Rep. Gene DeRossett, from the 55th District, offered the following invocation:

Why is it so much easier to pass laws and change legislation, rather than to change hearts, violent attitudes, and egos? May each of us here today take the time to learn and hear from You. Thank You for being patient with us as we try to respond to Your teachings on this journey called life. I was just given a memo stating that as we speak there is information that is not yet published. There has been another violent tragedy in Michigan. There has been a shooting in the Senior Center in Allen Park. We ask that You would be with these people. Amen.”
