SENATE BILL No. 661

December 17, 1991, Introduced by Senator N. SMITH and referred to the Committee on Education.

A bill to amend section 1531 of Act No. 451 of the Public Acts of 1976, entitled as amended

"The school code of 1976,"

as amended by Act No. 267 of the Public Acts of 1986, being section 380.1531 of the Michigan Compiled Laws.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF MICHIGAN ENACT:

- Section 1. Section 1531 of Act No. 451 of the Public Acts
- 2 of 1976, as amended by Act No. 267 of the Public Acts of 1986,
- 3 being section 380.1531 of the Michigan Compiled Laws, is amended
- 4 to read as follows:
- 5 Sec. 1531. (1) Except as provided in this section, the
- 6 state board shall determine the requirements for and issue all
- 7 licenses and certificates for teachers, including preprimary
- 8 teachers, and the requirements for an endorsement of teachers as
- 9 qualified counselors in the public schools of the state.

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- 1 (2) Beginning September 1, 1991, the state board shall only
- 2 issue a teaching certificate to a person who has passed both a
- 3 basic skills examination and each appropriate subject area exami-
- 4 nation for each subject area in which he or she is to be
- 5 certified. Beginning September 1, 1991, persons holding teaching
- 6 degrees from out-of-state teacher preparation institutions and
- 7 who apply for a Michigan teacher's certificate shall be required
- 8 to pass both a Michigan state board approved basic skills exami-
- 9 nation and each appropriate Michigan state board approved subject
- 10 area examination.
- 11 (3) Not later than June 1, 1988, the department, based upon
- 12 criteria recommended pursuant to subsection (5), shall provide to
- 13 state board approved teacher education institutions state board
- 14 approved guidelines and criteria for use in the development or
- 15 selection of a basic skills examination, and not later than
- 16 June 1, 1989, approved guidelines and criteria for use in the
- 17 development or selection of subject area examinations.
- 18 (4) Not later than January 1, 1989, the state board, based
- 19 upon criteria recommended pursuant to subsection (5), shall
- 20 develop, select, or develop and select 1 or more basic skills
- 21 examinations, and not later than January 1, 1990, subject area
- 22 examinations that may be used by an approved teacher education
- 23 institution.
- 24 (5) Within 30-days after the effective date of the amenda-
- 25 tory act that adds this subsection NOT LATER THAN JANUARY 18,
- 26 1987, the state board shall appoint an 11-member teacher
- 27 examination advisory committee comprised of representatives of

- 1 approved teacher education institutions and Michigan education
- 2 organizations and associations. Not more than 1/2 of the members
- 3 comprising this committee shall be certified teachers. Not later
- 4 than January 1, 1988, this committee shall recommend criteria to
- 5 be used by the state board in the development, selection, or
- 6 development and selection of 1 or more basic skills examinations,
- 7 and not later than January 1, 1989, criteria to be used by the
- 8 state board in the development, selection, or development and
- 9 selection of subject area examinations. In addition, by those
- 10 dates, the committee shall recommend guidelines for the use and
- 11 administration of those examinations. The basic skills examina-
- 12 tions referred to in this subsection may be developed by the
- 13 state board or selected by the state board from commercially or
- 14 university developed examinations. In addition, an approved
- 15 teacher education institution, pursuant to guidelines and cri-
- 16 teria described in subsection (3), may develop an examination at
- 17 its own expense for approval by the state board. An approved
- 18 teacher education institution that develops its own examination
- 19 -shall be IS liable for any litigation that results from the use
- 20 of its examination.
- 21 (6) Within 30 days after the effective date of the amenda-
- 22 tory act that adds this subsection NOT LATER THAN JANUARY 18,
- 23 1987, the state board shall appoint a 7-member standing technical
- 24 advisory council comprised of persons who are experts in measure-
- 25 ment and assessment. This council shall advise the state board
- 26 and the teacher examination committee on the validity,
- 27 reliability, and other technical standards of the examinations

