HOUSE BILL No. 5525

EXECUTIVE BUDGET BILL

February 18, 1992, Introduced by Reps. Ostling, Knight, Gilmer, Bender and Sparks and referred to the Committee on Appropriations.

A bill to make appropriations for the state institutions of higher education and certain state purposes related to education for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1993; to provide for the expenditures of those appropriations; and to prescribe the powers and duties of certain state departments, institutions, agencies, and officers.

- Sec. 101. There is appropriated for the state institutions of

Sec. 202. The appropriations made and the expenditures authorized

27 under this act and the institutions, departments, agencies, commissions,

28 boards, offices, and programs for which an appropriation is made under

26

1 this act are subject to the management and budget act, Act No. 431 of the 2 Public Acts of 1984, being section 18.1101 to 18,1594 of the Michigan 3 Compled Laws.

- Sec. 203. (1) For institutions with fiscal years ending June 30, 5 1993, the sums appropriated in this act are appropriated for their fiscal 6 years ending June 30, 1993 and shall be paid out of the state treasury 7 and distributed by the state treasurer to the respective institutions in 8 9 monthly installments for the period October 1, 1992 to June 30, 1993. 9 For an institution with a fiscal year ending September 30, 1993, the sums 10 appropriated in this act are appropriated for their fiscal year ending 11 September 30, 1993 and shall be paid out of the state treasury and 12 distributed by the state treasurer in 12 monthly installments for the 13 period October 1, 1992 to September 30, 1993. If the appropriations for 14 the Martin Luther King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks programs are not 15 committed or awarded by April 1, 1993 the funds shall become subject to 16 legislative transfer. Any unexpended and unencumbered funds remaining 17 on September 30, 1993 from the amount appropriated for the Martin Luther 18 King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks programs shall lapse on September 30, 19 1993 and shall be returned to the state general fund. The amount 20 distributed to an institution shall not exceed the net appropriations 21 plus additional distributions specifically authorized by this act.
- Sec. 204. (1) All universities shall furnish all program and 23 financial information that is required by and in a manner prescribed by 24 the state budget director or the house and senate appropriations 25 committees.
- Sec. 205. Money received by the state from the federal government 27 or private sources for the use of a college or university is appropriated 28 for the purpose for which it was provided. The acceptance and use of 29 federal or private funds shall not place an obligation upon the

1 legislature to continue the purposes for which the funds are made 2 available.

3 GRANTS AND FINANCIAL AID

- Sec. 301. Payments of the amounts included in section 101 for the 5 state competitive scholarship program shall be distributed in accordance 6 with Act No. 208 of the Public Acts of 1964, being sections 390.971 to 7 390.981 of the Michigan Compiled Laws. The maximum per award shall be 8 \$1,200.00.
- 9 Sec. 302. (1) The amounts appropriated in section 101 for the 10 state tuition grant program shall be distributed in accordance with Act 11 No. 313 of the Public Acts of 1966, being sections 390.991 to 390.997a 12 of the Michigan Compiled Laws. The maximum per grant shall be \$2,300.00.
- 14 (2) Tuition grant awards shall be made to all eligible Michigan 15 residents who apply before September 1, 1992, and who are qualified.
- (3) The Michigan higher education assistance authority shall 17 determine an actual maximum tuition grant award per student that ensures 18 that the aggregate payments for the tuition grant program do not exceed 19 the appropriation contained in section 101 for the state tuition grant 20 program. By October 15, 1992, and again by December 15, 1992, the 21 authority shall analyze the status of award commitments, shall make any 22 necessary adjustments, and shall confirm that those award commitments 23 will not exceed the appropriation contained in section 101 for the 24 tuition grant program. The final determination and actions shall be 25 reported to the department of management and budget and the house and 26 senate appropriation subcommittees on higher education no later than 27 December 15, 1992. If award adjustments are necessary, the students shall 28 be notified of the adjustment by the third Monday in January.
- 29 (4) Any unexpended and unencumbered funds remaining on September 30 30, 1993 from the amounts appropriated in section 101 for the tuition

