

HOUSE BILL No. 5459

EXECUTIVE BUDGET BILL

March 8, 1988, Introduced by Reps. Jacobetti and Hood and referred to the Committee on Appropriations.

A bill to make appropriations for the state institutions of higher education and certain state purposes related to education for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1989; to provide for the expenditures of those appropriations; and to prescribe the powers and duties of certain state departments, institutions, agencies, and officers.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF MICHIGAN ENACT:

1 Sec. 101. There is appropriated for the state institutions of higher
2 education and certain state purposes related to education, and subject to the
3 conditions set forth in this bill for the fiscal year ending September 30,
4 1989, the following respective amounts:

2 GENERAL

3 Sec. 201. In accordance with the provisions of section 30 of article IX
4 of the state constitution of 1963, total state spending in this act is
5 \$1,117,673,690.00. There are no state appropriations to be paid to local
6 units of government in section 101.

7 Sec. 202. (1) The sums appropriated in this act shall be paid out of the
8 state treasury and shall be distributed by the state treasurer to the
9 respective institutions in 12 monthly installments. The amount distributed
10 to an institution shall not exceed the net appropriations plus additional
11 distributions specifically authorized by this act.

12 (2) Each institution shall receive payments providing the same percentage
13 increase in its 1988-89 institutional fiscal year over its 1987-88 fiscal
14 year as the percentage increase in state appropriations to each institution
15 for the state fiscal year 1988-89 over 1987-88, based on the appropriations
16 and scheduled allotments provided under Act No. 219 of the Public Acts of
17 1986, and Acts Nos. 139 and 201 of the Public Acts of 1987.

18 (3) A detailed description of procedures utilized to arrive at the
19 amounts appropriated in section 101 shall be submitted to each institution
20 by the senate and house fiscal agencies.

21 (4) From the amounts appropriated in section 101, institutions shall
22 reimburse the Michigan public school employees' retirement system at the
23 rate of 9.0% of retirement members' salaries.

24 Sec. 203. (1) All colleges and universities shall furnish all program and
25 financial information that is required by and in a manner prescribed by the
26 state budget director or the house and senate appropriations committees.

1 (2) Pursuant to section 4 of article VIII of the state constitution of
2 1963, all state institutions of higher education shall furnish an annual
3 accounting of all income and expenditures to the legislature and the state
4 budget director.

5 Sec. 204. Money received by the state from the federal government or
6 private sources for the use of a college or university is appropriated for
7 the purpose for which provided. The acceptance and use of federal or private
8 funds shall not place an obligation upon the legislature to continue the
9 purposes for which the funds are made available.

10 Sec. 205. The appropriations contained in this act shall not be used for
11 the construction of buildings or operations of institutions of higher
12 education not expressly authorized in section 101.

13 Sec. 206. The appropriations in this act are subject to section 391 of
14 the management and budget act, Act No. 431 of the Public Acts of 1984, being
15 section 18.1391 of the Michigan Compiled Laws.

16 Sec. 207. Each institution that is appropriated funds under this act
17 shall comply with requests for data made by the Michigan postsecondary
18 education database policy council.

19 Sec. 208. The appropriations contained in this act shall not be expended
20 for renting, purchasing, or showing any movie film determined to be obscene
21 pursuant to Miller v California, 413 U.S. 15 (1973).

22 GRANTS AND FINANCIAL AID

23 Sec. 301. (1) Payments of the amounts included in section 101 for the
24 state competitive scholarship program shall be made as follows:

25 (a) \$1,200.00 maximum per award in accordance with section 3(1) of Act
26 No. 208 of the Public Acts of 1964, being section 390.973 of the Michigan

1 Compiled Laws.

2 (b) \$22,454,300.00 total state general fund.

3 Sec. 302. (1) The amounts appropriated in section 101 for the state
4 tuition grant program shall not exceed the following:

5 (a) \$2,475.00 maximum per grant.

6 (b) \$43,996,300.00 total state general fund.

7 (2) Tuition grant awards shall be made to all eligible Michigan residents
8 who apply before September 1, 1988, and who are qualified. If funding
9 remains, eligible applicants who apply after September 1, 1988, shall be
10 granted awards until funding is exhausted.

