

SENATE BILL No. 365

February 9, 1993, Introduced by Senators CHERRY, O'BRIEN and HART and referred to the Committee on State Affairs and Military/Veteran Affairs.

A bill to regulate the sale of heating cables in this state; to prescribe the powers and duties of certain persons and state departments; and to prescribe remedies and penalties.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF MICHIGAN ENACT:

- 1 Sec. 1. This act shall be known and may be cited as the
- 2 "heating cable safety act".
- 3 Sec. 2. As used in this act:
- 4 (a) "Department" means the department of labor.
- 5 (b) "Director" means the director of labor or his or her
- 6 designee.
- 7 (c) "Heating cable" means cable designed to be secured to
- 8 pipes and vessels to reduce their likelihood of freezing or to
- 9 facilitate the flow of viscous liquids. Heating cable intended
- 10 for industrial and commercial use is connected to the supply
- 11 system by a permanent wiring method. Heating cable intended for

- 1 residential and mobile home use has an attachment plug for
- 2 connection to a receptacle outlet. Heating cable is commonly
- 3 known as heat tape.
- 4 (d) "Person" means an individual, partnership, corporation,
- 5 association, or other legal entity.
- 6 Sec. 3. (1) A person shall not sell in this state a heating
- 7 cable that has not been approved by the state construction code
- 8 commission pursuant to section 21a of the state construction code
- 9 act of 1972, Act No. 230 of the Public Acts of 1972, being
- 10 section 125.1521a of the Michigan Compiled Laws.
- 11 (2) The department shall compile and revise as necessary a
- 12 list of heating cables that have been approved by the state con-
- 13 struction code commission and that may be sold in this state.
- 14 Sec. 4. (1) The director shall investigate complaints made
- 15 to him or her concerning violations of this act and, upon his or
- 16 her own initiative, shall conduct any investigation that he or
- 17 she considers advisable to determine possible violations of this
- 18 act.
- 19 (2) If the director finds or has probable cause to believe
- 20 that a heating cable is being sold in violation of this act, he
- 21 or she shall do both of the following:
- 22 (a) Order the person to cease the sale of that heating
- 23 cable.
- 24 (b) Affix to the heating cable a tag or other appropriate
- 25 marking, giving notice that the heating cable is or is suspected
- 26 of being sold in violation of this act and warning all persons

- 1 that the heating cable is not to be sold or otherwise distributed
 2 in this state.
- 3 (3) The director may apply to any court of competent juris-
- 4 diction for a temporary restraining order or a preliminary or
- 5 permanent injunction restraining any person from selling a heat-
- 6 ing cable in violation of this act.
- 7 (4) A person shall not obstruct or hinder the director in
- 8 the performance of his or her duties under this section.
- 9 Sec. 5. Upon return of a heating cable that is not on the
- 10 approved list of heating cables compiled by the department pursu-
- 11 ant to section 3, the manufacturer of the heating cable shall
- 12 refund to the retailer the amount paid by him or her for the
- 13 heating cable.
- 14 Sec. 6. The department shall promulgate, as necessary,
- 15 rules to implement this act pursuant to the administrative proce-
- 16 dures act of 1969, Act No. 306 of the Public Acts of 1969, being
- 17 sections 24.201 to 24.328 of the Michigan Compiled Laws.
- 18 Sec. 7. A person who violates this act or an order issued
- 19 or a rule promulgated under this act is liable for a civil fine
- 20 of not more than \$500.00. A fine due under this act shall be
- 21 assessed by the electrical administrative board and shall be paid
- 22 into the state construction code fund created by section 22 of
- 23 the state construction code act of 1972, Act No. 230 of the
- 24 Public Acts of 1972, being section 125.1522 of the Michigan
- 25 Compiled Laws.

- Sec. 8. This act shall not take effect unless Senate Bill

- 3 the 87th Legislature is enacted into law.
