21	Sec. 201. Pursuant to section 30 of article IX of the state	
22	constitution of 1963, total state spending from state resources	
23	under part 1 for fiscal year 2018-2019 is \$93,852,100.00 and state	
24	spending from state resources to be paid to local units of	
25	government for fiscal year 2018-2019 is \$14,567,700.00. The

- 7 Sec. 202. The appropriations authorized under this part and
- 8 part 1 are subject to the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431,
- 9 MCL 18.1101 to 18.1594.
- Sec. 203. As used in this part and part 1:
- 11 (a) "Department" means the Michigan department of education.
- 12 (b) "District" means a local school district as that term is
- 13 defined in section 6 of the revised school code, 1976 PA 451, MCL
- 14 380.6, or a public school academy as that term is defined in
- 15 section 5 of the revised school code, 1976 PA 451, MCL 380.5.
- 16 (c) "FTE" means full-time equated.
- 17 (d) "IDG" means interdepartmental grant.
- 18 Sec. 204. The departments and agencies receiving
- 19 appropriations in part 1 shall use the internet to fulfill the
- 20 reporting requirements of this part. This requirement may include
- 21 transmission of reports via electronic mail to the recipients
- 22 identified for each reporting requirement, or it may include
- 23 placement of reports on an internet or intranet site.
- Sec. 205. Funds appropriated in part 1 shall not be used for
- 25 the purchase of foreign goods or services, or both, if
- 26 competitively priced and of comparable quality American goods or
- 27 services, or both, are available. Preference shall be given to

- 1 goods or services, or both, manufactured or provided by Michigan
- 2 businesses, if they are competitively priced and of comparable
- 3 quality. In addition, preference should be given to goods or
- 4 services, or both, that are manufactured or provided by Michigan
- 5 businesses owned and operated by veterans, if they are
- 6 competitively priced and of comparable quality.
- 7 Sec. 206. The state superintendent of public instruction shall
- 8 take all reasonable steps to ensure businesses in deprived and
- 9 depressed communities compete for and perform contracts to provide
- 10 services or supplies, or both. The state superintendent of public
- 11 instruction shall strongly encourage firms with which the
- 12 department contracts to subcontract with certified businesses in
- 13 depressed and deprived communities for services, supplies, or both.
- 14 Sec. 207. The departments and agencies receiving
- 15 appropriations in part 1 shall prepare a report on out-of-state
- 16 travel expenses not later than January 1 of each year. The travel
- 17 report shall be a listing of all travel by classified and
- 18 unclassified employees outside this state in the immediately
- 19 preceding fiscal year that was funded in whole or in part with
- 20 funds appropriated in the department's budget. The report shall be
- 21 submitted to the senate and house appropriations committees, the
- 22 house and senate fiscal agencies, and the state budget director.
- 23 The report must include the following information:
- 24 (a) The dates of each travel occurrence.
- 25 (b) The transportation and related costs of each travel
- 26 occurrence, including the proportion funded with state general
- 27 fund/general purpose revenues, the proportion funded with state

- 1 restricted revenues, the proportion funded with federal revenues,
- 2 and the proportion funded with other revenues.
- 3 Sec. 208. Funds appropriated in part 1 shall not be used by a
- 4 principal executive department, state agency, or authority to hire
- 5 a person to provide legal services that are the responsibility of
- 6 the attorney general. This prohibition does not apply to legal
- 7 services for bonding activities and for those outside services that
- 8 the attorney general authorizes.
- 9 Sec. 209. Not later than November 30, the state budget office
- 10 shall prepare and transmit a report that provides for estimates of
- 11 the total general fund/general purpose appropriation lapses at the
- 12 close of the prior fiscal year. This report shall summarize the
- 13 projected year-end general fund/general purpose appropriation
- 14 lapses by major departmental program or program areas. The report
- 15 shall be transmitted to the chairpersons of the senate and house
- 16 appropriations committees and the senate and house fiscal agencies.
- Sec. 210. (1) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1,
- 18 there is appropriated an amount not to exceed \$10,000,000.00 for
- 19 federal contingency funds. These funds are not available for
- 20 expenditure until they have been transferred to another line item
- 21 in part 1 under section 393(2) of the management and budget act,
- 22 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1393.
- 23 (2) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1, there is
- 24 appropriated an amount not to exceed \$700,000.00 for state
- 25 restricted contingency funds. These funds are not available for
- 26 expenditure until they have been transferred to another line item
- 27 in part 1 under section 393(2) of the management and budget act,

