

SENATE BILL No. 972

EXECUTIVE BUDGET BILL

February 3, 2000, Introduced by Senators BENNETT, GAST, NORTH, MC MANUS,
JOHNSON and A. SMITH and referred to the Committee on Appropriations.

A bill to make appropriations for the department of environmental quality for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2001; to provide for the expenditure of those appropriations; to create funds and accounts; to require reports; to prescribe certain powers and duties of certain state agencies and officials; to authorize certain transfers by certain state agencies; and to provide for the disposition of fees and other income received by the various state agencies.

6 PROVISIONS CONCERNING APPROPRIATIONS

7 **GENERAL SECTIONS**

8 Sec. 201. (1) Pursuant to section 30 of article IX of the state
9 constitution of 1963, total state spending under part 1 for fiscal
10 year 2000-2001 is \$257,838,600.00 and state appropriations to be paid
11 to local units of government are as follows:

12 DEPARTMENT OF ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY

13 GRANTS

14 Grants to counties - air pollution \$ 2,854,900

15 Septage waste compliance program 200,000

16 Scrap tire grants 600,000

17 Noncommunity water grants 1,400,000

19 Drinking water grants 1,330,000

20 TOTAL \$ 6,519,900

21 (2) If it appears to the principal executive officer of a
22 department or branch that state spending to local units of government
23 will be less than the amount that was projected to be expended for any
24 quarter under subsection (1), the principal executive officer shall
25 immediately give notice of the approximate shortfall to the state
26 budget director, the senate and house of representatives standing
27 committees on appropriations, and the senate and house fiscal
28 agencies.

29 Sec. 202. The expenditures and funding sources authorized under

1 this bill are subject to the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431,
2 MCL 18.1101 to 18.154.

3 Sec. 203. As used in this bill:

4 (a) "CESARS" means chemical evaluation search and retrieval
5 system.

6 (b) "Department" means the Michigan department of environmental
7 quality.

8 (c) "FEMA" means the federal emergency management agency.

9 (d) "FTE" means full-time equated.

10 (e) "GIS" means geographic information system.

11 (f) "IDG" means interdepartmental grant.

12 (g) "IDT" means intradepartmental transfer.

13 (h) "MDCH" means the Michigan department of community health.

14 (i) "MDOT" means the Michigan department of transportation.

15 (j) "MDSP" means the Michigan department of state police.

16 Sec. 204. (1) Beginning October 1, a hiring freeze is imposed on
17 the state classified civil service. State departments and
18 agencies are prohibited from hiring any new full-time state classified
19 civil service employees and prohibited from filling any vacant state
20 classified civil service positions. This hiring freeze does not apply
21 to internal transfers of classified employees from one position to
22 another within a department or to positions that are funded with 80%
23 or more federal or restricted funds.

24 (2) The state budget director shall grant exceptions to this
25 hiring freeze when the state budget director believes that the hiring
26 freeze will result in rendering a state department or agency unable to
27 deliver basic services. The state budget director shall report by the
28 30TH of each month to the chairpersons of the senate and house of
29 representatives standing committees on appropriations the number of
30 exceptions to the hiring freeze approved during the previous month and

1 the reasons to justify the exception.

2 Sec. 205. The department of civil service shall bill the
3 department at the end of the first fiscal quarter for the 1% charge
4 authorized by section 5 of article XI of the state constitution of
5 1963. Payments shall be made for the total amount of the billing
6 by the end of the second fiscal quarter.

7 Sec. 206. (1) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1
8 there is appropriated an amount not to exceed \$30,000,000.00 for
9 federal contingency funds. These funds are not available for
10 expenditure until they have been transferred to another line item in
11 this bill pursuant to section 393(2) of the management and budget
12 act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1393.

13 (2) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1, there is
14 appropriated an amount not to exceed \$5,000,000.00 for state
15 restricted contingency funds. These funds are not available for
16 expenditure until they have been transferred to another line item in
17 this bill pursuant to section 393(2) of the management and budget act,
18 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1393.

19 (3) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1, there is
20 appropriated an amount not to exceed \$100,000.00 for local contingency
21 funds. These funds are not available for expenditure until they
22 have been transferred to another line item in this bill pursuant to
23 section 393(2) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL
24 18.1393.

25 (4) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1, there is
26 appropriated an amount not to exceed \$100,000.00 for private
27 contingency funds. These funds are not available for expenditure
28 until they have been transferred to another line item in this bill
29 pursuant to section 393(2) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA
30 431, MCL 18.1393.

1 Sec. 207. The department shall provide the state budget director,
2 the subcommittees on natural resources and environmental quality of
3 the house and senate appropriations committees, and the senate and
4 house fiscal agencies with an annual report on restricted fund
5 balances, projected revenues, and expenditures.

