

**SUBSTITUTE FOR  
SENATE BILL NO. 364**

A bill to make appropriations for the department of environmental quality for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2000; to provide for the expenditure of those appropriations; to create funds and accounts; to require reports; to prescribe certain powers and duties of certain state agencies and officials; to authorize certain transfers by certain state agencies; and to provide for the disposition of fees and other income received by the various state agencies.

13           Sec. 201. (1) In accordance with the provisions of section 30 of  
14 article IX of the state constitution of 1963, total state spending in  
15 this appropriation act is \$254,214,100.00 and state appropriations to be  
16 paid to local units of government for fiscal year 1999-2000 are estimated  
17 at \$6,919,900.00. The itemized statement below identifies appropriations

- 14 Sec. 204. (1) Beginning October 1, 1999, a hiring freeze is imposed
- 15 on the state classified civil service. State departments and agencies
- 16 are prohibited from hiring any new full-time state classified civil serv-
- 17 ice employees or prohibited from filling any vacant state classified
- 18 civil service positions. This hiring freeze does not apply to internal
- 19 transfers of classified employees from 1 position to another within a
- 20 department or to positions that are funded with 80% or more federal or
- 21 restricted funds.
- 22 (2) The state budget director shall grant exceptions to this hiring
- 23 freeze when the director believes that such a hiring freeze will result
- 24 in rendering a state department or agency unable to deliver basic
- 25 services. The state budget director shall report by the fifteenth of
- 26 each month to the chairpersons of the senate and house appropriations

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1 committees the number of exclusions to the hiring freeze approved during  
2 the previous month and the justification for each exclusion.

3       Sec. 205. The department of civil service shall bill the department  
4 at the end of the first fiscal quarter for the 1% charges authorized by  
5 section 5 of article XI of the state constitution of 1963. Payments  
6 shall be made for the total amount of the billing by the end of the  
7 second fiscal quarter.

8       Sec. 206. (1) From funds appropriated under part 1, the department  
9 shall prepare a report that lists all of the following regarding grant or  
10 loan or grant and loan programs administered by the department for the  
11 fiscal year ending on September 30, 2000:

12       (a) The name of each program.

13       (b) The goals of the program, the criteria, eligibility, process,  
14 filing fees, nominating procedures, and deadlines for each program.

15       (c) The maximum and minimum grant and loan available and whether  
16 there is a match requirement for each program.

17       (d) The amount of any required match, and whether in-kind contribu-  
18 tions may be used as part or all of a required match.

19       (e) Information pertaining to the application process, timeline for  
20 each program, and the contact people within the department.

21       (f) The source of funds for each program, including the citation of  
22 pertinent authorizing acts.

23       (g) Information regarding plans for the next fiscal year for the  
24 phaseout, expansion, or changes for each program.

25       (h) A listing of all recipients of grants or loans awarded by the  
26 department by type and amount of grant or loan.

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1       (2) The reports required under this section shall be submitted to  
2 the senate and house of representatives appropriations committees and  
3 senate and house fiscal agencies by January 1, 2001.

4       Sec. 207. (1) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1,  
5 there is appropriated an amount not to exceed \$30,000,000.00 for federal  
6 contingency funds. These funds are not available for expenditure until  
7 they have been transferred to another line item in this bill pursuant to  
8 section 393(2) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431,  
9 MCL 18.1393.

10       (2) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1, there is appro-  
11 priated an amount not to exceed \$5,000,000.00 for state restricted con-  
12 tingency funds. These funds are not available for expenditure until they  
13 have been transferred to another line item in this bill pursuant to sec-  
14 tion 393(2) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1393.

15       (3) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1, there is appro-  
16 priated an amount not to exceed \$100,000.00 for local contingency funds.  
17 These funds are not available for expenditure until they have been trans-  
18 ferred to another line item in this bill pursuant to section 393(2) of  
19 the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1393.

20       (4) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1, there is appro-  
21 priated an amount not to exceed \$100,000.00 for private contingency  
22 funds. These funds are not available for expenditure until they have  
23 been transferred to another line item in this bill pursuant to section  
24 393(2) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1393.

25       Sec. 208. The department shall provide the state budget director,  
26 the subcommittees on natural resources and environmental quality of the  
27 house and senate appropriations committees, and the senate and house

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1 fiscal agencies with an annual report on restricted fund balances,  
2 projected revenues, and expenditures.

3       Sec. 209. The department shall provide an annual report on the  
4 total amount of funds received from responsible parties and legal settle-  
5 ments, and the disposition of these funds. Included in the report shall  
6 be a listing of the individual settlement cases, the location of the  
7 facilities involved, the type of violation committed, and the amount of  
8 funds received.

