# ENROLLED HOUSE BILL No. 4419

AN ACT to make appropriations for the department of education and certain other purposes relating to education for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1996; to provide for the expenditure of the appropriations; to prescribe the powers and duties of certain state departments, school districts, and other governmental bodies; and to provide for the disposition of fees and other income received by certain legal entities and state agencies.

The People of the State of Michigan enact:

Sec. 201. (1) In accordance with the provisions of section 30 of article IX of the state constitution of 1963, total state spending from state resources in this appropriation act is \$55,671,200.00, and state appropriations to be paid to local units of government in section 101 are as follows:

(2) If it appears to the principal executive officers of each department that state spending to local units of government will be less than the amount that was projected to be expended for any quarter, the principal executive officer shall immediately give notice of the approximate shortfall to the department of management and budget, the senate and house appropriations subcommittees responsible for the department's budget, and the senate and house fiscal agencies.

Sec. 202. The appropriations made and the expenditures authorized under this act and the departments, agencies, commissions, boards, offices, and programs for which an appropriation is made under this act are subject to the management and budget act, Act No. 431 of the Public Acts of 1984, being sections 18.1101 to 18.1594 of the Michigan Compiled Laws.

Sec. 203. As used in this act:

- (a) "AIDS" means acquired immunodeficiency syndrome.
- (b) "ADP" means automated data processing.
- (c) "CDC" means center for disease control.
- (d) "DAG" means the United States department of agriculture.
- (e) "DED" means the United States department of education.
- (f) "Department" means the Michigan department of education.
- (g) "District" means a local school district established under part 2, 3, 4, 5, or 6 of the school code of 1976, Act No. 451 of the Public Acts of 1976, being sections 380.71 to 380.485 of the Michigan Compiled Laws, a local act school district, or a public school academy.
  - (h) "DOL" means the United States department of labor.
  - (i) "ECIA" means the education consolidation and improvement act.
  - (j) "FNS" means food and nutrition service of the USDA.

- (k) "HCFA" means the health care financing administration.
- (l) "HHS" means the United States department of health and human services.
- (m) "IASA" means improving America's schools act.
- (n) "IDEA" means the individuals with disabilities education act.
- (o) "IDG" means interdepartmental grant.
- (p) "JTPA" means the job training partnership act.
- (q) "MSB" means the Michigan school for the blind.
- (r) "MSD" means the Michigan school for the deaf.
- (s) "MSDB" means the Michigan school for the deaf and blind.
- (t) "NHTSA" means the national highway traffic safety administration.
- (u) "OBEMLA" means office of bilingual education and minority languages affairs.
- (v) "OERI" means office of educational research and improvement.

- Sec. 204. (1) Except as otherwise provided in this section, beginning October 1, 1994, there shall be a hiring freeze imposed on the state classified civil service. State departments and agencies shall be prohibited from hiring any new full-time state classified civil service employees or prohibited from filling any vacant state classified civil service positions. This hiring freeze does not apply to internal transfers of classified employees from 1 position to another within a department or to positions that are funded with 80% or more federal or restricted funds.
- (2) The director of the department of management and budget shall grant exceptions to the hiring freeze when the director believes that the hiring freeze will result in rendering a state department or agency unable to deliver basic services. The director of the department of management and budget shall report by the fifteenth of each month to the chairpersons of the senate and house of representatives appropriations committees the number of exceptions to the hiring freeze approved during the previous month and the reasons to justify the exception.
- Sec. 205. None of the funds appropriated in section 101 in the line item identified as "Federal contingency funds", "state restricted contingency funds", or "local and private contingency funds" are available for expenditure until they have been transferred to another line item in this act pursuant to section 393(2) of the management and budget act, Act No. 431 of the Public Acts of 1984, being section 18.1393 of the Michigan Compiled Laws.
- Sec. 207. A department or agency billed by the department of civil service for the 1% charge authorized by section 5 of article XI of the state constitution of 1963 by the end of the first fiscal quarter shall pay the total amount of the billing by the end of the second fiscal quarter.
- Sec. 208. The department may carry into the succeeding fiscal year unexpended federal pass-through funds to local institutions and governments that do not require additional state matching funds. Federal pass-through funds to local institutions and governments that are received in amounts in addition to those included in section 101 and that do not require additional state matching funds are appropriated for the purposes intended.
- Sec. 211. The department shall provide the department of management and budget and the senate and house fiscal agencies with copies of the state board of education agenda and all supporting documents at the time the agenda and supporting documents are provided to state board of education members.
- Sec. 212. (1) The department may receive and expend federal funds for purposes allowed by the federal government and these funds are appropriated, if the the funds are provided as "block grants" or other similar replacements for or consolidations of prior federal funding sources.

