## **HOUSE BILL No. 4130**

February 17, 1987, Introduced by Reps. Joe Young, Sr., DeMars, Harrison, Watkins, Perry Bullard, Maynard and Joe Young, Jr. and referred to the Committee on Transportation.

A bill to amend sections 2 and 698 of Act No. 300 of the Public Acts of 1949, entitled as amended "Michigan vehicle code,"

section 698 as amended by Act No. 326 of the Public Acts of 1984, being sections 257.2 and 257.698 of the Michigan Compiled Laws.

## THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF MICHIGAN ENACT:

- 1 Section 1. Sections 2 and 698 of Act No. 300 of the Public
- 2 Acts of 1949, section 698 as amended by Act No. 326 of the Public
- 3 Acts of 1984, being sections 257.2 and 257.698 of the Michigan
- 4 Compiled Laws, are amended to read as follows:
- 5 Sec. 2. "Authorized emergency vehicle" means -vehicles A
- 6 VEHICLE of the A fire department, A police vehicles,
- 7 ambulances, VEHICLE, AN AMBULANCE, OR A privately owned motor
- 8 -vehicles VEHICLE of A POLICE CHAPLAIN; OR IF AUTHORIZED BY THE
- 9 DEPARTMENT OF STATE POLICE, A PRIVATELY OWNED MOTOR VEHICLE OF A

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1 volunteer or paid firemen, or privately owned motor vehicles of

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- 2 FIREFIGHTER, A volunteer ambulance -drivers DRIVER, or A
- 3 licensed ambulance drivers or attendants as are authorized by
- 4 the department of state police DRIVER OR ATTENDANT.
- 5 Sec. 698. (1) A motor vehicle may be equipped with not more
- 6 than 2 side cowl or fender lamps which shall emit an amber or
- 7 white light without glare.
- 8 (2) A motor vehicle may be equipped with not more than 1
- 9 running board courtesy lamp on each side which shall emit a white
- 10 or amber light without glare.
- 11 (3) Backing lights of red, amber, or white may be mounted on
- 12 the rear of a motor vehicle if the switch controlling the light
- 13 is so arranged that the light may be turned on only if the vehi-
- 14 cle is in reverse gear. The backing lights when unlighted shall
- 15 be covered or otherwise arranged so as not to reflect objection-
- 16 able glare in the eyes of a driver of a vehicle approaching from
- 17 the rear.
- 18 (4) A lamp or reflector on a vehicle, other than those
- 19 expressly required or permitted by this chapter, if visible from
- 20 the front, shall display or reflect a white or amber light; if
- 21 visible from either side, shall display or reflect an amber or
- 22 red light; and if visible from the rear, shall display or reflect
- 23 a red light, except as otherwise provided by law.
- 24 (5) The use or possession of flashing, oscillating, or
- 25 rotating red, blue, or amber lights is prohibited except under
- 26 the following circumstances:

- 1 (a) A police vehicle shall be equipped with flashing,
- 2 rotating, or oscillating red or blue lights, for use in the
- 3 performance of police duties.
- 4 (b) A fire vehicle or ambulance available for public use or
- 5 for use of the United States, the state, or any unit of the
- 6 state, whether publicly or privately owned, shall be equipped
- 7 with flashing, rotating, or oscillating red lights and used as
- 8 required for safety.
- 9 (c) A school bus shall be equipped with flashing red lights
- 10 which shall be actuated by the driver only when the school bus is
- 11 stopped or stopping on a highway pursuant to section 682. A
- 12 school bus may also be equipped with a flashing, oscillating, or
- 13 rotating light mounted on the roof of the bus approximately 6
- 14 feet from the rear of the vehicle which displays a white light to
- 15 the front, side, and rear of the bus which light may be actuated
- 16 by the driver for use only in inclement weather such as fog,
- 17 rain, or snow, or when the school bus is stopped or stopping on a
- 18 highway pursuant to section 682, or where conditions hinder the
- 19 visibility of the school bus.
- 20 (d) If authorized by the department of state police, a pri-
- 21 vate motor vehicle owned by a volunteer or paid fire fighter, a
- 22 volunteer ambulance driver, or a licensed ambulance driver or
- 23 attendant, or an emergency support vehicle used exclusively for
- 24 emergencies and owned and operated by a federally recognized non-
- 25 profit charitable organization may be equipped with flashing,
- 26 rotating, or oscillating red lights for use when responding to an
- 27 emergency call if, when in use, the flashing, rotating, or

