

HOUSE BILL No. 5252

October 12, 1995, Introduced by Reps. Crissman, Green, Middleton, Hammerstrom, Rhead, McManus, Hill, Voorhees, Gustafson, LeTarte, Bodem, Perricone, Walberg, Law, Geiger, Johnson, Bobier, Kukuk, Rocca and Galloway and referred to the Committee on Insurance.

A bill to amend section 3 of Act No. 233 of the Public Acts of 1984, entitled

"Prudent purchaser act,"

as amended by Act No. 439 of the Public Acts of 1994, being section 550.53 of the Michigan Compiled Laws.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF MICHIGAN ENACT:

- 1 Section 1. Section 3 of Act No. 233 of the Public Acts of
- 2 1984, as amended by Act No. 439 of the Public Acts of 1994, being
- 3 section 550.53 of the Michigan Compiled Laws, is amended to read
- 4 as follows:
- 5 Sec. 3. (1) An organization may enter into prudent pur-
- 6 chaser agreements with 1 or more health care providers of a spe-
- 7 cific service to control health care costs, assure appropriate
- 8 utilization of health care services, and maintain quality of
- 9 health care. -The- EXCEPT AS PROVIDED IN SUBSECTION (13), THE

- 1 organization may limit the number of prudent purchaser agreements
- 2 entered into pursuant to this section, if the number of such
- 3 agreements is sufficient to assure reasonable levels of access to
- 4 health care services for recipients of those services. The
- 5 number of prudent purchaser agreements authorized by this section
- 6 that are necessary to assure reasonable levels of access to
- 7 health care services for recipients shall be determined by the
- 8 organization. However, the organization shall offer a prudent
- 9 purchaser agreement, comparable to those agreements with other
- 10 members of the provider panel, to a health care provider located
- II within a reasonable distance from the recipients of -such THE
- 12 health care services if a health care provider is located
- 13 within that reasonable distance.
- (2) An organization shall give interested health care pro-
- 15 viders located in the geographic area served by the organization
- 16 an opportunity to apply to the organization for membership on the
- 17 provider panel.
- (3) Prudent purchaser agreements shall be based upon the
- 19 following written standards which shall be filed by the organiza-
- 20 tion with the commissioner on a form and in a manner that is uni-
- 21 formly developed and applied by the commissioner before the ini-
- 22 tial provider panel is formed:
- 23 (a) Standards for maintaining quality health care.
- 24 (b) Standards for controlling health care costs.
- (c) Standards for assuring appropriate utilization of health
- 26 care services.

- (d) Standards for assuring reasonable levels of access to health care services.
- 3 (e) Other standards considered appropriate by the 4 organization.
- (4) An organization shall develop and institute procedures that are designed to notify health care providers located in the geographic area served by the organization of the formation of a provider panel. Upon receipt of a request by a health care prographic, the organization shall provide the written standards described in subsection (3) to the health care provider.
- (5) An organization that enters into prudent purchaser

 12 agreements with health care providers under this act shall insti13 tute a program for the professional review of the quality of
 14 health care, performance of health care personnel, and utiliza15 tion of services and facilities under a prudent purchaser
 16 agreement. At least every 2 years, the organization shall pro17 vide for an evaluation of its professional review program by a
 18 professionally recognized independent third party.
- (6) If 2 or more classes of health care providers may 20 legally provide the same health care service, the organization 21 shall offer each class of health care providers the opportunity 22 to apply to the organization for membership on the provider 23 panel.
- (7) Each prudent purchaser agreement shall state that the 25 health care provider may be removed from the provider panel 26 before the expiration of the agreement if the provider does not 27 comply with the requirements of the contract.

- 1 (8) Nothing in this act shall THIS ACT DOES NOT preclude a 2 health care provider or health care facility from being a member 3 of more than 1 provider panel.
- 4 (9) Provider panels A PROVIDER PANEL may include health 5 care providers and facilities outside Michigan if necessary to 6 assure reasonable levels of access to health care services under 7 coverage authorized by this act.
- 8 (10) At the time WHEN coverage authorized by this act is 9 offered to a person, the organization shall give or cause to be 10 given to the person the following information:
- (a) The identity of the organization contracting with the provider panel.
- (b) The identity of the party sponsoring the coverage including, but not limited to, the employer.
- (c) The identity of the collective bargaining agent if the coverage is offered pursuant to a collective bargaining agreement.
- (11) If a person who has coverage authorized by this act is
 19 entitled to receive a health care service when rendered by a
 20 health care provider who is a member of the provider panel, the
 21 person is entitled to receive the health care service from a
 22 health care provider who is not a member of the provider panel
 23 for an emergency episode of illness or injury that requires imme24 diate treatment before it can be obtained from a health care pro25 vider who is on the provider panel.

- (12) Subsections (2) to (11) do not limit the authority of 2 organizations to limit the number of prudent purchaser 3 agreements.
- 4 (13) AN ORGANIZATION SHALL NOT LIMIT THE NUMBER OF PRUDENT
 5 PURCHASER AGREEMENTS THAT IT WILL ENTER INTO WITH PHARMACIES WHEN
 6 ESTABLISHING OR RENEWING A PRUDENT PURCHASER AGREEMENT INVOLVING
 7 A PRESCRIPTION PROGRAM.
- 8 (14) -(13) If coverage under a prudent purchaser agreement
 9 provides for benefits for services that are within the scope of
 10 practice of optometry, this act does not require that coverage or
 11 reimbursement be provided for a practice of optometric service
 12 unless that service was included in the definition of practice of
 13 optometry under section 17401 of the public health code, Act
 14 No. 368 of the Public Acts of 1978, being section 333.17401 of
 15 the Michigan Compiled Laws, as of May 20, 1992.
- (14) If coverage under a prudent purchaser agreement pro

 17 vides for benefits for services that are within the scope of

 18 practice of chiropractic, this act does not require that coverage

 19 or reimbursement be provided for the use of therapeutic sound or

 20 electricity, or both, for the reduction or correction of spinal

 21 subluxations in a chiropractic service. This subsection shall

 22 not take effect unless Senate Bill No. 493 of the 87th
- 23 Egislature is enacted into law.
