

HOUSE BILL No. 4549

EXECUTIVE BUDGET BILL

March 24, 1993, Introduced by Reps. Bobier, Bender, Middleton, Allen, Gilmer, Stille, Sikkema, and Oxender and referred to the Committee on Appropriations.

A bill to make appropriations for the department of agriculture for the fiscal years ending September 30, 1994 and September 30, 1995; to provide for the expenditure of the appropriations; to create funds; to provide for the imposition of fees; to require reports, audits, and plans; to authorize certain transfers by certain state agencies; and to provide for the disposition of fees and other income received by certain state agencies.

1 GENERAL SECTIONS FOR FY93/94

- Sec. 201. (1) In accordance with the provisions of section 30 of article IX of the state constitution of 1963, total state spending in 4 this appropriation act is \$50,119,500.00 and state appropriations to 5 be paid to local units of government in section 101 are as follows: 6 DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE
- 10 (2) When it appears to the principal executive officer of each
 11 department that state spending to local units of government will be
 12 less than the amount that was projected to be expended for any
 13 quarter, the principal executive officer shall immediately give notice
 14 of the approximate shortfall to the department of management and
 15 budget, the senate and house appropriations committees, and the senate
 16 and house fiscal agencies.
- Sec. 202. The appropriations made and the expenditures authorized 18 under this act and the departments, agencies, commissions, boards, 19 offices, and programs for which an appropriation is made under this 20 act are subject to the management and budget act, Act No. 431 of the 21 Public Acts of 1984, being sections 18.1101 to 18.1594 of the Michigan 22 Compiled Laws.
- 23 Sec. 203. As used in this act:
- 24 (a) "Department" means the department of agriculture.
- 25 (b) "Director" means the director of the department.
- 26 (c) "DAG-AMS" means the United States department of agriculture-27 agriculture marketing service.
- 28 (d) "DAG-APHIS" means the United States department of

- 1 agriculture-animal plant health inspection service.
- 2 (e) "DAG-FS" means the United States department of agriculture-3 forest service.
- 4 (f) "DAG-SRS" means the United States department of agriculture-5 statistical reporting service.
- 6 (g) "EPA-OE" means the United States environmental protection 7 agency-office of enforcement.
- 8 (h) "EPA-OWWM" means the United States environmental protection 9 agency-office of water and waste management.
- 10 (i) "FTE" means full-time equated.
- 11 (j) "HHS-FDA" means the United States department of health and 12 human services-food and drug administration.
- 13 (k) "IDG" means interdepartmental grant.
- 14 Sec. 204. The department may receive and expend funds in addition 15 to those authorized in section 101 for conducting training and 16 orientation workshops and seminars that are consistent with the 17 programmatic mission of the individual unit sponsoring or coordinating 18 the program.
- Sec. 205. Of the funds appropriated in section 101 which are in 20 units other than the grants unit, the department may provide grants to 21 local government agencies, institutions of higher education, or 22 nonprofit organizations. The grants shall be used to support research 23 or other related activities for the purpose of enhancing the 24 agricultural industries in this state.
- 25 Sec. 206. The funds appropriated in section 101 from the central 26 funds for acquiring additional federal funds shall not be expended 27 until the grant money is authorized by the grantor. Expenditure of 28 those funds shall be controlled through the allotment process. Funds

