# **SENATE BILL No. 969**

## EXECUTIVE BUDGET BILL

February 3, 2000, Introduced by Senators MC MANUS, GAST and JOHNSON and referred to the Committee on Appropriations.

A bill to make appropriations for the department of agriculture for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2001; to provide for the expenditure of the appropriations; to create funds; to provide for the imposition of fees; to require reports, audits, and plans; to authorize certain transfers by certain state agencies; and to provide for the disposition of fees and other income received by certain state agencies.

29	Sec. 201. (1) Pursuant to section 30 of article IX of the

- (2) If it appears to the principal executive officer of a department or branch that state spending to local units of government will be less than the amount that was projected to be expended for any quarter under subsection (1), the principal executive officer shall immediately give notice of the approximate shortfall to the state budget director, the senate and house of representatives standing committees on appropriations, and the senate and house fiscal agencies.
- 9 Sec. 202. The expenditures and funding sources authorized under 10 this bill are subject to the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, 11 MCL 18.1101 to 18.1594.
  - Sec. 203. (1) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1, there is appropriated an amount not to exceed \$5,000,000.00 for federal contingency funds. These funds are not available for expenditure until they have been transferred to another line item in this bill pursuant to section 393(2) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1393.
  - (2) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1, there is appropriated an amount not to exceed \$6,000,000.00 for state restricted contingency funds. These funds are not available for expenditure until they have been transferred to another line item in this bill pursuant to section 393(2) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1393.
  - (3) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1, there is appropriated an amount not to exceed \$100,000.00 for local contingency funds. These funds are not available for expenditure until they have been transferred to another line item in this bill pursuant to section 393(2) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1393.
  - (4) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1, there is appropriated an amount not to exceed \$100,000.00 for private contingency funds. These funds are not available for expenditure until they have been transferred to another line item in this bill pursuant to section 393(2) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1393.
- Sec. 204. (1) Beginning October 1, a hiring freeze is imposed on the state classified civil service. State departments and agencies

- are prohibited from hiring any new full-time state classified civil service employees and prohibited from filling any vacant state classified civil service positions. This hiring freeze does not apply to internal transfers of classified employees from one position to another within a department or to positions that are funded with 80% or more federal or restricted funds.
  - (2) The state budget director shall grant exceptions to this hiring freeze when the state budget director believes that the hiring freeze will result in rendering a state department or agency unable to deliver basic services. The state budget director shall report by the 30<sup>th</sup> of each month to the chairpersons of the senate and house of representatives standing committees on appropriations the number of exceptions to the hiring freeze approved during the previous month and the reasons to justify the exception.
  - Sec. 205. The department of civil service shall bill departments and agencies at the end of the first fiscal quarter for the 1% charge authorized by section 5 of article XI of the state constitution of 1963. Payments shall be made for the total amount of the billing by the end of the second fiscal quarter.

- (a) "DAG" means the United States department of agriculture.
  - (b) "DAG-AMS" means the DAG agriculture marketing service.
- 23 (c) "DAG-APHIS" means the DAG animal and plant health inspection 24 service.
  - (d) "DAG-ERS-ARED" means the DAG economic research service agriculture and rural economy division.
    - (e) "DAG-FS" means the DAG forest service.
- 28 (f) "DAG-NRCS" means the DAG natural resources conservation 29 service.
  - (g) "Department" means the Michigan department of agriculture.
  - (h) "Director" means the director of the department.

- (m) "FTE" means full-time equated.
- 3 (n) "GREEEN" means generating research and extension to meet 4 environmental and economic needs.
  - (o) "HHS-FDA" means the HHS food and drug administration.