9       Sec. 210. (1) In addition to the funds appropriated for the envi-  
10 ronmental cleanup and redevelopment program listed in section 111, the  
11 department of environmental quality is authorized to expend amounts  
12 remaining from prior fiscal year appropriations to meet funding needs of  
13 legislatively approved sites.

14       (2) Unexpended and unencumbered amounts remaining from appropria-  
15 tions from the environmental protection bond fund contained in 1989  
16 PA 180, 1990 PA 55, 1990 PA 194, 1991 PA 31, 1991 PA 160, 1993 PA 74,  
17 1993 PA 353, 1994 PA 442, 1996 PA 353, and 1997 PA 114 are appropriated  
18 for expenditure for any site listed in this act and any site listed in  
19 the public acts referenced in this subsection.

20       (3) Unexpended and unencumbered amounts remaining from appropria-  
21 tions from the cleanup and redevelopment fund and unclaimed bottle depos-  
22 its fund contained in 1996 PA 319, 1997 PA 113, and 1997 PA 114 are  
23 appropriated for expenditure for any site listed in this act and any site  
24 listed in the public acts referenced in this subsection.

25       (4) The department of environmental quality shall provide an annual  
26 report by April 1, 2000 to the state budget director, the house and  
27 senate appropriations subcommittees on environmental quality, and the

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1 house and senate fiscal agencies that separately identifies the  
2 expenditures authorized by this section from the revenues available from  
3 the environmental bond fund, the unclaimed bottle deposit fund, and the  
4 cleanup and redevelopment fund.

5       Sec. 211. (1) The department shall notify the legislature and offer  
6 a public meeting and public comment opportunity with respect to any  
7 request received by the state of Michigan to divert water from the Great  
8 Lakes pursuant to the federal water resources development act of 1986.

9       (2) By September 30, 2000, the department shall prepare and submit  
10 to the governor and legislature a report on anticipated Great Lakes water  
11 diversions in the twenty-first century and recommendations on a research  
12 program and other measures needed to evaluate the impact of proposed  
13 Great Lakes water diversions. The report shall also contain recommenda-  
14 tions on appropriate state and federal policy and legislation needed to  
15 prevent or minimize, or both, the adverse impacts of new and increased  
16 Great Lakes water diversions, including proposals to draw water from the  
17 Great Lakes for commercial shipment outside the Great Lakes basin.

18       Sec. 212. All reports required in this act shall be made available  
19 to the public primarily through Internet access, unless a printed version  
20 is requested. The department shall provide electronic notification to  
21 all legislative offices for specific reports requested by the  
22 legislature.

23       Sec. 213. Funds appropriated in part 1 shall not be used for the  
24 purchase of foreign goods or services, or both, if competitively priced  
25 American goods or services, or both, of comparable quality are  
26 available. By May 1, 2000, the department shall submit a report to the  
27 state budget director, the speaker and minority leader of the house of



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1 representatives, the majority and minority leaders of the senate, the  
2 chairpersons of the house and senate appropriations committees, and the  
3 house and senate fiscal agencies on efforts to comply with this section.

4       Sec. 214. (1) In the expenditure of funds appropriated under this  
5 act, the director of the department shall take all reasonable steps to  
6 ensure that businesses in deprived and depressed communities compete for  
7 and perform contracts to provide services or supplies, or both, for the  
8 department.

9       (2) The director of the department shall strongly encourage firms  
10 with which the department contracts to subcontract with businesses certi-  
11 fied by the department of civil rights in depressed and deprived communi-  
12 ties for services or supplies, or both.

13       Sec. 215. Sixty days before beginning any effort to privatize, the  
14 department shall submit a complete project plan to the appropriate house  
15 and senate appropriations subcommittees and the house and senate fiscal  
16 agencies. The plan shall include the criteria under which the privatiza-  
17 tion initiative will be evaluated. The evaluation shall be completed and  
18 submitted to the appropriate house and senate appropriations subcommit-  
19 tees and the house and senate fiscal agencies within 30 months.

20       Sec. 216. (1) The department of management and budget and each  
21 principal executive department and agency shall provide to the senate and  
22 house of representatives standing committees on appropriations and the  
23 senate and house fiscal agencies a monthly report on all personal service  
24 contracts awarded without competitive bidding, pricing, or rate setting.  
25 The notification shall include all of the following:

26       (a) The total dollar amount of the contract.

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1 (b) The duration of the contract.

2 (c) The name of the vendor.

3 (d) The type of service to be provided.

