# **HOUSE BILL No. 4305**

February 18, 1999, Introduced by Reps. Byl, Pappageorge, Mead, Toy, Kukuk, Caul, Jellema, Godchaux, Cameron Brown, Geiger, Jansen and Scranton and referred to the Committee on Appropriations.

#### EXECUTIVE BUDGET BILL

A bill to make appropriations for the department of environmental quality for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2000; to provide for the expenditure of those appropriations; to create funds and accounts; to require reports; to prescribe certain powers and duties of certain state agencies and officials; to authorize certain transfers by certain state agencies; and to provide for the disposition of fees and other income received by the various state agencies.

- 2 Sec. 402. The unexpended portion of the appropriation in part 1 for
- 3 the state cleanup program, environmental cleanup and redevelopment
- 4 program, emergency cleanup action, NPL-municipal landfill match grants,
- 5 and superfund cleanup projects is considered work project
- 6 appropriations and any unencumbered or unallotted funds are carried
- 7 forward into the succeeding fiscal year. The following is in compliance
- 8 with section 451(3) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL

- 20 Sec. 404. The department shall report by March 1, 2000, all of the
- 21 following information relative to allocations made in section 111 for
- 22 the environmental cleanup and redevelopment program, state cleanup,
- 23 emergency actions, superfund cleanup, and revitalization revolving loan
- 24 fund and the environmental projects under part 195 of the natural

- 23 (2) The Michigan underground storage tank financial assurance
- 24 policy board shall allocate the amount of the underground storage tank
- 25 financial assurance fund to be distributed to the department. If the
- 26 amount recommended by the board is less than that appropriated in
- 27 section 112, expenditures shall be adjusted accordingly.
- 28 (3) Included in the amounts appropriated in section 112 from the
- 29 Michigan underground storage tank financial assurance fund are amounts
- 30 sufficient to pay debt service costs on the bonds or notes issued
- 31 pursuant to part 215 of the natural resources and environmental

- 33 Sec. 502. The department shall provide reports to the state budget
- 34 director, the senate and house appropriations subcommittees on

- 1 storage tank financial assurance fund. Reports shall include the fund

# 18 **WASTE MANAGEMENT**

- 22 hazardous waste user fees.
- 23 (2) The department shall discontinue hazardous waste management

- 9 Sec. 802. Loans provided by the water pollution control revolving
- 10 fund pursuant to the appropriation in section 116 are to be repaid on
- 11 schedule and penalties shall be assigned for delinquent repayment as
- 12 provided in part 53 of the natural resources and environmental
- 13 protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.5301 to 324.5316.