- (p) "IDG" means interdepartmental grant.
- 7 (q) "MDCIS" means the Michigan department of consumer industry 8 services.
  - (r) "MDCH" means the Michigan department of community health.
  - (s) "MDCIS (LCC)" means the MDCIS liquor control commission.
  - (t) "MDEQ" means the Michigan department of environmental quality.
  - Sec. 207. The unexpended and unencumbered balance of revenue deposited pursuant to section 20 (12) OF 1997 PA 73, MCL 731.320 for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2001, shall be appropriated to the Michigan agriculture equine industry development fund for distribution as set forth in section 20(4) to section 20(11) of 1997 PA 73, MCL 431.320.
  - Sec. 208. (1) Of the funds appropriated in part 1, the department may provide for indemnity as provided for pursuant to the animal industry act of 1987, 1988 PA 466, MCL 287.701 to 287.747, not to exceed \$10,000.00 per order from any line item for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2001. Before the department provides for an indemnification under this section, the department shall report the reason for the indemnification, the amount of the indemnification, and to whom the indemnification is to be paid. The report shall be given to each member of the house and senate appropriations subcommittees on agriculture and to the senate and house fiscal agencies.
  - (2) The department of agriculture shall make an indemnification payment for the fair market value of livestock that is killed by a wolf, if the kill is verified by the department of natural resources. The fair market value of the livestock shall be determined pursuant to the indemnification procedures prescribed in the animal industry act of 1987, 1988 PA 466, MCL 287.701 to 287.747. In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1, the department of agriculture is authorized to expend the funds received from the department of natural resources to reimburse the department of agriculture for all indemnification

1 payments made pursuant to this subsection.

Sec. 209. Sixty days before beginning any effort to privatize, the department shall submit a complete project plan to the appropriate subcommittees of the senate and house of representatives standing committees on appropriations and the senate and house fiscal agencies. The plan shall include the criteria under which the privatization initiative will be evaluated. The evaluation shall be completed and submitted to the appropriate subcommittees of the senate and house of representatives standing committees on appropriations and the senate and house fiscal agencies within 30 months.

Sec. 210. The department shall continue to pilot the use of the Internet to fulfill the reporting requirements in this bill. include transmission of reports via electronic mail to the recipients identified for each reporting requirement or it may include placement of reports on the Internet or on the Intranet. The appropriations subcommittee shall be notified in writing of the Internet/Intranet site of any such report.

Sec. 301. The appropriations in part 1 may be used for per diem payments to members of boards, committees, and commissions for a full day's board, committee, or commission work at which a quorum is present; for attending a hearing as authorized by the respective board, committee, or commission; or for performing official business as authorized by the respective board, committee, or commission. per diem payments shall be at a rate as follows:

  - (j) Fruit and vegetable inspection at shipping and termination points and processing plants.
  - Sec. 303. (1) From the appropriation in part 1 for project GREEEN, \$6,100,000.00 is allocated for a grant to an institution of higher education for the purpose of research and/or extension programs designed to address critical regulatory, food safety, economic, and environmental problems faced by Michigan's plant-based agriculture, forestry, and processing industries.
  - (2) A consortium of interested parties consisting of, but not limited to, representatives from the department, institutions of higher education, and agricultural commodity groups shall develop the research and/or extension program priorities described in subsection (1).
- 30 (3) Any unexpended balance of the appropriation for project GREEEN 31 in part 1 is considered a work project appropriation. Project GREEEN 32 projects will be accomplished by the use of contractual services with 33 an estimated completion date of September 30, 2003.
- (4) Not later than November 1, 2001, the grantee under subsection
  (1) shall submit to the house and senate appropriations subcommittees
  on agriculture and to the house and senate fiscal agencies a report

- for the immediately preceding fiscal year regarding project GREEEN projects. The report shall include, but is not limited to, the dollar amount of each project and a review of each project's performance and accomplishments.
- 5 (5) Indirect costs shall not be charged by an administering agency 6 against a grant funded under the allocation in subsection (1).

#### FOOD AND DAIRY

Sec. 401. The department shall monitor restaurant inspection and licensing functions carried out by local health departments to ensure uniform application and enforcement of state licensing standards. On or before September 30, 2001, the department shall report to the senate and house appropriations subcommittees on agriculture, the senate and house fiscal agencies, and the state budget director on local health department conformance with state restaurant licensing standards.

#### PESTICIDE AND PLANT PEST MANAGEMENT

Sec. 501. Of the funds appropriated in part 1 to the pesticide and plant pest management division, up to \$100,000.00 may be made available to the Michigan cooperative extension service for the purpose of training of applicators. Reimbursement shall be based on actual expenditures and revenue availability.

