March 18, 1991, Introduced by Reps. Ostling, Oxender, Johnson, Knight, Bender and Trim and referred to the Committee on Appropriations.

A bill to make appropriations for the department of state police, and certain other state purposes for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1992; to provide for the expenditure of those appropriations; to provide for the disposition of other income received by the various state agencies; to provide testing of certain persons; to provide for certain emergency powers; and to provide for the powers and duties of certain committees, certain state agencies, and certain employees.

- (2) When it appears to the principal executive officer of each department that state spending to local units of government will be less than the amount that was projected to be expended for any quarter, the principal executive officer shall immediately give notice of the approximate shortfall to the department of management and budget, the senate and house appropriations committees, and the senate and house fiscal agencies.
- Sec. 202. The appropriations made and the expenditures authorized under this act and the departments, agencies, commissions, boards, offices, and programs for which an appropriation is made under this act are subject to the management and budget act, Act No. 431 of the Public Acts of 1984, being sections 18.1101 to 18.1594 of the Michigan Compiled Laws.
- Sec. 203. (1) It is the intent of the legislature that the funds appropriated in section 101 will permit the department to carry out each program for the entire fiscal year, unless a shorter period is provided in law.
- (2) The department shall not make or authorize an expenditure or incur an obligation that exceeds or results in spending that will exceed the amount appropriated in section 101 or as otherwise provided by law.
- 26 (3) In consultation with the department of management and budget,

- the department shall, for each appropriation, develop a spending plan allotting the amount appropriated over the full 12 months of the 1991just 1992 fiscal year.
 - (4) The department director shall advise the director of the department of management and budget if an appropriation in section 101 or otherwise provided by law will not permit that department to carry out the program specified by line item mandated by the legislature for the entire fiscal year. The department director shall consider both the amount appropriated for each line item and the sufficiency of projected sources of financing when deciding whether the appropriation will last the entire fiscal year. If the director of the department of management and budget concurs with the projections of that department, the director shall advise the chairpersons of the senate and house appropriations committees, and the chairpersons of the appropriate appropriations subcommittees that an amount appropriated in section 101 or as otherwise provided by law will not permit that department to carry out the program mandated by the legislature for the entire fiscal year.
 - (5) If both the appropriations committees disagree with the conclusion of the director within 10 days, the house fiscal agency and senate fiscal agency shall immediately publish estimates of whether the amount appropriated, including all sources of financing assumed in the appropriation, will permit that department to carry out the program mandated by the legislature for the entire fiscal year.
 - (6) If the legislature does not act within 30 days after the notice from the director provided in subsection (4) to reduce the

- 1 mandated level of service, authorize the program to end before the
- 2 fiscal year is completed, or increase the amount of the appropriation,
- 3 that department shall reduce the rate of spending in order to carry
- 4 out the legislature's intent that the program be carried out for the
- 5 full fiscal year.

- 6 Sec. 204. As used in this act:
 - (a) "AFIS" means automated fingerprint identification system.
- 8 (b) "AIS/ICF/MR" means alternate intermediate services,
 9 intermediate care facilities, mentally retarded.
 - (c) "CARE" means combined accident reduction effort.
- "CCD" or "consolidated central dispatch" means an entity (d) 11 consisting of 75% or more of the law enforcement, fire fighting, and 12 emergency service agencies, or those agencies encompassing 75% or 13 14 more of the population of the service area, joined under a written 15 agreement to operate under a single dispatching operation. The 75% requirements for a CCD may be waived in counties of over 250,000 where 16 other configurations promise effective and efficient services. A 17 18 CCD must also include all of the following:
- 19 (i) The participation of the county sheriff and the state 20 police.
- 21 (ii) The control of central dispatching by a countywide or 22 regional authority consisting of representatives of participating 23 jurisdictions and agencies and the general public, that selects 24 supervisory staff and oversees operations.
- 25 (iii) One or 2 dispatching points operated by the authority 26 as is determined to be necessary given the size of the county.

- 1 (iv) Dispatch services 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, year-round 2 to all participating jurisdictions and agencies.
- 3 (v) A written agreement including an annual budget by the 4 participants that specifies the nature and amount of service and 5 identifies sources of financing, including the provision of personnel, 6 equipment, supplies, and funds from participants or dedicated sources.
- 7 (vi) An operational policy based on the concept of the dispatch 8 of the closest unit, of the appropriate type, to the service request.
- 9 (vii) Operation using 9-1-1, or enhanced 9-1-1, under the 10 emergency telephone service enabling act, Act No. 32 of the Public 11 Acts of 1986, being sections 484.1101 to 484.1707 of the Michigan 12 Compiled Laws, where feasible and cost-effective.
- (e) "CCH" means computerized criminal history.
- 14 (f) "Department" means the department of state police.
- 15 (g) "DMB" means the Michigan department of management and budget.
- 16 (h) "DOD" means United States department of defense.
- 17 (i) "DOJ" means the United States department of justice.
- 18 (j) "DOJ-BJS" means the United States department of justice,
 19 bureau of justice statistics.
- (k) "DOT" means the United States department of transportation.
- 21 (1) "DOT-NHTSA" means DOT-national highway traffic safety
 22 administration.
- 23 (m) "FTE" means full-time equated.
- 24 (n) "IDG" means interdepartmental grant.
- (o) "IDT" means intradepartmental transfer.
- 26 (p) "IDT" means intradepartmental transfer.

