3 compliance with section 451a(1) of the management and budget act,
4 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1451a:

5 (a) The purpose of the work project is to create and implement
6 a 1-time grant program for entities interested in establishing
7 crisis stabilization units or psychiatric residential treatment
8 facilities.

9 (b) The work project will be accomplished by utilizing state
10 employees, contracts, or both.

11 (c) The total estimated completion cost of the work project is
12 \$10,000,000.00.

13 (d) The tentative completion date is September 30, 2025.

14 Sec. 416. From the funds appropriated in part 1 for private
15 accredited child welfare agency coronavirus relief grants, the
16 department of health and human services shall allocate
17 \$3,000,000.00 to child welfare agencies that are members of the
18 Association of Accredited Child and Family Agencies for eligible
19 expenses related to COVID-19 including, but not limited to,
20 personal protection equipment, facility modification, and
21 technology upgrades.

22
23 **DEPARTMENT OF LABOR AND ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITY**

24 Sec. 451. The funds appropriated in part 1 for agricultural
25 processing support grants shall be used for grants to aid the
26 recovery of Michigan's agricultural supply chain businesses,
27 including, but not limited to, processing plants, abattoirs, and
28 storage facilities. Grants may be used by the grantee to purchase
29 personal protective equipment, provide training, and any other



1 goods or services that facilitate the recovery of agricultural
2 supply chain businesses.

3 Sec. 452. (1) The funds appropriated in part 1 for the
4 community health campuses pilot project shall be awarded for a
5 pilot project that develops an integrated wellness facility that
6 includes mental, physical, and behavioral health components,
7 including, but not limited to, the following services:

8 (a) Rehabilitation.

9 (b) Optical.

10 (c) Dental.

11 (d) Primary care.

12 (e) Urgent care.

13 (f) Chiropractic.

14 (g) Community mental health.

15 (h) Child care.

16 (2) The pilot project must be designed to serve underserved
17 areas where access to one stop wellness is deficient or absent. In
18 addition to the health components, the integrated wellness facility
19 must include, at a minimum, indoor aquatics, gymnasium, and workout
20 facilities in the same facility. The workout facilities must
21 provide no or low-cost access to individuals earning less than 200%
22 of the federal poverty level. Individuals at or above 200% of the
23 federal poverty level may be charged a fee.

24 Sec. 453. The funds appropriated in part 1 for unemployment
25 insurance benefit claims monitoring must be used to support ongoing
26 costs related to unemployment insurance benefit claims monitoring
27 and fraud detection through the use of a third-party service that
28 provides a proprietary identity document capture and verification
29 solution.



1 Sec. 454. (1) The funds appropriated in part 1 for the
2 unemployment insurance stabilization fund shall be deposited into
3 the fund created in subsection (2) and expended pursuant to
4 subsection (3).

5 (2) The unemployment insurance stabilization fund is created
6 within the department of treasury. The state treasurer may receive
7 money or other assets from any source for deposit into the fund.
8 The state treasurer shall direct the investment of the fund. The
9 state treasurer shall credit to the fund interest and earnings from
10 the fund investments.

11 (3) All funds in the unemployment insurance stabilization fund
12 are appropriated and available for expenditure only to provide a
13 stabilization payment to the unemployment trust fund administered
14 by the unemployment insurance agency subject to the following
15 conditions:

16 (a) If the balance of the unemployment trust fund falls below
17 \$235,000,000.00, the balance of the unemployment insurance
18 stabilization fund shall be deposited in the unemployment trust
19 fund.

20 (b) If the balance of the unemployment trust fund remains
21 above \$235,000,000.00 through September 30, 2021, any funds
22 remaining in the unemployment insurance stabilization fund shall
23 lapse to the fund from which they were originally received.
24 Interest and earnings from fund investments shall lapse to the
25 general fund.

26
27 **LEGISLATURE**

28 Sec. 501. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for
29 independent studies, \$750,000.00 is appropriated to the legislative



1 council to establish and utilize a legislative independent study
2 work group that will contract with a third-party vendor for a study
3 that compares pupil learning loss across virtual, hybrid, and in-
4 person instruction in the state of Michigan and reports on whether
5 there are any statistically significant differences in student
6 growth between virtual, hybrid, and in-person instruction. The
7 study must emphasize students who were in traditional, in-person
8 classrooms in the 2018-2019 school year and compare student growth
9 between the 2019-2020 school year and the 2020-2021 school year by
10 virtual, hybrid, and in-person instruction method.

