March 20, 1991, Introduced by Senator SCHWARZ and referred
to the Committee on Appropriations.

EXECUTIVE BUDGET BILL

A bill to make appropriations for the state institutions of higher education and certain state purposes related to education for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1992; to provide for the expenditures of those appropriations; and to prescribe the powers and duties of certain state departments, institutions, agencies, and officers.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF MICHIGAN ENACT:

1 Sec. 101. There is appropriated for the state institutions of higher
2 education and certain state purposes related to education, and subject
3 to the conditions set forth in this act, for the fiscal year ending September
4 30, 1992, the following respective amounts:

6 GENERAL SECTIONS

7 Sec. 201. In accordance with the provisions of section 30 of
8 article IX of the state constitution of 1963, total state spending
9 in this appropriation act is \$1,306,513,081.00. There are no state
10 appropriations to be paid to local units of government in section
11 101.

12 Sec. 202. (1) The sums appropriated in this act shall be paid
13 out of the state treasury and shall be distributed by the state
14 treasurer to the respective institutions in 12 monthly installments,
15 except for the Martin Luther King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks programs
16 which shall receive distributions in quarterly installments. If the
17 appropriations for the Martin Luther King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks
18 programs are not committed or awarded by April 1, 1992 the funds shall
19 become subject to legislative transfer. Any unexpended and unencumbered
20 funds remaining on September 30, 1992 from the amount appropriated
21 for the Martin Luther King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks programs shall
22 lapse on September 30, 1992 and shall be returned to the state general
23 fund. The amount distributed to an institution shall not exceed the
24 net appropriations plus additional distributions specifically
25 authorized by this act.

26 (2) Each institution shall receive payments providing the same

1 percentage increase in its 1991-92 institutional fiscal year over
2 its 1990-91 fiscal year as the percentage increase in state
3 appropriations to each institution for the state fiscal year 1991-92
4 over 1990-91, based on the appropriations and scheduled allotments
5 provided under Act No. 195 of the Public Acts of 1989 and Acts Nos.
6 209 and 357 of the Public Acts of 1990.

7 (3) From the amounts appropriated in section 101, institutions
8 shall reimburse the Michigan public school employees' retirement system
9 at the rate of 11.58% of retirement members' salaries.

10 Sec. 203. (1) All colleges and universities shall furnish all
11 program and financial information that is required by and in a manner
12 prescribed by the state budget director or the house and senate
13 appropriations committees.

14 (2) Pursuant to section 4 of article VIII of the state
15 constitution of 1963, all state institutions of higher education shall
16 furnish an annual accounting of all income and expenditures to the
17 legislature and the state budget director.

18 Sec. 204. Money received by the state from the federal government
19 or private sources for the use of a college or university is
20 appropriated for the purpose for which it was provided. The acceptance
21 and use of federal or private funds shall not place an obligation
22 upon the legislature to continue the purposes for which the funds
23 are made available.

24 Sec. 205. The appropriations contained in this act shall not
25 be used for the construction of buildings or operations of institutions
26 of higher education not expressly authorized in section 101.

1 Sec. 206. The appropriations in this act are subject to section
2 391 of the management and budget act, Act No. 431 of the Public Acts
3 of 1984, being section 18.1391 of the Michigan Compiled Laws.

4 GRANTS AND FINANCIAL AID

5 Sec. 301. Payments of the amounts included in section 101 for
6 the state competitive scholarship program established under Act No.
7 208 of the Public Acts of 1964, being sections 390.971 to 390.981
8 of the Michigan Compiled Laws, shall be made as follows:

9 (a) \$1,200.00 maximum per award in accordance with section 3(1)
10 of Act No. 208 of the Public Acts of 1964, being section 390.973 of
11 the Michigan Compiled Laws.

12 (b) \$25,033,000.00 total state general fund.

13 (c) If a student who receives an award under this section for
14 academic year 1991-92 has his or her tuition and fees paid under the
15 Michigan education trust program and still has financial need, the
16 funds awarded under this section may be used for educational expenses
17 other than tuition and fees.

18 Sec. 302. (1) The amounts appropriated in section 101 for the
19 state tuition grant program established under Act No. 313 of the Public
20 Acts of 1966, being sections 390.991 to 390.997a of the Michigan
21 Compiled Laws, shall not exceed the following:

22 (a) \$2,300.00 maximum per grant.

23 (b) \$50,652,300.00 total state general fund.

24 (2) Tuition grant awards shall be made to all eligible Michigan
25 residents who apply before September 1, 1991, and who are qualified.

26 (3) The Michigan higher education assistance authority shall

1 determine an actual maximum tuition grant award per student that
2 ensures that the aggregate payments for the tuition grant program
3 do not exceed the appropriation contained in section 101 for the state
4 tuition grant program. By October 1, 1991, and again by December
5 1, 1991, the authority shall analyze the status of award commitments,
6 shall make any necessary adjustments, and shall confirm that those
7 award commitments will not exceed the appropriation contained in
8 section 101 for the tuition grant program.

9 The final determination and actions shall be reported to the
10 department of management and budget and the house and senate
11 appropriation subcommittees on higher education no later than December
12 15, 1991. If award adjustments are necessary, the students shall
13 be notified of the adjustment by the second Monday in January.

14 (4) Any unexpended and unencumbered funds remaining on September
15 30, 1992 from the amounts appropriated in section 101 for the tuition
16 grant program shall not lapse on September 30, 1992, but shall continue
17 to be available for expenditure for tuition grants provided in the
18 1992-93 fiscal year.