- 1 (q) "LEIN" means law enforcement information network.
- 2 (r) "MDOT" means Michigan department of transportation.
- 3 (s) "MLEOTC" means the Michigan law enforcement officer training
- 4 council.

- (t) "OHSP" means office of highway safety planning.
- 6 (u) "Title XVIII" means title XVIII of the Social Security Act
 7 of 1935 as amended.
- 8 Sec. 205. The appropriations provided in section 101 for salaries and wages, longevity and insurance, retirement, and pension, and for 9 project accounts are approved for expenditure for automated information 10 processing which is relevant to the objectives of the given 11 appropriation unit or project account. Such expenditure shall not 12 be applied to the \$20,000.00 limitation provided in section 203(2) 13 of the management and budget act, Act No. 431 of the Public Acts of 14 1984, being section 18.1203 of the Michigan Compiled Laws. 15
- Sec. 206. The amounts appropriated for utilities and that portion of contractual services, supplies, and materials used to pay for utility service to state facilities in section 101 may be expended in a manner consistent with the provisions of section 253 of the management and budget act, Act No. 431 of the Public Acts of 1984, being section 18.1253 of the Michigan Compiled Laws.

22 EXECUTIVE DIRECTION

- Sec. 301. Funds appropriated in section 101 for rental of department aircraft shall be considered a work project account and shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year.
- 26 DEPARTMENTWIDE APPROPRIATIONS

- Sec. 401. (1) Pursuant to the provisions of civil service rules and regulations and applicable collective bargaining agreements, individuals seeking employment with the department shall submit to a controlled substance test. The test shall be administered by the department.
- (2) Individuals seeking employment with the department who refuse to take a controlled substance test or who test positive for the illicit use of a controlled substance on such a test shall be denied employment by the department for a minimum of 1 year.
 - (3) Funds shall not be expended by the MLEOTC for training law enforcement officer candidates, nor shall a candidate be certified by the MLEOTC, unless he or she tests negative on a test designed to detect the illicit use of a controlled substance. The test shall be conducted prior to basic training or application for certification. A candidate who tests positive or refuses to submit to the testing shall not be eligible for MLEOTC certification for a minimum of 2 years.
- 18 (4) From the funds available in section 101, sufficient money
 19 is provided to maintain the substance abuse data base as provided
 20 for in the MLEOTC substance abuse testing program.
 - (5) The fire fighters training council shall consider requiring all new fire fighter candidates to submit to controlled substance testing procedures developed by the fire fighters training council and administered at the local level. At the discretion of the fire fighters training council, candidates may be required to pay the cost of a controlled substance test required by the fire fighters training

 - (3) In addition to appropriations contained in section 101, the department may receive or expend funds from local or private sources for the purpose of supporting emergency preparedness response and mitigation activity.

22 UNIFORM SERVICES

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Sec. 901. (1) Funds appropriated in section 101 for 9-1-1 consolidated central dispatch shall be for continuation funding of existing consolidated central dispatches and new consolidated central dispatches that meet the definition criteria of a consolidated central

- dispatch established by the department and the June 2, 1988 central 1 dispatch state plan recommendations of the office of criminal justice 2 emergency telephone services committee. Funds for continuation funding 3 of existing consolidated dispatches and new consolidated central 4 5 dispatches shall be expended in accordance with the guidelines 6 established by the department and the April 4, 1989 office of criminal justice ad hoc subcommittee recommendations. These funds shall be 7 8 considered a work project account and shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year. The funding formula for new consolidated central 9 dispatches shall use a rate not to exceed the state radio dispatcher 10 FTE pay rate exclusively for, and limited to, dispatchers, dispatch 11 supervisors, and center director personnel. 12
- 13 (2) All counties receiving state funds for consolidated central 14 dispatches shall receive funding according to the consolidated central 15 dispatch formula described in subsection (1).

16 INVESTIGATIVE SERVICES

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Sec. 1001. The funds appropriated in section 101 for federal anti-drug initiatives shall be limited to operations that include significant financial and personnel participation from local units of government. State funds may be utilized to maximize federal fund matching for antidrug initiatives.
