

HOUSE BILL No. 4046

January 11, 1995, Introduced by Reps. Hammerstrom, Rhead, Ryan, Walberg, Fitzgerald, McNutt and Hill and referred to the Committee on Education.

A bill to amend section 1278 of Act No. 451 of the Public Acts of 1976, entitled as amended
"The school code of 1976,"
as amended by Act No. 335 of the Public Acts of 1993, being section 380.1278 of the Michigan Compiled Laws.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF MICHIGAN ENACT:

- Section 1. Section 1278 of Act No. 451 of the Public Acts 2 of 1976, as amended by Act No. 335 of the Public Acts of 1993, 3 being section 380.1278 of the Michigan Compiled Laws, is amended 4 to read as follows:
- 5 Sec. 1278. (1) Subject to subsection (12), in addition to
- 6 the requirements for accreditation under section 1280 specified
- 7 in that section, if the board of a school district wants all of
- 8 the schools of the school district to be accredited under
- 9 section 1280, the board shall make available to all pupils

- 1 attending public school in the district a core academic
- 2 curriculum in compliance with subsection (3) in each of the cur-
- 3 ricular areas specified in the state board recommended model core
- 4 academic curriculum developed under subsection (2). The state
- 5 board model core academic curriculum shall encompass academic and
- 6 cognitive instruction only. For purposes of this subsection, the
- 7 state board model core academic curriculum shall not include
- 8 attitudes, beliefs, or value systems that are not essential in
- 9 the legal, economic, and social structure of our society and to
- 10 the personal and social responsibility of citizens of our
- 11 society.
- (2) A recommended model core academic curriculum shall be
- 13 developed by the state board and distributed to each school dis-
- 14 trict in the state. The recommended core academic curriculum
- 15 shall set forth desired learning objectives in math, science,
- 16 reading, history, geography, economics, American government, and
- 17 writing for all children at each stage of schooling and be based
- 18 upon the "Michigan K-12 program standards of quality" to ensure
- 19 that high academic standards, academic skills, and academic
- 20 subject matters are built into the instructional goals of all
- 21 districts for all children. The state board also shall ensure
- 22 that the Michigan educational assessment program and the high
- 23 school proficiency exam, or any other statewide benchmark test is
- 24 testing only for proficiency in basic academic skills and aca-
- 25 demic subject matter and are not used to measure pupils' values
- 26 or attitudes.

- (3) Subject to subsection (12), the board of each school district, considering the academic curricular outcomes defined and recommended pursuant to subsection (2), shall do both of the following:
- (a) Establish a core academic curriculum for its pupils at the elementary, middle, and secondary school levels. The core racademic curriculum shall define academic outcomes to be achieved by all pupils and be based upon the school district's educational mission, long-range student goals, and student performance objectives. The core academic curriculum may vary from the model core academic curriculum recommended by the state board pursuant to subsection (2).
- (b) After consulting with teachers and school building

 4 administrators, determine the aligned instructional program for

 5 delivering the core academic curriculum and identify the courses

 16 and programs in which the core academic curriculum will be

 17 taught.
- (4) Consistent with its core academic curriculum for early legementary school, the board of a school district shall consider adopting early elementary school program initiatives establishing nongraded, continuous progress programs for grades 1 through 4, through individualized planning, maintaining comprehensive portfolios and narrative reports of learning progress for all pupils, and emphasizing collegiality and collaboration among teachers, parents, and students, all over multiple year periods.
- 26 (5) The board may supplement the core academic curriculum by
 27 providing instruction through additional classes and programs.

- (6) For all pupils, the subjects or courses, and the
- 2 delivery of those including special assistance, that constitute
- 3 the curriculum the pupils engage in shall assure the pupils have
- 4 a realistic opportunity to learn all subjects and courses
- 5 required by the district's core academic curriculum in order to
- 6 give all pupils a good and fair opportunity to attain a
- 7 state-endorsed diploma. A subject or course required by the core
- 8 academic curriculum pursuant to subsection (3) shall be provided
- 9 to all pupils in the school district by a school district, a con-
- 10 sortium of school districts, or a consortium of 1 or more school
- 11 districts and 1 or more intermediate school districts.
- (7) To the extent practicable, the state board may adopt or
- 13 develop academic outcome-based high standards for knowledge and
- 14 life skills, and core academic curriculum, for special education
- 15 pupils for whom it may not be realistic or desirable to expect
- 16 achievement of novice level or initial mastery of the state board
- 17 recommended model core academic curriculum outcomes or of a high
- 18 school diploma.
- 19 (8) The state board shall make available to all nonpublic
- 20 schools in this state, as a resource for their consideration, the
- 21 model core academic curriculum developed for public schools pur-
- 22 suant to subsection (2) for the purpose of assisting the govern-
- 23 ing body of a nonpublic school in developing its own core aca-
- 24 demic curriculum.
- 25 (9) Excluding special education pupils, pupils having a
- 26 learning disability, and pupils with extenuating circumstances as
- 27 determined by school officials, a pupil who does not score

- 1 satisfactorily on the 4th or 7th grade Michigan educational 2 assessment program reading test shall be provided special assist-3 ance reasonably expected to enable the pupil to bring his or her 4 reading skills to grade level within 12 months.
- (10) Any course that would have been considered a nonessen-6 tial elective course under <u>Snyder</u> v <u>Charlotte Schools</u>, 421 Mich 7 517 (1984) on <u>the effective date of the amendatory act that</u> 8 added this section APRIL 13, 1990 shall continue to be offered 9 to resident pupils of nonpublic schools on a shared time basis.
- (11) Not later than September 1, 1994, the state board shall 10 11 develop and submit for public hearing under the administrative 12 procedures act of 1969, Act No. 306 of the Public Acts of 1969, 13 being sections 24.201 to 24.328 of the Michigan Compiled Laws, 14 proposed rules establishing a required core academic curriculum 15 for all school districts. The proposed rules may exempt pupils 16 described in subsection (7) and require that the standards 17 described in subsection (7) be implemented. Not later than 18 January 1, 1996, the state board shall submit the proposed rules 19 to the joint committee on administrative rules. IN ADDITION TO 20 ACADEMIC SUBJECTS, THE RULES SHALL INCLUDE IN THE CORE CURRICULUM 21 FOR AT LEAST ELEMENTARY AND MIDDLE SCHOOL PUPILS INSTRUCTION ON 22 THE IMPORTANCE OF COMMUNITY SERVICE AND LEARNING ACTIVITIES 23 DESIGNED TO PROVIDE EXPERIENCE IN COMMUNITY SERVICE AND TO PRO-24 MOTE COMMUNITY SERVICE.
- 25 (12) Beginning in the 1997-98 school year, the board of a 26 school district shall provide to each pupil the core academic

1 curriculum required under the state board rules described in
2 subsection (11).
