HOUSE BILL No. 5261

EXECUTIVE BUDGET BILL

December 23, 1993, Introduced by Reps. Allen, McBryde, Bobier, Oxender and Gilmer and referred to the Committee on Appropriations.

A bill to make appropriations for the department of mental health and certain state purposes related to mental hygiene for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1995; to provide for the expenditure of such appropriations; to create funds; to provide for reports; to prescribe the powers and duties of certain state agencies and departments; and to provide for disposition of fees and other income received by the various state agencies.

The amounts appropriated for utilities and that portion 3 of contractual services, supplies, and materials used to pay for 4 utility service to state facilities in section 101 may be expended in a 5 manner consistent with the provisions of section 253 of the management 6 and budget act, Act 431 of the Public Acts of 1984, being section 7 18.1253 of the Michigan Compiled Laws.
- g Sec. 204. As used in this act:
- (a) "ADAMHA" means the United States department of health and 10 human services, alcohol, drug abuse, and mental health administration.
- (b) "ADP" means automated data processing.
- 12 (c) "CMH" means community mental health.
- (d) "CMH-Act 423 fund" means the fund provided for under Act No. 14 423 of the Public Acts of 1980, being section 330.1310 of the Michigan 15 Compiled Laws.

- 15 Sec. 205. Each April 15, the department shall provide a report 16 to the department of management and budget, chairpersons of the senate
- 17 and house appropriation's committees, the senate fiscal agency, the
- 18 house fiscal agency, and the legislative auditor general. The report
- 19 shall contain:
- 20 (a) A description of the clients, services, funding, and
- 21 expenditures of each community mental health board including
- 22 information about per capita expenditure by client group.
- 23 (b) Information about the reimbursement eligibility of clients of
- 24 the department and community mental health boards.
- 25 Sec. 206. (1) Beginning October 1, 1994, there shall be a hiring
- 26 freeze imposed on the state classified civil service. State
- 27 departments and agencies shall be prohibited from hiring any new full-
- 28 time state classified civil service employees and prohibited from
- 29 filling any vacant state classified civil service positions. This

1 hiring freeze does not apply to internal transfers from one position to 2 another within a department or to positions that are funded 80% or more 3 from federal or restricted funds.

- (2) The director of the department of management and budget shall 5 grant exceptions to this hiring freeze when the director believes that 6 such a hiring freeze will result in rendering a state department or 7 agency unable to deliver basic services. The director of the 8 department of management and budget shall report by the fifteenth of 9 each month to the chairpersons of the senate and house appropriations 10 committees the number of exclusions to the hiring freeze approved 11 during the previous month and the reasons to justify the exclusion. Sec. 207. In addition to the funds appropriated in section 101. 12 13 there is hereby appropriated such federal, local, or private funds as 14 the department may be eligible to receive up to a total of 15 \$20,000,000.00. These funds shall not be available for expenditure 16 unless transferred to a line item in this act in compliance with the 17 applicable provisions of section 393 of the management and budget act, 18 Act 431 of the Public Acts of 1984, being section 18.1393 of the 19 Michigan Compiled Laws.
- Sec. 208. From the funds appropriated in Section 101, the 21 department may make grants in support of the Michigan neighborhood 22 partnership to non-profit organizations for purposes consistent with 23 the purposes of the line-item appropriation from which the grant is 24 made. The total of such grants made by the department may not exceed 25 \$50,000.00.

26 EXECUTIVE PROGRAM

Sec. 301. Funds appropriated in section 101 from the central fund 28 for acquiring additional federal and private funds shall not be 29 expended until the grant money is actually authorized by the grantor.