- 1 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1393.
- 2 (3) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1, there is
- 3 appropriated an amount not to exceed \$250,000.00 for local
- 4 contingency funds. These funds are not available for expenditure
- 5 until they have been transferred to another line item in part 1
- 6 under section 393(2) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431,
- **7** MCL 18.1393.
- 8 (4) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1, there is
- 9 appropriated an amount not to exceed \$3,000,000.00 for private
- 10 contingency funds. These funds are not available for expenditure
- 11 until they have been transferred to another line item in part 1
- 12 under section 393(2) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431,
- **13** MCL 18.1393.
- Sec. 211. The department shall cooperate with the department
- 15 of technology, management, and budget to maintain a searchable
- 16 website accessible by the public at no cost that includes, but is
- 17 not limited to, all of the following for each department or agency:
- (a) Fiscal year-to-date expenditures by category.
- 19 (b) Fiscal year-to-date expenditures by appropriation unit.
- (c) Fiscal year-to-date payments to a selected vendor,
- 21 including the vendor name, payment date, payment amount, and
- 22 payment description.
- 23 (d) The number of active department employees by job
- 24 classification.
- (e) Job specifications and wage rates.
- 26 Sec. 212. Within 14 days after the release of the executive
- 27 budget recommendation, the department shall cooperate with the

- 1 state budget office to provide the senate and house appropriations
- 2 chairs, the chairs of the senate and house appropriations
- 3 subcommittees responsible for the department budget, and the senate
- 4 and house fiscal agencies with an annual report on estimated state
- 5 restricted fund balances, state restricted fund projected revenues,
- 6 and state restricted fund expenditures for the fiscal years ending
- 7 September 30, 2018 and September 30, 2019.
- 8 Sec. 213. The department shall maintain, on a publicly
- 9 accessible website, a department scorecard that identifies, tracks,
- 10 and regularly updates key metrics that are used to monitor and
- 11 improve the department's performance.
- 12 Sec. 214. Total authorized appropriations from all sources
- 13 under part 1 for legacy costs for the fiscal year ending September
- 14 30, 2019 are estimated at \$15,595,300.00. From this amount, total
- 15 agency appropriations for pension-related legacy costs are
- 16 estimated at \$7,189,700.00. Total agency appropriations for retiree
- 17 health care legacy costs are estimated at \$8,405,600.00.
- 18 Sec. 215. The department shall provide through the internet
- 19 the state board of education agenda and all supporting documents,
- 20 and shall notify the state budget director and the senate and house
- 21 fiscal agencies that the agenda and supporting documents are
- 22 available on the internet, at the time the agenda and supporting
- 23 documents are provided to state board of education members.
- Sec. 217. The department may assist the department of health
- 25 and human services, other departments, and local school districts
- 26 to secure reimbursement for eligible services provided in Michigan
- 27 schools from the federal Medicaid program. The department may