19 (5) The Michigan higher education assistance authority shall
20 continue a proportional tuition grant maximum award level for
21 recipients enrolled less than full-time in a given semester or term,
22 utilizing an award maximum of 3/4 of the full-time maximum for students
23 enrolled at least 3/4-time but less than full-time and an award maximum
24 of 1/2 of the full-time award maximum for students enrolled at least
25 1/2-time but less than 3/4-time. The authority shall include the
26 following provisions in implementing these proportional award maximums:

1 (a) Students who receive tuition grant awards at the 3/4-time
2 or 1/2-time maximum level shall remain eligible for cumulative awards
3 equal to the full-time equivalency of the total cumulative number
4 of semester awards or their equivalency stipulated for a given academic
5 level in section 3(1) of Act No. 313 of the Public Acts of 1966, being
6 section 390.993 of the Michigan Compiled Laws.

7 (b) Full-time, 3/4-time, and 1/2-time enrollment status at the
8 undergraduate level shall be determined in accordance with the formula
9 and procedures currently utilized in the federal Pell grant program.
10 At the graduate and professional level, full-time, 3/4-time, and
11 1/2-time enrollment status shall be determined according to the
12 definition of the institution.

13 (c) Students who are enrolled in special trimester calendar
14 systems, in which they are technically enrolled at 3/4-time or 1/2-time
15 status in a given semester or term but will complete by the end of
16 the academic year a number of credits equal to at least a year's
17 equivalent of full-time enrollment, shall be recognized as full-time
18 students for purposes of tuition grant eligibility.

19 (6) The Michigan higher education assistance authority shall
20 review the appropriateness of the student summer earnings expectations
21 used for purposes of the need analysis system used to determine
22 eligibility for the tuition grant program and implement any appropriate
23 changes in the student summer earnings expectations. The final
24 determination and proposed action shall be reported to the department
25 of management and budget and the house and senate subcommittees on
26 higher education by November 1, 1991.

1 Sec. 303. Included in the appropriation in section 101 is funding
2 for the Michigan work study program established under Act No. 288
3 of the Public Acts of 1986, being sections 390.1371 to 390.1382 of
4 the Michigan Compiled Laws, and Act No. 303 of the Public Acts of
5 1986, being sections 390.1321 to 390.1332 of the Michigan Compiled
6 Laws. Of the amount appropriated for the Michigan work study program,
7 at least \$535,800.00 shall be allocated for graduate work study. An
8 effort should be made by each institution participating in the Michigan
9 work study program to assure that not less than 10% of those
10 undergraduate, graduate, and professional students eligible to
11 participate in the program are placed with for-profit employers no
12 later than December 31, 1991. The authority shall submit a report
13 to the clerk of the house and the secretary of the senate and the
14 department of management and budget no later than March 31, 1992,
15 specifying the level of participation by each institution, the barriers
16 to the achievement of the 10% for-profit participation level by each
17 institution, and recommendations for addressing those barriers.

18 Sec. 304. (1) Payments of the amounts included in section 101
19 for the general degree reimbursement program established under Act
20 No. 75 of the Public Acts of 1974, being sections 390.1021 to 390.1027
21 of the Michigan Compiled Laws, shall be made for all degrees identified
22 in section 1(1) of that act, being section 390.1021 of the Michigan
23 Compiled Laws, except doctor of dental surgery, doctor of dental
24 medicine, juris doctor law and allied health degrees.

25 (2) The reimbursement rate per eligible degree shall be the
26 equally prorated amount permitted by the appropriation, except that

1 the amount of the reimbursement for each associate degree shall be
2 1/2 of the rate of reimbursement for the other degrees eligible under
3 subsection (1) for the general degree reimbursement program.

4 (3) Total general degree reimbursement payments shall not exceed
5 \$4,533,568.00.

6 (4) From the general degree reimbursement program \$135,300 shall
7 be provided to Spring Arbor College for the southern Michigan State
8 prison program.

9 Sec. 305. Payments of the amounts included in section 101 for
10 the allied health degree reimbursement program established under Act
11 No. 75 of the Public Acts of 1974, being sections 390.1021 to 390.1027
12 of the Michigan Compiled Laws, shall be made as follows:

13 (a) The reimbursement rate per eligible degree shall be the
14 equally prorated amount permitted by the appropriation.

15 (b) Total allied health degree reimbursement payments shall not
16 exceed \$730,208.00.

17 Sec. 306. Funds disbursed through the degree reimbursement
18 programs shall not be used by any recipient institution for theology
19 or divinity programs.

20 Sec. 307. The funds appropriated in section 101 for the American
21 Indian tuition waiver reimbursement established under Act No. 174
22 of the Public Acts of 1976, being sections 390.1251 to 390.1253 of
23 the Michigan Compiled Laws, are to reimburse tuition waivers granted
24 by colleges before September 30, 1990. Only those expenses classified
25 as tuition assessments are eligible for reimbursement, except that
26 if a student who receives an award under this section has his or her

1 tuition and fees paid under the Michigan education trust program and
2 still has financial need, the funds awarded under this section may
3 be used for educational expenses other than tuition and fees.

4 Sec. 308. Included in the appropriations in section 101 for higher
5 education are \$500,000.00 for the establishment of the Robert C. Byrd
6 honors scholarship program. Pursuant to the implementation of this
7 program, the legislature encourages the department of education to
8 distribute funds for this scholarship program to each high school
9 in this state and to allow each high school to select a merit scholar.

10 Sec. 309. To enable the legislature to evaluate the appropriation
11 needs of institutions of higher education, each independent college
12 and university shall make available to the legislature, upon request,
13 data regarding grants for the preceding, current, and ensuing fiscal
14 years.