11 Sec. 303. Included in the appropriation in section 101 is funding for the
12 Michigan work study program. Of the amount appropriated for the Michigan
13 work study program, at least \$333,000.00 shall be allocated for graduate
14 work study.

15 Sec. 304. (1) Payments of the amounts included in section 101 for the
16 general degree reimbursement program shall be made as follows:

17 (a) The reimbursement rate per eligible degree shall be the equally
18 prorated amount permitted by the appropriation, except that the amount of
19 the reimbursement for each associate degree shall be 1/2 of the rate of
20 reimbursement for each bachelor's or master's degree.

21 (b) Total general degree reimbursement payments shall not exceed
22 \$3,930,200.00.

23 (c) From the general degree reimbursement program, \$135,300.00 shall be
24 provided to Spring Arbor college for the southern Michigan state prison
25 program.

26 (d) From the general degree reimbursement program, \$200,500.00 shall be

1 provided to the university of Detroit for graduate research aid.

2 (e) From the general degree reimbursement program, \$30,100.00 shall be
3 provided to Marygrove college for learning clinics.

4 Sec. 305. (1) Payments of the amounts included in section 101 for the
5 allied health degree reimbursement program shall be made as follows:

6 (a) The reimbursement rate per eligible degree shall be the equally
7 prorated amount permitted by the appropriation.

8 (b) Total allied health degree reimbursement payments shall not exceed
9 \$601,500.00.

10 Sec. 306. (1) Funds disbursed through the degree reimbursement programs
11 shall not be used by any recipient institution for theology or divinity
12 programs.

13 (2) Each eligible institution shall be provided on October 1, 1988, or as
14 soon as possible thereafter, a preliminary payment of at least 75%, but not
15 more than 90%, of its estimated degree reimbursements under section 101. The
16 balance of the degree reimbursement to each eligible institution shall be
17 provided when the numbers of earned degrees conferred and total amounts to
18 be paid are certified.

19 Sec. 307. The funds for the American Indian tuition waiver reimbursement
20 in section 101 are to reimburse tuition waivers granted by colleges before
21 September 30, 1987. Only those expenses classified as tuition assessments
22 are eligible for reimbursement.

23 Sec. 308. Included in the appropriations in section 101 for higher
24 education are \$500,000.00 for the establishment of the Robert C. Byrd honors
25 scholarship program. Pursuant to the implementation of this program, the
26 legislature encourages the department of education to distribute funds for

1 this scholarship program to each high school in this state and to allow
2 each high school to select a merit scholar.

3 Sec. 309. To enable the legislature to evaluate the appropriation needs
4 of institutions of higher education, each independent college and university
5 shall make available to the legislature, upon request, data regarding grants
6 for the preceding, current, and ensuing fiscal years.

7 Sec. 310. The auditor general shall audit selected enrollments, degrees,
8 and awards at selected independent colleges and universities receiving
9 awards administered by the department of education. The audits shall be
10 based upon definitions and requirements established by the department of
11 management and budget and the senate and house fiscal agencies. The auditor
12 general shall submit a report of findings to the senate and house
13 appropriations committees not later than May 1, 1989.

14 STATE UNIVERSITIES

15 Sec. 401. The legislature encourages the development of an educational
16 reciprocity program between Lake Superior state college and the colleges of
17 northern Ontario.

18 Sec. 402. Student health services at state colleges and universities
19 shall be self-supporting through student and user fees.

20 Sec. 403. (1) The auditor general shall audit enrollments at all public
21 baccalaureate institutions of higher education. The audits shall be based
22 upon the definitions and requirements established by the department of
23 management and budget and the senate and house fiscal agencies. The auditor
24 general shall submit a report of findings to the senate and house
25 appropriations committees not later than March 1, 1989.

26 (2) Student credit hours reports shall not include the following:

1 (a) Student credit hours generated through correspondence courses, credit
2 by examination, or inmate prison programs regardless of teaching location.

3 (b) Student credit hours generated in new degree programs after January
4 1, 1975, that have not been specifically authorized for funding by the
5 legislature, except spin-off programs converted from existing core programs
6 that do all of the following:

7 (i) Represent new options, fields, or concentrations within existing
8 programs.