- 1 submit reports of direct expenses related to this effort to the
- 2 department of health and human services for reimbursement.
- 3 Sec. 219. From the funds appropriated in part 1, the
- 4 department shall ensure that kindergarten benchmark data include a
- 5 method for information to be provided regarding a child's
- 6 participation in the great start readiness program.
- 7 Sec. 220. The department shall post on its website a link to
- 8 the federal Institute of Education Sciences' What Works
- 9 Clearinghouse. The department also shall work to disseminate
- 10 knowledge about the What Works Clearinghouse to districts and
- 11 intermediate districts so that it may be used to improve reading
- 12 proficiency for pupils in grades K to 3.
- 13 Sec. 221. The department shall require all districts and
- 14 intermediate school districts to maintain complete records within
- 15 the personnel file of a teacher or school employee of any
- 16 disciplinary actions taken by the governing board against the
- 17 teacher or employee for sexual misconduct. The records shall not be
- 18 destroyed or removed from the teacher's or employee's personnel
- 19 file except as required by a court order.
- 20 Sec. 222. The department shall not take disciplinary action
- 21 against an employee who communicates truthfully and factually with
- 22 a member of the legislature or his or her staff.
- 23 Sec. 223. The department and agencies receiving appropriations
- 24 in part 1 shall receive and retain copies of all reports funded
- 25 from appropriations in part 1. Federal and state guidelines for
- 26 short-term and long-term retention of records shall be followed.
- 27 The department may electronically retain copies of reports unless

- 1 otherwise required by federal and state guidelines.
- 2 Sec. 225. (1) The department shall do all of the following:
- 3 (a) Not later than October 1, 2018, send districts and post on
- 4 its publicly accessible website a list of the grants available in
- 5 the current state fiscal year under article I of the state school
- 6 aid act of 1979, 1979 PA 94, MCL 388.1601 to 388.1772.
- 7 (b) Not later than November 1, 2018, open the grant
- 8 application process status for grant funds appropriated in the
- 9 current state fiscal year under article I of the state school aid
- 10 act of 1979, 1979 PA 94, MCL 388.1601 to 388.1772.
- 11 (c) Not later than December 1, 2018, award all grants.
- 12 (2) If the department fails to comply with subdivision (a),
- 13 (b), or (c), the state money appropriated in part 1 for state
- 14 board/superintendent operations shall be reduced by 1%.
- 15 Sec. 226. From the funds appropriated in part 1, the
- 16 department shall coordinate with the other departments to
- 17 streamline state services and resources, reduce duplication, and
- 18 increase efficiency. This includes, but is not limited to, working
- 19 with the department of treasury to coordinate with the financial
- 20 independence team and overseeing deficit districts and working with
- 21 the department of health and human services and department of
- 22 licensing and regulatory affairs to coordinate with early childhood
- 23 programs and overseeing child care providers.
- Sec. 227. (1) The department shall provide data requested by a
- 25 member of the legislature, his or her staff, or the house and
- 26 senate fiscal agencies in a timely manner. If the department fails
- 27 to provide reasonably requested data within 30 days after the

- 1 request, the state money appropriated in part 1 for state
- 2 board/superintendent operations shall be reduced by 1%.
- 3 (2) If the department fails to provide to the legislature
- 4 reports and other data required by boilerplate or statute within 30
- 5 days after the date the information is due, the state money
- 6 appropriated in part 1 for state board/superintendent operations
- 7 shall be reduced by 1%.
- 8 Sec. 229. The department shall not enter into a contract
- 9 funded under part 1 that exceeds \$1,000,000.00, submit federal
- 10 accountability plans, or request amendments to federal
- 11 accountability plans until after notification of the content to
- 12 both the house and senate appropriations committees and the state
- 13 budget director.
- Sec. 230. From the funds appropriated in part 1, the
- 15 department shall compile a report that identifies any new, or lack
- 16 thereof, mandates required of nonpublic schools. In compiling the
- 17 report, the department may consult with relevant statewide
- 18 education associations in Michigan. The report compiled by the
- 19 department shall indicate the type of mandate, including, but not
- 20 limited to, student health, student or building safety,
- 21 accountability, and educational requirements, and shall indicate
- 22 whether a school has to report on the specified mandates. The
- 23 report required under this section shall be completed by April 1,
- 24 2019 and transmitted to the state budget director, the house and
- 25 senate appropriations subcommittees responsible for the department
- 26 of education, and the senate and house fiscal agencies not later
- 27 than April 15, 2019.