11 (2) The study must include a measurement of student growth
12 between the 2019-2020 school year and the 2020-2021 school year by
13 predominate learning method by grade level for each school district
14 and intermediate school district categorizing grade levels as
15 follows:

16 (a) Grades mostly virtual, which means districts that had 100%
17 virtual-only instruction option for all students within a grade
18 level for 50% or more of the school year.

19 (b) Grades partially virtual, which means districts that had
20 100% virtual-only instruction option for all students within a
21 grade level for more than 25% of the school year but less than 50%
22 of the school year.

23 (c) Grades hybrid, which means districts that offered a hybrid
24 of in-person and virtual instruction to students within a grade
25 level that do not fit subdivision (a), (b), (d), or (e).

26 (d) Grades partially in-person, which means districts not
27 described in subdivision (a) or (b) that offered in-person
28 instruction for a minimum of 80% of students within a grade level
29 for more than 25% of the school year but not more than 50% of the



1 school year.

2 (e) Grades mostly in-person, which means districts not
3 described in subdivision (a) or (b) that offered in-person
4 instruction for a minimum of 80% of students within a grade level
5 for more than 50% of the school year.

6 (3) The study must include a measurement of student growth
7 between the 2019-2020 school year and the 2020-2021 school year by
8 predominate learning method, determined by a weighted average of
9 all learning methods utilized throughout the district categorizing
10 districts as follows:

11 (a) District mostly virtual, which means districts that had
12 100% virtual-only instruction option for all students for 50% or
13 more of the school year.

14 (b) Districts partially virtual, which means districts that
15 had 100% virtual-only instruction option for all students for more
16 than 25% of the school year but less than 50% of the school year.

17 (c) Districts hybrid, which means districts that offered a
18 hybrid of in-person and virtual instruction that do not fit
19 subdivision (a), (b), (d), or (e).

20 (d) Districts partially in-person, which means districts not
21 described in subdivision (a) or (b) that offered in-person
22 instruction for a minimum of 80% of students for more than 25% of
23 the school year but not more than 50% of the school year.

24 (e) Districts mostly in-person, which means districts not
25 described in subdivision (a) or (b) that offered in-person
26 instruction for a minimum of 80% of students for more than 50% of
27 the school year.

28 (4) The legislative council shall establish a legislative
29 independent study work group with the authority to issue a request



1 for proposal and select a vendor to conduct the study described in
2 this section. The legislative independent study work group shall
3 consist of 1 republican member of the Michigan senate, 1 democratic
4 member of the Michigan senate, 1 republican member of the Michigan
5 house of representatives, and 1 democratic member of the Michigan
6 house of representatives. The legislative independent study work
7 group shall issue a request for proposal for a vendor to conduct
8 the study identified in this section not later than 30 days after
9 the enactment of this bill and select a vendor to conduct the study
10 identified in this section not later than 60 days after enactment
11 of this bill.

12 (5) The study shall be transmitted to the senate and house of
13 representatives appropriations committees, the senate and house
14 fiscal agencies, and the state budget office not later than
15 September 30, 2021.

16 (6) As used in this section, "district" includes a public
17 school academy.

18 Sec. 502. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for
19 independent studies, \$750,000.00 is appropriated to the legislative
20 council to establish and utilize a legislative independent study
21 work group that will contract with a third-party vendor for a study
22 that examines the effect of COVID-19 stay-at-home orders,
23 shutdowns, and other mandates on COVID-19 outcomes in Michigan,
24 including the number of COVID-19 cases, hospitalizations, and
25 deaths. The study must include, but is not limited to, the
26 following:

27 (a) The effect of state's COVID-19 stay-at-home orders,
28 shutdowns, and other mandates on the magnitude and timing of cases
29 and case rates in Michigan compared to other states. This must



1 include a comprehensive analysis of both the short-term and long-
2 term effects of state COVID-19 stay-at-home orders, shutdowns, and
3 other mandates on cases and case rates and an analysis of whether
4 the state COVID-19 stay-at-home orders, shutdowns, and other
5 mandates were effective at reducing the overall number of cases and
6 case rates or whether they altered the timing of when cases
7 occurred and were not effective at reducing overall cases and case
8 rates.

9 (b) A detailed comparison of COVID-19 outcomes and metrics in
10 Michigan to COVID-19 outcomes and metrics in Illinois, Indiana,
11 Ohio, and Wisconsin that incorporates state policy actions,
12 including COVID-19 stay-at-home orders, shutdowns, and other
13 mandates.