- 1 accepted under this section shall not be authorized if the receipt of 2 the funds mandates a commitment for state funding at a future date.
- 3 Sec. 207. (1) Beginning October 1, 1993, there shall be a hiring
- 4 freeze imposed on the state classified civil service. State
- 5 departments and agencies shall be prohibited from hiring any new full-
- 6 time state classified civil service employees or prohibited from
- 7 filling any vacant state classified civil service positions. This
- 8 hiring freeze does not apply to internal transfers of classified
- 9 employees from one position to another within a department or to
- 10 positions that are funded with 80% or more federal or restricted
- 11 funds.
- 12 (2) The director of the department of management and budget shall 13 grant exceptions to this hiring freeze when the director believes that 14 such a hiring freeze will result in rendering a state department or 15 agency unable to deliver basic services. The director of the 16 department of management and budget shall report by the fifteenth of 17 each month to the chairperson of the senate and house appropriations 18 committees the number of exclusions to the hiring freeze approved 19 during the previous month and the reasons to justify the exclusion. 20 Sec. 208. All savings accruing from reduced contribution rates 21 for the state employees retirement system shall be unallotted from 22 appropriation line items as necessary. Such reductions in 23 contribution rates are contingent upon enactment of amendments to the 24 state employees retirement act of 1943, Act No. 240 of the Public Acts 25 of 1943, being sections 38.1 to 38.48 of the Michigan Compiled Laws, 26 including a defined contribution retirement plan for new state 27 employees within the membership of such plan; changes in funding for

28 the provision of dental and vision benefits; five year reconciliation

- 1 smoothing; use of a 50 year amortization schedule for unfunded
- 2 actuarial accrued liabilities; and other amendments to the act. The
- 3 director of the department of management and budget shall issue
- 4 instructions to all state agencies regarding contribution changes as
- 5 they occur.

6 DEPARTMENT OPERATIONS

- 7 Sec. 301. The appropriations in section 101 may be used for per
- 8 diem payments to members of boards, committees, and commissions for a
- 9 full day's board, committee, or commission work at which a quorum is
- 10 present; for attending a hearing as authorized by the respective
- 11 board, committee, or commission; or for performing official business
- 12 as authorized by the respective board, committee, or commission. The
- 13 per diem payments shall be at a rate as follows:
- 14 (a) Commission of agriculture \$75.00 per day
- 15 (b) Upper Peninsula state fair board \$50.00 per day
- 16 (c) Agricultural marketing and bargaining
- 17 board \$35.00 per day
- 18 Sec. 302. (a) The department may receive and expend revenue and
- 19 use those revenues to cover necessary expenses related to
- 20 publications, audit and licensing functions, livestock sales,
- 21 certification of nursery stock, bean inspection services, and
- 22 laboratory analyses as specified in the following subsections:
- 23 (b) Management services publications
- 24 (c) Management services audit and licensing functions
- 25 (d) Upper peninsula state fair livestock sales.
- 26 (e) Pesticide and plant pest management propagation and
- 27 certification of virus free foundation stock.
- 28 (f) Marketing and market development protection bean inspection

- 1 and grading services.
- 2 (g) Laboratory support testing for testing horses in draft horse 3 pulling contests at county fairs when local jurisdictions request 4 state assistance.
- 5 (h) Laboratory support analyses to determine foreign substances in 6 horses engaged in racing or pulling contests at tracks.
- 7 (i) Laboratory support analysis of food, livestock, and 8 agricultural products for disease, toxic materials, foreign products 9 for disease, toxic materials, foreign substances, and quality 10 standards.
- 11 (j) Laboratory support analysis of liming samples.
- 12 (k) Laboratory support analysis of feed and fertilzer samples.
- 13 (1) Laboratory support test samples for other agencies and 14 organizations.
- 15 Sec. 303. Of the funds appropriated in section 101 to the 16 pesticide and plant pest management program, up to \$100,000.00 may be 17 made available to the Michigan cooperative extension service for the 18 purpose of training of applicators. Reimbursement shall be based on 19 actual expenditures and revenue availability.
- Sec. 304. (1) From the amount appropriated in section 101 for the 21 pesticide and plant pest management program, \$100,000.00 shall be 22 allocated to Michigan State University for a gypsy moth education 23 program.
- (2) Any unexpended balance which is allocated pursuant to this 25 section shall be carried forward as a work project. The purpose of 26 the project is to provide public information regarding Gypsy Moth 27 infestation. The project will be managed by Michigan State University 28 through a \$100,000.00 contract to be completed September 30, 1994.

