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HOUSE SUBSTITUTE FOR

SENATE BILL NO. 989

(As passed the House, April 25, 2002) (As amended by the Senate, May 7, 2002)

A bill to amend 1994 PA 451, entitled

"Natural resources and environmental protection act,"

by amending sections 8302, 8303, 8304, 8305, 8306, 8309, 8310,

8311, 8312, 8313, 8314, 8317, 8318, 8319, 8322, 8327, 8329, 8330,

and 8333 (MCL 324.8302, 324.8303, 324.8304, 324.8305, 324.8306,

324.8309, 324.8310, 324.8311, 324.8312, 324.8313, 324.8314,

324.8317, 324.8318, 324.8319, 324.8322, 324.8327, 324.8329,

324.8330, and 324.8333), section 8319 as amended by 1996 PA 312,

and by adding sections 8307a, 8307b, 8307c, 8307d, 8307e, and

8307f; and to repeal acts and parts of acts.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF MICHIGAN ENACT:

Sec. 8302. (1) "Active ingredient" means an ingredient that
will prevent, destroy, repel, or mitigate pests, or that will act
as a plant regulator, defoliant, or desiccant or otherwise alter
the behavior of plants or products.

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- 1 (2) "Activity plan" means a plan for the mitigation of
 2groundwater contamination at a specific location, including a
 3time frame for implementation.
- 4 (3) "Adulterated" applies to a pesticide if its strength or 5purity is less than, or significantly greater than, the professed 6standard or quality as expressed on its labeling or under which 7it is sold; if a substance was substituted wholly or in part for 8a pesticide; or if a valuable constituent of the pesticide was 9wholly or in part abstracted.
- 10 (4) "Agricultural commodity" means a plant or part of a 11plant, or an animal or animal product, produced primarily for 12sale, consumption, propagation, or other use by human beings or 13animals.
- 14 (5) "Animal" means all vertebrate and invertebrate species,
 15including, but not limited to, human beings and other mammals,
 16birds, fish, and shellfish.
- (6) "ANTIMICROBIAL PESTICIDE" MEANS A PESTICIDE THAT IS INTENDED TO DISINFECT, SANITIZE, REDUCE, OR MITIGATE GROWTH OR DEVELOPMENT OF MICROBIAL ORGANISMS, AS DEFINED UNDER THE FEDERAL INSECTICIDE, FUNGICIDE, AND RODENTICIDE ACT, CHAPTER 125, 86 STAT. 973, 7 U.S.C. 136 TO 136i, 136j TO 136r, AND 136s TO 136y.
 - 17 (7) "APPLICATION SEASON" MEANS A TIME PERIOD OF PESTICIDE

 18APPLICATION, CONSISTENT WITH THE CATEGORY OF APPLICATION, WITHIN

 19A CALENDAR YEAR.
 - 20 (8) —(6) "Aquifer" means a geologic formation, a group of 21 formations, or a part of a formation capable of yielding a sig-22 nificant amount of groundwater to wells or springs.
 - 23 (9) -(7) "Aquifer sensitivity" means a hydrogeologic func-24tion representing the inherent abilities of materials surrounding 25the aquifer to attenuate the movement of pesticides into that 26aquifer.

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- 1 (10) -(8) "Avicide" means a substance or mixture of
 2substances PESTICIDE INTENDED for preventing, destroying,
 3repelling, or mitigating pest birds.
- 4 (11) -(9) "Building manager" means the person who is desig 5nated as being responsible for the building's pest management
 6program and to whom any reporting and notification shall be made
 7pursuant to this part or rules promulgated under this part.
- 8 (12) $\overline{}$ "Certified applicator" means $\overline{}$ a person AN INDI-9VIDUAL WHO IS authorized under this part to use and supervise the 10use of a restricted use pesticide.
- 11 (13) (11) "Commercial applicator" means a person who is

 12not a private agricultural applicator, whether that person is a

 13private agricultural applicator with respect to some uses or

 14not, who is required to be a registered or certified applicator

 15under this part, or who uses or supervises the use of a

 16restricted use pesticide or who holds himself or herself out to

 17the public as being in the business of applying pesticides. A

 18COMMERCIAL APPLICATOR DOES NOT INCLUDE A PERSON USING A PESTICIDE

 19FOR A PRIVATE AGRICULTURAL PURPOSE.
 - 20 (14) (12) "Commercial building" means any building or
 21portion of a building that is not a private residence where a
 22business is located and that is frequented by the public.
- 23 (15) -(13) "Confirmed contaminant" means a contaminant that
 24has been detected in at least 2 groundwater samples collected
 25from the same groundwater sampling point at an interval of
 26greater than 14 days.