- 1 Funds accepted under this section shall not be authorized if the 2 receipt of the funds mandates a commitment for state funding at a 3 future date.
- Sec. 302. The department shall continue a revenue recapture 5 project to generate additional revenues from third parties related to 6 cases which have been closed or are inactive. Revenues collected 7 through project efforts are appropriated to the department for 8 departmental costs and contractual fees associated with these 9 retroactive collections and to improve ongoing departmental 10 reimbursement management functions so that the need for retroactive 11 collections will be reduced or eliminated.
- Sec. 303. The department's ability to satisfy appropriation

 13 deducts in section 101 shall not be limited to collections and accruals

 14 pertaining to services provided in fiscal year 1994-95, but shall also

 15 include reimbursements, refunds, adjustments, and settlements from

 16 prior years.
- Sec. 304. Funds appropriated in section 101 for the mental health 18 advisory council may be used for member per diems of \$50.00 and other 19 council expenditures. Funds may also be used for the expenses of the 20 state mental health advisory council on deafness and other expenses for 21 councils established by the mental health code.
- Sec. 305. Unexpended and unencumbered amounts and accompanying 23 expenditure authorizations remaining on September 30, 1995 from the 24 amounts appropriated in section 101 for gifts and bequests for patient 25 living and treatment environments shall be carried forward for 1 fiscal 26 year. The purpose of gifts and bequests for patient living and 27 treatment environments is to use additional private funds to provide 28 specific enhancements for individuals residing at state operated 29 facilities. The gifts and bequests will be used consistent with the

- 1 stipulation of the donor with the total estimated expenditure of 2 \$2,000,^00.00. The expected completion date for the use of gifts and 3 bequests donations is within 1 year unless otherwise stipulated by the 4 donor.
- 5 Sec. 306. Revenues appropriated in section 101 as audit 6 exception/cost settlement revenues are revenues recovered by all 7 methods from department contract audit settlements and contract cost 8 settlements of prior fiscal years.
- g Sec. 307. The department shall provide quarterly reports
 10 concerning the department's revenue and expenditure status to the
 11 senate and house appropriation's subcommittees on mental health, the
 12 senate fiscal agency, the house fiscal agency, and the department of
 13 management and budget.
- sec. 308. The specific amounts indicated in section 101 of this 15 act as restricted revenue for financing appropriations from first and 16 third parties, HCFA Title XIX, audit exception/cost settlements, CMH 17 purchase of state service contracts and county revenues are estimates 18 of the proportion of the total amounts expected to be collected, and 19 the department may satisfy any individual restricted revenue deduct 20 amount from the total revenues of all of those revenue sources. A 21 report will be provided to the legislative fiscal agencies and 22 department of management and budget on actual collections by revenue 23 source for each appropriation unit for the previous fiscal year by 24 April 15.
- Sec. 309. The funds appropriated in section 101 for prisoner 26 mental health services are for the assumption of responsibilities for 27 prisoner mental health in accordance with the interdepartmental plan 28 developed in cooperation with the department of corrections. The 29 department is authorized to receive and expend funds from the

- 1 department of corrections in addition to the appropriations in section
- 2 101 to fulfill the obligations outlined in the interdepartmental 3 agreement.
- 4 Sec. 310. (1) With the approval of the department of management
- 5 and budget and senate and house appropriations subcommittees on mental
- 6 health, the director of the department may establish a discretionary
- 7 fund not to exceed 5% of the sum of the amounts of funds appropriated
- 8 in section 101 for the operation and support of executive programs,
- 9 community mental health, institutional operations, residential
- 10 services, and community mental health medicaid revenues.
- 11 (2) The director of the department may allocate expenditure
- 12 authorization amounts from the discretionary fund to departmental
- 13 institutions, community mental health boards, or for family support
- 14 subsidy payments. These funds may be used to achieve or maintain
- 15 certification for federal title XIX benefits, to equalize and maximize
- 16 staffing needs assessment project ratios, to expedite the transition of
- 17 responsibility for services to community mental health boards, and to
- 18 minimize the utilization of state inpatient services.
- 19 (3) The director of the department may also allocate revenue
- 20 amounts from the discretionary fund for HHS-HCFA, Title XIX, DAG-FNS,
- 21 national school lunch program, first/third party revenues,
- 22 miscellaneous revenues, audit exception/cost settlement revenues, and
- 23 local county match revenues allocated for state hospitals, centers, and
- 24 residential care into another revenue account listed in this section,
- 25 and into community mental health medicaid revenue accounts.