15 Sec. 310. The auditor general shall audit selected enrollments,
16 degrees, and awards at selected independent colleges and universities
17 receiving awards administered by the department of education. The
18 audits shall be based upon definitions and requirements established
19 by the department of management and budget and the senate and house
20 fiscal agencies. The auditor general shall submit a report of findings
21 to the senate and house appropriations committees not later than May
22 1, 1992.

23 Sec. 311. (1) The funds appropriated in section 101 for the
24 Michigan nursing opportunity program are for scholarship awards for
25 nursing students who demonstrate financial need and who are
26 underrepresented minorities.

1 (2) The Michigan higher education assistance authority established
2 under Act No. 77 of the Public Acts of 1960, being sections 390.951
3 to 390.961 of the Michigan Compiled Laws, shall administer the awards
4 which shall be available to each eligible Michigan resident student
5 enrolled in an accredited registered nursing program at a four-year
6 public or independent nonprofit college, a university, or a community
7 college in the state.

8 (3) As used in this section:

9 (a) "Nursing program" means an accredited degree program in
10 registered nursing which leads to fulfillment of the requirements
11 for the state nursing examination.

12 (b) "Michigan resident" means a person who was a resident of
13 the state at the time of graduation from high school or for a minimum
14 of 12 months prior to enrollment in the nursing degree program.

15 (4) The amount of the award to be paid for each semester or
16 trimester shall be determined by the Michigan higher education
17 assistance authority based upon an evaluation of the applicant's
18 family's financial resources. In determining financial resources,
19 the authority shall use the same criteria as used under Act No. 208
20 of 1964, being sections 390.971 to 390.981 of the Michigan Compiled
21 Laws.

22 (5) Each award shall not exceed the amount of tuition and fees
23 for the full academic year as reported by the college or university
24 in which the applicant is enrolled, or an amount the Michigan higher
25 education assistance authority finds appropriate in relation to the
26 applicant's family's financial resources, whichever is the lesser.

1 (6) The Michigan higher education assistance authority shall
2 promulgate rules to implement this section.

3 Sec. 312. The sums appropriated in section 101 for state
4 competitive scholarships, tuition grants, part-time independent student
5 grants, grant for Michigan resident dental graduates, grant for general
6 degree graduates, grant for Allied Health graduates, grant for Indian
7 Tuition waivers, Michigan education opportunity grants and Michigan
8 Nursing Opportunity grants shall be paid out of the state treasury
9 and shall be distributed to the respective institutions in 9 monthly
10 installments from October 1, 1991 to June 30, 1992.

11 Sec. 313. The funds appropriated in section 101 for the tuition
12 incentive program/high school completion program shall be distributed
13 in compliance with the administrative procedures for this program
14 in the department of social services.

15 Sec. 314. (1) It is the intent of the legislature that the funds
16 appropriated in section 101 for the fiscal year ending September 1992,
17 will permit each financial aid program to be carried out for the entire
18 fiscal year, unless a shorter period is provided in law.

19 (2) The Michigan higher education assistance authority shall
20 not make or authorize an expenditure or incur an obligation that
21 exceeds or results in spending that will exceed the amount appropriated
22 in section 101 or as otherwise provided by law.

23 (3) In consultation with the department of management and budget,
24 the Michigan higher education assistance authority shall develop a
25 spending plan allotting the amount appropriated for financial aid
26 over the 9 months of the 1991-1992 fiscal year.

1 (4) The Michigan higher education assistance authority shall
2 advise the director of the department of management and budget if
3 an appropriation is section 101 or as otherwise provided by law will
4 not permit to carry out the program specified by line item mandated
5 by the legislature for the entire fiscal year. The authority shall
6 consider both the amount appropriated for each line item and the
7 sufficiency of projected sources of financing when deciding whether
8 the appropriation will last the entire fiscal year. If the director
9 of the department of management and budget concurs with the projections
10 of the authority, the authority shall advise the chairpersons of the
11 senate and house appropriations committees, and the chairpersons of
12 the appropriate appropriations subcommittees that an amount
13 appropriated in section 101 or as otherwise provided by law will not
14 permit the authority to carry out the program mandated by the
15 legislature for the entire fiscal year.

16 (5) If both of the appropriations committees disagree with the
17 conclusion of the authority and department of management director
18 within 10 days, the house fiscal agency and senate fiscal agency shall
19 immediately publish estimates of whether the amount appropriated,
20 including all sources of financing assumed in the appropriation, will
21 that department to carry out the program mandated by the legislature
22 for the entire fiscal year.

23 (6) If the legislature does not act within 30 day after the notice
24 from the authority and department of management director provided
25 in subsection (4) to reduce the mandated level of service, authorize
26 the program to end before the fiscal year is completed, or increase

1 the amount of the appropriation, the authority shall reduce the rate
2 of spending in order to carry out the legislature's intent that the
3 program be carried out for the full fiscal year.

4 STATE UNIVERSITIES

5 Sec. 401. Student health services at state universities shall
6 be self-supporting through student and user fees.

7 Sec. 402. (1) The research excellence fund, previously
8 appropriated separately, is included in the amount of \$27,870,750
9 in section 101 in university operations. The research supported by
10 these funds should be conducted in accordance with the following
11 guidelines:

12 (a) Leads to the development of scientific or technological
13 discoveries.

14 (b) Applies scientific or technological discoveries or advances
15 to new applications.

16 (c) Provides a tangible, direct benefit to the economy of the
17 state or region.

18 (d) Is of general interest to an entire industrial field.

19 (e) Contributes directly or indirectly to the development of
20 additional products or processes.

21 (f) May generate outside funding sources.

22 (g) The research results or technology advances may be transferred
23 to the private sector.

24 (h) These funds should not be used for indirect costs or to
25 supplant existing research resources.

