SUBSTITUTE FOR SENATE BILL NO. 159

A bill to provide for certain investigations for violating the event online ticket sales act; to prescribe the powers and duties of certain state agencies and departments; and to prescribe civil sanctions and provide certain remedies.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF MICHIGAN ENACT:

- Sec. 1. For the purposes of this act, the definitions in section 3 of the event online ticket sales act apply to the use of those terms in this act.
- Sec. 3. The attorney general shall investigate a claim that a person has violated the event online ticket sales act.
- Sec. 5. (1) A person that violates the event online ticket sales act is subject to a civil fine of not more than \$5,000.00. A civil fine collected under this section must be deposited in the

- 2 (2) Each ticket transaction in which a ticket is acquired in
- 3 violation of the event online ticket sales act constitutes a
- 4 separate violation for the purpose of assessing a civil fine under
- 5 this section.
- 6 Sec. 7. (1) If the attorney general determines that a person
- 7 is in the process of violating the event online ticket sales act,
- 8 the attorney general may bring a civil action to restrain or enjoin
- 9 the person from continuing to violate the event online ticket sales
- 10 act.
- 11 (2) If the attorney general determines that a person has
- 12 violated the event online ticket sales act, the attorney general
- 13 may bring a civil action against the person to collect the civil
- 14 fine as provided for under section 5. The attorney general may also
- 15 recover restitution.
- 16 (3) A person that violates a court order or injunction issued
- 17 to enforce the event online ticket sales act is subject to a civil
- 18 fine of not more than \$5,000.00.
- 19 Sec. 9. The court may allow the attorney general to recover
- 20 reasonable costs and attorney fees incurred in an action resulting
- 21 in the imposition of a civil fine under this act.
- 22 Enacting section 1. This act does not take effect unless
- 23 Senate Bill No. 158 of the 103rd Legislature is enacted into law.