1 (16) -(14) "Contaminant" means any pesticide originated
 2chemical, radionuclide, ion, synthetic organic compound,
 3microorganism, or waste that does not occur naturally in ground 4water or that naturally occurs at a lower concentration than

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6 (17) (15) "Contamination" means the direct or indirect
7introduction into groundwater of any contaminant caused in whole
8 or in part by human activity.

- 9 Sec. 8303. (1) "Defoliant" means a substance or mixture of 10substances intended for causing the leaves or foliage to drop 11from a plant, with or without causing abscission.
 - 12 (2) "Department" means the department of agriculture.
- 13 (3) "Desiccant" means a substance or mixture of substances
 14intended for artificially accelerating the drying of plant
 15tissue.
- 16 (4) "Device" means an instrument or contrivance, other than
 17a firearm, which is intended for trapping, destroying, repelling,
 18or mitigating a pest; but does not include equipment used for the
 19application of pesticides when sold separately.
- 20 (5) "Direct supervision" means that a certified applicator
 21is supervising the application of a pesticide and is DIRECTING
 22THE APPLICATION OF A PESTICIDE WHILE BEING physically present at
 23the time and place the pesticide is being applied DURING THE
 24APPLICATION. However, direct supervision by a private agricul25tural applicator who is supervising the application of a
 26restricted use pesticide for an agricultural purpose means
 27either that a certified applicator shall be OF THE FOLLOWING:

- 1 (A) THE PRIVATE AGRICULTURAL APPLICATOR IS in the same field

 2 or at the same location with that applicator as he or she

 3 applies the DIRECTING THE APPLICATION OF A restricted use pesti
 4 cide or that the BY AN UNCERTIFIED APPLICATOR.
- 5 (B) THE private agricultural applicator supervises at all 6times the UNCERTIFIED applicator and directly supervises repre7sentative aspects of each IS PHYSICALLY PRESENT DURING THE ini8tial RESTRICTED USE PESTICIDE application process on an agri9cultural commodity or agricultural structure, including the
 10calibration, mixing, application, operator safety, and disposal.

11 aspects of the process.

- 12 (6) "Director" means the director of the department of agri13culture or his or her authorized representative.
 - 14 (7) "Distribute" means to offer for sale, hold for sale,
 15sell, barter, ship, OR deliver for shipment, or receive and
 16having so received deliver or offer to deliver, pesticides in
 17this state.
- 18 (8) "Envelope monitoring" means monitoring of groundwater in 19areas adjacent to properties where groundwater is contaminated to 20determine the concentration and spatial distribution of the con21taminant in the aquifer.
- 22 (9) "Environment" includes water, air, land, and all plants
 23and human beings and other animals living therein, and the inter24relationships that exist among them.
- 25 (10) "EPA" means the United States environmental protection 26agency.

1 (11) "FIFRA" means the federal insecticide, fungicide, and
2rodenticide act, chapter 125, 86 Stat. 973, 7 U.S.C. 136 to 136i
3and 136j -136y 136r AND 136s TO 136y.

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- 4 (12) "Fungi" means all nonchlorophyll bearing thallophytes;
 5that is, all nonchlorophyll bearing plants of a lower order than
 6mosses and liverworts, as for example rusts, smuts, mildews,
 7molds, yeasts, and bacteria, except those in or on other animals,
 8and except those in or on processed foods, beverages, or
 9pharmaceuticals.
- 10 (13) "General use pesticide" means a pesticide that is not
 11 classified as a restricted use pesticide.
- 12 (14) "Groundwater" means underground water within the zone

 13of saturation.
- 15 "Groundwater protection rule" means a rule promulgated
 15 under this part that defines a minimum operational standard for
 16 structures, activities, and procedures that may have or may con17 tribute to the contamination of groundwater and that defines the
 18 scope of a groundwater protection rule, the region of implementa19 tion of a groundwater protection rule, and implementation period
 20 for those rules. As used in this subsection:
- 21 (a) "Structures, activities, and procedures" includes, but
 22is not limited to, mixing, loading, and rinse pads, application
 23equipment, application timing, application rates, crop rotation,
 24and pest control thresholds.
- 25 (b) "The scope of a groundwater protection rule" may define
 26a particular pesticide, structure, activity, or procedure or may
 27define pesticides containing specific ingredients.