9 (ii) Are consistent with the current institutional role and mission.

10 (iii) Are accommodated within the continuing funding base of the
11 institution.

12 (iv) Do not require a new degree level beyond that which the institution
13 is currently authorized to grant within that discipline or field.

14 (v) Do not require a special grant funding from the state. As used in
15 this subparagraph, "special grant funding" means funding in addition to that
16 provided by the student credit hours generated within the program, either
17 before program initiation or within the first 3 years of program operation.

18 Sec. 404. Included in the amounts appropriated in section 101, there is
19 appropriated to Wayne state university the sum of \$440,000.00 for
20 cooperative leadership skills programs for trade union minorities and women.
21 This program is to be offered by a consortium consisting of eastern Michigan
22 university, Michigan state university, northern Michigan university, Oakland
23 university, university of Michigan, and Wayne state university. Wayne state
24 university shall act as fiscal agent, and the funds shall be divided among
25 the participating universities.

26 Sec. 405. Included in the amounts appropriated in section 101 are funds

1 for the following consortia projects:

2 (a) Northern inter-collegiate research sharing consortium - central
3 Michigan university and Kirtland community college.

4 (b) Manufacturing technology and management consortium - Grand Valley
5 state college, Ferris state college, and Grand Rapids junior college.

6 (c) Industrial development institute - Michigan state university and
7 Lansing community college.

8 (d) Enabling technology consortium - university of Michigan, Michigan
9 state university, and Wayne state university.

10 (e) Kalamazoo consortium - western Michigan university, Kalamazoo valley
11 community college, Kalamazoo college, and Nazareth college.

12 Sec. 406. The principal executive officer of each institution of higher
13 education receiving an appropriation under this act shall expend a portion
14 of the funds appropriated to the institution in reporting to the house and
15 senate appropriations committees, the auditor general, the senate and house
16 fiscal agencies, and the department of management and budget within 60 days
17 after the auditor general issues his or her annual report on the operation
18 of the institution. The institution's report shall specify all of the
19 following:

20 (a) The recommendations of the auditor general implemented by the
21 institution, including projected dates and resources required, if any, to
22 achieve compliance.

23 (b) The recommendations of the auditor general not implemented by the
24 institution or implemented by the institution as modified.

25 (c) The rationale for not implementing a recommendation of the auditor
26 general or of implementing a recommendation as modified.

1 Sec. 407. From the funds appropriated in section 101 for Michigan state
2 university cooperative extension service, the legislature encourages that
3 \$250,000.00 be expended for the expanded food and nutrition education
4 program.

5 Sec. 408. From the amount appropriated in section 101 for state
6 universities, \$30,000.00 shall be expended to establish a systematic method
7 for colleges and universities to inform school districts regarding the
8 number of students from their districts who are enrolled in
9 remedial/developmental course work. The presidents council of state
10 universities shall submit a report, not later than January 31, 1989, to the
11 chairs of the house and senate appropriations committees concerning the
12 progress made in establishing the reporting system described in this
13 section. Each university shall allocate \$2,000.00 of the funds appropriated
14 to their institution in section 101 to promote communication between school
15 district personnel and college and university personnel so that a
16 cooperative effort can be made to improve student academic preparation.

17 Sec. 409. To encourage more students to study mathematics in high school
18 and to reduce the amount of remediation in the mathematics area at the
19 college and university level, \$150,000.00 is appropriated in section 101 for
20 the Michigan mathematics early placement test. Included within the
21 appropriation in section 101 for each college and university is \$10,000.00
22 for the implementation of the mathematics early placement test program which
23 was proposed by the presidents council of state universities. A report on
24 the results of the mathematics early placement test program shall be
25 submitted by the presidents council of state universities to the house and
26 senate appropriations committees by June 1, 1989.

1 Sec. 410. (1) Included in the appropriation for each Michigan public
2 university from the amount in section 101 is funding for the Martin Luther
3 King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks visiting professors program.

4 (2) Universities with student head count totals exceeding 20,000 for the
5 fall of 1987 are appropriated \$82,120.00 each. Universities with student
6 head count totals of less than 20,000 for the fall of 1987 are appropriated
7 \$20,480.00 each.