14 (c) A comparative analysis of the economic impact Michigan's
15 COVID-19 state-at-home orders, shutdowns, and other mandates
16 against Illinois, Indiana, Ohio, and Wisconsin. This analysis must
17 also include findings identifying any measurable differences in
18 COVID-19 positivity rates per capita, serious illness per capita,
19 and mortality per capita.

20 (d) Information on the effectiveness of mask mandates on
21 COVID-19 metrics in youth athletics that must provide, at a
22 minimum, a comparison of Michigan's COVID-19 metrics in youth to
23 COVID-19 metrics in states without mask mandates for youth
24 athletics. Youth COVID-19 metrics to be compared must include, but
25 not be limited to, positivity rate per capita, serious illness per
26 capita, and mortality rate per capita.

27 (2) The legislative council shall establish a legislative
28 independent study work group with the authority to issue a request
29 for proposal and select a vendor to conduct the study described in



1 this section. The legislative independent study work group shall
2 consist of 1 republican member of the Michigan senate, 1 democratic
3 member of the Michigan senate, 1 republican member of the Michigan
4 house of representatives, and 1 democratic member of the Michigan
5 house of representatives. The legislative independent study work
6 group shall issue a request for proposal for a vendor to conduct
7 the study identified in this section not later than 30 days after
8 the enactment of this bill and select a vendor to conduct the study
9 identified in this section not later than 60 days after enactment
10 of this bill.

11 (3) The study shall be transmitted to the senate and house of
12 representatives appropriations committees, the senate and house
13 fiscal agencies, and the state budget office not later than
14 September 30, 2021.

15
16 **DEPARTMENT OF MILITARY AND VETERANS AFFAIRS**

17 Sec. 541. Funds appropriated in part 1 for premium pay for
18 frontline employees must include premium payments to social
19 workers, activity staff, dietary service staff, and other facility
20 staff of the Michigan veteran homes who have performed hazardous
21 duty or work involving physical hardship related to COVID-19 among
22 other staff identified by the Michigan veterans facility authority
23 to receive premium payments. Premium payments must be distributed
24 equally among all eligible employees.

25
26 **DEPARTMENT OF TECHNOLOGY, MANAGEMENT, AND BUDGET**

27 Sec. 551. Funds appropriated in part 1 for broadband expansion
28 act of Michigan must be used to support the statewide broadband
29 service grant program created under the broadband expansion act of



1 Michigan, 2020 PA 224, MCL 484.3251 to 484.3261.

2 Sec. 552. Funds appropriated in part 1 for state employee
3 rightsizing are appropriated for the purpose of providing an
4 incentive for state workers to leave state employment due to the
5 increased efficiency of the state workforce. This incentive may not
6 be used for an early-out retirement program or severances not
7 related to increased state employee efficiency. The value of any
8 rightsizing incentive is capped at an amount equal to 6 weeks of
9 pay.

10 Sec. 553. (1) Funds appropriated in part 1 for state facility
11 divestments must be expended to support costs associated with
12 divesting state-owned buildings and office space. Allowable costs
13 for use of the funds include, but are not limited to, those
14 associated with selling a building or property and demolition.

15 (2) The department of technology, management, and budget must
16 submit a report not later than June 1 that provides a list of
17 expenditures and a description of the property or building and the
18 benefit of each expenditure. The report must also include
19 information on additional state facilities under consideration for
20 divestment. The report must be submitted to the senate and house
21 appropriations committees, the senate and house appropriations
22 subcommittees on general government, the senate and house fiscal
23 agencies, and the state budget office.

24 Sec. 554. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for
25 venture Michigan fund II voucher purchase, the state budget
26 director is authorized to pay the portion prescribed in subdivision
27 (c) of the outstanding monetary obligations owed by venture
28 Michigan fund, a Michigan early stage venture investment
29 corporation created under the Michigan early stage venture



1 investment act of 2003, 2003 PA 296, MCL 125.2231 to 125.2263, to
2 Stanton Equity Trading Delaware LLC under that certain loan
3 agreement, dated as of December 22, 2010, between venture Michigan
4 fund and Stanton Equity Trading Delaware LLC, as amended, in return
5 for surrender to the state treasurer all of the tax voucher
6 certificates issued by venture Michigan fund for the benefit of
7 Stanton Equity Trading Delaware LLC under section 23 of the
8 Michigan early stage venture investment act of 2003, 2003 PA 296,
9 MCL 125.2253, with the following stipulations:

10 (a) Venture Michigan fund borrowed funds under the loan
11 agreement pursuant to section 17 of the Michigan early stage
12 venture investment act of 2003, 2003 PA 296, MCL 125.2247, and
13 Stanton Equity Trading Delaware LLC is the only lender.