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- 1 (c) "The region of implementation of a groundwater
 2protection rule" may include specific soil types or aquifer sen3sitivity regions or any other geographic boundary.
- 4 (16) "Groundwater resource protection level" means a maximum 5contaminant level, health advisory level, or, if the EPA has not 6established a maximum contaminant level or a health advisory 7level, a level established by the director of public health using 8risk assessment protocol established by rule under this part.
- 9 (17) "Groundwater resource response level" means 20% of the 10groundwater resource protection level. In cases where 20% of the 11groundwater resource protection level is less than the method 12detection limit, the method detection limit shall serve as the 13groundwater resource response level.
- Sec. 8304. (1) "Inert ingredient" means an ingredient that

 15is not -an active. -ingredient.
 - 16 (2) "Ingredient statement" means:
- 17 (a) A statement of the name and percentage of each active
 18ingredient together with the total percentage of the inert ingre19dients in the pesticide.
- 20 (b) When the pesticide contains arsenic in any form, the 21ingredient statement shall include percentages of total and water 22soluble arsenic, each calculated as elemental arsenic.
- 23 (3) "Insect" means any of the numerous small invertebrate
 24animals generally having the body more or less obviously segment25ed, for the most part belonging to the class insecta, comprising
 266-legged, usually winged forms, as for example beetles, bugs,
 27bees, and flies, and to other allied classes or arthropods whose

1members are wingless and usually have more than 6 legs, as for
2example spiders, mites, ticks, centipedes, and wood lice.

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- 3 (4) "Insecticide" means a substance or mixture of
 4substances PESTICIDE intended for preventing, destroying, repel5ling, or mitigating an insect.
 - 6 (5) "INTEGRATED PEST MANAGEMENT" MEANS A PEST MANAGEMENT
 7SYSTEM THAT USES ALL SUITABLE TECHNIQUES IN A TOTAL MANAGEMENT
 8SYSTEM TO PREVENT PESTS FROM REACHING UNACCEPTABLE LEVELS OR TO
 9REDUCE EXISTING PEST POPULATIONS TO ACCEPTABLE LEVELS.
- 10 (6) (5) "Label" means the written, printed, or graphic

 11matter on or attached to the pesticide or device or any of its

 12containers or wrappers.
- 13 (7) —(6)— "Labeling" means the label and all other written,
 14printed, or graphic matter accompanying the pesticide or device,
 15or to which reference is made on the label or in literature
 16accompanying the pesticide or device, and all applicable modifi17cations or supplements to official publications of the EPA, the
 18United States departments of agriculture and interior, the United
 19States departments of education and health and human services,
 20state experiment stations, state agricultural colleges, and other
 21similar federal or state institutions or agencies authorized by
 22law to conduct research in the field of pesticides.
- 23 (8) -(7) "Maximum contaminant level" means that term as it 24is defined in title XIV of the public health service act, chapter 25373, 88 Stat. 1660, 42 U.S.C. 300f to 300j-3, 300j-4 to 300j-9 26and 300j-11 to 300j-25, and regulations promulgated under that 27act.

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1 (9) (8) "Method detection limit" means the minimum

2 concentration of a substance that can be measured and reported

3 with 99% confidence that the analyte concentration is greater

4 than 0 and is determined from analysis of a sample in a given

5 matrix that contains the analyte.

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- 10 (10) $\overline{(9)}$ "Minor use" means the use of a pesticide on a 11crop, animal, or site where any of the following exist:
- (a) The total United States acreage for the crop or site is 13less than 300,000 acres.
 - 14 (b) The acreage expected to be treated nationally as a 15result of that use is less than 300,000 acres annually.
- 16 (c) The use does not provide sufficient economic incentive
 17to support the initial registration or continuing registration of
 18the use.
- 19 (11) (10) "Misbranded" applies to any pesticide or device 20if it is an imitation of or is offered for sale under the name of 21another pesticide, or if its labeling does not comply with label-22ing requirements of this part, the rules promulgated under this 23part, FIFRA, or regulations promulgated under FIFRA.
- 24 (12) (11) "Molluscicide" means a substance or mixture of 25substances PESTICIDE intended for preventing, destroying, repel-26ling, or mitigating a mollusk.