26 (2) Each state university shall report on the activities and

1 results of the research supported by these funds to the speaker and
2 minority leader of the house, the majority and minority leaders of
3 the senate, the chairs of the house and senate appropriation
4 committees, the chairs of the house and senate higher education
5 appropriation subcommittees, and the director of the department of
6 management and budget by November 1, 1992.

7 Sec. 403. (1) The teaching excellence fund appropriated in section
8 101 is created to recognize outstanding teaching performance by faculty
9 members of state universities.

10 (2) An award of \$2,500.00 shall be made to faculty members
11 selected by a process administered by each university which provides
12 for participation by students and members of the faculty. The students
13 and faculty members participating in the selection process shall be
14 representative of all segments of the campus community, including
15 academic discipline, academic level, instructional level, race, and
16 sex. Students shall comprise at least 1/3 of the selection committee.
17 All faculty members of a university shall be eligible for selection
18 for an award.

19 (3) The criteria to be used in the selection process are to be
20 limited to the following: superior classroom performance, innovative
21 instructional practice, high educational standards, and concern for
22 students in and out of the classroom.

23 (4) By May 1, 1992 each university receiving teaching excellence
24 funds shall report to the legislature and the department of management
25 and budget the following: the names of faculty members receiving
26 teaching excellence fund awards, the basis for each award, and a

1 description of the selection process, including the names, sex, and
2 race of the students and faculty members participating in the selection
3 process; and also the names, sex, and race of the recipients shall
4 be provided in each annual report.

5 (5) Each institution shall receive a number of awards based on
6 the number of full-time faculty as follows:

7 (a) 2 awards each: Lake Superior state university, Saginaw valley
8 state university, university of Michigan at Flint, university of
9 Michigan at Dearborn, and Grand valley state university.

10 (b) 4 awards each: Michigan technological university, northern
11 Michigan university, and Oakland university.

12 (c) 6 awards each: Ferris state university and central Michigan
13 university.

14 (d) 8 awards each: eastern Michigan university and western
15 Michigan university.

16 (e) 12 awards: Wayne state university.

17 (f) 18 awards: university of Michigan at Ann Arbor.

18 (g) 20 awards: Michigan state university.

19 The funds awarded under this section shall not supplant current
20 institutional expenditures devoted to the selection and monetary
21 recognition of outstanding teaching performance by faculty members.

22 Sec. 404. The legislature recommends that the ratio of
23 out-of-state students at any state university not exceed 30% of
24 undergraduate student enrollment and 38% of graduate student
25 enrollment.

26 Sec. 405. Any public college or university eligible to receive

1 funds under any section of this act shall have its total funding
2 reduced 10% unless it has certified to the department of management
3 and budget by August 15, 1991 that its health and related benefit
4 insurance contracts entered into, or renewed on or after July 1, 1991
5 were, or will be, let under competitive bidding procedures.

6 CONSORTIA AND COOPERATIVE PROGRAMS

7 Sec. 501. Included in the amounts appropriated in section 101,
8 there is appropriated to Wayne state university the sum of \$440,000.00
9 for cooperative leadership skills programs for trade union minorities
10 and women. This program is to be offered by a consortium consisting
11 of eastern Michigan university, Michigan state university, northern
12 Michigan university, Oakland university, university of Michigan, and
13 Wayne state university. Wayne state university shall act as fiscal
14 agent, and the funds shall be divided among the participating
15 universities.

16 Sec. 502. Included in the amounts appropriated in section 101
17 are funds for the following consortia projects:

18 (a) Northern inter-collegiate research sharing consortium -
19 central Michigan university and Kirtland community college.

20 (b) Industrial development institute - Michigan state university
21 and Lansing community college.

22 (c) Enabling technology consortium - university of Michigan,
23 Michigan state university, and Wayne state university.

24 (d) Kalamazoo consortium - western Michigan university, Kalamazoo
25 valley community college, Kalamazoo college, Davenport college, and
26 Nazareth college.

1 (e) Urban teacher education consortium - eastern Michigan
2 university, Wayne state university, and Wayne county community college.

3 (f) Grand Rapids applied technology center - Ferris state
4 university and Grand Rapids junior college.

5 (g) Race relations consortium - Wayne state university and western
6 Michigan university.

7 (h) Polymer technology consortium - Michigan technological
8 university, central Michigan technological university, Wayne state
9 university, eastern Michigan university, Michigan state university,
10 and the Michigan molecular institute.

11 Sec. 503. It is the intent of the legislature to fund the
12 consortium on race relations from the funds appropriated under this
13 act. The consortium is to be comprised of the race relations institute
14 at Wayne state university, and the institute for the study of race
15 and ethnic relations at western Michigan university. The consortium
16 is to be governed by an advisory council consisting of 2 members from
17 Wayne state university, 2 members from western Michigan university,
18 and chairs of the house and senate higher education appropriations
19 subcommittees. The consortium shall conduct research; provide outreach
20 programs; promote racial and ethnic harmony; and encourage
21 participation and commitments from other higher education institutions
22 and communities.

23 MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR.-CESAR CHAVEZ-ROSA PARKS

24 PROGRAMS

25 Sec. 601. (1) Included in the appropriation for each Michigan
26 public university from the amount in section 101 is funding for the

1 Martin Luther King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks visiting professors
2 program.

3 (2) Universities with student head count totals exceeding 20,000
4 for the fall of 1988 are appropriated \$91,634.00 each. Universities
5 with student head count totals of less than 20,000 for the fall of
6 1989 are appropriated \$22,857.00 each.

7 (3) Martin Luther King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks visiting
8 professors program funds shall be expended to increase the number
9 of minority instructors in the classroom and provide role models for
10 underrepresented minority students.

