

**HOUSE SUBSTITUTE FOR
SENATE BILL NO. 1104**

A bill to make appropriations for the department of environmental quality for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2003; to provide for the expenditure of those appropriations; to create certain funds and accounts; to require certain reports; to prescribe the powers and duties of certain state agencies and officials; to authorize certain transfers by certain state agencies; and to provide for the disposition of fees and other income received by the various state agencies.

8 Sec. 201. Pursuant to section 30 of article IX of the state consti-
9 tution of 1963, total state spending from state resources under part 1
10 for fiscal year 2002-2003 is [\$262,157,300.00] and state spending from
11 state resources to be paid to local units of government for fiscal year
12 2002-2003 is \$15,547,500.00. The itemized statement below identifies

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Sec. 203. As used in this act:

(a) "CESARS" means chemical evaluation search and retrieval system.

(b) "Department" means the department of environmental quality.

(c) "DOC" means the United States department of commerce.

(d) "DOC-NOAA" means the DOC national oceanic and atmospheric
administration.

(e) "DOD" means the United States department of defense.

(f) "DOE" means the United States department of energy.

(g) "DOI" means the United States department of interior.

(h) "EPA" means the United States environmental protection agency.

(i) "EPA-GWDW" means the EPA groundwater drinking water.

(j) "EPA-LUST trust" means the EPA leaking underground storage tank
trust fund.

(k) "EPA, radon" means the EPA radon grants.

(l) "EPA-UST" means the EPA underground storage tank.

(m) "FEMA" means the federal emergency management agency.

(n) "FTE" means full-time equated.

(o) "IDG" means interdepartmental grant.

(p) "IDT" means intradepartmental transfer.

(q) "MDCH" means the Michigan department of community health.

(r) "MDSP" means the Michigan department of state police.

(s) "MI" means Michigan.

Sec. 204. The department of civil service shall bill departments
and agencies at the end of the first fiscal quarter for the 1% charge
authorized by section 5 of article XI of the state constitution of 1963.

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1 Payments shall be made for the total amount of the billing by the end of
2 the second fiscal quarter.

3 Sec. 205. (1) Beginning October 1, a hiring freeze is imposed on
4 the state classified civil service. State departments and agencies are
5 prohibited from hiring any new full-time state classified civil service
6 employees and prohibited from filling any vacant state classified civil
7 service positions. This hiring freeze does not apply to internal trans-
8 fers of classified employees from 1 position to another within a
9 department.

10 (2) The state budget director shall grant exceptions to the hiring
11 freeze described in subsection (1) when the state budget director
12 believes that the hiring freeze will result in rendering a state depart-
13 ment or agency unable to deliver basic services, cause a loss of revenue
14 to the state, result in the inability of the state to receive federal
15 funds, or would necessitate additional expenditures that exceed any sav-
16 ings from maintaining a vacancy. The state budget director shall report
17 quarterly to the chairpersons of the senate and house of representatives
18 standing committees on appropriations the number of exceptions to the
19 hiring freeze approved during the previous quarter and the reasons to
20 justify the exception.

21 Sec. 206. (1) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1,
22 there is appropriated an amount not to exceed \$30,000,000.00 for federal
23 contingency funds. These funds are not available for expenditure until
24 they have been transferred to another line item in this act under
25 section 393(2) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431,
26 MCL 18.1393.

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1 (2) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1, there is
2 appropriated an amount not to exceed \$5,000,000.00 for state restricted
3 contingency funds. These funds are not available for expenditure until
4 they have been transferred to another line item in this act under
5 section 393(2) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431,
6 MCL 18.1393.

7 (3) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1, there is appro-
8 priated an amount not to exceed \$100,000.00 for local contingency funds.
9 These funds are not available for expenditure until they have been trans-
10 ferred to another line item in this act under section 393(2) of the man-
11 agement and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1393.