- 1 grant program shall not lapse on September 30, 1993, but shall continue 2 to be available for expenditure for tuition grants provided in the 1993-3 94 fiscal year.
- 4 (5) The Michigan higher education assistance authority shall 5 continue for the 1992-93 fiscal year a proportional tuition grant maximum 6 award level for recipients enrolled less than full-time in a given 7 semester or term.
- Sec. 303. (1) Included in the appropriation in section 101 is 9 funding for the Michigan work study program established under Act No. 288 10 of the Public Acts of 1986, being sections 390.1371 to 390.1382 of the 11 Michigan Compiled Laws, and Act No. 303 of the Public Acts of 1986, being 12 sections 390.1321 to 390.1332 of the Michigan Compiled Laws. An effort 13 should be made by each institution participating in the Michigan work 14 study program to assure that not less than 10% of those undergraduate, 15 graduate, and professional students eligible to participate in the 16 program are placed with for-profit employers no later than December 31, 17 1992.
- 18 (2) The Michigan Higher Education Assistance authority shall 19 allocate funds to institutions eligible for work study monies based upon 20 each institution's specific Pell Grant index and its utilization rate of 21 work study funds for the three most recent years for which statistics are 22 available.
- 23 (3) The Michigan Higher Education Assistance Authority shall set 24 aside up to five percent (5%) of the total work study appropriation to 25 process requests from participating institutions for allocation 26 adjustments. Such adjustments shall be based on criteria set by the 27 authority prior to making the allocations described under subsection (2) 28 above.
- Sec. 304. (1) Payments of the amounts included in section 101 for 30 the general degree reimbursement program established under Act No. 75 of

- 1 the Public Acts of 1974, being sections 390.1021 to 390.1027 of the 2 Michigan Compiled Laws, shall be made for all degrees identified in 3 section 390.1021 (1) except doctor of dental surgery, doctor of dental 4 medicine, juris doctor law and allied health degrees. Funds disbursed 5 through the degree reimbursement programs shall not be used by any 6 recipient institution for theology or divinity programs.
- 7 (2) The reimbursement rate per eligible degree shall be the equally 8 prorated amount permitted by the appropriation, except that the amount 9 of the reimbursement for each associate degree shall be 1/2 of the rate 10 of reimbursement for the other degrees eligible under subsection (1) for 11 the general degree reimbursement program.
- 12 (3) From the general degree reimbursement program, \$135,300.00 13 shall be provided to Spring Arbor College for the southern Michigan state 14 prison program.
- Sec. 305. The funds appropriated in section 101 for the American 16 Indian tuition waiver reimbursement established under Act No. 174 of the 17 Public Acts of 1976, being sections 390.1251 to 390.1253 of the Michigan 18 Compiled Laws, are to reimburse tuition waivers granted by colleges 19 before September 30, 1991. Only those expenses classified as in-state 20 resident tuition charges are eligible for reimbursement.
- Sec. 306. The auditor general shall audit selected enrollments, 22 degrees, and awards at selected independent colleges and universities 23 receiving awards administered by the department of education. The audits 24 shall be based upon definitions and requirements established by the 25 department of management and budget and the senate and house fiscal 26 agencies. The auditor general shall submit a report of findings to the 27 senate and house appropriations committees not later than May 1, 1993.

 Sec. 307. The sums appropriated in Section 101 for the student 29 financial aid and degree reimbursement programs shall be paid out of the

30 state treasury and shall be distributed to the respective institutions

- 1 in accordance with the quarterly payments system implemented during the 2 1991-92 fiscal year as follows:
- 3 (a) In the competitive scholarship and tuition grant programs, 40% 4 shall be paid at the beginning of the state's first fiscal quarter, 40% 5 at the beginning of the second quarter, 10% at the beginning of the third 6 quarter, and 10% at the beginning of the fourth quarter.
- 7 (b) In the work-study program, payments shall be made in 9 monthly 8 installments from October 1 to June 30.
- 9 (c) In the part-time independent student program, and Michigan 10 Education Opportunity Grant program, 50% shall be paid at the beginning 11 of the state's first fiscal quarter, 25% at the beginning of the second 12 quarter and 25% at the beginning of the third quarter.
- (d) In the general degree reimbursement program, allied health 14 degree reimbursement program, dental grant program, Indian Tuition Waiver 15 program, and Paul Douglas Teacher Scholarship program, 50% shall be paid 16 at the beginning of the state's first fiscal quarter and 50% at the 17 beginning of the second quarter after the numbers of earned degrees 18 conferred and total amounts to be paid are certified.
- 19 (e) In the Byrd Honor Scholarship program, 100% shall be allocated 20 in the last quarter of the fiscal year.