4 (2) For personal service contracts of \$100,000.00 or more, the  
5 department of management and budget shall provide a monthly report on all  
6 of the following:

7 (a) The total dollar amount of the contract.

8 (b) The duration of the contract.

9 (c) The name of the vendor.

10 (d) The type of service to be provided.

11 (3) The department of management and budget shall provide a monthly  
12 listing of all bid requests or requests for proposal that were issued.

13 (4) Each principal executive department and agency shall provide a  
14 monthly summary listing of information that identifies any authorizations  
15 for personal service contracts that are provided to the department of  
16 civil service pursuant to delegated authority granted to each principal  
17 executive department and agency related to personal service contracts.

18 Sec. 217. If a department enters into a personal services contract  
19 with any temporary service agency or similar contractor that hires or  
20 subcontracts with a person who retired from employment in the department  
21 under the early retirement program under section 19f of the state  
22 employees' retirement act, 1943 PA 240, MCL 38.19f, the retired state  
23 employee shall be limited to 500 hours for professional, technical, or  
24 clerical services and 250 hours for management services. This limitation  
25 does not apply to computer technology services. This provision only  
26 applies during a 24-month period after the date of retirement. This  
27 section applies to each principal executive department and agency.

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1       Sec. 218. Funds appropriated in part 1 for permit review shall not  
2 be provided to a non-governmental organization that acquires land for  
3 endangered species habitats. This prohibition does not apply to  
4 universities or other educational institutions.

5

6       Sec. 219. Of the environmental education funds appropriated in sec-  
7 tion 102, \$5,000.00 shall be allocated to Michigan State University  
8 Extension Service - 4H Youth Programs to fund the Michigan Youth  
9 Conservation Council.

      Sec. 220. The department shall provide a report prepared by  
the department's internal auditor for the prior fiscal year. This  
report shall include a listing of each audit or investigation  
performed by the internal auditor pursuant to sections 486(4) and  
487 of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1486 and  
18.1487. The report shall identify the proportion of time spent on  
each of the statutory responsibilities described in sections 485(4),  
486(4), and 487 of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL  
18.1485, 18.1486, and 18.1487, and the time spent on all other  
activities performed in the internal audit function. The first  
report is due March 1, 2000, and beginning on May 1, 2002,  
biennially thereafter. The reports shall be submitted to the  
governor, auditor general, the senate and house appropriations  
committees, the senate and house fiscal agencies, and the director.

      Sec. 221. The Department shall receive and retain copies of  
all reports funded from section 101 appropriations.

**10   AIR QUALITY**

11       Sec. 301. From the funds appropriated in section 107, the depart-  
12 ment shall report on the status of implementation planning and permit  
13 backlog reduction activities under part 55 of the natural resources and  
14 environmental protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.5501 to 324.5542,  
15 including status of revenue collections, on an annual basis. The report  
16 shall be provided to the house of representatives and senate appropria-  
17 tions subcommittees on environmental quality, the standing committees of  
18 the house of representatives and the senate that are responsible for  
19 issues pertaining to air quality, and the governor on or before March 1,  
20 2000.

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## **1 SURFACE WATER QUALITY**

2       Sec. 401. Of the funds appropriated in section 108 for surface  
3 water surveillance, a minimum of \$250,000.00 shall be designated for  
4 grants to local organizations for water quality monitoring activities.

## **5 DRINKING WATER**

6       Sec. 501. Not later than September 30, 2000, the department, work-  
7 ing with the legislature, shall develop and implement a laboratory  
8 accreditation program that conforms with the national environmental labo-  
9 ratory accreditation program.

10       Sec. 502. The department shall provide quarterly reports to the  
11 legislature on the revenues received and expenditures made by the drink-  
12 ing water and environmental units within the laboratory services appro-  
13 priation line. The information shall include the types of tests con-  
14 ducted, the number of tests conducted at no charge, and the allocation of  
15 the general fund appropriation for each unit.

## **16 ENVIRONMENTAL RESPONSE**

17       Sec. 601. From the appropriations in part 1 for the program under  
18 part 201 of the natural resources and environmental protection act, 1994  
19 PA 451, MCL 324.20101 to 324.20142, environmental cleanup and redevelop-  
20 ment program, the department shall continue to make authorizations for  
21 response activities at environmental contamination sites and for the  
22 administration of the program created by part 201 of the natural

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1 resources and environmental protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.20101 to  
2 324.20142.