12 (4) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1, there is appro-
13 priated an amount not to exceed \$100,000.00 for private contingency
14 funds. These funds are not available for expenditure until they have
15 been transferred to another line item in this act under section 393(2) of
16 the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1393.

17 Sec. 207. At least 60 days before beginning any effort to privat-
18 ize, the department shall submit a complete project plan to the appropri-
19 ate senate and house of representatives appropriations subcommittees and
20 the senate and house fiscal agencies. The plan shall include the cri-
21 teria under which the privatization initiative will be evaluated. The
22 evaluation shall be completed and submitted to the appropriate senate and
23 house of representatives appropriations subcommittees and the senate and
24 house fiscal agencies within 30 months.

25 Sec. 208. Unless otherwise specified in this act, the department
26 shall use the Internet to fulfill the reporting requirements of this
27 act. This may include transmission of reports via electronic mail to the

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1 recipients identified for each reporting requirement or it may include
2 placement of reports on an Internet or Intranet site.

3 Sec. 209. Funds appropriated in part 1 should not be used for the
4 purchase of foreign goods or services, or both, if competitively priced
5 American goods or services, or both, of comparable quality are
6 available. Preference should be given to goods or services, or both,
7 manufactured or provided by Michigan businesses if they are competitively
8 priced and of comparable value.

9 Sec. 210. The director shall take all reasonable steps to ensure
10 that businesses in deprived and depressed communities compete for and
11 perform contracts to provide services or supplies, or both. Each direc-
12 tor shall strongly encourage firms with which the department contracts to
13 subcontract with certified businesses in depressed and deprived communi-
14 ties for services, supplies, or both.

15 Sec. 211. (1) From funds appropriated under part 1, the department
16 shall prepare a report that lists all of the following regarding grant or
17 loan or grant and loan programs administered by the department for the
18 fiscal year ending on September 30, 2003:

19 (a) The name of each program.

20 (b) The goals of the program, the criteria, eligibility, process,
21 filing fees, nominating procedures, and deadlines for each program.

22 (c) The maximum and minimum grant and loan available and whether
23 there is a match requirement for each program.

24 (d) The amount of any required match, and whether in-kind contribu-
25 tions may be used as part or all of a required match.

26 (e) Information pertaining to the application process, timeline for
27 each program, and the contact people within the department.

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1 (f) The source of funds for each program, including the citation of
2 pertinent authorizing acts.

3 (g) Information regarding plans for the next fiscal year for the
4 phaseout, expansion, or changes for each program.

5 (h) A listing of all recipients of grants or loans awarded by the
6 department by type and amount of grant or loan.

7 (2) The reports required under this section shall be submitted to
8 the state budget office, the senate and house appropriations committees,
9 and senate and house fiscal agencies by January 1, 2003.

10 Sec. 212. By February 15, 2003, the department shall provide the
11 state budget director, the subcommittees on natural resources and envi-
12 ronmental quality of the senate and house appropriations committees, and
13 the senate and house fiscal agencies with an annual report on restricted
14 fund balances, projected revenues, and expenditures for the fiscal years
15 ending September 30, 2002 and September 30, 2003.

16 Sec. 213. The department shall provide an annual report on the
17 total amount of funds received from responsible parties and legal settle-
18 ments, and the disposition of these funds. Included in the report shall
19 be a listing of the individual settlement cases, the location of the
20 facilities involved, the type of violation committed, and the amount of
21 funds received.

22 Sec. 214. The department shall notify the legislature and shall
23 provide a public meeting and public comment opportunity with respect to
24 any request received by the state of Michigan to divert water from the
25 Great Lakes pursuant to the water resources development act of 1986,
26 Public Law 99-662, 100 Stat. 4082.