- 2 Sec. 301. (1) The appropriations in part 1 may be used for per
- 3 diem payments to the state board for meetings at which a quorum is
- 4 present or for performing official business authorized by the state
- 5 board. The per diem payments shall be at a rate as follows:
- 6 (a) State board of education president \$110.00 per day.
- 7 (b) State board of education member other than president -
- **8** \$100.00 per day.
- 9 (2) A state board of education member shall not be paid a per
- 10 diem for more than 30 days per year.
- 11 Sec. 302. From the amount appropriated in part 1 to the state
- 12 board of education, not more than \$35,000.00 shall be expended in
- 13 the current fiscal year for in-state travel and out-of-state travel
- 14 directly related to the duties of the state board of education.

## 15 CENTRAL SUPPORT

- Sec. 325. Within 10 days of the receipt of a grant
- 17 appropriated in the federal and private grants line item in part 1,
- 18 the department shall notify the house and senate chairpersons of
- 19 the appropriations subcommittees responsible for the department
- 20 budget, the house and senate fiscal agencies, and the state budget
- 21 director of the receipt of the grant, including the funding source,
- 22 purpose, and amount of the grant.

## 23 SPECIAL EDUCATION SERVICES

- 24 Sec. 350. From the funds in part 1 for special education
- 25 operations, the department shall perform the following activities:

- 1 (a) Design and distribute to all parents and legal guardians
- 2 of a student with a disability information about federal and state
- 3 mandates regarding the rights and protections of students with
- 4 disabilities, including, but not limited to, individualized
- 5 education programs to ensure that parents and legal guardians are
- 6 fully informed about laws, rules, procedural safeguards, problem-
- 7 solving options, and any other information the department
- 8 determines is necessary so that parents and legal guardians may be
- 9 able to provide meaningful input in collaboration with districts to
- 10 develop and implement an individualized education program.
- 11 (b) Train mediators who are knowledgeable about the dispute
- 12 resolution system and state and federal mandates pertaining to the
- 13 rights and protections of students with disabilities outlined in
- 14 the federal individuals with disabilities education act, 20 USC
- 15 1400 to 1482, and the Michigan administrative rules for special
- 16 education programs and services, R 340.1701 to R 340.1862 of the
- 17 Michigan Administrative Code. This annual training will include
- 18 coursework, resources, and materials.

#### 19 MICHIGAN SCHOOLS FOR THE DEAF AND BLIND

- 20 Sec. 401. The employees at the Michigan Schools for the Deaf
- 21 and Blind who work on a school-year basis are considered annual
- 22 employees for purposes of service credits, retirement, and
- 23 insurance benefits.
- 24 Sec. 402. For each student enrolled at the Michigan Schools
- 25 for the Deaf and Blind, the department shall assess the
- 26 intermediate school district of residence 100% of the cost of

- 1 operating the student's instructional program. The amount shall
- 2 exclude room and board related costs and the cost of weekend
- 3 transportation between the school and the student's home.
- 4 Sec. 406. (1) The Michigan Schools for the Deaf and Blind may
- 5 promote its residential program as a possible appropriate option
- 6 for children who are deaf or hard of hearing or who are blind or
- 7 visually impaired. The Michigan Schools for the Deaf and Blind
- 8 shall distribute information detailing its services to all
- 9 intermediate school districts in this state.
- 10 (2) Upon knowledge of or recognition by an intermediate school
- 11 district that a child in the district is deaf or hard of hearing or
- 12 blind or visually impaired, the intermediate school district shall
- 13 provide to the parents of the child the literature distributed by
- 14 the Michigan Schools for the Deaf and Blind to intermediate school
- 15 districts under subsection (1).
- 16 (3) Parents will continue to have a choice regarding the
- 17 educational placement of their deaf or hard-of-hearing children.
- 18 Sec. 407. Revenue received by the Michigan Schools for the
- 19 Deaf and Blind from gifts, bequests, and donations that is
- 20 unexpended at the end of the state fiscal year may be carried over
- 21 to the succeeding fiscal year and shall not revert to the general
- **22** fund.
- 23 Sec. 408. (1) The funds appropriated in part 1 for the low
- 24 incidence outreach fund are appropriated from money collected by
- 25 the Michigan Schools for the Deaf and Blind and the low incidence
- 26 outreach program for providing qualified services and may be used
- 27 for any expenses necessary to provide the qualified services. Any