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- 1 Sec. 8305. (1) "Nematode" means invertebrate animals of the
 2phylum nemathelminthes and class nematoda, which are unsegmented
 3roundworms with elongated, fusiform, or sac-like bodies covered
 4with cuticle that inhabit soil, water, plants, or plant parts. A
 5nematode may also be called a nema or eelworm.
- 6 (2) "Person" , when referring to a certified or registered

 7 applicator, means individuals only MEANS AN INDIVIDUAL, PARTNER
 8 SHIP, CORPORATION, ASSOCIATION, GOVERNMENTAL ENTITY, OR OTHER

 9 LEGAL ENTITY.
- 10 (3) "Pest" means an insect, rodent, nematode, fungus, weed,
 11 and other forms of terrestrial or aquatic plant or animal life or
 12 virus, bacteria, or other microorganism, except viruses, fungi,
 13 bacteria, nematodes, or other microorganisms in or on living
 14 animals, or any other organism that the director declares to be
 15 a pest under section 8322, EXCEPT VIRUSES, FUNGI, BACTERIA, NEMA16 TODES, OR OTHER MICROORGANISMS IN OR ON LIVING ANIMALS.
- 18 intended for preventing, destroying, repelling, or mitigating
 19 pests or intended for use as a plant regulator, defoliant, or
 20 desiccant. PESTICIDE DOES NOT INCLUDE LIQUID CHEMICAL STERILANT
 21 PRODUCTS, INCLUDING ANY STERILANT OR SUBORDINATE DISINFECTANT
 22 CLAIMS ON SUCH PRODUCTS, FOR USE ON A CRITICAL OR SEMI-CRITICAL
 23 DEVICE, AS DEFINED IN SECTION 201 OF THE FEDERAL FOOD, DRUG, AND
 24 COSMETIC ACT, CHAPTER 675, 52 STAT. 1040, 21 U.S.C. 321. AS USED
 25 IN THIS SUBSECTION:

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- 1 (A) "CRITICAL DEVICE" INCLUDES ANY DEVICE THAT IS INTRODUCED 2DIRECTLY INTO THE HUMAN BODY, EITHER INTO OR IN CONTACT WITH THE 3BLOODSTREAM OR NORMALLY STERILE AREAS OF THE BODY.
- 4 (B) "SEMI-CRITICAL DEVICE" INCLUDES ANY DEVICE THAT CONTACTS
 5INTACT MUCOUS MEMBRANES BUT THAT DOES NOT ORDINARILY PENETRATE
 6THE BLOOD BARRIER OR OTHERWISE ENTER NORMALLY STERILE AREAS OF
 7THE BODY.
- 8 (5) "PESTICIDE REGISTRATION RENEWAL" MEANS THE REGISTRATION
 9OF ANY PESTICIDE THAT WAS PREVIOUSLY REGISTERED BY THE
 10DEPARTMENT.
- 11 (6) (5) "Place of business" means a location that is

 12staffed by at least 1 person who independently, without supervi
 13sion, applies SELLS OR USES pesticides or who supervises

 14others in the WITHIN THIS STATE OR WHERE A PERSON EXERCISES THE

 15RIGHT TO CONTROL OTHERS IN THE SALE OR use of pesticides WITHIN

 16THIS STATE.
- 17 (7) —(6)— "Plant regulator" means a substance or mixture of 18 substances intended through physiological action for accelerating 19 or retarding the rate of growth or rate of maturation or for oth-20 erwise altering the behavior of plants or the produce of plants.

 21 Plant regulator does not include substances to the extent that 22 they are intended as plant nutrients, trace elements, nutritional 23 chemicals, plant inoculants, and soil amendments.
- 24 (8) (7)— "Private agricultural applicator" means a certi-25fied applicator who uses or supervises the use of a restricted 26use pesticide for a private agricultural purpose.