11 (4) The presidents council of state universities shall report
12 by October 30, 1991 to the house and senate appropriations committees,
13 the office of minority equity in postsecondary education, and the
14 department of management and budget all of the following Martin Luther
15 King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks visiting professors program
16 information:

17 (a) Names of visiting professors.

18 (b) Courses instructed by visiting professors.

19 (c) Duration and dates of instruction.

20 (d) Employment status, excluding Martin Luther King, Jr.-Cesar
21 Chavez-Rosa Parks visiting professor duties.

22 (e) Race and sex of visiting professors.

23 (5) Martin Luther King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks visiting
24 professor funds shall be equally matched with institution funding
25 devoted to the purpose stated in subsection (3). No part of the
26 visiting professor funds or the institution's matching funds shall

1 be deducted to cover indirect costs.

2 (6) An applicant for a visiting professor award shall provide
3 all of the following information to the office of minority equity
4 in postsecondary education at the time of application:

5 (a) The name of each institution where the applicant has served
6 in a visiting professor capacity.

7 (b) Courses instructed as a visiting professor at each
8 institution.

9 (c) Money earned for serving as a visiting professor at each
10 institution.

11 (d) The dates during which the applicant served as a visiting
12 professor at each institution.

13 Sec. 602. (1) Included in the appropriation for each public
14 university in this state from the amount appropriated in section 101
15 is funding for a Martin Luther King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks
16 fellowship/scholarship program. The Martin Luther King, Jr.-Cesar
17 Chavez-Rosa Parks fellowship/scholarship program is intended to
18 increase the pool of minority candidates pursuing academic careers
19 in postsecondary education in this state.

20 (2) The Martin Luther King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks
21 fellowship/scholarship program shall be administered by each
22 institution.

23 Each institution may grant a scholarship or fellowship to a student
24 to attend any Michigan university. An award shall be granted to a
25 candidate considered by the granting institution to be an
26 underrepresented minority in that academic field of study. University

1 of Michigan-Ann Arbor, Michigan state university, Wayne state
2 university, and western Michigan university may grant only fellowships
3 under this program.

4 (3) A Martin Luther King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks fellowship
5 shall be awarded to a candidate who will:

6 (a) Begin an academic career in a Michigan postsecondary
7 educational institution within 1 year after attaining his or her
8 doctorate degree.

9 (b) Remain in an academic career in Michigan postsecondary
10 education for a period of not less than 3 years.

11 (c) Pursue a doctorate at a Michigan postsecondary educational
12 institution upon receipt of the fellowship funds.

13 (4) A Martin Luther King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks scholarship
14 shall be awarded to a candidate who is pursuing a masters degree and
15 who will pursue a doctorate degree at a Michigan postsecondary
16 educational institution within 1 year after attaining his or her
17 masters degree.

18 (5) A Martin Luther King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks
19 fellowship/scholarship is intended to offset any educational or living
20 expenses that the fellow or scholar may incur, so long as he or she
21 remains in good academic standing as defined by the host institution.

22 (6) A Martin Luther King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks fellowship
23 award shall not exceed \$25,000.00 for a student pursuing a doctorate
24 degree, and a Martin Luther King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks
25 scholarship award shall not exceed \$15,000.00 for a student pursuing
26 a master's degree. A fellowship/scholarship candidate shall not receive

1 more than 1 Martin Luther King, Jr. -Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks award
2 to pursue the same degree or a degree at the same level of study.
3 Martin Luther King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks scholarship recipients
4 are to be considered candidates for the Martin Luther King, Jr.-Cesar
5 Chavez-Rosa Parks fellowship program, when eligible.

6 (7) A Martin Luther King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks fellow
7 has 6 years in which to attain his or her doctorate degree. This 6-year
8 period begins after obtaining a master's degree or spending an
9 equivalent 2-1/2 year period at master's level studies. A Martin Luther
10 King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks scholar shall attain the master's
11 degree within 2-1/2 years of receiving the award. The Michigan higher
12 education assistance authority may extend these periods by 1 year
13 for good cause.

14 (8) The Martin Luther King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks
15 fellowship/scholarship shall be defaulted and considered a loan subject
16 to repayment in full to the state if any 1 of the following occurs:

17 (a) The recipient fails to maintain good academic standing at
18 the postsecondary institution.

19 (b) The recipient fails to attain the appropriate degree in the
20 time required by subsection (7).

21 (c) The recipient fellow does not meet the requirements of
22 subsection (3) (a), (b), and (c), or the recipient scholar does not
23 meet the requirements of this section.

24 (9) The first fellowship/scholarship repayment is due within
25 1 year of fellowship/scholarship default, as described in subsection
26 (8). The loan amount to be repaid shall include the

1 fellowship/scholarship award, plus interest calculated at a rate not
2 less than that of the guaranteed student loan at the time of default,
3 and collection fees including attorney fees, according to a schedule
4 established by the Michigan higher education assistance authority.
5 Interest amounts shall be calculated pursuant to the interest
6 computation procedures of the guaranteed student loan program.
7 Repayment shall be made according to a schedule published by the
8 Michigan higher education assistance authority. The schedule shall
9 call for repayment of the loan within a period of not more than 10
10 years, or monthly repayment of \$100.00, whichever is greater.

11 (10) Each university granting Martin Luther King, Jr.-Cesar
12 Chavez-Rosa Parks awards shall require recipients to sign an agreement
13 specifying acceptance of the terms of the award.

14 (11) The Michigan higher education assistance authority shall
15 implement and administer the loan repayment provisions of subsections
16 (8) and (9).