- (2) The department may use the funds described in subsection (1) to continue existing programs and shall not establish new programs utilizing these funds, unless the legislature has enacted a modification to the existing program or enacted a new program.
- Sec. 213. The amounts appropriated from 1 fund to another fund shall be authorized pursuant to annual appropriations within the departments responsible for each fund's appropriation.
- Sec. 214. A branch of government, a principal executive department, or a state agency that is appropriated funds in section 101 shall not use any of the funds for the purchase of foreign goods or services if competitively priced American goods or services of comparable quality are available.
- Sec. 215. (1) The director of the department shall take all reasonable steps to ensure that businesses in deprived and depressed communities compete for and perform contracts to provide services or supplies, or both, for the department.
- (2) The director of the department shall strongly encourage firms with which the department contracts to subcontract with businesses certified by the department of civil rights in depressed and deprived communities for services or supplies, or both.

# STATE BOARD/OFFICE OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

- Sec. 301. (1) The appropriations in section 101 may be used for per diem payments to members of boards, committees, and commissions for each day's board, committee, or commission work at which a quorum is present; for attending a hearing as authorized by the respective board, committee, or commission; or for performing official business as authorized by the respective board, committee, or commission. The per diem payments shall be at a rate as follows:

  - (c) State tenure commission-member......\$ 50.00 per day
  - (2) A state board of education member shall not be paid a per diem for more than 24 days per year.
- (3) The administrative secretary of the state board of education shall report to the public, the senate and house fiscal agencies, and the department of management and budget the previous month's expenses by fund source for members of the state board of education related to the performance of their responsibilities.
- Sec. 302. (1) From the amount appropriated in section 101 to the state board of education, not more than \$27,500.00 shall be expended for travel.
- (2) The state board of education shall not expend amounts for travel appropriated from DED-OVAE, basic grants to states.
- Sec. 303. From the amount appropriated in section 101 for executive director programs, there is allocated \$421,000.00 and 5.0 FTE positions to establish and operate a charter school office to administer charter school legislation and associated regulations, and to coordinate the activities of the department relating to charter schools.

#### SCHOOL PROGRAM QUALITY SERVICES

- Sec. 501. (1) From the general fund allocations in section 101, the department may provide tests to nonpublic schools. The department shall notify nonpublic schools that they are eligible to receive the tests without cost to them.
- (2) The department shall release test results at the same time to all private schools and public school districts taking the tests at the same time.
- Sec. 502. The department shall provide a progress report to the chairpersons of the senate and house of representatives education appropriations subcommittees, the senate and house fiscal agencies, and the department of management and budget no later than May 15 of each year describing the activities of the department during the previous fiscal year and the current status relative to the implementation of sections 1204a, 1277, 1278, and 1280 of the school code of 1976, Act No. 451 of the Public Acts of 1976, being sections 380.1204a, 380.1277, 380.1278, and 380.1280 of the Michigan Compiled Laws.

