

HOUSE BILL No. 4540

EXECUTIVE BUDGET BILL

March 24, 1993, Introduced by Reps. Hood, Gilmer, Stille, McBryde, Dolan, Sikkema, Johnson, Bender, Middleton and Oxender and referred to the Committee on Appropriations.

A bill to make appropriations for the state institutions of higher education and certain state purposes related to education for the fiscal years ending September 30, 1994, and September 30, 1995; to provide for the expenditures of those appropriations; and to prescribe the powers and duties of certain state departments, institutions, agencies, and officers.

1 GENERAL SECTIONS FOR FY93/94

Sec. 201. In accordance with the provisions of section 30 of 3 article IX of the state constitution of 1963, total state spending in 4 this appropriation act is \$1,314,581,900.00. Of the funds 5 appropriated in section 101 for campus based and other financial aid 6 programs, it is determined that the portion of the funds utilized by 7 community colleges are local spending pursuant to section 30 of 8 article IX of the state constitution of 1963. Analysis of fiscal year 9 1991-92 expenditures indicates that \$11,066,000.00 of the financial 10 aid funds will be distributed to community college students by the 11 college financial aid offices in accordance with statute for each 12 program. The distribution is as follows:

- 1 appropriated in this act are appropriated for its fiscal year ending 2 September 30, 1994 and shall be paid out of the state treasury and 3 distributed by the state treasurer in 12 monthly installments for the 4 period October 1 to September 30, pursuant to Act 190 of the Public 5 Acts of 1991, being sections 487.2101 to 487.2104 of the Michigan 6 Compiled Laws. If the appropriations for the Martin Luther King, Jr.-7 Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks programs are not committed or awarded by April 81, 1994, the funds shall become subject to legislative transfer. Any 9 unexpended and unencumbered funds remaining on September 30, 1994 from 10 the amount appropriated for the Martin Luther King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-11 Rosa Parks programs shall lapse on September 30, 1994 and shall be 12 returned to the state general fund. The amount distributed to an 13 institution shall not exceed the net appropriations plus additional 14 distributions specifically authorized by this act.

- 18 Sec. 203. All universities shall furnish all program and 19 financial information that is required by and in a manner prescribed 20 by the state budget director or the house and senate appropriations 21 committees.
- Sec. 204. Money received by the state from the federal government 23 or private sources for the use of a college or university is 24 appropriated for the purpose for which it was provided. The 25 acceptance and use of federal or private funds shall not place an 26 obligation upon the legislature to continue the purposes for which the 27 funds are made available.
- Sec. 205. The appropriations made and the expenditures authorized

- 6 colleges before September 30, 1993. Only those expenses classified as
- 7 in-state resident tuition charges are eligible for reimbursement.
- 8 Sec. 1310. The funds appropriated in section 102 for the tuition
- 9 incentive program/high school completion program shall be distributed
- 10 pursuant to the administrative procedure for the tuition incentive
- 11 program/high school completion program in the department of social
- 12 services.
- 13 Sec. 1311. The auditor general shall audit selected enrollments,
- 14 degrees, and awards at selected independent colleges and universities
- 15 receiving awards administered by the department of education. The
- 16 audits shall be based upon definitions and requirements established by
- 17 the department of management and budget and the senate and house
- 18 fiscal agencies. The auditor general shall submit a report of
- 19 findings to the senate and house appropriations committees and
- 20 department of management and budget not later than May 1, 1995.
- 21 Sec. 1312. The sums appropriated in section 102 for the student
- 22 financial aid and degree reimbursement programs shall be paid out of
- 23 the state treasury and shall be distributed to the respective
- 24 institutions in accordance with a quarterly payment system as follows:
- 25 (a) For the state competitive scholarship, tuition incentive
- 26 program and tuition grant programs, 40% shall be paid at the beginning
- 27 of the state's first fiscal quarter, 40% at the beginning of the
- 28 state's second fiscal quarter, 10% at the beginning of the state's

