- 4 (a) "DAG" means the United States department of agriculture.
- 5 (b) "DED" means the United States department of education.
- 6 (c) "DED-OBEMLA" means the DED office of bilingual education and
- 7 minority languages affairs.
- 8 (d) "DED-OESE" means the DED office of elementary and secondary