- 1 money that is unexpended at the end of the current fiscal year may
- 2 be carried forward into the succeeding fiscal year.
- 3 (2) As used in this section, "qualified services" means
- 4 document reproduction and services; conducting conferences,
- 5 workshops, and training classes; and providing specialized
- 6 equipment, facilities, and software.
- 7 Sec. 409. When conducting a due process hearing resulting from
- 8 a parent's appeal of his or her child's individualized education
- 9 program team's decision on the child's educational placement, a
- 10 state administrative law judge shall consider designating the
- 11 Michigan Schools for the Deaf and Blind as the least restrictive
- 12 environment under federal law for the parent's child who is deaf,
- 13 deafblind, or hard of hearing.

#### 14 PROFESSIONAL PREPARATION SERVICES

- 15 Sec. 501. From the funds appropriated in part 1 for
- 16 professional preparation services, the department shall maintain
- 17 certificate revocation/felony conviction files of educational
- 18 personnel.
- 19 Sec. 502. The department shall authorize teacher preparation
- 20 institutions to provide an alternative program by which up to 1/2
- 21 of the required student internship or student teaching credits may
- 22 be earned through substitute teaching. The department shall require
- 23 that teacher preparation institutions collaborate with school
- 24 districts to ensure that the quality of instruction provided to
- 25 student teachers is comparable to that required in a traditional
- 26 student teaching program.

- 1 Sec. 503. From the funds appropriated in part 1, the
- 2 department shall, upon request, consult with the Michigan Virtual
- 3 Research Institute and external stakeholders in connection with the
- 4 department's implementation and administration of professional
- 5 development training described in section 35a of the state school
- 6 aid act of 1979, 1979 PA 94, MCL 388.1635a, including, but not
- 7 limited to, the online training of educators of pupils in grades K
- 8 to 3 described in that section.
- 9 Sec. 506. Revenue received from teacher testing fees that is
- 10 unexpended at the end of the current fiscal year may be carried
- 11 over to the succeeding fiscal year and shall not revert to the
- 12 general fund.
- Sec. 507. From the funds appropriated in part 1, the
- 14 department shall adopt a teacher certification test that ensures
- 15 that all newly certified elementary teachers have the skills to
- 16 deliver evidence-based literacy instruction. The department may use
- 17 teacher certification or teacher testing fee revenue to the extent
- 18 allowable under law to implement this section, or may pass along
- 19 increased testing fees to teachers as allowable and appropriate.
- 20 Sec. 508. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1, the
- 21 department shall create the Michigan teacher council within the
- 22 department for the following purposes:
- (a) Provide feedback to the superintendent of public
- 24 instruction, the state board, and the legislature on initiatives
- 25 that it considers critical to the development of attracting,
- 26 preparing, and retaining teachers.
- 27 (b) Provide guidance on best practices for developing the

- 1 profession of teaching, including, but not limited to, effective
- 2 preparation and compensation, and for creating the best teacher
- 3 infrastructure to serve this state.
- 4 (c) Provide advice to the governor and the legislature on
- 5 subjects regarding public education, including, but not limited to,
- 6 building a model for teacher compensation, rewarding teachers for
- 7 exemplary service, making the teaching profession an attractive
- 8 option for prospective educators, and instituting practices that
- 9 help retain quality teachers in the classroom.
- 10 (2) The council shall consist of the following members:
- 11 (a) Two members who are participating in a higher education
- 12 teacher preparation program, appointed by the governor.
- 13 (b) Four members who are public school teachers in this state,
- 14 each appointed by the majority and minority leaders of the house
- 15 and senate.
- 16 (c) One member appointed by the superintendent of public
- 17 instruction nominated by the Michigan Education Association.
- 18 (d) One member appointed by the superintendent of public
- 19 instruction nominated by the American Federation of Teachers.
- (e) Three members appointed by the superintendent of public
- 21 instruction nominated from a school management organization, a
- 22 nonprofit organization that engages in teacher and education
- 23 research, and a superintendent of a school district.
- 24 (3) Members shall be appointed to the council within 90 days
- 25 after the effective date of the bill and shall serve for 4 years or
- 26 until a successor is appointed. Vacancies shall be replaced in the
- 27 same manner as the original appointment.