Sec. 502. From the appropriation in part 1 for the disease and pest intervention fund program, the department shall utilize these funds as needed to respond to exotic or regulatory pests or diseases.

Sec. 503. The department is authorized to enter into a cooperative agreement with a nonprofit foundation or agency associated with the gypsy moth slow-the-spread program in order to receive funds for managing plant pests.

## ENVIRONMENTAL STEWARDSHIP

Sec. 601. The amount appropriated in part 1 for grants to local conservation districts shall be used for providing financial assistance to all conservation districts in order to permit the districts to engage in programs that conserve soil resources and prevent and control soil erosion. All grants to local conservation districts shall be allocated according to a formula approved by the commission of agriculture.

- Sec. 602. (1) The department may expend the amount appropriated in part 1 for migrant labor housing grants for construction of new migrant labor housing. Project grants shall not exceed \$4,000.00 per unit. An applicant is not eligible for more than a \$16,000.00 grant in any fiscal year. Units shall be equivalent in construction to units approved by the DAG-rural development agency for low interest construction loans and shall be not less than 484 square feet in size and be self-contained with a minimum of 1 bedroom, a kitchen, a flush toilet, a lavatory, and bathing facilities.
  - (2) Any unexpended migrant labor housing funds from the prior year shall be available for grants in the subsequent fiscal year.
- Sec. 603. (1) From the amounts appropriated in part 1 for migrant labor housing, no less than \$100,000.00 shall be allocated to a private, nonprofit entity for the purpose of providing matching grants for the improvement or new construction of migrant labor housing. The terms or requirements imposed on a recipient of a grant awarded for migrant labor housing improvement or new construction by a private, nonprofit entity shall be no less stringent than those imposed by the department on recipients of similar grants awarded by the department. An entity receiving funds under this section shall use no greater than 7% of the state allocation for the administration of this program.
- (2) A private nonprofit entity that receives an allocation to administer a migrant labor housing construction grant program shall give priority to grant applicants who are on the department's waiting list of applicants for migrant labor housing construction grants. The applicants for migrant labor construction grants administered by a nonprofit entity who are on the department's waiting list shall be served in the order in which they reside on the department's waiting list.
- Sec. 604. From the part 1 appropriation for local conservation districts, \$300,000.00 shall be allocated for district forestry programs to assist private forest land development. Allocations to districts will be made in accordance with a plan developed by the department of agriculture in cooperation with the forest management division of the department of natural resources.

## 36 MARKET DEVELOPMENT

- Sec. 701. Within the appropriations in part 1 for market development, \$448,400.00 is for the grape and wine industry council, from which the department may provide grants for the purposes as described in section 303 of the Michigan liquor control code of 1998, 1998 PA 58, MCL 436.1303.
  - Sec. 702. In any given year when insufficient amounts of Michigan surplus products are offered to the food bank council and accepted for distribution, unused funds may be applied by the food bank council for the direct purchase of foods from Michigan growers, manufacturers, or wholesalers.
- Sec. 703. (1) The \$100,000.00 appropriated in part 1 for the grown in Michigan program is to provide competitive grants to Michigan nonprofit organizations to raise in-state consumer awareness of Michigan grown commodities.
  - (2) The grants are to be made by the Michigan commission of agriculture on a competitive basis considering the following order of priority:
- 18 (a) Cooperative efforts by recognized, statewide, grower funded 19 organizations.
- 20 (b) The number of consumers made aware of the benefits of Michigan grown commodities.
- (c) The number of Michigan grown products encompassed in the proposal.
  - (d) The amount of the match.

  - (4) Each grant shall be matched equally with grantees' funds. Inkind contributions shall not be considered as matching funds
- Sec. 704. Indirect costs may not be charged against the future farmers of America grant in part 1 by any administering agency.
- 31 Sec. 705. The amount appropriated in part 1 for Michigan 32 festivals shall be allocated to the Michigan festivals and events
- 33 association for the purpose of promoting commodity related festivals
- 34 on a statewide basis. The allocation to the Michigan festivals and
- 35 events association is contingent upon the association providing
- 36 at least a 100% cash or in-kind match.