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- 1 oscillating red lights are mounted on the roof section of the
- 2 vehicle, either as a permanent installation or by means of suc-
- 3 tion cups or magnets and are clearly visible in a 360 degree arc
- 4 from a distance of 500 feet. when in use. A person operating
- 5 lights under this subdivision, at any time other than when
- 6 responding to an emergency call, is guilty of a misdemeanor.
- 7 (e) Flashing, rotating, or oscillating amber lights, placed
- 8 in a position SO as to be visible throughout an arc of 360
- 9 degrees, shall be used by a state, county, or municipal vehicle
- 10 engaged in the removal of ice, snow, or other material from the
- 11 highway and in other operations designed to control ice and
- 13 (f) A vehicle used to perform public utility service, an
- 14 automobile service car or wrecker, a vehicle engaged in autho-
- 15 rized highway repair or maintenance, a vehicle of a peace offi-
- 16 cer, a vehicle operated by a rural letter carrier, a vehicle uti-
- 17 lized for snow removal, a private security guard vehicle as
- 18 authorized in subsection (7), or a farm tractor may be equipped
- 19 with flashing, rotating, or oscillating amber lights. However, a
- 20 wrecker may be equipped with flashing, rotating, or oscillating
- 21 red lights which shall be activated only when the wrecker is
- 22 engaged in removing or assisting a vehicle at the scene of a
- 23 traffic accident or disablement. The flashing, rotating, or
- 24 oscillating amber lights shall not be activated except in those
- 25 circumstances that the warning produced by the lights is required
- 26 for public safety.

- 1 (g) A police vehicle, an ambulance, or a fire vehicle may
  2 display a flashing, rotating, or oscillating white light in
  3 conjunction with an authorized emergency light as prescribed in
  4 this section.
- 6 emergency call may be equipped with and the physician may use 7 flashing, rotating, or oscillating red lights mounted on the roof 8 section of the vehicle either as a permanent installation or by 9 means of magnets or suction cups and clearly visible in a 360 to degree arc from a distance of 500 feet when in use. The physitian shall first obtain written authorization from the county 12 sheriff.
- (i) A person engaged in the manufacture, sale, or repair of 14 flashing, rotating, or oscillating lights governed by this sub15 section may possess the lights for the purpose of employment, but 16 shall not activate the lights upon the highway unless authorized 17 to do so under subsection (6).
- (J) A PRIVATE MOTOR VEHICLE OF A POLICE CHAPLAIN RESPONDING

  19 TO AN EMERGENCY CALL MAY BE EQUIPPED WITH AND THE POLICE CHAPLAIN

  20 MAY USE FLASHING, ROTATING, OR OSCILLATING RED LIGHTS MOUNTED ON

  21 THE ROOF SECTION OF THE VEHICLE EITHER AS A PERMANENT INSTALLA
  22 TION OR BY MEANS OF MAGNETS OR SUCTION CUPS AND CLEARLY VISIBLE

  23 IN A 360-DEGREE ARC FROM A DISTANCE OF 500 FEET WHEN IN USE.
- (6) A person shall not sell, loan, or otherwise furnish a
  25 flashing, rotating, or oscillating blue or red light designed
  26 primarily for installation on an authorized emergency vehicle to
  27 a person except a police officer, sheriff, deputy sheriff, POLICE

- 1 CHAPLAIN, authorized physician, volunteer or paid fire fighter, 2 volunteer ambulance driver, licensed ambulance driver or atten-3 dant of the state, a county or municipality within the state, a 4 person engaged in the business of operating an ambulance or 5 wrecker service, or a federally recognized nonprofit charitable 6 organization which owns and operates an emergency support vehicle 7 used exclusively for emergencies. This subsection does not pro-8 hibit an authorized vehicle, equipped with flashing, rotating, or 9 oscillating blue or red lights, from being operated by a person 10 other than a person described in this section if the person II receives authorization to operate the emergency vehicle from a 12 police officer, sheriff, deputy sheriff, POLICE CHAPLAIN, autho-13 rized physician, volunteer or paid fire fighter, volunteer ambu-14 lance driver, licensed ambulance driver or attendant, a person 15 operating an ambulance or wrecker service, or a federally recog-16 nized nonprofit charitable organization which owns and operates 17 an emergency support vehicle used exclusively for emergencies, 18 except that the authorization shall not permit the person to 19 operate lights as described in subsection (5)(a), (b), (d), (g), 20 or (h), OR (J), or to exercise the privileges described in sec-21 tion 603. A person who operates an authorized emergency vehicle 22 in violation of the terms of an authorization is guilty of a 23 misdemeanor.
- (7) A private motor vehicle of a security guard agency or 25 alarm company licensed pursuant to THE PRIVATE SECURITY GUARD ACT 26 OF 1968, Act No. 330 of the Public Acts of 1968, being sections 27 338.1051 to 338.1085 of the Michigan Compiled Laws, may display

- 1 flashing, rotating, or oscillating amber lights. The flashing,
- 2 rotating, or oscillating amber lights shall not be activated on a
- 3 public highway when a vehicle is in motion.
- 4 (8) This section shall not be construed to prohibit,
- 5 restrict, or limit the use of lights authorized or required under
- 6 sections 697, 697a, and 698a.
- 7 (9) A person who violates subsection (1), (2), (3), or (4)
- 8 is responsible for a civil infraction.