6 Sec. 208. (1) In addition to the funds appropriated for the
7 environmental cleanup and redevelopment program listed in part 1, the
8 department of environmental quality is authorized to expend amounts
9 remaining from prior fiscal year appropriations to meet
10 funding needs of legislatively approved sites.

11 (2) Unexpended and unencumbered amounts remaining from
12 appropriations from the environmental protection bond fund contained
13 in 1989 PA 180, 1990 PA 55, 1990 PA 194, 1991 PA 31, 1991 PA 160, 1993
14 PA 74, 1993 PA 353, 1994 PA 442, 1996 PA 353, and 1997 PA 114 are
15 appropriated for expenditure for any site listed in this bill and any
16 site listed in the public acts referenced in this section.

17 (3) Unexpended and unencumbered amounts remaining from
18 appropriations from the cleanup and redevelopment fund and unclaimed
19 bottle deposits fund contained in 1996 PA 319, 1997 PA 113, 1997 PA
20 114, and 1998 PA 292, and 1999 PA 125 are appropriated for expenditure
21 for any site listed in this bill and any site listed in the public
22 acts referenced in this section.

23 Sec. 209. The department shall continue to pilot the use of the
24 Internet to fulfill the reporting requirements in this bill. This may
25 include transmission of reports via electronic mail to the recipients
26 identified for each reporting requirement or it may include placement
27 of reports on the Internet or on the Intranet. The appropriations
28 subcommittee shall be notified in writing of the Internet/Intranet
29 site of any such report.

30 Sec. 210. Sixty days before beginning any effort to privatize,

1 the department shall submit a complete project plan to the appropriate
2 subcommittees of the senate and house of representatives standing
3 committees on appropriations and the senate and house fiscal agencies.
4 The plan shall include the criteria under which the privatization
5 initiative will be evaluated. The evaluation shall be completed and
6 submitted to the appropriate subcommittees of the senate and house of
7 representatives standing committees on appropriations and the senate
8 and house fiscal agencies within 30 months.

9 Sec. 211. (1) The department shall report all of the following
10 information relative to allocations made in part 1 for the
11 environmental cleanup and redevelopment program, state cleanup,
12 emergency actions, superfund cleanup, the leaking underground storage
13 tank cleanup program, and the environmental protection bond projects
14 under section 19508(7) of the natural resources and environmental
15 protection act 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.19508, to the state budget
16 director, the senate and house of representatives appropriations
17 subcommittees on environmental quality, and the senate and house
18 fiscal agencies:

19 (a) The name and location of the site for which an allocation is
20 made.

21 (b) The nature of the problem encountered at the site.

22 (c) A brief description of how the problem will be resolved if the
23 allocation is made for a response activity.

24 (d) The estimated date that site closure activities will be
25 completed.

26 (e) The amount of the allocation, or the anticipated financing for
27 the site.

28 (f) A summary of the sites and the total amount of funds expended
29 at the sites at the conclusion of the fiscal year.

30 (g) The number of sites that would qualify as brownfields that

1 were redeveloped.

2 (2) The report prepared shall also include the status of all state
3 owned facilities that are on the list compiled under part 201 of the
4 natural resources and environmental protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL
5 324.20101 TO 324.20142.

6 (3) The report shall include the total amount of funds expended
7 during the fiscal year and the total amount of funds awaiting
8 expenditure.

9 (4) The department shall report the total amount of bond issued
10 for the environmental protection bond program issued pursuant to 1994
11 PA 451, MCL 324.19301 to 324.19306 and the clean Michigan initiative
12 bonds issued pursuant to 1998 PA 294, MCL 324.95101 TO 324.95108.

13 (5) The report shall be made available by March 31 of each year.

14 **AIR QUALITY**

15 Sec. 301. From the funds appropriated in part 1, the department
16 shall report on the status of implementation planning and permit
17 backlog reduction activities under part 55 of the natural resources
18 and environmental protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.5501
19 to 324.5542, including status of revenue collections, on an annual
20 basis. The report shall be provided to the state budget director, the
21 house of representatives and senate appropriations subcommittees on
22 environmental quality, and the standing committees of the house of
23 representatives and the senate that are responsible for issues
24 pertaining to air quality, on or before March 1, 2001.

25 **SURFACE WATER QUALITY**

26 Sec. 401. Of the funds appropriated in part 1 for surface water
27 programs, a minimum of \$250,000.00 shall be designated for grants to
28 local organizations for water quality monitoring activities.

29 **ENVIRONMENTAL RESPONSE**

30 Sec. 501. The unexpended portion of the appropriation in part 1

1 for the state cleanup program; environmental cleanup and redevelopment
2 program; emergency cleanup action; contaminated site investigations,
3 cleanup and revitalization; revitalization revolving loan program; and
4 superfund cleanup projects is considered work project appropriations
5 and any unencumbered or unallotted funds are carried forward into the
6 succeeding fiscal year. The following is in compliance with section
7 451a(1) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1451a:

8 (a) The purpose of the projects to be carried forward is to
9 provide contaminated site cleanup.