21 STATE UNIVERSITIES

- Sec. 401. (1) Included in the appropriations for each public 23 university in section 101 is funding for the Martin Luther King-Cesar 24 Chavez-Rosa Parks future faculty program which is intended to increase 25 the pool of minority candidates pursuing full-time faculty teaching 26 careers in postsecondary education in this state.
- 27 (2) Included in the appropriations for each public university in 28 section 101 is funding for the Martin Luther King-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks 29 college day program which is intended to introduce school children

1 underrepresented in postsecondary education to the potential of a college 2 education.

- 3 (3) The future faculty and college day programs shall be 4 administered by each university in a manner prescribed by the office of 5 minority equity in the department of education.
- 6 (4) Included in the appropriations in section 101 is funding for 7 the Martin Luther King-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks select student support 8 services program for developing academically disadvantaged student 9 retention programs for 4-year public and independent educational 10 institutions in this state.
- 11 (5) Included in the appropriations in section 101 is funding for 12 the Martin Luther King-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks linkage program between 13 public 4-year universities and public community colleges which is 14 intended to increase the number of underrepresented minority students who 15 transfer from community colleges into baccalaureate programs.
- 16 (6) The select student support services and linkage programs shall 17 be administered by the office of minority equity in the department of 18 education.
- Sec. 402. From the amount appropriated in section 101 for state 20 universities, the state universities shall systematically inform Michigan 21 high schools regarding the academic status of students from each high 22 school in a manner prescribed by the department of education.
- Sec. 403. (1) The auditor general shall audit enrollments at 5 24 randomly selected public universities. The audits shall be based upon 25 the definitions and requirements established by the department of 26 management and budget and the senate and house fiscal agencies. The 27 audits shall be based on uniform reporting categories and shall include 28 HEIDI data. The auditor general shall submit a report of findings to the 29 senate and house appropriations committees no later than March 1, 1993.
- 30 (2) Student credit hours reports shall not include the following:

- 1 (a) Student credit hours generated through correspondence courses, 2 credit by examination, or inmate prison programs regardless of teaching 3 location.
- 4 (b) Student credit hours generated in new degree programs after 5 January 1, 1975, that have not been specifically authorized for funding 6 by the legislature, except spin-off programs converted from existing core 7 programs that do all of the following:
- 8 (i) Represent new options, fields, or concentrations within 9 existing programs.
- 10 (ii) Are consistent with the current institutional role and 11 mission.
- 12 (iii) Are accommodated within the continuing funding base of the 13 institution.
- 14 (iv) Do not require a new degree level beyond that which the 15 institution is currently authorized to grant within that discipline or 16 field.
- 17 (v) Do not require special grant funding from the state. As used 18 in this subparagraph, "special grant funding" means funding in addition 19 to that provided by the student credit hours generated within the 20 program, either before program initiation or within the first 3 years of 21 program operation.
- Sec. 404. The principal executive officer of each institution of 23 higher education receiving an appropriation under this act shall expend 24 a portion of the funds appropriated to the institution in reporting to 25 the house and senate appropriations committees, the auditor general, the 26 senate and house fiscal agencies, and the department of management and 27 budget within 60 days after the auditor general issues his or her annual 28 report on the operation of the institution. The institution's report 29 shall specify all of the following:

- 1 (a) The recommendations of the auditor general implemented by the 2 institution, including projected dates and resources required, if any, 3 to achieve compliance.
- 4 (b) The recommendations of the auditor general not implemented by 5 the institution or implemented by the institution as modified.
- 6 (c) The rationale for not implementing a recommendation of the 7 auditor general or of implementing a recommendation as modified.
- 8 Sec. 405. A state university that has not reported project 9 completion and total expenditure of oil overcharge revenues shall submit 10 an annual report by October 1, 1992 to the public service commission in 11 the department of commerce.
- Sec. 406. Each university shall submit biennially the following 13 reports to the governor, department of management and budget, speaker and 14 minority leader of the house, majority and minority leader of the senate, 15 chairs of the house and senate appropriations committees and chairs of 16 the house and senate higher education appropriations committees. The 17 next reporting date shall be November 1, 1993.
- 18 (a) Efforts to improve and emphasize undergraduate instruction.
- 19 (b) Efforts to ensure the English language proficiency of teaching 20 faculty.
- 21 (c) Efforts to provide instructional opportunities to 22 nontraditional students, particulary for part-time and continuing 23 education students during evenings and weekends.