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- 1 (9) (8) "Private agricultural purpose" means the

 2APPLICATION OF A PESTICIDE FOR THE production of an agricultural

 3commodity on property EITHER OF THE FOLLOWING:
- 4 (A) PROPERTY owned or rented by that THE person APPLYING

 5THE PESTICIDE or BY his or her employer. or
- 6 (B) PROPERTY OF ANOTHER PERSON if applied without compensa-7tion, other than trading of personal services between producers 8of agricultural commodities. , on the property of another

9person.

- 10 (10) -(9) "Protect health and environment" means protection

 11against any unreasonable adverse effects on the environment.
- 12 (11) —(10)— "Public building" means a building that is owned 13 or operated by a federal, state, or local government, including 14 public universities.
- 15 Sec. 8306. (1) "Registered applicator" means a person—AN

 16INDIVIDUAL who is not a certified applicator and who is 1 or

 17more of the following: (a) Authorized—AUTHORIZED to apply gen
 18eral and restricted—use pesticides for a PRIVATE OR commercial

 19purpose as provided in this part and in the rules promulgated

 20under this part.
- 21 (b) Applies pesticides as a scheduled and required work

 22assignment in the course of his or her employment on the property

 23of another person for any purpose.
- 24 (c) Applies pesticides for a private agricultural purpose.
 - 25 (2) "Ready-to-use pesticide" means a pesticide that is 26applied directly from its original container consistent with 27label directions, such as an aerosol insecticide or -rodent

1RODENTICIDE bait box, and PACK that does not require mixing or 2loading prior to application.

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- 3 (3) "Registrant" means a person who has registered IS
 4REQUIRED TO REGISTER a pesticide pursuant to this part.
- 5 (4) "Restricted use pesticide" means a pesticide
 6 formulation classified for restricted use by the EPA or the
 7director.
- 8 (5) "Restricted use pesticide dealer" means a person engaged
 9in distributing, selling, or offering for sale restricted use
 10pesticides to the ultimate user.
- 11 (6) "Rodenticide" means a substance or mixture of

 12substances PESTICIDE intended for preventing, destroying, repel13ling, or mitigating rodents. or any other vertebrate animal.
- 14 (7) "State management plan" means a plan for the protection

 15of groundwater as required by the EPA's labeling requirements for

 16pesticides and devices, 40 C.F.R. part 156.
- 17 (7) (8) "School" means public and private schools, grades

 18kindergarten through the twelfth grade.
- 19 (8) -(9) "Supervise" means the act or process of a certi20fied applicator in directing the application of a pesticide by
 21a competent person who is under his or her instruction and con22trol and for whose actions the certified applicator is responsi23ble, even though the certified applicator is not WITH OR WITHOUT
 24BEING physically present at the time and place the pesticide is
 25applied DURING THE APPLICATION.
- 26 (9) (10) "Unreasonable adverse effect on the environment" 27means any unreasonable risk to human beings or the environment,

- 1taking into account the economic, social, and environmental costs
 2and benefits of the use of a pesticide.
- 3 (10) (11) "Use of a pesticide" means the loading, mixing,
 4applying, storing, transporting, and disposing of a pesticide.
- 5 (11) $\overline{(12)}$ "Vendor" means a person who sells or distributes
 6 pesticides.
- 7 (12) "VIOLATES THIS PART" OR "VIOLATION OF THIS PART" MEANS 8A VIOLATION OF THIS PART, A RULE PROMULGATED UNDER THIS PART, OR 9AN ORDER ISSUED UNDER THIS PART.
 - 10 (13) "Weed" means a plant which grows where it is not 11wanted.
- 12 SEC. 8307A. (1) EVERY PESTICIDE DISTRIBUTED, SOLD, EXPOSED,
 130R OFFERED FOR SALE IN THIS STATE SHALL BE REGISTERED WITH THE
 14DIRECTOR PURSUANT TO THIS PART. THE REGISTRATION SHALL BE SUB15MITTED ON A FORM PROVIDED BY THE DIRECTOR AND SHALL BE RENEWED
 16ANNUALLY BEFORE JULY 1. THE DIRECTOR SHALL NOT REGISTER A PESTI17CIDE UNDER THIS PART UNLESS THE REGISTRANT HAS PAID ALL GROUNDWA18TER PROTECTION FEES AND LATE FEES REQUIRED UNDER PART 87, REGIS19TRATION FEES UNDER THIS PART, AND ANY ADMINISTRATIVE FINES
 20IMPOSED UNDER THIS PART.
- 21 (2) A PESTICIDE IS CONSIDERED DISTRIBUTED, SOLD, EXPOSED, OR 22OFFERED FOR SALE IN THIS STATE WHEN THE OFFER TO SELL EITHER 23ORIGINATES WITHIN THIS STATE OR IS DIRECTED BY THE OFFEROR TO 24PERSONS IN THIS STATE AND RECEIVED BY THOSE PERSONS.
 - 25 (3) IF A REGISTRANT DISTRIBUTES IDENTICAL PESTICIDES UNDER 26MORE THAN 1 BRAND NAME, OR DISTRIBUTES MORE THAN 1 PESTICIDE