- 1 (4) At the first meeting the council shall elect a
- 2 chairperson, and the council shall meet at least quarterly, and
- 3 more frequently if called for by the chairperson or a majority of
- 4 the members. A majority of members is required for a quorum. All
- 5 meetings shall be held in compliance with the open meetings act,
- 6 1976 PA 267, MCL 15.261 to 15.275. All writings prepared, owned,
- 7 used, and in the possession of the council are subject to the
- 8 freedom of information act, 1976 PA 442, MCL 15.231 to 15.246.
- 9 Members shall not be compensated for their service, but may be
- 10 reimbursed for their actual and necessary expenses incurred in the
- 11 performance of their duties on the council.

## 12 SCHOOL SUPPORT SERVICES

- Sec. 601. From the funds appropriated in part 1, there is
- 14 appropriated an amount not to exceed \$1,000,000.00 for
- 15 implementation costs associated with programs for early childhood
- 16 literacy funded under section 35a of the state school aid act of
- 17 1979, 1979 PA 94, MCL 388.1635a.
- 18 Sec. 602. From the funds appropriated in part 1, there is
- 19 appropriated \$100.00 to replace federal funding reductions from the
- 20 HHS Centers for Disease Control and Prevention to the department
- 21 and section 39a(2)(a) of the state school aid act of 1979, 1979 PA
- **22** 94, MCL 388.1639a.

## 23 FIELD SERVICES

- Sec. 701. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for field
- 25 services operations, the department shall produce a report

- 1 detailing the progress made by districts with grades K to 3
- 2 receiving at-risk funding under section 31a of the state school aid
- 3 act of 1979, 1979 PA 94, MCL 388.1631a, in implementing multitiered
- 4 systems of supports in the prior school fiscal year for grades 4 to
- 5 8, and in providing reading intervention services described in
- 6 section 1280f of the revised school code, 1976 PA 451, MCL
- 7 380.1280f, for pupils in grades K to 3.
- 8 (2) The report described in subsection (1) shall include, at a
- 9 minimum:
- 10 (a) A description of the training, coaching, and technical
- 11 assistance offered by the department to districts to support the
- 12 implementation of effective multitiered systems of supports and
- 13 reading intervention programs.
- 14 (b) A list of districts determined by the department to have
- 15 successfully implemented multitiered systems of supports and
- 16 reading intervention programs.
- 17 (c) A list of best practices that the department has
- 18 identified that may be used by districts to implement multitiered
- 19 systems of supports and reading intervention programs.
- 20 (d) Other information the department determines would be
- 21 useful to understanding the status of districts' implementation of
- 22 effective multitiered systems of supports and reading intervention
- 23 programs.
- 24 (3) The department shall provide the report described in
- 25 subsection (1) to the state budget director, the house and senate
- 26 subcommittees that oversee the department of education and school

- 22 Sec. 1007. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for child

- 24 create progress reports that shall include, but are not limited to,
- 25 the following:

- 27 to improve child care provider quality and the number of times

- 19 Sec. 1008. From the amount appropriated in part 1 for office
- 20 of great start operations, the department shall work with the
- 21 department of health and human services to coordinate services
- 22 provided to families for home visits, reduce duplication of state
- 23 services and spending, and increase efficiencies including the home
- 24 visits funded under section 32p of the state school aid act of
- 25 1979, 1979 PA 94, MCL 388.1632p.
- 26 Sec. 1009. From the funds appropriated in part 1 for child
- 27 development and care public assistance, the department shall ensure

- 1 that the entrance threshold for the child development and care
- 2 program is 130% of the federal poverty guidelines.
- 3 Sec. 1010. Within 10 days of the receipt of changes to the
- 4 federal child care and development program, the department shall