- 1 third fiscal quarter, and 10% at the beginning of the state's fourth 2 fiscal quarter.
- 3 (b) For the work-study program, payments shall be made in 9 4 monthly installments from October 1 to June 30 of any year.
- (c) For the part-time independent student program and Michigan 6 education opportunity grant program, 50% shall be paid at the 7 beginning of the state's first fiscal quarter, 25% at the beginning of 8 the state's second fiscal quarter, and 25% at the beginning of the 9 state's third fiscal quarter.
- (d) For the general degree reimbursement program, allied health 11 degree reimbursement program, Michigan resident dental grant program, 12 Indian tuition waiver program, and Paul Douglas teacher scholarship 13 program, 50% shall be paid at the beginning of the state's first 14 fiscal quarter and 50% at the beginning of the state's second fiscal 15 quarter after the number of earned degrees conferred and total amounts 16 to be paid are certified.
- 17 (e) For the Byrd honor scholarship program, 100% shall be 18 allocated in the last quarter of the state's fiscal year.

19 STATE UNIVERSITIES

- Sec. 1401. (1) The research excellence fund, previously
 21 appropriated separately, is included in the amount of \$28,534,823.00
 22 in section 102 in university operations. The research supported by
 23 these funds shall be conducted in accordance with the following
 24 guidelines:
- 25 (a) Leads to the development of scientific or technological 26 discoveries.
- 27 (b) Applies scientific or technological discoveries or advances to 28 new applications.

- 1 (c) Provides a tangible, direct benefit to the economy of the 2 state or region.
- 3 (d) Is of general interest to an entire industrial field.
- 4 (e) Contributes directly or indirectly to the development of 5 additional products or processes.
- 6 (f) May generate outside funding sources.
- 7 (g) The research results or technology advances may be transferred 8 to the private sector.
- 9 (h) These funds shall not be used for indirect costs or to 10 supplant existing research resources.
- 12 results of the research supported by these funds to the directors of 13 the house and senate fiscal agencies, and the director of the 14 department of management and budget by November 1, 1995. The report 15 shall be in a form and contain such information as determined by the 16 department of management and budget and the house and senate fiscal 17 agencies.
- Sec. 1402. (1) Included in section 102 is \$5,000,000.00 to Wayne 19 State University for psychiatric research and training. Wayne State 20 University shall use these funds for psychiatric laboratory and 21 clinical research, training, and treatment services. Within the 22 available appropriation, services shall not be denied to any patient 23 who meets established research guidelines for treatment on the basis 24 of personal financial circumstances, age, geographic residence, or 25 projected/actual length of treatment as medically warranted.
- 26 (2) Wayne State University shall report the following information 27 to the department of mental health by April 1, 1995 with status update 28 reports on July 1, 1995 and October 1, 1995:

- 1 (a) The number and type of psychiatric research projects to be 2 funded by this appropriation.
- 3 (b) The number and type of students to be trained and the location 4 of training funded by this appropriation.
- 5 (c) Demographic data regarding the number and profile of patients 6 to receive psychiatric services funded by the appropriation and a 7 profile of the services provided.
- 8 (d) A summary budget outlining major expenditure categories and 9 any first and third party reimbursements.
- 10 (3) Copies of these reports shall also be provided to the house 11 and senate appropriations higher education subcommittees, the house 12 and senate appropriations mental health subcommittees, the house and 13 senate fiscal agencies, and the department of management and budget.

14 MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR.-CESAR CHAVEZ-ROSA PARKS PROGRAMS

- 15 Sec. 1501. (1) Included in the appropriation for each public 16 university in section 102 is funding for the Martin Luther King, Jr.-17 Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks future faculty program, that is intended to 18 increase the pool of minority candidates pursuing full-time faculty 19 teaching careers in postsecondary education in this state.
- 20 (2) The program shall be administered by each university in a 21 manner prescribed by the office of minority equity in the Michigan 22 department of education.
- Sec. 1502. (1) Included in the appropriation for each public 24 university in section 102 is funding for the Martin Luther King, Jr.-25 Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks college day program that is intended to 26 introduce school children underrepresented in postsecondary education 27 to the potential of a college education.
- 28 (2) Individual program plans shall include a budget of equal