17 (12) The Michigan higher education assistance authority may extend
18 forbearance in the form of a reduced monthly payment of principal
19 and interest for any period or periods not to exceed a total of 24
20 months to a defaulted fellow or scholar who demonstrates to the
21 satisfaction of the Michigan higher education assistance authority
22 that the fellow or scholar is experiencing serious financial hardship,
23 even though the forbearance would extend the loan repayment period
24 beyond 10 years.

25 (13) The Michigan higher education assistance authority shall
26 report by September 30, 1992, and each year thereafter, on September

1 30, to the house and senate appropriations committees and the office
2 of minority equity in postsecondary education all of the following
3 information:

4 (a) Names of student fellows/scholars, the institutions, and
5 fields of study.

6 (b) Names of scholars having completed their master's degree
7 requirements and their current educational status.

8 (c) Names of fellows having completed their studies, and their
9 current employment status or employing institutions, or both.

10 (d) Names of fellows/scholars in default as described in
11 subsection (7), and the status of their Martin Luther King, Jr.-Cesar
12 Chavez-Rosa Parks fellowship/scholarship repayment.

13 (14) The Michigan higher education assistance authority shall
14 cancel the unpaid loan amount of a defaulted fellow or scholar who
15 dies or becomes totally and permanently disabled and has such
16 disability certified by a licensed doctor of medicine or osteopathy.

17 (15) Martin Luther King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks
18 fellowship/scholarship funds shall not supplant institutional funding
19 devoted to the purpose stated in subsection (1).

20 (16) On April 15, 1992, each university shall report to the office
21 of minority equity in postsecondary education the name and social
22 security number of each recipient of a Martin Luther King, Jr.-Cesar
23 Chavez-Rosa Parks scholarship or fellowship, and the amount, date,
24 and duration of the award.

25 (17) If any funds are not awarded or committed by a university
26 to a specific recipient by April 1, 1992, the department of management

1 and budget may recommend legislative transfers to other Martin Luther
2 King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks line items within a university or
3 to Martin Luther King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks line items at
4 another university.

5 Sec. 603. (1) Included in section 101 is funding for the Martin
6 Luther King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks college day program. The
7 Martin Luther King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks college day program
8 is an intervention program intended to introduce school children
9 underrepresented in postsecondary education to the potential of a
10 college education.

11 (2) The programs shall provide a day, overnight, or extended
12 experience on the college campus for pupils in grades 6 through 11,
13 if the program meets the intent stated in subsection (1), and is
14 designed primarily as a motivational program to inspire targeted pupils
15 to pursue a college education. It is not designed principally as an
16 academic or athletic skills development program.

17 (3) If possible and practical, the program shall focus on serving
18 those 35 school districts with the highest percentage of minority
19 pupils as reported to the Michigan department of education. However,
20 all eligible pupils from the participating school districts shall
21 be included in this program, regardless of the pupil's race.

22 (4) Each pupil participating in the program shall be provided
23 with standard appropriate background information describing the
24 Michigan postsecondary education system, both 2-year and 4-year public
25 and independent degree granting colleges and universities, the
26 opportunities afforded by a college experience, admissions

1 requirements, and financial aid availability. The Michigan department
2 of education shall develop and make available this material.

3 (5) Individual program plans shall include all of the following:

4 (a) A budget of equal contributions from this program, the
5 participating public university, the participating school district,
6 and the participating independent degree granting college. No college
7 day funds may be deducted to cover indirect costs. No more than 20%
8 of the university match may be attributable to indirect costs.

9 (b) A letter of support signed by the superintendents of the
10 participating school districts and the presidents or chancellors of
11 the participating colleges and universities named under subdivision
12 (a).

13 (c) The formal involvement of the appropriate public 2-year
14 colleges and independent degree granting colleges in the college day
15 program.

16 (6) The presidents council of state universities shall report
17 by September 30, 1991, and each year thereafter, to the house and
18 senate fiscal agencies, the office of minority equity in postsecondary
19 education, and the department of management and budget all of the
20 following for each participating university and school district:

21 (a) Number of pupils participating and their schools.

22 (b) Age, race, and sex of participating pupils.

23 (c) Description of the college experience offered by the program
24 to the pupils.

25 (d) A copy of the program plans described in subsection (5).

26 (e) A copy of the program budget.

1 (7) The participating school district, the participating colleges
2 and universities, and the presidents council of state universities
3 shall retain the information as is necessary to assess the long-range
4 impact of the Martin Luther King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks college
5 day program on the high school graduation rate, college attendance
6 of participating pupils, or any other benefits that may be realized
7 by this program.

8 (8) The universities shall submit a report to the office of
9 minority equity in postsecondary education by November 30, 1991,
10 detailing their plans for college day activities for the 1991-92 fiscal
11 year.

12 Sec. 604. (1) From the amount appropriated in section 101 for
13 select student support services programs, \$1,673,100.00 is allocated
14 for developing academically and economically disadvantaged student
15 retention programs for 4-year public and independent educational
16 institutions in this state.

17 (2) Not later than January 1, 1992, the office of minority equity
18 in postsecondary education shall develop and make available proposal
19 guidelines to eligible 4-year institutions for programs described
20 in subsection (1). Each proposal shall be submitted to the office
21 not later than February 15, 1992.

22 (3) A peer review committee shall be established by the office
23 of minority equity in conjunction with the presidents council of state
24 universities and the association of independent colleges and
25 universities of Michigan to review submitted proposals and to make
26 recommendations.

1 (4) A 3-member review panel composed of 1 member appointed by
2 the speaker of the house of representatives, 1 member appointed by
3 the majority leader of the senate, and 1 member appointed by the state
4 budget director shall review all committee recommendations and make
5 awards.