- 1FORMULATION, EACH BRAND OR FORMULATION SHALL BE REGISTERED AS A 2SEPARATE PRODUCT.
- 3 (4) A REGISTRANT SHALL NOT REGISTER A PESTICIDE THAT CON-4TAINS A SUBSTANCE THAT IS REQUIRED TO BE REGISTERED WITH THE 5DEPARTMENT UNLESS THAT SUBSTANCE IS ALSO REGISTERED WITH THE 6DEPARTMENT.
- 7 (5) A PESTICIDE REGISTRATION APPLICANT SHALL SUBMIT TO THE 8DIRECTOR A COMPLETE COPY OF THE PESTICIDE LABELING AND THE FOL-9LOWING, IN A FORMAT PRESCRIBED BY THE DIRECTOR:
- 10 (A) THE NAME AND ADDRESS OF THE APPLICANT AND THE NAME AND 11ADDRESS OF THE PERSON WHOSE NAME WILL APPEAR ON THE LABEL, IF 12OTHER THAN THE APPLICANT.
- 13 (B) THE FULL PRODUCT NAME OF THE PESTICIDE AND THE EPA REG-14ISTRATION NUMBER.
- 15 (C) OTHER INFORMATION CONSIDERED NECESSARY BY THE DIRECTOR.
- 16 (6) THE APPLICANT SHALL SUBMIT A COMPLETE FORMULA OF THE
 17PESTICIDE PROPOSED FOR REGISTRATION, INCLUDING THE ACTIVE AND
 18INERT INGREDIENTS, WHEN REQUESTED BY THE DIRECTOR AND NECESSARY
 19FOR THE DIRECTOR TO EXECUTE HIS OR HER DUTIES UNDER THIS PART.
 20THE DIRECTOR SHALL NOT USE ANY INFORMATION RELATIVE TO FORMULAS
 21OF PRODUCTS, TRADE SECRETS, OR OTHER INFORMATION OBTAINED UNDER
 22THIS PART FOR HIS OR HER OWN ADVANTAGE OR REVEAL SUCH INFORMA23TION, OTHER THAN TO HIS OR HER AUTHORIZED REPRESENTATIVE, THE
 24EPA, THE DEPARTMENT OF ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY, THE DEPARTMENT OF
 25COMMUNITY HEALTH, A COURT OF THE STATE IN RESPONSE TO A SUBPOENA,
 26A LICENSED PHYSICIAN, OR IN AN EMERGENCY TO A PHARMACIST OR OTHER
 27PERSONS QUALIFIED TO ADMINISTER ANTIDOTES.

- 1 SEC. 8307B. (1) A PESTICIDE THAT HAS BEEN REGISTERED WITH
 2THE DEPARTMENT MUST CONTINUE TO BE REGISTERED AS LONG AS THE PES3TICIDE REMAINS IN THE CHANNELS OF TRADE IN THIS STATE. IT IS THE
 4REGISTRANT'S RESPONSIBILITY TO MAINTAIN THE PESTICIDE
 5REGISTRATION.
- 6 (2) IT IS A VIOLATION OF THIS PART TO CONTINUE TO DISTRIBUTE
 7A PESTICIDE FOR WHICH A RENEWAL APPLICATION, INCLUDING THE
 8REQUIRED FEE, HAS NOT BEEN RECEIVED BY THE DIRECTOR ON OR BEFORE
 9THE LAST DAY IN JUNE. IT IS THE RESPONSIBILITY OF THE REGISTRANT