#### FAIRS AND EXPOSITIONS

Sec. 801. The department shall submit a report each month for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2001, to the state budget director, the senate and house standing committees on appropriations, and the senate and house fiscal agencies that sets forth the simulcasting revenues generated in the preceding month by each licensed track and the amount received from license fees.

Sec. 802. (1) The appropriation of \$291,600.00 in part 1 for standardbred purses and supplements - fairs/licensed tracks is intended to provide state purse supplements for 4 races at state licensed pari-mutuel horse racing tracks. The purse supplements are to be used for races comprised only of Michigan-bred horses segregated into a 4-year-old colt trot division, a 4-year-old filly trot division, a 4-year-old colt pace division, and a 4-year-old filly pace division.

16 (2) The appropriation in part 1 for licensed tracks - light horse 17 racing shall be allocated as follows:

Arabian and Appaloosa horse racing . . . . . . \$ 20,500.00 Quarter horse racing . . . . . . . . . . . . . . . \$ 61,300.00

Sec. 803. Included in the appropriation made in part 1 for the thoroughbred program is \$30,500.00 for the Michigan united thoroughbred breeders and owners association to conduct a thoroughbred yearling show. The Michigan united thoroughbred breeders and owners association shall submit to the department an itemized list of expenses showing that the expenses of the yearling show were paid.

Sec. 804. From the funds appropriated in part 1 for thoroughbred owners' awards, the department shall develop a program to provide for thoroughbred owners' awards that will be given to owners of Michigan-bred horses finishing first in nonrestricted races at licensed parimutuel tracks in Michigan.

Sec. 805. The \$78,200.00 appropriated in part 1 for draft horse shows shall be allocated in equal amounts to the Can-Am draft horse show held at the Michigan state fairgrounds and the Great Lakes draft horse show held at Michigan State University.

Sec. 806. A county fair, district fair, 4-H fair, or state fair receiving funds in part 1 to be used for prizes or awards, in whole or

- in part, as a condition precedent to the receiving of the funds for 1 2 those purposes, shall publish the rules relative to the prizes, 3 awards, and deadlines for entries eligible for the funds in their 4 official premium books or lists relative to the prizes or awards. 5 aggrieved exhibitor may make a written complaint to the fair within 10 days after the fair ends. If the fair has not satisfactorily settled 6 7 the grievance within 45 days after it is submitted to the fair, the 8 aggrieved person may file the complaint with the department and the 9 department shall investigate the complaint and make a finding of fact 10 regarding the complaint and take appropriate action regarding the 11 complaint.
  - Sec. 807. Of the amount appropriated in part 1 for standardbred purses and supplements fairs/licensed tracks, a sufficient amount is appropriated to provide for overnight purse supplements pursuant to the horse racing law of 1995, 1995 PA 279, MCL 431.301 to 431.336.
- Sec. 808. Of the amount appropriated in part 1 for premiums, \$11,400.00 shall be expended as a grant for the Michigan horse show association - fall youth show at the Michigan exposition and fairgrounds.
- 20 Sec. 809. From the appropriations for premiums - county and state 21 fairs in part 1, \$120,000.00 shall be awarded through a competitive 22 grant program to local, regional, or state fairs or expositions to promote youth involvement and adult exhibitions in the animal 23 24 agriculture industry. Appropriate exhibition classes for youth shall 25 be developed that encourage a production exhibit for which premium awards may be paid. The age for youth exhibitors shall be determined 26 by the standards of the association requesting the grant or, if 27 standards do not exist, the age for youth exhibitors shall be ages 9 28 29 through 21. Implementation of the latest technologies into the 30 evaluation of the animals shall be encouraged in the production 31 exhibit. Adult exhibitions should focus on the performance or end product, or both, with the appropriate technologies used to enhance 32 33 placings and the awarding of premiums.

## 34 OFFICE OF RACING COMMISSIONER

35 Sec. 901. The racing commissioner may pay rewards of not more 36 than \$5,800.00 to a person who provides information that results in

- 1 the arrest and conviction on a felony or misdemeanor charge for a
