

HOUSE BILL No. 4553

EXECUTIVE BUDGET BILL

March 25, 1993, Introduced by Reps. Berman, Bankes, Bender, Dolan, Gilmer, Allen, Middleton, Stille, Sikkema, Johnson, Oxender, DeMars, Scott, Bobier, Jacobetti, Gire, Harrison, Hollister and Kilpatrick and referred to the Committee on Appropriations.

A bill to make appropriations for the department of public health and certain state purposes related to the expenditure of those appropriations for fiscal years ending September 30, 1994 and September 30, 1995; to provide for reports; to prescribe certain powers and duties of the department of public health; and to provide for the disposition of fees and other income received by the department of public health.

- 12 Sec. 1502. The department may do 1 or more of the following:
- (a) Provide special formula for eligible clients with specified 14 metabolic and allergic disorders.
- 15 (b) Provide medical care and treatment to eligible patients with 16 cystic fibrosis who are 21 years of age or older.
- 17 (c) Provide genetic diagnostic and counseling services for 18 eligible families.
- 19 (d) Provide medical care and treatment to eligible patients with
- 20 hereditary coagulation defects, commonly known as hemophilia, who are
- 21 21 years of age or older.

22 SUBSTANCE ABUSE PROGRAMS

- 23 Sec. 1601. If substance abuse coordinating agencies receiving
- 24 funding from the amount appropriated in section 102 for substance
- 25 abuse services cease to exist or merge with other coordinating
- 26 agencies, or otherwise restructure, the administrative savings
- 27 resulting from such a change will be re-distributed to the
- 28 restructured substance abuse coordinating agencies for substance abuse

1 treatment services.

2 LOCAL SERVICES

- 3 Sec. 1701. The amount appropriated in section 102 for state/local
- 4 cost sharing may be used for special grants to local health
- 5 departments to satisfy minimum funding levels prescribed by section
- 6 2477 of the public health code, Act No. 368 of the Public Acts of
- 7 1978, being section 333.2477 of the Michigan Compiled Laws, and any
- 8 other authorized supplement. The special grants shall not exceed a
- 9 total of \$250,000.00.
- 10 Sec. 1702. (1) The department shall not reimburse a claim by an
- 11 operator of an agricultural labor camp pursuant to sections 12431 and
- 12 12432 of the public health code, Act No. 368 of the Public Acts of
- 13 1978, being sections 333.12431 and 333.12432 of the Michigan Compiled
- 14 Laws, from the amount appropriated in section 102 for migrant labor
- 15 housing grants, until that portion of the labor camp utilized for
- 16 migrant housing is in compliance with all state statutes and rules
- 17 pertaining to the licensure of migrant labor camps as determined by
- 18 on-site inspections both before and after occupancy.
- 19 (2) The amount appropriated in section 102 for migrant labor
- 20 housing grants expended by the department for remodeling projects
- 21 shall only be expended on remodeling projects started after January 1,
- 22 1987.
- 23 (3) An agricultural labor camp operator receiving a grant from the
- 24 department for remodeling from the amount appropriated in section 102
- 25 for migrant labor housing grants shall not do either of the following:
- 26 (a) Convert a migratory housing unit that has been remodeled with
- 27 grant funding to a use other than for migratory housing within 3 years
- 28 after receipt of the grant.

- 1 (b) Charge rent to an occupant of a migratory housing unit that 2 has been remodeled with grant funding within 3 years after receipt of 3 the grant.
- 4 (4) If an agricultural labor camp operator violates subsection 5 (3), the department shall institute proceedings to recover the grant 6 funds from the operator.
- The department may also expend the amount appropriated in 8 section 102 for migrant labor housing grants for construction of new 9 migrant labor housing. Project grants shall not exceed \$2,000.00 per 10 unit. An applicant is not eligible for more than a \$10,000.00 grant 11 in any fiscal year. Units shall be equivalent in construction to 12 units approved by the farmers home administration for low interest 13 construction loans and shall be not less than 484 square feet in size 14 with a minimum of 1 bedroom, a kitchen, flush toilet, lavatory, and 15 bathing facilities.
- Sec. 1703. (1) Each family planning program receiving federal 17 title X family planning funds shall be in compliance with all 18 performance and quality assurance indicators that the United States 19 bureau of community health services specifies as its common reporting 20 requirements. An agency not in compliance with the indicators shall 21 not receive supplemental or reallocated funds.