#### SPECIAL EDUCATION SERVICES/MSB/MSD/MSDB PROGRAMS

Sec. 601. The employees at the Michigan school for the deaf and blind who work on a school year basis shall be considered annual employees for purposes of service credits, retirement, and insurance benefits.

Sec. 602. For each student enrolled at the Michigan school for the deaf and blind, the department shall assess the intermediate school district of residence 100% of the cost of operating the student's instructional program. The amount shall exclude room and board related costs and the cost of weekend transportation between the school and the student's home.

- Sec. 603. (1) The department may assess rent to the department of corrections for Michigan school for the blind space occupied by the corrections staff training academy. The rental rates and all leasing arrangements shall be subject to the approval of the department of management and budget. Amounts received under section 101 for the corrections academy lease program may be expended by the department for operation, maintenance, and renovation expenses associated with the lease space.
- (2) In addition, the department may receive and expend funds in addition to those authorized in section 101 for the rental of facilities at the Michigan school for the blind to private or publicly funded organizations.

Sec. 604. The department shall assess rent to the state employee child care center for the rental of space it occupies at the Michigan school for the blind. The rental rates and all leasing arrangements shall be subject to the approval of the department of management and budget. Amounts received under section 101 for the child care center may be expended by the department for the operation, maintenance, and renovation of the leased space.

Sec. 605. Proceeds from the sale of surplus property and facilities at the Michigan school for the deaf are hereby appropriated for the purposes of repairs, renovations, and maintenance of the school's campus. Any unexpended and unencumbered funds remaining on September 30, 1996 from such proceeds shall be carried forward as a work project for the purposes of repairs, renovations, and maintenance of the school's campus at a total estimated cost not to exceed the proceeds of the sales. The work is to be completed by September 30, 1997.

Sec. 606. The department may assist the department of social services, other departments, and local school districts to secure reimbursement for eligible services provided in Michigan schools from the federal medicaid program. The department may submit reports of direct expenses related to this effort to the department of social services for reimbursement.

Sec. 607. The unexpended balances of appropriations for the school for the deaf operations shall not lapse to the state general fund at the end of the fiscal year but shall be carried forward as a work project and expended for special maintenance and repairs of facilities at the Michigan school for the deaf.

Sec. 608. (1) By October 1, 1995, the department shall co-locate the Michigan school for the blind from Lansing to the campus of the Michigan school for the deaf in Flint, unless the Michigan school for the blind is able to demonstrate, by September 11, 1995, that not less than 25 visually impaired students are enrolled in the residential program at the Lansing campus. The co-located school shall be known as the Michigan school for the deaf and blind. As used in this section, "co-locate" means to establish on 1 campus 2 distinct educational and residential programs for the deaf and the blind and shall include all of the following:

- (a) A unified budget for the school.
- (b) Assurance of the continuity of programs and services for students of the school including, but not limited to, appropriate individualized educational programs, ongoing evaluations, and instructional methods.
  - (c) Continuation of outreach services to visually impaired school age children, parents, caregivers, and professionals.
- (d) A plan for the use of part of the campus of the MSB for commemorating the services provided by MSB in Lansing.
- (e) Assurance that the funds currently held by the MSB and MSD as gifts, trusts, and bequests shall not be commingled and shall be separately accounted annually to the state board of education and the house and senate appropriation subcommittees on education.
- (f) A plan for the continued development of Camp Tuhsmeheta as an environmental education and camping facility for use by visually and other impaired persons.
- (2) If there are 25 students enrolled at the MSB as specified in subsection (1), then the schools shall not be co-located during the 1995-96 school year, but it is the legislature's intent that the schools be co-located by October 1, 1996. Not later than March 1, 1996, the department shall submit a report on co-locating the Michigan school for the blind and Michigan school for the deaf in Flint to the house and senate committees on education and appropriations, addressing all of the elements in subsection (1)(a) through (f).

(3) In the event of co-location, the MSDB may expend appropriations for temporary facilities.