6 (5) The review panel shall make its awards to eligible
7 institutions not later than April 1, 1992. An award to any 1
8 institution shall not be greater than \$150,000.00, and the amount
9 awarded shall be matched on an 70% state, 30% college-university basis.

10 (6) An educational institution that receives an award under this
11 section shall report at the end of its grant period to the house and
12 senate appropriations committees, the office of minority equity in
13 postsecondary education, and the department of management and budget
14 all of the following information:

15 (a) A description of select student support services programs
16 initiated.

17 (b) The number of participants, measured in head count, by racial,
18 ethnic, and 4-S program category.

19 (c) Other information considered necessary or appropriate by
20 the office of minority equity in postsecondary education.

21 (7) The funds awarded under this section shall not supplant
22 institutional funding devoted to the purpose described in subsection
23 (1).

24 Sec. 605. (1) Included in section 101 is funding for a linkage
25 program between public 4-year universities and public community
26 colleges. The purpose of this program is to increase the number of

1 underrepresented minority students who transfer from community colleges
2 into baccalaureate programs.

3 (2) The grants shall be made under this program to Michigan public
4 universities. The grants shall reflect geographic diversity.

5 (3) Not later than October 1, 1991, the office of minority equity
6 in postsecondary education shall develop and make available proposal
7 guidelines to eligible universities. Each proposal shall be submitted
8 to the office not later than October 30, 1991.

9 (4) The office of minority equity in postsecondary education
10 shall review submitted proposals and make recommendations to the Martin
11 Luther King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks review panel established
12 in section 604.

13 (5) The review panel shall review the recommendations of the
14 office of minority equity in postsecondary education and make awards
15 not later than November 15, 1991. An award to any 1 institution shall
16 not be greater than \$150,000.00, and the amount awarded shall be
17 matched on an 70% state, 30% university basis.

18 (6) An educational institution that receives an award under this
19 section shall report at the end of its grant period, to the house
20 and senate appropriations committees, the department of management
21 and budget, and the office of minority equity in postsecondary
22 education in the manner requested by the office of minority equity
23 in postsecondary education on the progress made to increase the number
24 of minority students transferring from the community college into
25 baccalaureate degree programs.

26 (7) The funds awarded under this section shall not supplant

1 institutional funding devoted to the purpose described in subsection
2 (1).

3 Sec. 606. Included in the appropriation in section 101 for the
4 Martin Luther King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks program is \$147,233.00
5 for a media presentation program. From this amount, the office of
6 minority equity, in collaboration with the American association of
7 university professors, shall develop media presentations to motivate
8 minority students to enter higher education and to instruct minority
9 students and their families in college and financial aid opportunities.

10 Sec. 607. It is the intent of the legislature that funds from
11 the Martin Luther King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks program shall
12 not be used for any purpose other than the purposes designated in
13 this act. No part of the funds or the institution's matching funds
14 for any of the Martin Luther King, Jr. -Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks
15 initiative programs shall be deducted to cover indirect costs.

16 UNIVERSITY SERVICE TO K-12 EDUCATION

17 Sec. 701. (1) From the amount appropriated in section 101 for
18 state universities, the state universities shall establish a systematic
19 method to inform Michigan high schools regarding the academic status
20 of students from each high school. Not later than March 31, 1992,
21 each state university shall prepare and deliver to each Michigan high
22 school that has graduates enrolled as FTIACs at the university a report
23 on the status of each of those students, using the standard format
24 developed under subsection (3). The report shall contain at least
25 all of the following information:

26 (a) For the academic year in which the report is submitted, the

1 total number of FTIACs who were conditionally enrolled and the number
2 of those students from that high school.

3 (b) For the academic year in which the report is submitted, the
4 total number of FTIACs who were regularly enrolled and the number
5 of those students from that high school.

6 (c) Detailed status of both conditionally enrolled and regularly
7 enrolled FTIACs, showing both the total number of each and the number
8 of each from that high school in each of the following categories:

9 (i) Enrolled in a remedial/developmental math course or program
10 as a result of placement testing.

11 (ii) Enrolled in a remedial/developmental writing or reading
12 course or program as a result of placement testing.

13 (iii) Awarded advanced placement credit, identifying the
14 subject/course area.

15 (iv) Were required to enroll in a comprehensive program to develop
16 academic skills as a result of placement testing.

17 (d) For each placement examination or other assessment instrument
18 used for determining whether to place a FTIAC in a
19 remedial/developmental course or program, or to give the FTIAC credit
20 for a freshman level course or place the FTIAC in a sophomore or higher
21 level course; the name, type, and a description of the examination
22 or instrument; the basis for comparing results among students and
23 making placement determinations; average score for all FTIACs; and
24 average score for FTIACs from that high school.

25 (e) Detailed status of students returning in the fall term or
26 semester for their second year of studies at the university, showing

1 both the total number of students and the number of students from
2 that high school in each of the following categories:

3 (i) Total number returning for second year.

4 (ii) Number returning in good academic standing with at least
5 enough credits for full sophomore status.

6 (iii) Number returning in good academic standing with less than
7 full sophomore status.

8 (iv) Number returning in conditional or probationary academic
9 standing.

10 (v) Average grade point average of returning students compared
11 to the university-wide average.

12 (2) In preparing the report, confidentiality of individual
13 students' records shall be maintained in accordance with section 438
14 of subpart 2 of part C of the general education provisions act, title
15 IV of Public Law 90-247, 20 U.S.C. 1232g, commonly referred to as
16 the family educational rights and privacy act of 1974.

17 (3) Not later than October 30, 1991, the presidents council of
18 state universities, in cooperation with high schools, shall develop
19 and distribute to each state university a standard format for reporting
20 the information required under subsection (1).