26 COMMUNITY MENTAL HEALTH

- 27 Sec. 401. (1) Funds allocated in section 101 for community mental
- 28 health operations include the continuation of transportation services,
- 29 funded 100% with state funds and include title XX transition grants.

- 1 (2) In addition to the funds appropriated in section 101 for 2 community mental health operations there is appropriated all funds 3 received by CMH boards in additional federal funds. It is intended 4 that the community mental health boards maximize federal funding 5 sources. CMH boards shall retain, contingent upon actual earnings, the 6 amount of increased federal funds above the amounts authorized in the 7 billable services fiscal year ending September 30, 1994 contracts. 8 State funding provided in each CMH board's contract shall not be 9 increased as a result of implementation of this section.
- 10 (3) When federal or state revisions occur in Medicaid programs,
 11 services, or eligibility which reduce current community mental health
 12 reimbursement, the department shall, in conjunction with the department
 13 of management and budget, determine the fiscal and program implications
 14 and make recommendations to the senate and house appropriation's
 15 committees.
- Sec. 402 (1) Funds appropriated in section 101 are intended to 17 support a system of comprehensive community mental health services 18 under the full authority and responsibility of local county community 19 mental health boards. The department shall ensure that each board 20 provides the following:
- 21 (a) A system of single entry and single exit.
- 22 (b) A comprehensive range of services which include prevention 23 and which may include state provided acute and long term care.
- 24 (c) The coordination of service provision including contractual 25 relationships with state psychiatric hospitals and regional centers.
- 26 (d) Individualized plans of service sufficient to meet the needs
 27 of persons including those discharged from psychiatric hospitals or
 28 regional centers and which ensure that the full range of recipient
 29 needs is provided either through the board's program or through

1 assistance in locating and obtaining a service.

- 2 (e) A system of case management to monitor and assure the 3 provision of services consistent with the individualized plan of 4 service.
- 5 (2) The department shall, with the involvement of representatives 6 of various components of the community mental health system, advocacy, 7 and consumer groups, annually report to the legislature on the legal, 8 fiscal, and other issues affecting the long term viability and 9 stability of the community mental health system.
- Sec. 403. (1) The funds appropriated in section 101 for purchase 11 of state service contracts are for the purchase of state hospital and 12 center services, state administered community residential services, or 13 for approved community-based programs which reduce utilization of state 14 provided services below this appropriated level. These funds shall be 15 allocated to community mental health boards based on estimates approved 16 by the department as part of the negotiated contract.
- 17 (2) Funds which are allocated to community mental health boards, 18 when used to purchase state services, shall be provided to state 19 hospitals, centers, and placement agencies based on the per diem and 20 billing arrangements approved by the department in the negotiated 21 contract.
- Sec. 404. The funds appropriated in this act for community mental 23 health programs shall not be used to replace funds no longer available 24 because the local government or community mental health board reduced 25 its base of support for state and local mental health services, as 26 defined in chapter 2 of the mental health code, Act No. 258 of the 27 Public Acts of 1974, being sections 330.1200 to 330.1246 of the 28 Michigan Compiled Laws, below that of the previous year.
- 29 Sec. 405. (1) From funds appropriated in section 101, final 05592'93

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1 authorizations to community mental health boards shall be made upon the 2 execution of a contract between the department and each community 3 mental health board. The contract shall contain an approved plan and 4 budget as well as the policies and procedures governing the obligations 5 and responsibilities of both parties to the contract.

- 6 (2) The department may advance to each community mental health 7 board an amount not to exceed 1/4 of their estimated total collections 8 from medicaid and may establish a separate accounts receivable for the 9 total of these amounts. Such advances shall be repaid in the same 10 fiscal year and before any advance is provided for a subsequent year.
- Sec. 406. The funds appropriated in section 101 for community 12 mental health programs shall be allocated to community mental health 13 boards under a formal contract with the department. The spending 14 plans, authorizations, and allocations for each community mental health 15 board shall be determined by the department central office staff, in 16 cooperation with community mental health boards.
- 17 Sec. 407. (1) Funds appropriated in section 101 for community
 18 mental health services may be reserved and carried forward into the
 19 subsequent fiscal year by a county community mental health board as
 20 part of the board's financial management plan under requests that are
 21 consistent with the following provisions of section 451 of P.A. 431 of
 22 1984, being section 18.1451(3) of the Michigan Compiled Laws:
- 23 (a) The purpose of the project to be carried forward.
- 24 (b) The methods that will be used to accomplish the project.
- 25 (c) The total estimated cost of the project.
- 26 (d) The tentative completion date of the project.
- 27 (2) Funding carried forward shall be limited to the differences 28 between the projected cost of community mental health services in the 29 subsequent fiscal year and the level of funding available, not to