8 (3) Martin Luther King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks visiting professors
9 program funds shall be expended to increase the number of minority
10 instructors in the classroom.

11 (4) The presidents council of state universities shall report by
12 September 30, 1989 to the house and senate appropriations committees, the
13 office of minority equity in postsecondary education, and the department of
14 management and budget all of the following Martin Luther King, Jr.-Cesar
15 Chavez-Rosa Parks visiting professors program information:

16 (a) Names of visiting professors.

17 (b) Courses instructed by visiting professors.

18 (c) Period of instruction.

19 (d) Employment status, excluding Martin Luther King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-
20 Rosa Parks visiting professor duties.

21 (e) Race and sex of visiting professors.

22 (5) Martin Luther King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks visiting professor
23 funds shall be equally matched with institution funding devoted to the
24 purpose stated in subsection (3).

25 Sec. 411. (1) Included in the appropriation for each nondoctoral degree
26 granting public university in this state from the amounts appropriated in

1 section 101 is funding for a Martin Luther King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks
2 scholarship program. The Martin Luther King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks
3 scholarship program is intended to increase the pool of minority candidates
4 pursuing academic careers in postsecondary education in Michigan.

5 (2) The Martin Luther King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks scholarship
6 program shall be administered by each institution.

7 (3) A Martin Luther King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks scholarship shall
8 be awarded to a candidate who is both of the following:

9 (a) Pursuing a doctorate degree at a Michigan postsecondary educational
10 institution within 1 year after attaining his or her masters degree.

11 (b) Considered by the institution to be an underrepresented minority in
12 that academic field of study.

13 (4) A Martin Luther King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks scholarship is
14 intended to offset any educational or living expenses that the scholar may
15 incur, so long as the scholar remains in good academic standing as defined
16 by the host institution.

17 (5) A Martin Luther King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks scholarship award
18 shall not exceed \$15,000.00. A scholarship candidate shall not receive more
19 than 1 Martin Luther King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks scholarship award in
20 order to pursue the same degree or a degree at that same level of study.

21 (6) A Martin Luther King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks scholar shall
22 attain the masters degree within 2-1/2 years of receiving the award.

23 (7) The Martin Luther King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks scholarship shall
24 be defaulted and considered a loan subject to repayment in full to the state
25 if any 1 of the following occurs:

26 (a) The recipient fails to maintain good academic standing at the

1 postsecondary institution.

2 (b) The recipient fails to attain the masters degree in the time required
3 by subsection (6).

4 (c) The recipient does not meet the requirement of subsection (3)(a).

5 (8) The repayment of a Martin Luther King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks
6 scholarship shall be made in 5 equal annual payments. The first scholarship
7 repayment is due within 1 year of default, as described in subsection (7).
8 The loan amount to be repaid shall include the scholarship award, plus
9 interest calculated at a rate not less than that of the guaranteed student
10 loan at the time of default. Interest amounts shall be calculated pursuant
11 to the interest computation procedures of the guaranteed student loan
12 program.

13 (9) The Michigan higher education assistance authority shall implement
14 and administer the loan repayment provisions of subsections (7) and (8).

15 (10) The Michigan higher education assistance authority shall report by
16 September 30, 1989, and each year thereafter, to the house and senate
17 appropriations committees, the office of minority equity in postsecondary
18 education, and the department of management and budget all of the following
19 information:

20 (a) Names of scholars, their institutions, and fields of study.

21 (b) Names of scholars having completed their masters degree requirements
22 and their current educational status.

23 (c) Names of scholars in default as described in subsection (7), and the
24 status of their Martin Luther King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks scholarship
25 repayment.

26 (11) Martin Luther King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks scholarship

1 recipients are to be considered candidates for the Martin Luther King, Jr.-
2 Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks fellowship program, when eligible.

3 (12) Martin Luther King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks scholarship funds
4 shall not supplant institutional funding devoted to the purpose stated in
5 subsection (1).

6 Sec. 412. (1) Included in the appropriation for each doctorate degree
7 granting public university in this state from the amount appropriated in
8 section 101 is funding for a Martin Luther King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks
9 fellowship program. The Martin Luther King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks
10 fellowship program is intended to increase the pool of minority candidates
11 pursuing academic careers in postsecondary education in this state.