21 (4) Each state university shall allocate funds appropriated to
22 the institution in section 101 to promote communication between high
23 school personnel and university personnel to promote school improvement
24 and to improve student academic preparation.

25 (5) Not later than April 30, 1992, the presidents council of
26 state universities shall submit a report to the chairs of the house

1 and senate appropriations committees, and the department of management
2 and budget concerning the implementation of the reporting system
3 required under this section.

4 (6) As used in this section, "FTIAC" means a student enrolled
5 as a freshman and for the first time in any college at the state
6 university.

7 Sec. 702. To encourage more students to study mathematics in
8 high school and to reduce the amount of remediation in the mathematics
9 area at the college and university level, \$190,500.00 is appropriated
10 in section 101 for the Michigan mathematics early placement test.
11 Included within the appropriation in section 101 for each state
12 university is \$12,700.00 for activities to increase both the number
13 of students and high schools participating in the Michigan mathematics
14 early placement test, a program of the presidents council of state
15 universities. A report on the results of the mathematics early
16 placement test program shall be submitted by the presidents council
17 of state universities to the house and senate higher education
18 appropriations subcommittees, the department of education, and the
19 department of management and budget by June 15, 1992.

20 Sec. 703. Included in the amounts contained in section 101, Wayne
21 state university is granted \$320,000.00 for the college of education
22 to deliver professional school district programs to meet their service
23 needs. A minimum of \$100,000.00 shall be allocated for the
24 establishment and maintenance of a staff development/school improvement
25 program with the intermediate school district servicing its area.

26 Sec. 704. It is the intent of the legislature that eastern

1 Michigan university shall coordinate a professional teacher development
2 program for local area school districts.

3 Sec. 705. Included in the appropriations in section 101 is funding
4 for the urban teacher education program. The amount appropriated shall
5 be equally divided among eastern Michigan university, Wayne state
6 university, and Wayne county community college for the sole purpose
7 of development and implementation of the urban teacher education
8 program approved by the state board of education. Not less than 75%
9 of the allocation to each institution for the urban teacher education
10 program shall be spent for operation and support of activities and
11 personnel to advise and counsel students and support the field-based
12 teacher education experiences of students.

13 GENERAL REPORTS AND AUDITS

14 Sec. 801. (1) The auditor general shall audit enrollments at
15 all public universities. The audits shall be based upon the definitions
16 and requirements established by the department of management and budget
17 and the senate and house fiscal agencies. The audits shall be based
18 on uniform reporting categories and shall include HEIDI data. The
19 auditor general shall submit a report of findings to the senate and
20 house appropriations committees no later than March 1, 1992.

21 (2) Student credit hours reports shall not include the following:

22 (a) Student credit hours generated through correspondence courses,
23 credit by examination, or inmate prison programs regardless of teaching
24 location.

25 (b) Student credit hours generated in new degree programs after
26 January 1, 1975, that have not been specifically authorized for funding

1 by the legislature, except spin-off programs converted from existing
2 core programs that do all of the following:

3 (i) Represent new options, fields, or concentrations within
4 existing programs.

5 (ii) Are consistent with the current institutional role and
6 mission.

7 (iii) Are accommodated within the continuing funding base of
8 the institution.

9 (iv) Do not require a new degree level beyond that which the
10 institution is currently authorized to grant within that discipline
11 or field.

12 (v) Do not require special grant funding from the state. As used
13 in this subparagraph, "special grant funding" means funding in addition
14 to that provided by the student credit hours generated within the
15 program, either before program initiation or within the first 3 years
16 of program operation.

17 Sec. 802. The principal executive officer of each institution
18 of higher education receiving an appropriation under this act shall
19 expend a portion of the funds appropriated to the institution in
20 reporting to the house and senate appropriations committees, the
21 auditor general, the senate and house fiscal agencies, and the
22 department of management and budget within 60 days after the auditor
23 general issues his or her annual report on the operation of the
24 institution. The institution's report shall specify all of the
25 following:

26 (a) The recommendations of the auditor general implemented by

1 the institution, including projected dates and resources required,
2 if any, to achieve compliance.

3 (b) The recommendations of the auditor general not implemented
4 by the institution or implemented by the institution as modified.

5 (c) The rationale for not implementing a recommendation of the
6 auditor general or of implementing a recommendation as modified.

7 Sec. 803. Each state university shall submit an annual report
8 to the department of management and budget and to the chairpersons
9 of the house and senate higher education appropriations subcommittees
10 in a manner prescribed by the department of management and budget
11 describing each energy conservation project financed wholly or in
12 part by oil overcharge revenues appropriated in fiscal year 1987 and
13 fiscal year 1988. The report shall include a description of each energy
14 conservation project and the actual expenditures and energy savings
15 estimates. The information contained in the report shall be utilized
16 to meet the annual reporting requirements to the United States district
17 court and the United States secretary of energy regarding state use
18 of oil overcharge refunds.

19 Sec. 804. Each university shall submit the following reports
20 by November 1, 1991 to the governor, department of management and
21 budget, speaker and minority leader of the house, majority and minority
22 leader of the senate, chairs of the house and senate appropriations
23 committees and chairs of the house and senate higher education
24 appropriations committees.

25 (a) Efforts to improve and emphasize undergraduate instruction.

1 (b) Efforts to ensure the english language proficiency of teaching
2 faculty.

3 (c) Efforts to provide instructional opportunities to non-
4 traditional students, particularly for part-time and continuing
5 education students during evenings and weekends.

6 Sec. 805. It is the intent of the governor that a cooperative
7 effort be made by the executive, legislature, and state universities
8 to develop a more equitable method of allocating state appropriations
9 among institutions.