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1 Sec. 215. (1) The department shall report all of the following
2 information relative to allocations made in part 1 for the environmental
3 cleanup and redevelopment program, state cleanup, emergency actions,
4 superfund cleanup, the revitalization revolving loan program, the brown-
5 field grants and loans program, the leaking underground storage tank
6 cleanup program, the contaminated lake and river sediments cleanup pro-
7 gram, and the environmental protection bond projects under section
8 19508(7) of the natural resources and environmental protection act, 1994
9 PA 451, MCL 324.19508, to the state budget director, the senate and house
10 appropriations subcommittees on environmental quality, and the senate and
11 house fiscal agencies:

12 (a) The name and location of the site for which an allocation is
13 made.

14 (b) The nature of the problem encountered at the site.

15 (c) A brief description of how the problem will be resolved if the
16 allocation is made for a response activity.

17 (d) The estimated date that site closure activities will be
18 completed.

19 (e) The amount of the allocation, or the anticipated financing for
20 the site.

21 (f) A summary of the sites and the total amount of funds expended at
22 the sites at the conclusion of the fiscal year.

23 (g) The number of sites that would qualify as brownfields that were
24 redeveloped.

25 (2) The report prepared under subsection (1) shall also include all
26 of the following:

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1 (a) The status of all state-owned facilities that are on the list
2 compiled under part 201 of the natural resources and environmental
3 protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.20101 to 324.20142.

4 (b) The report shall include the total amount of funds expended
5 during the fiscal year and the total amount of funds awaiting
6 expenditure.

7 (c) The total amount of bonds issued for the environmental protec-
8 tion bond program pursuant to part 193 of the natural resources and envi-
9 ronmental protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.19301 to 324.19306, and
10 bonds issued pursuant to the clean Michigan initiative act, 1998 PA 284,
11 MCL 324.95101 to 324.95108.

12 (3) The report shall be made available by March 31 of each year.

13 Sec. 216. Of the money appropriated from the environmental educa-
14 tion fund in part 1, \$5,000.00 shall be allocated to Michigan State
15 University Extension Service - 4-H Youth Programs to fund the Michigan
16 Youth Conservation Council.

17 Sec. 217. The departments and state agencies receiving appropria-
18 tions under this act shall receive and retain copies of all reports
19 funded from appropriations in part 1. These departments and state agen-
20 cies shall follow federal and state guidelines for short-term and
21 long-term retention of these reports and records.

22 Sec. 218. (1) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1 for
23 the environmental cleanup and redevelopment program and the leaking
24 underground storage tank cleanup program, the department of environmental
25 quality is authorized to expend amounts remaining from prior fiscal year
26 appropriations to meet funding needs of legislatively approved sites.

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1 (2) Unexpended and unencumbered amounts remaining from
2 appropriations from the environmental protection bond fund contained in
3 1989 PA 180, 1990 PA 55, 1990 PA 194, 1991 PA 31, 1991 PA 160, 1993
4 PA 74, 1993 PA 353, 1994 PA 442, 1996 PA 353, and 1997 PA 114 are appro-
5 priated for expenditure for any site listed in this act and any site
6 listed in the public acts referenced in this section.

7 (3) Unexpended and unencumbered amounts remaining from appropria-
8 tions from the cleanup and redevelopment fund and unclaimed bottle depos-
9 its fund contained in 1996 PA 319, 1997 PA 113, 1997 PA 114, 1998 PA 292,
10 1999 PA 125, 2000 PA 275, and 2001 PA 43 are appropriated for expenditure
11 for any site listed in this act and any site listed in the public acts
12 referenced in this section.

13 (4) Unexpended and unencumbered amounts remaining from appropria-
14 tions from the clean Michigan initiative fund - response activities con-
15 tained in 1999 PA 111, 2000 PA 52, 2000 PA 506, and 2001 PA 120 are
16 appropriated for expenditure for any site listed in this act and any site
17 listed in the public acts referenced in this section.