3       Sec. 602. The unexpended portion of the appropriation in  
4 section 111 for the state cleanup program, environmental cleanup and  
5 redevelopment program, emergency cleanup action, NPL - municipal landfill  
6 match grants, state cleanup, and superfund cleanup projects is considered  
7 work project appropriations and any unencumbered or unallotted funds are  
8 carried forward into the succeeding fiscal year. The following is in  
9 compliance with section 451(3) of the management and budget act, 1984  
10 PA 431, MCL 18.1451:

11       (a) The purpose of the projects to be carried forward is to provide  
12 contaminated site cleanup.

13       (b) The projects will be accomplished by contract.

14       (c) The total estimated cost of all projects is identified in each  
15 line-item appropriation.

16       (d) The tentative completion date is September 30, 2001.

17       Sec. 603. Of the funds appropriated in section 111 as state match  
18 for the superfund cleanup program, an amount not to exceed \$250,000.00  
19 shall be expended as state match for the hazardous substance research  
20 center.

21       Sec. 604. (1) The department shall report by March 1, 2000 all of  
22 the following information relative to allocations made in section 111 for  
23 the environmental cleanup and redevelopment program, state cleanup, emer-  
24 gency actions, superfund cleanup, and revitalization revolving loan fund  
25 to the senate and house of representatives appropriations subcommittees  
26 on environmental quality and the senate and house fiscal agencies:

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1 (a) The name and location of the site for which an allocation is  
2 made.

3 (b) The nature of the problem encountered at the site.

4 (c) A brief description of how the problem will be resolved if the  
5 allocation is made for a response activity.

6 (d) The estimated date of site closure.

7 (e) The amount of the allocation, or the anticipated financing for  
8 the site.

9 (f) A summary of the sites and the total amount of funds expended at  
10 the sites at the conclusion of the fiscal year.

11 (g) The number of sites that would qualify as brownfields that were  
12 redeveloped.

13 (2) The report prepared shall be made available by March of each  
14 year.

15 Sec. 605. The department shall report to the legislature on  
16 October 1, 1999 the total amount of funds awaiting expenditure for envi-  
17 ronmental cleanup from environmental protection bond appropriations,  
18 cleanup and redevelopment fund appropriations, environmental response  
19 fund appropriations, and state general fund appropriations. The report  
20 shall include an estimate of when these funds will be used for the pur-  
21 pose intended. The department shall focus increased activity on comple-  
22 tion of these previously appropriated projects, and provide a report by  
23 September 30, 2000 on accomplishments during the fiscal year.

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**1 STORAGE TANKS**

2       Sec. 701. (1) The funds appropriated in section 112 from the  
3 Michigan underground storage tank financial assurance fund for the pur-  
4 pose of carrying out the duties and responsibilities as specified in  
5 part 215 of the natural resources and environmental protection act, 1994  
6 PA 451, MCL 324.21501 to 324.21551, are considered work project appropri-  
7 ations and any unencumbered funds are carried forward into the succeeding  
8 fiscal year. The following is in compliance with section 451(3) of the  
9 management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1451:

10       (a) The purpose of the projects to be carried forward is to carry  
11 out the responsibilities of part 215 of the natural resources and envi-  
12 ronmental protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.21501 to 324.21551.

13       (b) The projects will be accomplished by contract and state  
14 employees.

15       (c) The total estimated cost is identified in a line-item  
16 appropriation.

17       (d) The tentative completion date is September 30, 2001.

18       (2) The Michigan underground storage tank financial assurance policy  
19 board shall allocate the amount of the underground storage tank financial  
20 assurance fund to be distributed to the department. If the amount recom-  
21 mended by the board is less than that appropriated in section 112, expen-  
22 ditures shall be adjusted accordingly.

23       (3) Included in the amounts appropriated in section 112 from the  
24 Michigan underground storage tank financial assurance fund are amounts  
25 sufficient to pay debt service costs on the bonds or notes issued pursu-  
26 ant to part 215 of the natural resources and environmental protection  
27 act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.21501 to 324.21551.

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1       Sec. 702. The department shall provide reports to the state budget  
2 director, the senate and house of representatives appropriations subcom-  
3 mittees on environmental quality, and the senate and house fiscal agen-  
4 cies no later than March 31, 2000 and October 31, 2000 on the Michigan  
5 underground storage tank financial assurance fund. Reports shall include  
6 the fund balance, estimate of available revenues, number and dollar value  
7 of claims processed through September 30, 1999, and total estimated  
8 claims liability through December 22, 2001.

9       Sec. 703. The unexpended portion of the appropriation in section  
10 112 for the leaking underground storage tank cleanup program is consid-  
11 ered work project appropriations and any unencumbered or unallotted funds  
12 are carried over into the succeeding fiscal year. The following is in  
13 compliance with section 451(3) of the management and budget act, 1984  
14 PA 431, MCL 18.1451:

15       (a) The purpose of the projects to be carried over is to provide for  
16 cleanup of sites of environmental contamination.