- 1 that will be used or are being used and of the administration and
 2 use of those examinations.
- 3 (7) Not later than September 1, 1992 and each year thereaf-
- 4 ter, the state board shall submit in writing a report on the
- 5 development or selection and use of the basic skills examination
- 6 and the subject area examinations to the house and senate educa-
- 7 tion committees. The report shall also contain a financial
- 8 statement regarding revenue received from the assessment of fees
- 9 levied pursuant to subsection (9) and the amount of and any pur-
- 10 poses for which that revenue was expended.
- 11 (8) The basic skills examination and the subject area exami-
- 12 nations required by this section may be taken at different times
- 13 during an approved teacher preparation program, but must be
- 14 passed before a person is enrolled for student teaching.
- (9) The department, or if approved by the state board, a
- 16 private testing service, may assess a fee for taking the basic
- 17 skills and the subject area examinations. The fees, which shall
- 18 be set by the state board, shall not exceed \$50.00 for a basic
- 19 skills examination nor \$75.00 for a subject area examination.
- 20 Fees received by the department shall be expended solely for
- 21 administrative expenses that it incurs in implementing subsec-
- 22 tions (2) to -(12) (14).
- 23 (10) As used in this section:
- 24 (a) "Basic skills examination" means an examination devel-
- 25 oped or selected by the state board or developed pursuant to sub-
- 26 section (5) by an approved teacher education institution for the
- 27 purpose of demonstrating the applicant's knowledge and

- 1 understanding of basic language and mathematical skills and other
- 2 skills necessary for the certificate sought, and for determining
- 3 whether or not a teacher education graduate is eligible for a
- 4 provisional or probationary Michigan teaching certificate. Not
- 5 later than June 30, 1987, the department shall advise the state
- 6 board and the legislature whether or not the department recom-
- 7 mends that the basic skills examination include an examination of
- 8 a person's knowledge and understanding of 1 or more of the
- 9 following: brain function, learning styles, and learning
- 10 processes.
- 11 (b) "Subject area examination" means an examination related
- 12 to a specific area of certification, which examination has been
- 13 developed or selected by the state board for the purpose of
- 14 demonstrating the applicant's knowledge and understanding of the
- 15 subject matter and determining whether or not a teacher education
- 16 graduate is eligible for a provisional or probationary Michigan
- 17 teaching certificate.
- 18 (11) The state board shall certify as qualified the supervi-
- 19 sors required in section 1506. The state board shall certify
- 20 teachers as qualified to teach the class described in section
- 21 1507(1), based upon the recommendation of a teacher training
- 22 institution, upon an evaluation of the teacher's educational
- 23 qualifications and experience, and upon any additional require-
- 24 ments the state board considers necessary.
- 25 (12) BEGINNING JANUARY 1, 1993, THE STATE BOARD SHALL ONLY
- 26 ISSUE A TEACHING CERTIFICATE TO A PERSON WHO HAS PASSED A
- 27 COLLEGE-LEVEL PHILOSOPHY COURSE THAT PROVIDES INSTRUCTION IN THE

