THE APPARENT PROBLEM:

Efforts have made during the last decade to remove gender biased language from public acts, but some acts still need to be amended. The fire and police retirement act was drafted in 1937, when few women were employed as police officers or as fire fighters, and the bill's language reflects this. Legislation is needed to remove from the act language that is gender biased and archaic.

THE CONTENT OF THE BILL:

The bill would amend the fire and police retirement act to revise certain gender biased language. Under the bill, the act would be known as the "Fire Fighters and Police Officers Retirement Act."