18 Sec. 219. By December 1, 2003, the department shall submit a
19 report, for the previous fiscal year, to the senate and house appropria-
20 tions subcommittees on environmental quality and natural resources, the
21 standing committees of the legislature with jurisdiction over issues pri-
22 marily related to natural resources and the environment, and the senate
23 and house fiscal agencies. The report shall include all of the
24 following:

25 (a) An estimate of the annual budget amount spent by the department
26 for compliance inspection, monitoring, and enforcement of all permits and
27 licenses issued by the department.

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1 (b) The number of permits and licenses that have been issued.

2 (c) The number of compliance and complaint inspections completed, by
3 category, the number of on-site compliance inspections conducted, and the
4 number of compliance inspections that were not announced in advance to
5 the permittee or licensee.

6 (d) The number and percent of permit and license inspections that
7 were found to be in significant noncompliance, by category.

8 (e) A listing of the supplemental environmental projects agreed to
9 as a result of a consent agreement including all of the following:

10 (i) The case name.

11 (ii) The monetary value of the supplemental environmental project.

12 (iii) A description of the project.

13 (f) The number of administrative enforcement actions taken for
14 permit or license violations and the results of the enforcement actions,
15 including the amount of fines and penalties collected.

16 (g) The number of judicial enforcement actions taken for permit or
17 license violations and the results of the enforcement actions, including
18 the amount of fines and penalties collected.

19 (h) The number of facilities listed on the department's facility
20 profiler database that have been issued a permit. The department shall
21 include an update of the status of incorporating the department's remain-
22 ing databases to the facility profiler system.

23 Sec. 220. The department shall report to the state budget office,
24 the senate and house appropriations subcommittees on environmental quali-
25 ty, and the senate and house fiscal agencies at the end of each fiscal
26 quarter the fund balance in the environmental response fund.

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1 Sec. 221. By March 1 of each year, the department of environmental
2 quality shall submit to the senate and house appropriations committees
3 and the standing committees of the senate and house with jurisdiction
4 over issues primarily pertaining to natural resources and the environment
5 a report on the expenditure of the proceeds of bonds issued under the
6 clean Michigan initiative act, 1998 PA 284, MCL 324.95101 to 324.95108.
7 The department shall submit the report beginning in the year [2003] and
8 every year thereafter until all bond proceeds have been expended. The
9 report shall provide information related to expenditures during the pre-
10 vious fiscal year and over the cumulative life of the bond. Information
11 related to expenditures shall include, but is not limited to, all of the
12 following:

13 (a) The amount of bonds sold.

14 (b) The amount of bond proceeds expended.

15 (c) The number of and locations of sites in which bond proceeds have
16 been expended.

17 (d) The human health and environmental impacts that have been miti-
18 gated by the expenditure of bond funds including, but not limited to, all
19 of the following:

20 (i) Amount of contaminated sediment remediated.

21 (ii) Number of illicit storm sewer connections identified and
22 corrected.

23 (iii) Number of stream and road crossings stabilized to control non-
24 point source pollution.

25 (iv) Number of miles of shoreline stabilized or buffered to control
26 nonpoint source pollution.

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1 (v) Number of abandoned wells identified and plugged.

2 (vi) Number and type of actions taken to implement lakewide
3 management plans (R 324.8904 of the Michigan administrative code), reme-
4 dial action plans (R 324.8905 of the Michigan administrative code), and
5 approved watershed management plans (R 324.8902 of the Michigan adminis-
6 trative code).

7 (vii) Number of cleaned up sites of environmental contamination
8 having imminent and substantial endangerment to human health or the
9 environment.

10 (e) The implementation of and results from the monitoring program
11 conducted to achieve the goals stated in "A Strategic Environmental
12 Quality Monitoring Program for Michigan's Surface Waters" as required
13 under section 8807(4)(a) of part 88 of the natural resources and environ-
14 mental protection act, MCL 324.8807. The report shall include a discus-
15 sion of annual monitoring results as well as trends over time.