- 1 exceed 5% of the total community based authorization. A statement of
- 2 intent to carryforward funds shall be submitted and approved by the
- 3 department by the end of the third quarter. This statement shall
- 4 identify the proposed uses of funds to be carried forward.
- 5 (3) Conditions under which funding may be reserved include all of 6 the following:
- 7 (a) Provisions of the contract between the department and county 8 community mental health boards regarding protection of categorical
- 9 funding shall not be altered.
- 10 (b) Funds may be carried forward only when the performance
- 11 commitments in the contract for the year from which funding will be
- 12 reserved are met.
- 13 (c) An expenditure made from a reserve account does not change a
- 14 board's base allocation or create a full year cost obligation for the
- 15 department.
- (d) Funding carried forward and not used shall lapse to the state
- 17 general fund.
- 18 Sec. 408. The amount appropriated in section 101 for community
- 19 mental health services is intended for funding of community mental
- 20 health service boards in accordance with contracts between the
- 21 department and the boards for the current fiscal year. The department
- 22 shall establish such total payable and receivable amounts as may be
- 23 appropriate to represent the expected final state obligation for all
- 24 such contracts. After final review of the expenditure reports required
- 25 by the contracts, any amounts advanced to the board which are returned
- 26 to the department and any amounts paid to the boards in accordance with
- 27 the provisions of the contracts shall be considered to be adjustments
- 28 to the program expenditures for prior fiscal years. These prior year
- 29 transactions shall be recorded in a separate account established for

- 1 that purpose. Community mental health programs prior year revenue 2 recognized in the current fiscal year may be restricted to finance 3 related prior year expenditures not previously recorded.
- Sec. 409. The funds appropriated in section 101 for expanding CMH services through the reduced utilization of state facilities represent savings resulting from census and state hospital/center reductions that rare transferred to community mental health. The appropriated amount of \$523,200,000.00 is based upon anticipated full year cost savings at 9 state hospitals and centers.
- Sec. 410. Each CMH board shall develop procedures to improve the 11 administration of service provider contracts.
- Sec. 411. Each CMH board shall conduct record reviews and 13 retrospective reviews to meet the requirements of the quality assurance 14 plan.
- 15 Sec. 412. The department, in conjunction with each CMH board, 16 shall establish a system to monitor and evaluate mental health services 17 provided by each CMH board.

18 COMMUNITY RESIDENTIAL SERVICES

- 19 Sec. 501. The funds appropriated in section 101 for community
 20 residential services programs may be used for basic care in cases where
 21 individuals are not eligible to receive social security benefits and
 22 are not otherwise capable of supporting themselves out of their own
 23 resources. Funds may be used for aftercare services or to prevent
 24 admissions to state hospitals and centers through residential and
 25 support services. Expenditures and allocations may be authorized for
 26 community mental health boards and state hospitals, centers, and
 27 placement agencies.
- Sec. 502. Funds appropriated in section 101 for OBRA
- 29 implementation shall be used to fund pre-admission screening and annual

