

**SUBSTITUTE FOR
SENATE BILL NO. 370**

A bill to make appropriations for the department of natural resources for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2000; to provide for the expenditure of those appropriations; to create funds and accounts; to require reports; to prescribe certain powers and duties of certain state agencies and officials; to authorize certain transfers by certain state agencies; and to provide for the disposition of fees and other income received by the various state agencies.

12 Sec. 201. (1) Pursuant to section 30 of article IX of the state
13 constitution of 1963, total state spending in this appropriation act is
14 \$211,226,800.00 and state appropriations to be paid to local units of
15 government are estimated at \$21,734,200.00. The following itemized

7 Sec. 202. The expenditures and fund sources authorized under this
8 act are subject to the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431,
9 MCL 18.1101 to 18.1594.

10 Sec. 203. As used in this act:

11 (a) "Commission" means the commission of natural resources.

12 (b) "DAG" means the United States department of agriculture.

13 (c) "Department" means the department of natural resources.

14 (d) "DOC" means the United States department of commerce.

15 (e) "DOD" means the United States department of defense.

16 (f) "DOE" means the United States department of energy.

17 (g) "DOI" means the United States department of interior.

18 (h) "DOI-MMS" means DOI minerals management service.

19 (i) "DOT" means the United States department of transportation.

20 (j) "EPA" means the United States environmental protection agency.

21 (k) "FTE" means full-time equated.

22 (l) "IDG" means interdepartmental grant.

23 (m) "IDT" means intradepartmental transfer.

24 (n) "IGLFC" means the international Great Lakes fish commission.

25 (o) "MDOT" means the Michigan department of transportation.

26 Sec. 204. (1) Beginning October 1, 1999, a hiring freeze is imposed
27 on the state classified civil service. State departments and agencies

1 are prohibited from hiring any new full-time state classified civil
2 service employees or prohibited from filling any vacant state classified
3 civil service positions. This hiring freeze does not apply to internal
4 transfers of classified employees from 1 position to another within a
5 department or to positions that are funded with 80% or more federal or
6 restricted funds.

7 (2) The state budget director shall grant exceptions to this hiring
8 freeze when the director believes that such a hiring freeze will result
9 in rendering a state department or agency unable to deliver basic
10 services. The state budget director shall report by the fifteenth of
11 each month to the chairpersons of the senate and house appropriations
12 committees the number of exclusions to the hiring freeze approved during
13 the previous month and the justification for each exclusion.

14 Sec. 205. The department of civil service shall bill departments
15 and agencies at the end of the first fiscal quarter for the 1% charges
16 authorized by section 5 of article XI of the state constitution of 1963.
17 Payments shall be made for the total amount of the billing by the end of
18 the second fiscal quarter.

19 Sec. 206. (1) From funds appropriated under part 1, the department