- 1 IMPORTANCE OF ETHICS AND VALUES. AS USED IN THIS SUBSECTION,
- 2 "ETHICS AND VALUES" INCLUDES AT LEAST ALL OF THE FOLLOWING ETHI-
- 3 CAL PRINCIPLES AND THE ACCOMPANYING CHARACTERISTICS ASSOCIATED
- 4 WITH ETHICAL BEHAVIOR.
- 5 (A) HONESTY: TO BE TRUTHFUL, SINCERE, FORTHRIGHT, STRAIGHT-
- 6 FORWARD, FRANK, AND CANDID; TO NOT CHEAT, STEAL, LIE, DECEIVE, OR
- 7 ACT DEVIOUSLY.
- 8 (B) INTEGRITY: TO BE PRINCIPLED, HONORABLE, AND UPRIGHT; TO
- 9 NOT BE TWO-FACED OR UNSCRUPULOUS.
- 10 (C) PROMISE-KEEPING: TO BE WORTHY OF TRUST, KEEP PROMISES,
- 11 FULFILL COMMITMENTS, AND ABIDE BY THE SPIRIT AS WELL AS THE
- 12 LETTER OF AN AGREEMENT.
- 13 (D) LOYALTY: TO BE FAITHFUL AND LOYAL TO FAMILY, FRIENDS.
- 14 EMPLOYERS, CLIENTS, AND COUNTRY.
- 15 (E) FAIRNESS: TO BE FAIR AND OPEN-MINDED, WILLING TO ADMIT
- 16 ERROR, AND, IF APPROPRIATE, CHANGE POSITIONS AND BELIEFS; TO
- 17 DEMONSTRATE A COMMITMENT TO JUSTICE AND THE EOUAL TREATMENT OF
- 18 INDIVIDUALS.
- 19 (F) CARING FOR OTHERS: TO BE CARING, KIND, AND COMPASSION-
- 20 ATE; TO SHARE; TO BE GIVING AND OF SERVICE TO OTHERS; TO HELP
- 21 THOSE IN NEED AND AVOID HARMING OTHERS.
- 22 (G) RESPECT FOR OTHERS: TO DEMONSTRATE RESPECT FOR OTHER
- 23 PEOPLE'S PROPERTY, HUMAN DIGNITY, AND PRIVACY; TO BE COURTEOUS,
- 24 PROMPT, AND DECENT; TO NOT PATRONIZE, EMBARRASS, OR DEMEAN.
- 25 (H) RESPONSIBLE CITIZENSHIP: TO OBEY THE LAWS AND, IF A LAW
- 26 IS UNJUST, OPENLY PROTEST IT; TO EXERCISE ALL DEMOCRATIC RIGHTS
- 27 AND PRIVILEGES RESPONSIBLY BY PARTICIPATION THROUGH VOTING AND

- 1 EXPRESSING INFORMED VIEWS, SOCIAL CONSCIOUSNESS, AND PUBLIC
- 2 SERVICE; WHEN IN A POSITION OF LEADERSHIP OR AUTHORITY, TO OPENLY
- 3 RESPECT AND HONOR DEMOCRATIC PROCESSES OF DECISION MAKING, AVOID
- 4 UNNECESSARY SECRECY OR CONCEALMENT OF INFORMATION, AND ASSURE
- 5 THAT OTHERS HAVE ALL THE INFORMATION THEY NEED TO MAKE INTELLI-
- 6 GENT CHOICES AND EXERCISE THEIR RIGHTS.
- 7 (I) PURSUIT OF EXCELLENCE: TO PURSUE EXCELLENCE IN ALL MAT-
- 8 TERS AND IN MEETING PERSONAL AND PROFESSIONAL RESPONSIBILITIES;
- 9 TO BE DILIGENT, RELIABLE, INDUSTRIOUS, AND COMMITTED; TO PERFORM
- 10 ALL TASKS TO THE BEST OF ONE'S ABILITY, DEVELOP AND MAINTAIN A
- 11 HIGH DEGREE OF COMPETENCE, AND BE WELL INFORMED AND WELL PRE-
- 12 PARED; TO NOT BE CONTENT WITH MEDIOCRITY; TO NOT STRIVE TO "WIN
- 13 AT ANY COST".
- 14 (J) ACCOUNTABILITY: TO BE ACCOUNTABLE AND ACCEPT RESPONSI-
- 15 BILITY FOR DECISIONS, FOR THE FORESEEABLE CONSEQUENCES OF ACTIONS
- 16 AND INACTIONS, AND FOR SETTING AN EXAMPLE FOR OTHERS. TO AVOID
- 17 EVEN THE APPEARANCE OF IMPROPRIETY AND TO TAKE NECESSARY ACTION
- 18 TO CORRECT OR PREVENT INAPPROPRIATE CONDUCT OF OTHERS.
- 19 (13) BEGINNING NOT LATER THAN SEPTEMBER 1, 1992, THE STATE
- 20 BOARD SHALL REQUIRE A STATE BOARD APPROVED TEACHER EDUCATION
- 21 INSTITUTION TO OFFER A PHILOSOPHY COURSE DESCRIBED IN SUBSECTION
- 22 (12).
- 23 (14) -(12) The state board shall promulgate rules for the
- 24 implementation of this section.