- 1 resident reviews of nursing home residents with mental illness or
- 2 developmental disabilities, special nursing home costs, alternative
- 3 community residential and support services for persons inappropriately
- 4 placed in nursing homes and associated administrative costs.
- 5 Sec. 503. Funds appropriated in section 101 for residential
- 6 services may be used to make payments to the state housing development
- 7 authority for in-home support services assumed by the state housing
- 8 development authority through agreement with the department.
- 9 Sec. 504. The department shall not enter into new contracts with
- 10 private attorneys for legal services for the purposes of gaining and
- 11 maintaining occupancy to a specialized residential facility. The
- 12 department may enter into a contract with the protection and advocacy
- 13 service, authorized under section 931 of the mental health code, Act.
- 14 No. 258 of the Public Acts of 1974, being section 330.1931 of the
- 15 Michigan Compiled Laws, or a similar organization to provide legal
- 16 services for purposes of gaining and maintaining occupancy in a
- 17 specialized residential facility which is under lease of contract with
- 18 the department of a community mental health board to provide services
- 19 to developmentally disabled persons or mental health recipients. St
- 20 funds shall not be used for legal services to represent private
- 21 investors purchasing homes for these persons.
- 22 Sec. 505. It is the intent of the legislature that the department
- 23 of mental health in conjunction with the office of the auditor general
- 24 develop uniform audit requirements for all community residential
- 25 provider contracts. These audit requirements shall be implemented in
- 26 fiscal year 1994-95 by the department and by community mental health
- 27 boards for residential services contracts.
- Sec. 506. The department of social services, the department of
- 29 public health, and the department of mental health shall engage in

- 1 collaborative planning to identify both duplication of effort and gaps 2 in home reviews and propose improvements to enhance efficiency and the 3 protection of vulnerable persons. A report shall be provided to the 4 legislature by December 31, 1994.
- Sec. 507. It is the intent of the legislature the department in 6 cooperation with the department of social services conduct an analysis 7 of current representative payee and guardianship arrangements for 8 vulnerable persons in dependent living arrangements. Problems with 9 current arrangements and identification of the need for the expansion 10 of nonprofit guardian-type programs or other improvements to protect 11 individuals should be specified. A report shall be provided to the 12 legislature by December 31, 1994.

13 INSTITUTIONAL SERVICES, HOSPITALS AND CENTERS

- 14 Sec. 601. The operation and maintenance of the power plant at the 15 Kalamazoo state hospital shall be financed from charges to the 16 appropriations to the Kalamazoo state hospital and Western Michigan 17 University, which charges shall be based upon the cost of the power 18 plant and upon the usage of heat and electrical power by the hospital 19 and the university.
- Sec. 602. In addition to the amounts appropriated in section 101, 21 revenues from the sale of sheltered workshop services and products are 22 appropriated to be expended for supplies, equipment, and other costs 23 associated with the maintenance of the sheltered workshop program, 24 excluding costs of compensating state classified employees. The 25 unspent balance on the last day of the fiscal year ending September 30, 26 1995, shall be carried forward into the subsequent fiscal year. The 27 funds carried forward shall be used for supplies, equipment, and other 28 costs associated with maintaining sheltered workshop programs excluding 29 the costs of compensating state classified employees. The total

- 1 estimated cost of the program is \$1,250,000.00 and specific project 2 expenditures to be completed by September 30, 1996.
- 3 Sec. 603. Funds appropriated in section 101 for gifts and
- 4 bequests include pay telephone revenues and are intended to be
- 5 allocated for patient living unit furnishings, recreational, and
- 6 vocational materials and supplies
- 7 Sec. 604. In addition to the funds appropriated in section 101
- 8 for state psychiatric hospitals, the department is authorized,
- 9 contingent upon the approval of the department of management and
- 10 budget, to (1) expend restricted funds earned above revenue
- 11 appropriated for CMH-purchase of state services contracts, first/third
- 12 party revenues, or title XIX medicaid revenues, excluding medicaid
- 13 disproportionate share payment revenue; (2) make interdepartmental
- 14 transfers to the department of social services equal to any medicaid
- 15 disproportionate share payments received by the hospitals.
- 16 Sec. 605. From the funds appropriated for workers' compensation,
- 17 the department may make payments in lieu of workers' compensation
- 18 payments for wage/salary and related fringe benefits for employees who
- 19 return to work under limited duty assignments. Employees returning to
- 20 work under limited duty assignments and who are funded under this
- 21 subsection will be in addition to the facility's existing staffing
- 22 authorization.