14 (b) The prepayment of all outstanding monetary obligations
15 owed by venture Michigan fund to Stanton Equity Trading Delaware
16 LLC are made as provided in the loan agreement.

17 (c) Venture Michigan fund contributes not less than
18 \$120,000,000.00 of the prepayment of all outstanding monetary
19 obligations owed by venture Michigan fund to Stanton Equity Trading
20 Delaware LLC under the loan agreement, with the payment from the
21 state budget director authorized under this subsection limited to
22 the balance of all the outstanding monetary obligations owed by
23 venture Michigan fund to Stanton Equity Trading Delaware LLC under
24 the loan agreement.

25 (d) If the amount appropriated in part 1 for venture Michigan
26 fund II voucher purchase is insufficient to pay the portion to be
27 paid by the state budget director of all of the outstanding
28 monetary obligations of venture Michigan fund owed to Stanton
29 Equity Trading Delaware LLC, then there is appropriated not more



1 than \$1,500,000.00 from the state general fund for that purpose
2 only.

3 (e) The prepayment of all the outstanding monetary obligations
4 of venture Michigan fund owed to Stanton Equity Trading Delaware
5 LLC must be conditioned upon surrender to the state treasurer of
6 all tax voucher certificates issued by venture Michigan fund for
7 the benefit of Stanton Equity Trading Delaware LLC under section 23
8 of the Michigan early stage venture investment act of 2003, 2003 PA
9 296, MCL 125.2253.

10 (f) The prepayment of all the outstanding monetary obligations
11 of venture Michigan fund owed to Stanton Equity Trading Delaware
12 LLC and the surrender of the tax voucher certificates to the state
13 treasurer shall occur not later than September 30, 2021.

14 (g) Any unexpended balance of the amounts appropriated in part
15 1 and in subdivision (d) shall lapse to the state general fund.

16 (2) Upon surrender of the tax voucher certificates to the
17 state treasurer, the state treasurer shall destroy the tax voucher
18 certificates.

19
20 **DEPARTMENT OF STATE POLICE**

21 Sec. 575. Funds appropriated in part 1 for first responder
22 bags shall be used by the department to purchase 1,200 Haynes first
23 responder bags for police cruisers.

24
25 **STATE TRANSPORTATION DEPARTMENT**

26 Sec. 601. (1) Funds appropriated in part 1 for local road and
27 bridge bundling initiative shall be expended by the department to
28 support a statewide program for the rehabilitation or replacement
29 of road and bridges owned by local road agencies. The department



1 shall coordinate the local road and bridge bundling initiative and
2 issue contracts necessary for planning, design, and construction
3 work related to roads and bridges selected for the program.

4 (2) The department shall provide a progress report on the
5 local road and bridge bundling initiative to the senate and house
6 appropriations subcommittees on transportation, the senate and
7 house fiscal agencies, and the state budget office by September 30.

8 Sec. 602. Funds appropriated in part 1 for state trunkline
9 fund bond advance repayment shall be used to retire bonds issued by
10 the Michigan state transportation department prior to January 1,
11 2021.

12 Sec. 603. (1) Funds appropriated in part 1 for transportation
13 bond repayment sinking fund shall be credited to the transportation
14 bond repayment sinking fund established in House Bill No. 4669 of
15 the 101st Legislature.

16 (2) Funds appropriated in part 1 for transportation bond
17 repayment sinking fund must not be spent or otherwise distributed
18 unless both of the following bills of the 101st Legislature are
19 enacted into law:

20 (a) House Bill No. 4082.

21 (b) House Bill No. 4669.

22
23 **DEPARTMENT OF TREASURY**

24 Sec. 651. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for
25 disaster relief, \$56,000.00 shall be awarded to a city with a
26 population between 3,000 and 4,000 located in a county with a
27 population between 63,000 and 64,000 according to the most recent
28 federal decennial census to cover the costs from disaster flooding
29 that occurred in 2019 that have not been reimbursed from other



1 sources.