10 (b) The projects will be accomplished by contract.

11 (c) The total estimated cost of all projects is identified in
12 each line-item appropriation.

13 (d) The tentative completion date is September 30, 2005.

14 Sec. 502. Of the funds appropriated in part 1 as state match for
15 the superfund cleanup program, an amount not to exceed \$250,000.00
16 shall be expended as state match for the hazardous substance research
17 center.

18 **STORAGE TANKS**

19 Sec. 601. (1) The funds appropriated in part 1 from the Michigan
20 underground storage tank financial assurance fund for the purpose of
21 carrying out the duties and responsibilities as specified in part 215
22 of the natural resources and environmental protection act,
23 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.21501 to 324.21551, are considered work project
24 appropriations and any unencumbered funds are carried forward into the
25 succeeding fiscal year. The following is in compliance with section
26 451a(1) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1451a:

27 (a) The purpose of the projects to be carried forward is to carry
28 out the responsibilities of part 215 of the natural resources and
29 environmental protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.21501 to 324.21551.

30 (b) The projects will be accomplished by contract and state

1 employees.

2 (c) The total estimated cost is identified in a line-item
3 appropriation.

4 (d) The tentative completion date is September 30, 2005.

5 (2) The Michigan underground storage tank financial assurance
6 policy board shall allocate the amount of the underground storage tank
7 financial assurance fund to be distributed to the department. If the
8 amount recommended by the board is less than that appropriated in part
9 1, expenditures shall be adjusted accordingly.

10 (3) Included in the amounts appropriated in part 1 from the
11 Michigan underground storage tank financial assurance fund are amounts
12 sufficient to pay debt service costs on the bonds or notes issued
13 pursuant to part 215 of the natural resources and environmental
14 protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.21501 to 324.21551.

15 Sec. 602. The department shall annually report to the state
16 budget director, the senate and house of representatives
17 appropriations subcommittees on environmental quality, and the senate
18 and house fiscal agencies no later than October 31, 2001, on the
19 Michigan underground storage tank financial assurance fund. Reports
20 shall include the fund balance, estimate of available revenues, number
21 and dollar value of claims processed through September 30, 2000, and
22 total estimated claims liability through December 22, 2002.

23 Sec. 603. The unexpended portion of the appropriation in part 1
24 for the leaking underground storage tank cleanup program is
25 considered work project appropriations and any unencumbered or
26 unallotted funds are carried over into the succeeding fiscal year.
27 The following is in compliance with section 451a(1) of the management
28 and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1451a:

29 (a) The purpose of the projects to be carried over is to provide
30 for redevelopment and contaminated site cleanup.

1 (b) These projects will be accomplished by contract.

2 (c) The total estimated costs of all projects is identified in
3 each line-item appropriation.

4 (d) The tentative completion date for these projects is September
5 30, 2005.

6 **ENVIRONMENTAL ASSISTANCE**

7 Sec. 701. With funds appropriated in part 1, the department shall
8 continue to implement a community right-to-know project to facilitate
9 convenient public access to information about the performance of
10 individual facilities in complying with requirements of air, surface
11 water, waste management, storage tank, and environmental response
12 programs, and with any permits issued pursuant to these programs. The
13 project shall also facilitate convenient public access to information
14 about the overall quality of Michigan's air, water, groundwater, and
15 drinking water and the generation of municipal solid waste and
16 regulated hazardous waste. In implementing this section, the
17 department shall consult with interested stakeholders on a periodic
18 basis, including, but not limited to, industrial and environmental
19 group representatives.

20 Sec. 702. The appropriation in part 1 for low income community
21 wastewater assistance shall be provided to the Michigan community
22 action agency association. This appropriation enables the association
23 to maintain rural community assistance program services to all
24 Michigan counties.

25 **CRIMINAL INVESTIGATIONS**

26 Sec. 801. The department shall provide training in support of
27 local efforts to regulate solid waste disposal. Department
28 environmental conservation officers shall be directed to help train
29 law enforcement officers and other enforcement personnel to develop
30 community partnerships to combat illegal dumping at the local level.

1 **GRANTS**

2 Sec. 901. If a certified health department does not exist in a
3 city, county, or district or does not fulfill its responsibilities
4 under part 117 of the natural resources and environmental protection
5 act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.11701 to 324.11719, then the department may
6 spend funds appropriated in part 1 under the septage waste compliance
7 program in accordance with section 11716 of the natural resources and
8 environmental protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.11716.

9 Sec. 902. Loans provided by the water pollution control revolving
10 fund pursuant to the appropriation in part 1 are to be repaid on
11 schedule and penalties shall be assigned for delinquent repayment as
12 provided in part 53 of the natural resources and environmental
13 protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.5301 to 324.5316.