16 (f) The brownfield properties that have been redeveloped by the
17 expenditure of bond funds, including, but not limited to, all of the
18 following:

19 (i) Number of corrective actions undertaken by the department to
20 address releases from leaking underground storage tanks pursuant to part
21 213 of the natural resources and environmental protection act, 1994 PA
22 451, MCL 324.21301 to 324.21330.

23 (ii) The number of response activities undertaken by the department
24 at facilities pursuant to part 201 of the natural resources and environ-
25 mental protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.20101 to 324.20142, to pro-
26 mote redevelopment.

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(iii) The number of assessment activities undertaken to determine whether the property is a facility.

(iv) The number of grants provided to local units of government and brownfield redevelopment authorities created under the brownfield redevelopment financing act, 1996 PA 381, MCL 125.2651 to 125.2672, for response activities at known or suspected facilities with redevelopment potential.

(v) The acres of brownfield remediated.

(vi) The acres of former brownfield that have been redeveloped and are now being used for other purposes.

Sec. 222. The negative appropriation in part 1 for early retirement savings represents savings from the state's 2002 early retirement program. Not later than November 15, 2002, the state budget director shall request legislative transfers under section 393(2) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1393, to apply the early retirement savings to the appropriated line items affected by the early retirement program.

DEPARTMENT SUPPORT SERVICES

Sec. 301. Due to the consolidation of the department of environmental quality operations for the purpose of increasing agency efficiencies, effective October 1, 2002, the department of environmental quality shall not expend any of the funds appropriated in part 1 for rental payments or operational expenses for the leased premises located at 300 South Washington, Lansing, Michigan.

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1 Sec. 302. Due to the consolidation of the department of
2 environmental quality operations for the purpose of increasing agency
3 efficiencies, effective October 1, 2002, the department of environmental
4 quality is prohibited from expending any of the funds appropriated in
5 part 1 of this act for rental payments or operational expenses for the
6 leased premises located at 300 Stroh River Place, Detroit, Michigan.

7 LAND AND WATER MANAGEMENT

[Sec. 401. From the funds appropriated in part 1, the department shall, through administrative rule, add to the atlas of critical dunes, publicly owned dunes recommended in the publication "Final Report: Evaluation of Critical Dune Areas Designated Under Part 353, Sand Dune Protection and Management, of the Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Act 1994 PA 451".]

8 Sec. 403. The department shall collect Great Lakes bottomland
9 permit fees uniformly and fairly from commercial and noncommercial users
10 of the Great Lakes bottomlands.

11 Sec. 404. The department shall waive permit fees for nonprofit
12 organizations conducting approved stream habitat improvement projects.

13 AIR QUALITY

14 Sec. 501. The department shall report quarterly, via the
15 department's Internet website, on air quality program expenditures and
16 revenues. The report shall include expenditures and revenues by fund
17 source and by program function.

18 SURFACE WATER QUALITY

19 Sec. 601. Of the funds appropriated in part 1 for surface water
20 surveillance, a minimum of \$250,000.00 shall be designated for grants to
21 local organizations for water quality monitoring activities.

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1 Sec. 602. Of the funds appropriated in section 107 for water
2 quality monitoring, \$20,000.00 may be provided, on a 50:50 cost-sharing
3 basis, to erect signs at beaches owned by governmental entities. These
4 signs will inform the public where the most recent beach water quality
5 information may be found.

6 Sec. 603. From the funds appropriated in section 110 for contami-
7 nated site investigations, before July 1, 2003, the department shall test
8 for sources of groundwater contamination in Oshtemo Township, Kalamazoo
9 County unrelated to the West K L Avenue superfund site.

10 Sec. 604. The department shall review the 2002 report, "Greening
11 the Governments", and present its analysis to the house and senate sub-
12 committees on environmental quality on October 30, 2002. This analysis
13 shall address specific findings of the "Greening the Governments" report
14 that Michigan had the best water quality in 1999, as measured by the
15 number of tons of toxic material released per \$1,000,000.00 in industry
16 gross state product [. The analysis shall include specific
17 recommendations on how Michigan can improve its environmental performance
18 in these and other areas to be competitive with the other great lakes
 states.]