2 (2) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for disaster relief,
3 \$2,400.00 shall be awarded to a city with a population between
4 5,000 and 6,000 located in a county with a population between
5 63,000 and 64,000 according to the most recent federal decennial
6 census to cover the costs from disaster flooding that occurred in
7 2019 that have not been reimbursed from other sources.

8 Sec. 652. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for great
9 start readiness program teacher COVID-19 grants, there is allocated
10 for only 2020-2021 an amount not to exceed \$15,000,000.00 for grants
11 to eligible teachers to recognize the additional time spent outside
12 of normal working hours and additional costs eligible teachers have
13 incurred as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic.

14 (2) The department shall distribute funding allocated under
15 this section directly to eligible teachers in an equal amount up to
16 \$500.00 per FTE eligible teacher employed by an eligible provider.
17 An eligible teacher that works full time and is calculated as 1.0
18 FTE will receive \$500.00 and an eligible teacher whose work time is
19 calculated as less than 1.0 FTE shall receive that portion of the
20 FTE applied to \$500.00. The department must distribute funding
21 allocated under this subsection as soon as it is feasible.

22 (3) The eligible teacher must certify to the eligible
23 provider, in a manner prescribed by the department, that he or she
24 worked additional time outside of normal working hours, experienced
25 hazardous conditions, or incurred additional costs related to
26 ensuring students could effectively participate in their eligible
27 provider's great start readiness program.

28 (4) Eligible providers shall provide to the department of
29 treasury a list of eligible teachers including their residency



1 address on file.

2 (5) Eligible providers shall maintain documentation of
3 eligibility for eligible teachers under subsection (3).

4 (6) If funds allocated under this section are insufficient to
5 award the amount in subsection (2) to each of the eligible
6 teachers, the department shall reduce the grant on an equal per
7 full-time and part-time prorated equated classroom teacher basis.

8 (7) The department may retain up to 1/2 of 1% of total funding
9 under this section for administration of this section.

10 (8) Any correspondence from the state of Michigan associated
11 with the issuance of the grant shall contain only information
12 indicating that the eligible teacher was eligible for the grant
13 under this section. The correspondence must be sent from the state
14 treasurer.

15 (9) As used in this section:

16 (a) "Eligible teacher" means a full-time or part-time teacher
17 with an assigned class with an eligible provider that is funded
18 under section 32d of the state school aid act of 1979, MCL
19 388.1632d, who taught students during the 2019-2020 school year and
20 submitted an approved certification under subsection (3). For the
21 purposes of this section, eligible teacher does not include
22 substitute teachers, paraprofessionals, support staff, or
23 administrators.

24 (b) "Eligible provider" means a great start readiness program
25 that receives funding under section 32d of the state school aid act
26 of 1979, MCL 388.1632d.

27 Sec. 653. (1) The funds appropriated in part 1 for water and
28 sewer replacement grants are to be used for a competitive grant
29 program that provides grants to local units of government for



1 eligible water and sewer replacement projects. Eligible water and
2 sewer replacement projects are projects that have been identified
3 in asset management plans under the stormwater, asset management,
4 and wastewater grant program administered by the Michigan
5 department of environment, Great Lakes, and energy. Not more than
6 10% of the total available for grants may be allocated to a local
7 unit of government. The department must require a 25% match in
8 funds from each local unit of government to which funds are
9 awarded.

10 (2) The department of treasury shall develop an application
11 process and detailed guidance for prospective participants to
12 follow to qualify under the program. The application and detailed
13 guidance must be posted on the department website and local units
14 of government must be notified when application and detailed
15 guidance materials are available.

16 (3) The department shall provide a report that includes, at a
17 minimum, individual grantees, grant amounts, and a detailed
18 description of the project. The report shall be transmitted to the
19 senate and house of representatives appropriations subcommittees,
20 the senate and house fiscal agencies, and the state budget office
21 not later than September 30, 2021.

22 (4) The unexpended funds appropriated in part 1 for water and
23 sewer replacement grants are designated as a work project
24 appropriation, and any unencumbered or unallotted funds shall not
25 lapse at the end of the fiscal year and shall be available for
26 expenditures for projects under this section until the projects
27 have been completed. The following is in compliance with section
28 451a(1) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL
29 18.1451a:



1 (a) The purpose of the project is to provide grants to local
2 units of government for eligible water and sewer replacement
3 projects.

4 (b) The project will be accomplished by utilizing state
5 employees or contracts with service providers, or both.

6 (c) The total estimated cost of this project is
7 \$250,000,000.00.

8 (d) The tentative completion date is September 30, 2025.
