

# **SENATE BILL No. 530**

#### EXECUTIVE BUDGET BILL

March 25, 1993, Introduced by Senators EHLERS and GAST and referred to the Committee on Appropriations.

A bill to make appropriations for the department of natural resources for fiscal years ending September 30, 1994 and September 30, 1995; to provide for the expenditure of those appropriations; to create funds and accounts; to require reports; to prescribe certain powers and duties of certain state departments and officers, institutions, and agencies; to authorize certain transfers by certain state agencies; and to provide for the disposition of fees and other income received by the various state agencies.

- 17 forest management, recreation, fisheries, parks, and wildlife
- 18 management divisions of the department, and representatives from the
- 19 house and senate fiscal agencies.
- 20 Sec. 1503. The department may charge land acquisition projects
- 21 appropriated for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1995, and for
- 22 prior fiscal years, a standard percentage fee to be determined by the
- 23 state budget director, and may use the revenue derived to support the
- 24 land acquisition service charges provided for in section 102.
- 25 Sec. 1504. The land sale fund is created. An amount equal to the
- 26 cost of personal services, printing, postage, advertising, contractual
- 27 services, and facility rental associated with tax reverted lands shall
- 28 be deducted from the sales and credited to the land sale fund.

- Sec. 1505. The commission may establish and collect fees for the processing of applications for the use of state forests that require extensive review. The fees shall cover the cost to the department of processing the applications. Any unexpended application fees for the use of state forests, along with any excess collections from prior fiscal years, shall be carried over into subsequent fiscal years and shall be available for appropriation.
- 8 Sec. 1506. The department shall cooperate with the United States 9 geological survey in maintaining a groundwater data base in Michigan.

#### 10 ENVIRONMENT

- Sec. 1601. (1) From the appropriation in section 102 for the Act 12 307 cleanup program, the department shall continue to make 13 authorizations for site evaluation, interim response activity, final 14 response activity, and contingencies for all environmental 15 contamination sites and for the administration of the program created 16 by the environmental response act, Act No. 307 of the Public Acts of 17 1982, being sections 299.601 to 299.618 of the Michigan Compiled Laws.
- 18 (2) The department shall report all of the following information 19 relative to allocations made from the lines "Act 307 cleanup" and 20 "state cleanup implementation" in section 101 to the senate and house 21 appropriations committees and the senate and house fiscal agencies:
- 22 (a) The name and location of the site for which an allocation is 23 made.
- (b) The nature of the problem encountered at the site.
- 25 (c) The estimated time necessary to prepare plans or complete any 26 necessary study if the allocation is for plans or a study.
- 27 (d) A brief description of how the problem will be resolved if the 28 allocation is made for a response activity.

- 1 (e) The estimated time to complete the response activity if the 2 allocation is for a response activity.
- 3 (f) The amount of the allocation.
- 4 (g) A summary of the sites and the total amount of funds expended 5 at the sites at the conclusion of the fiscal year.
- 6 (3) The report shall be made available in January of each year.
- 7 Sec. 1602. The unexpended portion of the appropriation in section
- 8 102 for the Act 307 cleanup program and superfund cleanup projects are
- 9 considered work project appropriations and any unencumbered or
- 10 unallotted funds are carried forward into the succeeding fiscal year.
- 11 The following is in compliance with section 451(3) of the management
- 12 and budget act, Act No. 431 of the Public Acts of 1984, being section
- 13 18.1451 of the Michigan Compiled Laws:
- 14 (a) The purpose of the projects to be carried forward is to 15 provide contaminated site cleanup.
- (b) The projects will be accomplished by contract.
- 17 (c) The total estimated cost of all projects is identified in each 18 line item appropriation.
- 19 (d) The tentative completion date is September 30, 1995.
- 20 Sec. 1603. (1) The department shall report all of the following
- 21 information relative to site specific cooperative agreements made from
- 22 the line "superfund cleanup" to the senate and house appropriations
- 23 committees and the senate and house fiscal agencies:
- 24 (a) The name and location of the site for which the site specific 25 cooperative agreement is made.
- (b) The nature of the problem encountered at the site.
- 27 (c) The estimated time to prepare plans or complete any necessary 28 study if the allocation is for plans or a study.

- 1 (d) A brief description of how the problem will be resolved if the 2 allocation is made for a remedy.
- 3 (e) The estimated time to complete the remedy of the problem if 4 the allocation is for a remedy.
- 5 (f) The amount of the anticipated financing for the site.
- 6 (g) A summary of the sites and the total amount of funds expended 7 at the sites at the conclusion of the fiscal year.
- 8 (2) The report shall be made available in January of each year.
- 9 Sec. 1604. The appropriation in section 102 for the Act 307
  10 cleanup program shall be used for the purpose of taking emergency
  11 response activities at sites listed under the environmental response
  12 act, Act No. 307 of the Public Acts of 1982, being sections 299.601 to
  13 299.618 of the Michigan Compiled Laws, for the implementation of the
  14 Act 307 cleanup program, for remediation of contaminated sites on
  15 state-owned land, and for court ordered settlements and related
  16 agreements. The department shall report to the house and senate
  17 appropriations subcommittees on natural resources any projected
  18 shortfall of appropriations made under this section by April 2, 1995.
- Sec. 1605. (1) The department may receive and expend funds in 20 addition to those authorized in section 102 from the Michigan 21 underground storage tank financial assurance fund for the purpose of 22 carrying out the duties and responsibilities as specified in the 23 Michigan underground storage tank financial assurance act, Act No. 518 24 of the Public Acts of 1988, being sections 299.801 to 299.828 of the 25 Michigan Compiled Laws. The funds appropriated pursuant to this 26 section are considered work project appropriations and any

27 unencumbered funds are carried forward into the succeeding fiscal

28 year.

1 (2) The Michigan underground storage tank financial assurance 2 policy board shall allocate the amount of the underground storage tank 3 financial assurance fund to be distributed to the department. If the 4 amount recommended by the board is less than that appropriated in 5 section 102, expenditures shall be adjusted accordingly.

#### 6 RESOURCE PRESERVATION LAW ENFORCEMENT

Sec. 1701. Of the state general fund/general purpose resources 8 appropriated in section 102 to resource preservation law enforcement, 9 \$2,240,000.00 is to provide reimbursement to the game and fish 10 protection fund for senior citizen reimbursement.

#### 11 GRANTS

- Sec. 1801. (1) If a certified health department does not exist in 13 a city, county, or district or does not fulfill its responsibilities 14 under the septage waste servicers act, Act No. 181 of the Public Acts 15 of 1986, being sections 325.311 to 325.332 of the Michigan Compiled 16 Laws, then the department may spend funds appropriated in section 102 17 under the septage waste compliance program in accordance with section 18 17(3) of the septage waste servicers act, Act No. 181 of the Public 19 Acts of 1986, being section 325.327 of the Michigan Compiled Laws.
- 20 (2) The department may carryforward unexpended septage waste
- 21 license fees collected for the septage waste compliance program.
- 22 Expenditures shall not exceed revenue collected for the fiscal year
- 23 together with any unexpended balances of the prior fiscal year.
- Sec. 1802. Of the state general fund/general purpose funds 25 appropriated in section 102 for purchased lands, \$2,829,000.00 is to
- 26 reimburse the game and fish protection fund for the seventh year of a
- 277-year phase-in of general fund support of 50% of the total tax
- 28 payments due to local units for lands acquired with hunting and

1 fishing license fees from the game and fish protection fund. Funds
2 described in this section shall only be utilized for those lands
3 acquired with hunting and fishing license fees from the game and fish
4 protection fund.