19 Sec. 605. If a water quality sample is taken from a water body of a
20 local jurisdiction and the results of the analysis demonstrate contami-
21 nant levels above ambient water quality standards, the department shall
22 provide those results to the local public health department of jurisdic-
23 tion within 24 hours after the results are known by the department.

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1 DRINKING WATER

2 Sec. 701. The funds appropriated in part 1 for groundwater use
3 reporting shall be awarded as a grant for the development of a groundwa-
4 ter database needed to model the demands for domestic water uses of
5 groundwater supplies.

6 ENVIRONMENTAL RESPONSE

7 Sec. 801. The unexpended funds appropriated in part 1 for the state
8 cleanup program, environmental cleanup and redevelopment program, emer-
9 gency cleanup action, contaminated site investigations, cleanup and revi-
10 talization, and superfund cleanup projects are considered work project
11 appropriations and any unencumbered or unallotted funds are carried for-
12 ward into the succeeding fiscal year. The following is in compliance
13 with section 451a(1) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431,
14 MCL 18.1451a:

15 (a) The purpose of the projects to be carried forward is to provide
16 contaminated site cleanup.

17 (b) The projects will be accomplished by contract.

18 (c) The total estimated cost of all projects is identified in each
19 line-item appropriation.

20 (d) The tentative completion date is September 30, 2007.

21 Sec. 802. Of the funds appropriated in part 1 as state match for
22 the superfund cleanup program, an amount not to exceed \$250,000.00 shall
23 be expended as the state match for the hazardous substance research
24 center.

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1 Sec. 803. The funds appropriated in part 1 for the environmental
2 cleanup and redevelopment program shall be used to fund redevelopment and
3 cleanup activities on the following sites:

14 Sec. 901. (1) The funds appropriated in part 1 from the Michigan
15 underground storage tank financial assurance fund for the purpose of car-
16 rying out the duties and responsibilities as specified in part 215 of the
17 natural resources and environmental protection act, 1994 PA 451,
18 MCL 324.21501 to 324.21551, are considered work project appropriations
19 and any unencumbered funds are carried forward into the succeeding fiscal
20 year. The following is in compliance with section 451a(1) of the manage-
21 ment and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1451a:

22 (a) The purpose of the projects to be carried forward is to carry
23 out the responsibilities of part 215 of the natural resources and envi-
24 ronmental protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.21501 to 324.21551.

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1 (b) The projects will be accomplished by contract and state
2 employees.

3 (c) The total estimated cost is identified in a line-item
4 appropriation.

5 (d) The tentative completion date is September 30, 2007.

6 (2) The Michigan underground storage tank financial assurance policy
7 board shall allocate the amount of the underground storage tank financial
8 assurance fund to be distributed to the department. If the amount recom-
9 mended by the board is less than that appropriated in part 1, expendi-
10 tures shall be adjusted accordingly.

11 (3) Included in the funds appropriated in part 1 from the Michigan
12 underground storage tank financial assurance fund are funds sufficient to
13 pay debt service costs on the bonds or notes issued pursuant to part 215
14 of the natural resources and environmental protection act, 1994 PA 451,

16 Sec. 902. The department shall report to the state budget director,
17 the senate and house appropriations subcommittees on environmental quali-
18 ty, and the senate and house fiscal agencies not later than October 31,
19 2003 on the Michigan underground storage tank financial assurance fund.
20 The report shall include the fund balance, estimate of available reve-
21 nues, number and dollar value of claims processed through September 30,
22 2002, and total estimated claims liability through December 22, 2004.