12 (2) The Martin Luther King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks fellowship
13 program shall be administered by each institution.

14 (3) A Martin Luther King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks fellowship shall be
15 awarded to a candidate who meets all of the following:

16 (a) Will begin an academic career in a Michigan postsecondary educational
17 institution within 1 year after attaining his or her doctorate degree.

18 (b) Will remain in an academic career in Michigan postsecondary education
19 for a period of not less than 5 years.

20 (c) Will pursue a doctorate degree at a Michigan postsecondary
21 educational institution.

22 (d) Is considered by the institution to be an underrepresented minority
23 in that academic field of study.

24 (4) A Martin Luther King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks fellowship is
25 intended to offset any educational or living expenses that the fellow may
26 incur, so long as the student remains in good academic standing as defined

1 by the host institution.

2 (5) A Martin Luther King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks fellowship award
3 shall not exceed \$25,000.00 for a student pursuing a doctorate degree. A
4 fellowship candidate shall not receive more than 1 Martin Luther King, Jr.-
5 Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks fellowship award in order to pursue the same degree
6 or a degree at that same level of study.

7 (6) A Martin Luther King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks fellow has 4 years
8 in which to attain his or her doctorate degree.

9 (7) A Martin Luther King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks fellowship shall be
10 defaulted and considered a loan subject to repayment in full to the state if
11 any 1 of the following occurs:

12 (a) The recipient fails to maintain good academic standing at the
13 postsecondary institution.

14 (b) The recipient fails to attain the appropriate degree in the time
15 required by subsection (6).

16 (c) The recipient does not meet the requirements of subsection (3)(a) and
17 (b).

18 (8) The repayment of a Martin Luther King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks
19 fellowship shall be made in 5 equal annual payments. The first fellowship
20 repayment is due within 1 year of fellowship default, as described in
21 subsection (7). The loan amount to be repaid shall include the fellowship
22 award, plus interest calculated at a rate not less than that of the
23 guaranteed student loan at the time of default. Interest amounts shall be
24 calculated pursuant to the interest computation procedures of the guaranteed
25 student loan program.

26 (9) The Michigan higher education assistance authority shall implement

1 and administer the loan repayment provisions of subsections (7) and (8).

2 (10) The Michigan higher education assistance authority shall report by
3 September 30, 1989, and each year thereafter, on September 30, to the house
4 and senate appropriations committees and the office of minority equity in
5 postsecondary education all of the following information:

6 (a) Names of student fellows, the institutions, and fields of study.

7 (b) Names of fellows having completed their studies, and their current
8 employment status or employing institutions, or both.

9 (c) Names of fellows in default as described in subsection (7), and the
10 status of their Martin Luther King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks fellowship
11 repayment.

12 (11) Martin Luther King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks fellowship funds
13 shall not supplant institutional funding devoted to the purpose stated in
14 subsection (1).

15 Sec. 413. (1) Included in section 101 is funding for the Martin Luther
16 King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks college day program. The Martin Luther
17 King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks college day program is an intervention
18 program intended to introduce school children underrepresented in
19 postsecondary education to the potential of a college education.

20 (2) The programs shall provide a day, overnight, or extended experience
21 on the college campus for pupils in grades 7 through 11, if the program
22 meets the intent stated in subsection (1), and is not designed principally
23 as an academic or athletic skills development program.

24 (3) If possible and practical, the program shall focus on serving those
25 35 school districts with the highest percentage of minority pupils as
26 reported to the Michigan department of education. However, all eligible

1 pupils from the participating school districts shall be included in this
2 program, regardless of the pupil's race.

3 (4) Each pupil participating in the program shall be provided with
4 standard appropriate background information describing the Michigan
5 postsecondary education system, both 2-year and 4-year public and
6 independent degree granting colleges and universities, the opportunities
7 afforded by a college experience, admissions requirements, and financial aid
8 availability. The Michigan department of education shall develop and make
9 available this material.

10 (5) Individual program plans shall include all of the following:

11 (a) A budget of equal contributions from this program, the participating
12 public 4-year institution, the participating school district, and the
13 participating independent degree granting college.