- Sec. 305. The racing commissioner may pay rewards of not more than \$5,800.00 to a person who provides information which results in the arrest and conviction on a felony or misdemeanor charge for a crime which involves the horse racing industry. A reward paid pursuant to this section shall be paid out of the licensing and 6 regulation line item.
- Sec. 306. Included in section 101 is an amount not to exceed 8 \$380,000.00 for promotion of attendance at pari-mutuel horse racing.

 9 The state funds shall be matched before expenditure such that each 10 \$2.00 of state funds is matched by \$1.00 of private industry funds. A 11 race meeting licensee or an association of thoroughbred and harness 12 racetracks or any horsemen's group may submit a plan and proposal to 13 the racing commissioner for use of funds authorized to be expended for 14 promotion of attendance at pari-mutual horse racing. A plan shall be 15 submitted by the commissioner to the chairpersons of the senate and 16 house subcommittees on agriculture at least 30 days before the funds 17 may be expended. Each licensee or association of thoroughbred and 18 harness racetracks or horsemen's group shall be eligible for 19 promotional funds.

20 GRANTS

- Sec. 401. Of the \$98,800.00 appropriated in section 101 for the 22 Great Lakes draft horse show, \$35,500.00 shall be made available for 23 the Michigan dynamometers association, \$58,500.00 shall be made 24 available for the Michigan draft horse breeders association, and 25 \$4,800.00 shall be used for advertisement and promotion of an annual 26 Great Lakes international draft horse show.
- Sec. 402. The independent audits of local units of government, as 28 required by the uniform budgeting and accounting act, Act No. 2 of the

- 1 Public Acts of 1968, being sections 141.421 to 141.440a of the 2 Michigan Compiled Laws, shall include an examination to determine the 3 accuracy of reports submitted in compliance with section 404 of this
- 3 accuracy of reports submitted in compliance with section 404 of this 4 act.
- 5 Sec. 403. Of the \$137,500.00 appropriated in section 101 for
- 6 water wonderland breeder awards, not more than 2% of the amount
- 7 appropriated may be used for administrative expenses required to
- 8 manage the program, the remainder shall be expended for premiums,
- 9 judges, ribbons and trophies, promotion, and to send state champions
- 10 to national shows. Large breeds receiving over \$8,000.00 may use up
- 11 to 20% for a show held separate from county or state fairs.
- 12 Sec. 404. A county fair, district fair, 4-H fair, or state fair
- 13 receiving funds under this act to be used for prizes or awards, in
- 14 whole or in part, as a condition precedent to the receiving of the
- 15 funds for those purposes, shall publish the rules relative to the
- 16 prizes, awards, and deadlines for entries eligible for the funds in
- 17 their official premium books or lists relative to the prizes or
- 18 awards. An aggrieved exhibitor may make a written complaint to the
- 19 fair within 10 days after the fair ends. If the fair has not
- 20 satisfactorily settled the grievance within 45 days after it is
- 21 submitted to the fair, the aggrieved person may file the complaint
- 22 with the department and the department shall investigate the complaint
- 23 and make a finding of fact regarding the complaint and take
- 24 appropriate action regarding the complaint.
- 25 Sec. 405. Of the horse race revenues collected for the
- 26 standardbred sire stakes program, grants to cities with racetracks,
- 27 and the thoroughbred sire stakes program, \$2,045,400.00 shall be
- 28 appropriated to the general fund of the state in the following

