



HOUSE BILL No. 4123

February 2, 1993, Introduced by Reps. Pitoniak, Gubow, Dalman, Curtis, Ciaramitaro, Gire, Byrum, Stille, Olshove, Brown and Goschka and referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

A bill to amend section 2830 of Act No. 368 of the Public Acts of 1978, entitled as amended
"Public health code,"
being section 333.2830 of the Michigan Compiled Laws.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF MICHIGAN ENACT:

1 Section 1. Section 2830 of Act No. 368 of the Public Acts
2 of 1978, being section 333.2830 of the Michigan Compiled Laws, is
3 amended to read as follows:

4 Sec. 2830. (1) If a child whose birth occurred outside the
5 United States, a territory of the United States, or Canada, is
6 adopted by a resident of this state under the laws of this state
7 OR UNDER THE LAWS OF A FOREIGN COUNTRY, the probate court, on
8 motion of the adopting parent, ~~shall~~ MAY file a delayed
9 registration of birth on a form provided by the department. The

1 delayed registration shall contain the date and place of birth
2 and other facts specified by the department.

3 (2) If the date and place of birth cannot be documented from
4 foreign records or a medical assessment of the development of the
5 child indicates that the date of birth as stated in the immigra-
6 tion records is not correct, the court shall determine the facts
7 and establish a date and place of birth and may file a delayed
8 registration of birth as provided in subsection (1).

9 (3) Upon the petition of a child adopted in this state whose
10 birth occurred outside the United States, a territory of the
11 United States, or Canada, or a petition of the child's adoptive
12 parents, the court ~~which~~ THAT issued an order of adoption for
13 that child before the effective date of this section may issue a
14 delayed registration of birth for the adopted child as provided
15 in subsection (1).

16 Section 2. This amendatory act shall not take effect unless
17 Senate Bill No. _____ or House Bill No. 4122 (request
18 no. 01926'93) of the 87th Legislature is enacted into law.