23 Sec. 903. The unexpended funds appropriated in part 1 for the leak-
24 ing underground storage tank cleanup program are considered work project
25 appropriations and any unencumbered or unallotted funds are carried over
26 into the succeeding fiscal year. The following is in compliance with

21 Sec. 1001. The funds appropriated in part 1 for low-income commu-

24 expand rural community assistance program services to all Michigan
25 counties.

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1 Sec. 1002. The appropriation in part 1 for environmental assistance
2 includes \$200,000.00 to support research and technology demonstration
3 projects which encourage scrap tire recycling and reuse.

4 Sec. 1003. If the department participates, consults, or collabo-
5 rates on a study regarding removal of automobile components in 2002, it
6 shall complete a comparative study of other removal options for similar
7 components by September 30, 2003 including, but not limited to, removal
8 from other than end-of-life vehicles.

9 **CRIMINAL INVESTIGATIONS**

10 Sec. 1101. From funds appropriated in part 1, the department shall
11 conduct periodic inspections of imported solid waste at disposal facili-
12 ties to mitigate the unpermitted disposal of waste at Michigan disposal
13 sites.

14 Sec. 1102. With funds appropriated in part 1, the department shall
15 provide training in support of local efforts to regulate solid waste
16 disposal. Department environmental conservation officers shall be
17 directed to help train law enforcement officers and other enforcement
18 personnel to develop community partnerships to combat illegal dumping at
19 the local level.

20 **GRANTS**

21 Sec. 1201. If a certified health department does not exist in a
22 city, county, or district or does not fulfill its responsibilities under
23 part 117 of the natural resources and environmental protection act, 1994

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1 PA 451, MCL 324.11701 to 324.11719, then the department may spend funds
2 appropriated in part 1 under the septage waste compliance program in
3 accordance with section 11716 of the natural resources and environmental
4 protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.11716.

5 Sec. 1202. Of the funds appropriated in part 1 for scrap tire
6 grants, \$100,000.00 shall be available for grants to communities to cover
7 scrap tire fire suppression costs, provided owner liability bonds and
8 other available funding sources have been exhausted.

9 Sec. 1203. Loans provided by the water pollution control revolving
10 fund with funds appropriated in part 1 are to be repaid on schedule, and
11 penalties shall be assigned for delinquent repayment as provided in part
12 53 of the natural resources and environmental protection act, 1994 PA
13 451, MCL 324.5301 to 324.5316. A list of delinquent payments and
14 assessed penalties shall be provided to the house and senate subcommit-
15 tees on environmental quality by February 15, 2004.

16 Sec. 1204. From the funds appropriated in section 115 for the
17 drinking water revolving loan program, the department shall provide
18 low-interest loans for public water supply systems found to be out of
19 compliance with federal arsenic standards.

[Sec. 1205. The money appropriated in section 115 for grants to
counties-water quality monitoring shall be used to establish and operate a
comprehensive monitoring program to protect and manage the environmental
quality of the St. Clair River, Lake St. Clair, and the Clinton River
watershed.]

20 **INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY**

21 Sec. 1301. The department of information technology shall establish
22 a schedule of rates, user fees, and charges or assessments for standard
23 services and information system support requirements to be made to
24 departments for technology related services and projects. This schedule,
25 as well as copies of related interagency agreements, shall be provided to

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1 the state budget office and the house and senate committees on
2 appropriations before October 1, 2002.

3 Sec. 1302. Amounts appropriated in part 1 for information technol-
4 ogy may be designated as work projects and carried forward to support
5 department of environmental quality technology projects under the direc-
6 tion of the department of information technology. Funds designated in
7 this manner are not available for expenditure until approved as work
8 projects under section 451a of the management and budget act, 1984
9 PA 431, MCL 18.1451a.

10 **WASTE MANAGEMENT**

11 Sec. 1401. The funds appropriated in part 1 for pollution preven-
12 tion includes authorization for 1.0 FTE position and \$60,000.00 to pro-
13 vide technical assistance to organizations and businesses involved in
14 recycling and composting.