Sec. 609. The department of management and budget shall enter into a contract for, or conduct with internal resources, a study of the disposition of property and facilities associated with the Michigan school for the blind in Lansing. The department shall make a recommendation regarding the disposition of the property and facilities, including a recommendation regarding the feasibility of sale or conversion to other state purposes, to the joint capital outlay subcommittee, and the senate and house appropriation subcommittees on education before October 1, 1996.

Sec. 610. (1) The department shall determine what the savings will be for fiscal year 1996-97 as a result of co-locating the Michigan school for the blind and the Michigan school for the deaf. The savings will be appropriated for a summer institute to teach braille and life skills.

(2) The line item appropriation for a summer institute shall be expended for an expanded summer program to teach students braille and life skills.

#### TEACHER PREPARATION AND CERTIFICATION SERVICES

Sec. 701. From the funds appropriated in section 101 for teacher preparation and certification services, the department shall maintain the professional personnel register and certificate revocation/felony conviction files.

Sec. 702. Not later than November 30, 1995, the department shall submit to the senate and house of representatives appropriations subcommittees responsible for the department's budget, the senate and house fiscal agencies, and the department of management and budget, a report on the status of activities to meet the requirements of section 1531 of the school code of 1976, Act No. 451 of the Public Acts of 1976, being section 380.1531 of the Michigan Compiled Laws, relating to teacher test development, validation, and implementation.

### INFORMATION SERVICE CENTER/HIGHER EDUCATION MANAGEMENT SERVICES

Sec. 801. Included in the appropriation for information service center operations in section 101 is \$50,000.00 to publish and distribute the Michigan school report.

#### **GRANTS AND DISTRIBUTIONS**

Sec. 902. The department shall disburse the funds to a general fund grantee in accordance with the same standards of timing and amount that apply to disbursements made by the department to a federal fund grantee. The disbursement shall be restricted to the minimum amount needed for immediate disbursement by the grantee. The department may waive this section if extenuating circumstances warrant and are substantiated in the grantee's application or other appropriate documentation. A waiver granted pursuant to this section shall not be effective until 15 days after written notice of the proposed waiver is given to the chairpersons of the senate and house appropriations subcommittees having jurisdiction over the department budget.

Sec. 903. (1) The funds appropriated in section 101 for school breakfast programs shall be made available to all eligible applicant public school districts and public school academies as follows:

- (a) The district or public school academy participates in the federal school breakfast program and meets all standards as prescribed by 7 C.F.R. parts 220 and 245.
  - (b) Payment is made for each breakfast served meeting standards prescribed in subdivision (a).
- (c) The payment for a district or public school academy is at a per meal rate equal to the lesser of the district's or public school academy's actual cost, or 100% of the cost of a breakfast served by an efficiently operated breakfast program as determined by the department, less federal reimbursement, participant payments, and other state reimbursement. Determination of efficient cost by the department shall be determined by using a statistical sampling of statewide and regional cost as reported in a manner approved by the department for the preceding school year.
- (d) The payment determined under subdivision (c) is prorated if the appropriation in section 101 is not sufficient to fund all payments determined under this section.