- 1 respective amounts: standardbred sire stakes program \$127,900.00; 2 grants to cities with racetracks - \$1,839,100.00; thoroughbred sire
- 3 stakes program \$78,400.00.
- 4 Sec. 406. (1) Except as provided in subsection (2), the
- 5 appropriation of \$284,500.00 in section 101 for purses and supplements
- 6 licensed tracks is intended to provide state purse supplements for 4
- 7 races at state licensed pari-mutuel horse racing tracks. The purse
- 8 supplements are to be used for races comprised only of Michigan bred
- 9 horses segregated into a 4-year-old colt trot division, a 4-year-old
- 10 filly trot division, a 4-year-old colt pace division, and a 4-year-old
- 11 filly pace division.
- 12 (2) Of the \$284,500.00 appropriated in section 101 for purses and
- 13 supplements licensed tracks, \$71,200.00 shall be allocated as follows:
- 14 Arabian and Appaloosa horse racing \$ 17,800
- 16 Sec. 407. Of the amount appropriated in section 101 for purses
- 17 and supplements-fairs, a sufficient amount is appropriated to provide
- 18 for overnight purse supplements at the maximum supplement of \$1,000.00
- 19 per overnight race.
- 20 Sec. 408. Of the amount appropriated in section 101 for premiums,
- 21 \$12,000.00 shall be expended as a grant for the Michigan horse show
- 22 association-fall youth show at the Michigan exposition and
- 23 fairgrounds.
- 24 Sec. 409. Included in the appropriation made in section 101 for
- 25 the thoroughbred program is \$29,000.00 for the Michigan united
- 26 thoroughbred breeders and owners association to conduct a thoroughbred
- 27 yearling show. The Michigan united thoroughbred breeders and owners
- 28 association shall submit to the department an itemized list of

- 1 expenses showing that the expenses of the yearling show were paid.
- 2 Sec. 410. The department may carryforward unexpended appropriated
- 3 funds from the thoroughbred and standardbred sire stakes programs
- 4 pursuant to section 13(9) and (10) of the racing law of 1980, Act No.
- 5 327 of the Public Acts of 1980, being section 431.73 of the Michigan
- 6 Compiled Laws, for the purposes of reimbursement of sire stakes purses
- 7 for Michigan bred 2- and 3-year-old horse races held in the following
- 8 fiscal year.
- 9 Sec. 411. In any given year when insufficient amounts of 10 Michigan surplus products are offered to the food bank council and 11 accepted for distribution, unused funds may be applied by the food 12 bank council for the direct purchase of foods from Michigan growers, 13 manufacturers and/or wholesalers.

- 8 Grants to cities with racetracks 1,745,600
- 10 (2) When it appears to the principal executive officer of each
- 11 department that state spending to local units of government will be
- 12 less than the amount that was projected to be expended for any
- 13 quarter, the principal executive officer shall immediately give notice
- 14 of the approximate shortfall to the department of management and
- 15 budget, the senate and house appropriations committees, and the senate
- 16 and house fiscal agencies.
- 17 Sec. 1202. The appropriations made and the expenditures
- 18 authorized under this act and the departments, agencies, commissions,
- 19 boards, offices, and programs for which an appropriation is made under
- 20 this act are subject to the management and budget act, Act No. 431 of
- 21 the Public Acts of 1984, being sections 18.1101 to 18.1594 of the
- 22 Michigan Compiled Laws.
- 23 Sec. 1203. As used in this act:
- 24 (a) "Department" means the department of agriculture.
- 25 (b) "Director" means the director of the department.
- 26 (c) "DAG-AMS" means the United States department of agriculture-27 agriculture marketing service.
- 28 (d) "DAG-APHIS" means the United States department of