17       (b) These projects will be accomplished by contract.

18       (c) The total estimated costs of all projects is identified in each  
19 line-item appropriation.

20       (d) The tentative completion date for these projects is September  
21 30, 2001.

### **22 ENVIRONMENTAL ASSISTANCE**

23       Sec. 801. With funds appropriated in section 114, the department  
24 shall implement a community right-to-know project to facilitate  
25 convenient public access to information about the performance of



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1 individual facilities in complying with requirements of air, surface  
2 water, waste management, storage tank, and environmental response pro-  
3 grams, and with any permits issued pursuant to these programs. The  
4 project shall also facilitate convenient public access to information  
5 about the overall quality of Michigan's air, water, groundwater, and  
6 drinking water and the generation of municipal solid waste and regulated  
7 hazardous waste. In implementing this section, the department shall con-  
8 sult with interested stakeholders on a periodic basis, including, but not  
9 limited to, industrial and environmental group representatives. By  
10 September 30, 2000, the department shall report to the legislature on the  
11 status of efforts to coordinate databases and to communicate this infor-  
12 mation to citizens, and shall make recommendations on any legislation or  
13 appropriations needed to complete this project.

14       Sec. 802. Of the funds appropriated in section 114 for environmen-  
15 tal services, \$300,000.00 is for the Michigan RETAP program to initiate a  
16 pilot project with public universities to focus on assessment of hazard-  
17 ous materials use and training of personnel at small and medium sized  
18 businesses. The program shall include internship opportunities for stu-  
19 dents with professionals who evaluate business environments for materials  
20 handling, production efficiencies, and waste reduction processes.  
21 Overhead costs assigned to the project from participating universities  
22 shall not exceed 20% of the project total.

23       Sec. 803. The funds appropriated in section 114 for the brownfield  
24 relocation revolving fund shall be used to provide low interest loans for  
25 pollution prevention projects as defined in section 14501 of the natural  
26 resources and environmental protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.14501.

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### **1 CRIMINAL INVESTIGATIONS**

2       Sec. 901. The department shall provide training in support of local  
3 efforts to regulate solid waste disposal. Department environmental con-  
4 servation officers shall be directed to help train law enforcement offi-  
5 cers and other enforcement personnel to develop community partnerships to  
6 combat illegal dumping at the local level.

7       Sec. 902. Of the funds appropriated in section 115 for criminal  
8 investigations, 2.0 FTEs and \$115,000.00 are designated primarily for  
9 inspections of incoming out-of-state waste, but can also be made avail-  
10 able for other criminal investigation activities.

### **11 GRANTS**

12       Sec. 1001. If a certified health department does not exist in a  
13 city, county, or district or does not fulfill its responsibilities under  
14 part 117 of the natural resources and environmental protection act, 1994  
15 PA 451, MCL 324.11701 to 324.11719, then the department may spend funds  
16 appropriated in section 116 under the septage waste compliance program in  
17 accordance with section 11716 of the natural resources and environmental  
18 protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.11716.

19       Sec. 1002. Loans provided by the water pollution control revolving  
20 fund pursuant to the appropriation in section 116 are to be repaid on  
21 schedule and penalties shall be assigned for delinquent repayment as pro-  
22 vided in part 53 of the natural resources and environmental protection  
23 act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.5301 to 324.5316.

24       Sec. 1003. Of the funds appropriated in section 116 for Great Lakes  
25 research and protection fund grants, the department shall designate

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1 \$100,000.00 for research on the adequacy of department standards to  
2 protect children's health. The department shall recommend changes in  
3 air, water, and waste standards in a report to the legislature to promote  
4 the protection of Michigan children from environmental pollution. This  
5 report shall be provided to the house and senate appropriations subcom-  
6 mittees on environmental quality and the house and senate fiscal agencies  
7 by September 30, 2000.

8       Sec. 1004. The funds appropriated in section 116 for settlement  
9 fund grants shall be allocated to the local unit of government where the  
10 settlement was reached. Specifically, 1/2 shall be provided to the city,  
11 township, or village housing the facility involved in the settlement, and  
12 1/2 provided to the county government. The funds shall be used for  
13 public environmental projects, or reclamation of contaminated or damaged  
14 land. The department shall allocate funds from this line, proportional  
15 to the settlement revenues received, only after all other settlement fund  
16 obligations in this act have been met.

### **GEOLOGICAL SURVEY**

Sec. 1101. Funds appropriated in section 105 shall not be used to grant a permit for deep well injection operations that could result in subsurface trespass or contamination.
