- 26 Michigan residents enrolled in undergraduate degree programs who
- 27 are qualified and who apply before July 1 of each year for the next

- 1 academic year.
- 2 (3) Pursuant to section 5 of 1966 PA 313, MCL 390.995, and
- 3 subject to subsections (7) and (8), the department of treasury
- 4 shall determine an actual maximum tuition grant award per student,
- 5 which shall be no less than \$1,512.00, that ensures that the

- 18 reporting institution and successfully completed a program or
- 19 graduated.
- 20 (9) By February 1, 2016, 2017, each independent college and
- 21 university participating in the tuition grant program shall report
- 22 to the senate and house appropriations subcommittees on higher
- 23 education, the senate and house fiscal agencies, and the state
- 24 budget director on its efforts to develop and implement sexual
- 25 assault response training for the institution's title IX
- 26 coordinator, campus law enforcement personnel, campus public safety
- 27 personnel, and any other campus personnel charged with responding

- 1 to on-campus incidents, including information on sexual assault
- 2 response training materials and the status of implementing sexual
- 3 assault response training for institutional personnel.
- 4 Sec. 254. The sums appropriated in section 236 for the state