- 1 agriculture-animal plant health inspection service.
- 2 (e) "DAG-FS" means the United States department of agriculture-3 forest service.
- 4 (f) "DAG-SRS" means the United States department of agriculture-5 statistical reporting service.
- 6 (g) "EPA-OE" means the United States environmental protection 7 agency-office of enforcement.
- 8 (h) "EPA-OWWM" means the United States environmental protection 9 agency-office of water and waste management.
- 10 (i) "FTE" means full-time equated.
- 11 (j) "HHS-FDA" means the United States department of health and 12 human services-food and drug administration.
- 13 (k) "IDG" means interdepartmental grant.
- Sec. 1204. The department may receive and expend funds in 15 addition to those authorized in section 101 for conducting training 16 and orientation workshops and seminars that are consistent with the 17 programmatic mission of the individual unit sponsoring or coordinating 18 the program.
- Sec. 1205. Of the funds appropriated in section 101 which are in 20 units other than the grants unit, the department may provide grants to 21 local government agencies, institutions of higher education, or 22 nonprofit organizations. The grants shall be used to support research 23 or other related activities for the purpose of enhancing the 24 agricultural industries in this state.
- Sec. 1206. The funds appropriated in section 101 from the central 26 funds for acquiring additional federal funds shall not be expended 27 until the grant money is authorized by the grantor. Expenditure of 28 those funds shall be controlled through the allotment process. Funds

1 accepted under this section shall not be authorized if the receipt of

2 the funds mandates a commitment for state funding at a future date.

- 3 Sec. 1207. (1) Beginning October 1, 1994, there shall be a hiring
- 4 freeze imposed on the state classified civil service. State
- 5 departments and agencies shall be prohibited from hiring any new full-
- 6 time state classified civil service employees or prohibited from
- 7 filling any vacant state classified civil service positions. This
- 8 hiring freeze does not apply to internal transfers of classified
- 9 employees from one position to another within a department or to
- 10 positions that are funded with 80% or more federal or restricted
- 11 funds.
- 12 (2) The director of the department of management and budget shall 13 grant exceptions to this hiring freeze when the director believes that 14 such a hiring freeze will result in rendering a state department or 15 agency unable to deliver basic services. The director of the 16 department of management and budget shall report by the fifteenth of 17 each month to the chairperson of the senate and house appropriations 18 committees the number of exclusions to the hiring freeze approved 19 during the previous month and the reasons to justify the exclusion. Increases in employee wage compensation which accrue 20 Sec. 1208. 21 as a result of savings in group insurance costs in accordance with 22 terms of valid collective bargaining agreements shall be paid from 23 appropriations lines in Section 102 in which authorization for salary 24 and wage payments are included. If a transfer of appropriations is 25 necessary to adjust for these increased wage levels, the director of 26 the department of management and budget may authorize administrative 27 transfers for this purpose consistent with Section 393(1) of Act 431 28 of the Public Acts of 1984, as amended, being section 18.1393(1) of

- 1 the Michigan Compiled Laws.
- 2 Sec. 1209. All savings accruing from reduced contribution rates
- 3 for the state employees retirement system shall be unallotted from
- 4 appropriation line items as necessary. Such reductions in
- 5 contribution rates are contingent upon enactment of amendments to the
- 6 state employees retirement act of 1943, Act No. 240 of the Public Acts
- 7 of 1943, being sections 38.1 to 38.48 of the Michigan Compiled Laws,
- 8 including a defined contribution retirement plan for new state
- 9 employees within the membership of such plan; changes in funding for
- 10 the provision of dental and vision benefits; five year reconciliation
- 11 smoothing; use of a 50 year amortization schedule for unfunded
- 12 actuarial accrued liabilities; and other amendments to the act. The
- 13 director of the department of management and budget shall issue
- 14 instructions to all state agencies regarding contribution changes as
- 15 they occur.

16 DEPARTMENT OPERATIONS

- 17 Sec. 1301. The appropriations in section 101 may be used for per
- 18 diem payments to members of boards, committees, and commissions for a
- 19 full day's board, committee, or commission work at which a quorum is
- 20 present; for attending a hearing as authorized by the respective
- 21 board, committee, or commission; or for performing official business
- 22 as authorized by the respective board, committee, or commission. The
- 23 per diem payments shall be at a rate as follows:
- 24 (a) Commission of agriculture \$75.00 per day
- 25 (b) Upper Peninsula state fair board . . . \$50.00 per day
- 26 (c) Agricultural marketing and bargaining
- 27 board \$35.00 per day
- 28 Sec. 1302. (a) The department may receive and expend revenue and