- (2) Of the appropriation of federal funds in section 101 for the national school lunch program, expenditures shall not be made in FY 1995-96 for any programs other than those authorized by the department and funded from this line item in FY 1994-95.
- Sec. 904. (1) The funds appropriated in section 101 for school readiness programs shall be made available through a competitive application process as follows:
- (a) An applicant may be any public or private nonprofit legal entity or agency other than a local or intermediate school district except a local or intermediate school district acting as a fiscal agent for a child caring organization regulated under Act No. 116 of the Public Acts of 1973, being sections 722.111 to 722.128 of the Michigan Compiled Laws.
  - (b) Applications shall be submitted in a form and manner as required by the department.
- (c) Applications shall be reviewed by a diverse interagency committee composed of representatives of the department, appropriate community, volunteer, social service agencies and organizations, and parents.
- (d) Priority in the recommendation for awarding of grants by the state board of education to applicants shall be based upon the following criteria:
- (i) Compliance with standards for early childhood development consistent with programs for 4-year-olds, as approved by the state board of education.
  - (ii) Active and continuous involvement of the parents or guardians of the children participating in the program.
- (iii) Employment of teachers possessing proper training in early childhood development, including an early childhood (ZA) endorsement or child development associate, and trained support staff.
- (iv) Evidence of collaboration with the community of providers in early childhood development programs including documentation of the total number of children in the community who would meet the criteria established in subparagraph (vi), and who are being served by other providers, and the number of children who will remain unserved by other community early childhood programs if this program is funded.
  - (v) The extent to which these funds will supplement other federal, state, local, or private funds.
- (vi) The extent to which these funds will be targeted to children who will be at least 4, but less than 5, years of age as of December 1 of the year in which the programs are offered and who show evidence of 2 or more "at risk" factors as defined in the state board of education report entitled, "children at risk" that was adopted by the state board on April 5, 1988.
- (e) Whether the application contains a comprehensive evaluation plan that includes implementation of all program components required and an assessment of the gains of children participating in an early childhood development program.
- (f) Applications shall provide for the establishment of a school readiness advisory committee that shall be involved in the planning and evaluation of the program and provides for the involvement of parents and appropriate community, volunteer, and social service agencies and organizations. At least 50% of the committee members shall be parents or legal guardians of current or former program participants. The committee shall do all of the following:
- (i) Review the mechanisms and criteria used to determine referrals for participation in the school readiness program.
  - (ii) Review the health screening program for all participants.
  - (iii) Review the nutritional services provided to all participants.
  - (iv) Review the mechanisms in place for the referral of families to community social service agencies, as appropriate.
- (v) Review the collaboration with and the involvement of appropriate community, volunteer, and social service agencies and organizations in addressing all aspects of education disadvantage.
  - (vi) Review, evaluate, and make recommendations for changes in the school readiness program.
- (g) More than 50% of the children participating in the program shall meet the income eligibility criteria for free or reduced price lunch, as determined under the national school lunch act, chapter 281, 60 Stat. 230, 42 U.S.C. 1751 to 1753, 1755 to 1761, 1762a, 1765 to 1766b, and 1769 to 1769h, or meet income and all other eligibility criteria for participation in the Michigan department of social services unified child day care program.
- (2) Grant awards by the state board of education may be at whatever level the board determines appropriate. A grant, when combined with other sources of state revenue for this program, shall not exceed \$3,000.00 per child or the cost of the program, whichever is less. However, in order to achieve the goals and objectives of the early childhood development programs, it is the intent of the legislature to fund these programs at the maximum optimum per pupil level.
- (3) Except as otherwise provided, an applicant that received a grant under this section in the 1994-95 fiscal year shall receive priority for funding in 1995-96. However, continuation of funding is contingent on the availability of funds and

documented evidence of grantee compliance with standards for early childhood development consistent with programs for 4-year-olds, as approved by the state board of education, and with all operational, fiscal, administrative, and other program requirements. After 3 years of funding, a program that received a grant under this section may reapply for funding, but will compete for available funds with other new programs and other programs also completing their third year of funding under this section.

(4) From the appropriation in section 101 for school readiness grants, not more than \$25,000.00 may be expended for project first step.

Sec. 905. Subject to the provisions of applicable federal law, in order to more fully integrate all job training programs for the state, the Michigan jobs commission shall be the lead agency responsible for programs funded under the federal job training partnership act, Public Law 97-300, 96 Stat. 1322, and grants distributed under that act shall be subject to the approval of the Michigan jobs commission. Changes in federal law or regulation permitting, the Michigan jobs commission shall be the state agency responsible for administering this federal program.

This act is ordered to take immediate effect.