- 1 contributions from this program, the participating public university,
- 2 the participating school district, and the participating independent
- 3 degree granting college. College day funds may not be deducted to
- 4 cover indirect costs. No more than 20% of the university match may be
- 5 attributable to indirect costs.
- 6 (3) The program shall be administered by each university in a 7 manner prescribed by the office of minority equity in the Michigan 8 department of education.
- 9 Sec. 1503. (1) Included in section 102 is funding for the Martin
- 10 Luther King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks select student support
- 11 services programs for developing academically and economically
- 12 disadvantaged student retention programs for 4-year public and
- 13 independent educational institutions in this state.
- 14 (2) An award made under this program to any 1 institution shall
- 15 not be greater than \$150,000.00, and the amount awarded shall be
- 16 matched on a 70% state, 30% college or university basis.
- 17 (3) The program shall be administered by the office of minority 18 equity in the Michigan department of education.
- 19 Sec. 1504. (1) Included in section 102 is funding for the Martin
- 20 Luther King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks linkage program between 4-
- 21 year universities and public community colleges, which is intended to
- 22 increase the number of underrepresented minority students who transfer
- 23 from community colleges into baccalaureate programs.
- 24 (2) The grants under this program shall be made to Michigan
- 25 public universities. An award to any 1 institution shall not be
- 26 greater than \$150,000.00, and the amount awarded shall be matched on a
- 27 70% state, 30% university basis.
- 28 (3) The program shall be administered by the office of minority

- 1 equity in the Michigan department of education.
- Sec. 1505. (1) Included in the appropriation in section 102 is
- 3 funding for the Martin Luther King, Jr.-Cesar Chavez-Rosa Parks
- 4 visiting professors program which is intended to increase the number
- 5 of minority instructors in the classroom and provide role models for.
- 6 underrepresented minority students.
- 7 (2) The program shall be administered by the office of minority 8 equity in the michigan department of education.

9 UNIVERSITY SERVICE TO K-12 EDUCATION

- 10 Sec. 1601. From the amount appropriated in section 102 for state
- 11 universities, the state universities shall systematically inform
- 12 Michigan high schools regarding the academic status of students from
- 13 each high school in a manner prescribed by the presidents council,
- 14 state universities of Michigan in cooperation with the Michigan
- 15 association of secondary school principals.

16 GENERAL REPORTS AND AUDITS

- 17 Sec. 1701. (1) The auditor general shall audit enrollments at 5
- 18 randomly selected public universities. The audits shall be based upon
- 19 the definition and requirements established by the department of
- 20 management and budget and the senate and house fiscal agencies. The
- 21 audits shall be based on uniform reporting categories and shall
- 22 include HEIDI data. The auditor general shall submit a report of
- 23 findings to the senate and house appropriations committees no later
- 24 than March 1, 1995.
- 25 (2) Student credit hours reports shall not include the following:
- 26 (a) Student credit hours generated through correspondence courses,
- 27 credit by examination, or inmate prison programs regardless of
- 28 teaching location.

- 1 (b) Student credit hours generated in new degree programs after
- 2 January 1, 1975, that have not been specifically authorized for
- 3 funding by the legislature, except spin-off programs converted from
- 4 existing core programs that do all of the following:
- 5 (i) Represent new options, fields, or concentrations within 6 existing programs.
- 7 (ii) Are consistent with the current institutional role and 8 mission.
- 9 (iii) Are accommodated within the continuing funding base of the 10 institution.
- 11 (iv) Do not require a new degree level beyond that which the 12 institution is currently authorized to grant within that discipline or 13 field.
- (v) Do not require special grant funding from the state. As used 15 in this subparagraph, "special grant funding" means funding in 16 addition to that provided by the student credit hours generated within 17 the program, either before program initiation or within the first 3 18 years of program operation.
- Sec. 1702. The principal executive officer of each institution of 20 higher education receiving an appropriation under this act shall 21 expend a portion of the funds appropriated to the institution in 22 reporting to the house and senate appropriations committees, the 23 auditor general, the senate and house fiscal agencies, and the 24 department of management and budget within 60 days after the auditor 25 general issues his or her annual report on the operation of the 26 institution. The institution's report shall specify all of the 27 following:
- 28 (a) The recommendations of the auditor general implemented by the

- 1 institution, including projected dates and resources required, if any, 2 to achieve compliance.
- 3 (b) The recommendations of the auditor general not implemented by 4 the institution or implemented by the institution as modified.
- 5 (c) The rationale for not implementing a recommendation of the 6 auditor general or of implementing a recommendation as modified.
- 7 Sec. 1703. A state university that has not reported project 8 completion and total expenditure of oil overcharge revenues shall 9 submit an annual report by October 1, 1995 to the public service 10 commission in the department of commerce.