- 1 use those revenues to cover necessary expenses related to
- 2 publications, audit and licensing functions, livestock sales,
- 3 certification of nursery stock, bean inspection services, and
- 4 laboratory analyses as specified in the following subsections:
- 5 (b) Management services publications
- 6 (c) Management services audit and licensing functions
- 7 (d) Upper peninsula state fair livestock sales.
- 8 (e) Pesticide and plant pest management propagation and
- 9 certification of virus free foundation stock.
- 10 (f) Marketing and market development protection bean inspection 11 and grading services.
- 12 (g) Laboratory support testing for testing horses in draft horse 13 pulling contests at county fairs when local jurisdictions request 14 state assistance.
- 15 (h) Laboratory support analyses to determine foreign substances in 16 horses engaged in racing or pulling contests at tracks.
- 17 (i) Laboratory support analysis of food, livestock, and
 18 agricultural products for disease, toxic materials, foreign products
 19 for disease, toxic materials, foreign substances, and quality
 20 standards.
- 21 (j) Laboratory support analysis of liming samples.
- 22 (k) Laboratory support analysis of feed and fertilzer samples.
- 23 (1) Laboratory support test samples for other agencies and 24 organizations.
- Sec. 1303. Of the funds appropriated in section 101 to the 26 pesticide and plant pest management program, up to \$100,000.00 may be 27 made available to the Michigan cooperative extension service for the 28 purpose of training of applicators. Reimbursement shall be based on

- 1 actual expenditures and revenue availability.
- Sec. 1304. (1) From the amount appropriated in section 101 for the pesticide and plant pest management program, \$100,000.00 shall be allocated to Michigan State University for a gypsy moth education program.
- 6 (2) Any unexpended balance which is allocated pursuant to this
 7 section shall be carried forward as a work project. The purpose of
 8 the project is to provide public information regarding Gypsy Moth
 9 infestation. The project will be managed by Michigan State University
 10 through a \$100,000.00 contract to be completed September 30, 1995.
 11 Sec. 1305. The racing commissioner may pay rewards of not more
- 12 than \$5,800.00 to a person who provides information which results in 13 the arrest and conviction on a felony or misdemeanor charge for a 14 crime which involves the horse racing industry. A reward paid 15 pursuant to this section shall be paid out of the licensing and 16 regulation line item.
- 17 Sec. 1306. Included in section 101 is an amount not to exceed
 18 \$380,000.00 for promotion of attendance at pari-mutuel horse racing.
 19 The state funds shall be matched before expenditure such that each
 20 \$2.00 of state funds is matched by \$1.00 of private industry funds. A
 21 race meeting licensee or an association of thoroughbred and harness
 22 racetracks or any horsemen's group may submit a plan and proposal to
 23 the racing commissioner for use of funds authorized to be expended for
 24 promotion of attendance at pari-mutual horse racing. A plan shall be
 25 submitted by the commissioner to the chairpersons of the senate and
 26 house subcommittees on agriculture at least 30 days before the funds
 27 may be expended. Each licensee or association of thoroughbred and
 28 harness racetracks or horsemen's group shall be eligible for

1 promotional funds.