14 (b) A letter of support signed by the superintendents of the
15 participating school districts and the presidents or chancellors of the
16 participating colleges and universities named in subsection (5)(a).

17 (c) The formal involvement of the appropriate public 2-year colleges and
18 independent degree granting colleges in the college day program.

19 (6) The presidents council of state universities shall report by
20 September 30, 1989, and each year thereafter, to the house and senate fiscal
21 agencies, the office of minority equity in postsecondary education, and the
22 department of management and budget all of the following by a participating
23 4-year institution and school district:

24 (a) Number of pupils participating and their schools.

25 (b) Age, race, and sex of participating pupils.

26 (c) Description of the college experience offered by the program to the

1 pupils.

2 (d) A copy of the program plans described in subsection (5).

3 (e) A copy of the program budget.

4 (7) The participating school district, the participating colleges and
5 universities, and the presidents council of state universities shall retain
6 the information as is necessary to assess the long-range impact of the
7 Martin Luther King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks college day program on the
8 high school graduation rate, college attendance of participating pupils, or
9 any other benefits that may be realized by this program.

10 Sec. 414. (1) The research excellence fund for which funds are
11 appropriated in section 101 is transferred to the department of commerce
12 and is to be administered by the Michigan strategic fund. This fund is
13 created to support research programs at the public universities of this
14 state.

15 (2) The research excellence funds shall not be released to the eligible
16 institution until the institution's research proposals are approved by a
17 review panel created pursuant to subsection (3).

18 (3) The review panel shall be composed of 3 members who shall serve
19 without compensation. The membership of the panel shall consist of 1 member
20 to be appointed by the speaker of the house, 1 member to be appointed by
21 the director of the department of management and budget, and 1 member to be
22 appointed by the senate majority leader. The director of the department of
23 commerce and the director of the Michigan strategic fund shall serve as
24 ex officio members of the panel. The review panel shall work in conjunction
25 with the Michigan strategic fund in evaluating each institution's research
26 proposals to provide coordination of efforts directed at improving economic

1 development in the state.

2 (4) The review panel may approve all or part of an institution's research
3 proposal. The review panel shall respond to each research proposal within
4 30 days after submission. Funds for the approved research proposals or any
5 part of the funds shall be released for payment to the institution within 30
6 days after approval of the award. The review panel shall submit a copy of
7 each research proposal received, and grant award notification, to the
8 speaker and minority leader of the house, the majority and minority leaders
9 of the senate, and the chairs of the house and senate appropriations
10 committees.

11 (5) The research proposals shall be submitted to the review panel in 1
12 complete, comprehensive research proposal. The research proposals shall be
13 evaluated according to the following criteria:

14 (a) Leads to the development of scientific or technological discoveries.

15 (b) Applies scientific or technological discoveries or advances to new
16 applications.

17 (c) Provides a tangible, direct benefit to the economy of the state or
18 region.

19 (d) Is of general interest to an entire industrial field.

20 (e) Contributes directly or indirectly to the development of additional
21 products or processes.

22 (f) The applicant demonstrates the capability to implement the proposed
23 project.

24 (g) The applicant has an ability to generate outside funding sources for
25 the proposal.

26 (h) The applicant demonstrates the ability or submits a plan for

1 transferring research results or technology advances to the private sector.

2 (6) Proposals shall be submitted to the review panel before October 15,
3 1988, in a form and manner as prescribed by the department of commerce. The
4 department of commerce shall submit a comprehensive research excellence fund
5 annual report within 60 days after the end of the fiscal year to those
6 legislators listed in subsection (4).

7 (7) Universities receiving research excellence fund grants shall not
8 deduct an amount from the grant award to cover indirect costs or supplant
9 existing research resources with research excellence funds.

10 Sec. 415. Included in the amounts contained in section 101, Wayne state
11 university is granted \$220,000.00 for the college of education to deliver
12 professional school district programs to meet their service needs.

13 Sec. 416. Included in the amounts contained in section 101, Oakland
14 university is granted \$220,000.00 for the labor education service program.