2 GRANTS

- Sec. 1401. Of the \$98,800.00 appropriated in section 101 for the 4 Great Lakes draft horse show, \$35,500.00 shall be made available for 5 the Michigan dynamometers association, \$58,500.00 shall be made 6 available for the Michigan draft horse breeders association, and 7 \$4,800.00 shall be used for advertisement and promotion of an annual 8 Great Lakes international draft horse show.
- 9 Sec. 1402. The independent audits of local units of government, 10 as required by the uniform budgeting and accounting act, Act No. 2 of 11 the Public Acts of 1968, being sections 141.421 to 141.440a of the 12 Michigan Compiled Laws, shall include an examination to determine the 13 accuracy of reports submitted in compliance with section 404 of this 14 act.
- Sec. 1403. Of the \$137,500 appropriated in section 101 for water 16 wonderland breeder awards, not more than 2% of the amount appropriated 17 may be used for administrative expenses required to manage the 18 program, the remainder shall be expended for premiums, judges, ribbons 19 and trophies, promotion, and to send state champions to national 20 shows. Large breeds receiving over \$8,000.00 may use up to 20% for a 21 show held separate from county or state fairs.
- Sec. 1404. A county fair, district fair, 4-H fair, or state fair 23 receiving funds under this act to be used for prizes or awards, in 24 whole or in part, as a condition precedent to the receiving of the 25 funds for those purposes, shall publish the rules relative to the 26 prizes, awards, and deadlines for entries eligible for the funds in 27 their official premium books or lists relative to the prizes or 28 awards. An aggrieved exhibitor may make a written complaint to the

- 1 fair within 10 days after the fair ends. If the fair has not
 2 satisfactorily settled the grievance within 45 days after it is
 3 submitted to the fair, the aggrieved person may file the complaint
 4 with the department and the department shall investigate the complaint
 5 and make a finding of fact regarding the complaint and take
 6 appropriate action regarding the complaint.
- Sec. 1405. Of the horse race revenues collected for the 8 standardbred sire stakes program, grants to cities with racetracks, 9 and the thoroughbred sire stakes program, \$2,045,400.00 shall be 10 appropriated to the general fund of the state in the following 11 respective amounts: standardbred sire stakes program \$127,900.00; 12 grants to cities with racetracks \$1,839,100.00; thoroughbred sire 13 stakes program \$78,400.00.
- 14 Sec. 1406. (1) Except as provided in subsection (2), the
 15 appropriation of \$284,500.00 in section 101 for purses and supplements
 16 licensed tracks is intended to provide state purse supplements for 4
 17 races at state licensed pari-mutuel horse racing tracks. The purse
 18 supplements are to be used for races comprised only of Michigan bred
 19 horses segregated into a 4-year-old colt trot division, a 4-year-old
 20 filly trot division, a 4-year-old colt pace division, and a 4-year-old
 21 filly pace division.
- 22 (2) Of the \$284,500.00 appropriated in section 101 for purses and 23 supplements licensed tracks, \$71,200.00 shall be allocated as follows:
- Arabian and Appaloosa horse racing \$ 17,800
- Sec. 1407. Of the amount appropriated in section 101 for purses
- 27 and supplements-fairs, a sufficient amount is appropriated to provide
- 28 for overnight purse supplements at the maximum supplement of \$1,000.00

- 1 per overnight race.
- 2 Sec. 1408. Of the amount appropriated in section 101 for 3 premiums, \$12,000.00 shall be expended as a grant for the Michigan 4 horse show association-fall youth show at the Michigan exposition and 5 fairgrounds.
- 6 Sec. 1409. Included in the appropriation made in section 101 for 7 the thoroughbred program is \$29,000.00 for the Michigan united 8 thoroughbred breeders and owners association to conduct a thoroughbred 9 yearling show. The Michigan united thoroughbred breeders and owners 10 association shall submit to the department an itemized list of 11 expenses showing that the expenses of the yearling show were paid.
- Sec. 1410. The department may carryforward unexpended 13 appropriated funds from the thoroughbred and standardbred sire stakes 14 programs pursuant to section 13(9) and (10) of the racing law of 1980, 15 Act No. 327 of the Public Acts of 1980, being section 431.73 of the 16 Michigan Compiled Laws, for the purposes of reimbursement of sire 17 stakes purses for Michigan bred 2- and 3-year-old horse races held in 18 the following fiscal year.
- 19 Sec. 1411. In any given year when insufficient amounts of 20 Michigan surplus products are offered to the food bank council and 21 accepted for distribution, unused funds may be applied by the food 22 bank council for the direct purchase of foods from Michigan growers, 23 manufacturers and/or wholesalers.