15 Sec. 417. The legislature recognizes the value of cooperative programs
16 between state universities and community colleges aimed at stimulating
17 economic development and diversification in this state. It is the intent of
18 the legislature to encourage continued development and expansion of these
19 cooperative programs in the years ahead.

20 Sec. 418. It is the intent of the legislature that eastern Michigan
21 university shall coordinate a professional teacher development program for
22 local area school districts.

23 Sec. 419. (1) From the amount appropriated in section 101 for select
24 student support services programs, \$1,488,700.00 is allocated for developing
25 academically and economically disadvantaged student access and retention
26 programs for 4-year public and independent educational institutions in this

1 state.

2 (2) Not later than October 1, 1988, the office of minority equity in
3 postsecondary education shall develop and make available proposal guidelines
4 to eligible 4-year institutions. Each proposal shall be submitted to the
5 office not later than October 30, 1988.

6 (3) A committee shall be established to review submitted proposals and to
7 make recommendations. The committee shall be composed of 1 member appointed
8 by the office of minority equity in postsecondary education, 1 member
9 appointed by the association of independent colleges and universities of
10 Michigan, and 3 members appointed by the presidents council of state
11 universities.

12 (4) A 3-member review panel composed of 1 member appointed by the speaker
13 of the house of representatives, 1 member appointed by the majority leader
14 of the senate, and 1 member appointed by the state budget director shall
15 review all committee recommendations and make awards.

16 (5) The review panel shall make its awards to eligible institutions not
17 later than November 15, 1988. An award to any 1 institution shall not be
18 greater than \$150,000.00, and the amount awarded shall be matched on an 80%
19 state, 20% college-university basis.

20 (6) An educational institution that receives an award under this section
21 shall report by September 30, 1989 to the house and senate appropriations
22 committees, the office of minority equity in postsecondary education, and
23 the department of management and budget all of the following information:

24 (a) A description of select student support services programs initiated.

25 (b) The number of participants, measured in head count, by racial,
26 ethnic, and 4-S program category.

1 (c) Other information considered necessary or appropriate by the office
2 of minority equity in postsecondary education.

3 (7) The funds awarded under this section shall not supplant institutional
4 funding devoted to the purpose described in subsection (1).

5 Sec. 420. (1) It is the intent of the legislature in expending funds for
6 the operation of the D.J. Jacobetti vocational skill center that the
7 following activities be performed in order to insure that the integrity and
8 the original role set forth for the vocational skill center be retained:

9 (a) Insuring the flexibility and adequate autonomy that will enable the
10 vocational skill center to expand, upgrade, and modify its existing
11 programs as well as to develop new vocational programs in partnership with
12 its industrial, commercial, agency, and labor advisories. The length and
13 content of programs at the skill center, whether they be certificate, 1-
14 year, or 2-year, shall be determined by the performances required in the
15 marketplace rather than by baccalaureate criteria.

16 (b) Developing a ladder of articulation at northern Michigan university
17 that grants fair value for vocational skill center credits that constitute a
18 viable portion of a related 2- or 4-year baccalaureate career ladder. This
19 articulation process shall be accomplished without nullifying the intent of
20 the vocational program or consuming those programs into the baccalaureate
21 department.

22 (c) Funding the skill center for its credit hour production in a manner
23 equitable to other vocational technical centers.

24 (d) Placing the vocational skill center budget funds and the decision
25 making process for housing certificate and 1- or 2-year vocational technical
26 programs within the vocational skill center under the direct supervision of

1 the vocational skill center administration in order to insure the integrity
2 and the continuation of the role of the skill center.

3 Sec. 421. The tuition assistance funding appropriated in section 101 to
4 each state university is intended to supplement the amount of undergraduate
5 student financial aid made available to financially needy Michigan resident
6 students.

7 Sec. 422. Each state university shall submit an annual report in a manner
8 prescribed by the department of management and budget describing each energy
9 conservation project financed wholly or in part by oil overcharge revenues
10 appropriated in fiscal year 1987 and fiscal year 1988. The report shall
11 include a description of each energy conservation project and the actual
12 expenditures and energy savings estimates. The information contained in the
13 report shall be utilized to meet the annual reporting requirements to the
14 United States district court and the United States secretary of energy
15 regarding state use of oil overcharge refunds.
