February 21, 2001, Introduced by Senators MC MANUS, GAST, JOHNSON, STILLE and GOSCHKA and referred to the Committee on Appropriations.

EXECUTIVE BUDGET BILL

A bill to make appropriations for the department of agriculture for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2002; to provide for the expenditure of the appropriations; to create funds; to provide for the imposition of fees; to require reports, audits, and plans; to authorize certain transfers by certain state agencies; and to provide for the disposition of fees and other income received by certain state agencies.

29	Sec. 201. Pursuant to section 30 of article IX of the state

- 1 constitution of 1963, total state spending from state resources under
- 2 part 1 for fiscal year 2001-2002 is \$82,585,400.00 and state spending
- 3 from state resources to be paid to local units of government for
- 4 fiscal year 2001-2002 is \$4,600,000.00. The itemized statement below
- 5 identifies appropriations from which spending to units of local
- 6 government will occur:
- 7 DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE
- 8 Groundwater and freshwater protection program . \$1,800,000
- 9 Local conservation districts $\underline{2,800,000}$
- 11 Sec. 202. The appropriations authorized under this bill are
- subject to the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1101 to
- **13** 18.1594.
- 14 Sec. 203. As used in this bill:
- (a) "DAG" means the United States department of agriculture.
- (b) "DAG-FS" means the United States department of agriculture -
- 17 forest service.
- 18 (c) "DAG-NRCS" means the United States department of agriculture -
- 19 natural resources conservation service.
- 20 (d) "Department" means the department of agriculture.
- (e) "Director" means the director of the department.
- (f) "EPA" means the United States environmental protection agency.
- 23 (g) "FTE" means full-time equated.
- 24 (h) "HHS-FDA" means the United States department of health and
- 25 human services food and drug administration.
- 26 (i) "IDG" means interdepartmental grant.
- 27 (j) "MDCH" means the Michigan department of community health.
- 28 (k) "MDCIS (LCC)" means the Michigan department of consumer and
- 29 industry services liquor control commission.
- 30 (1) "MDEQ" means the Michigan department of environmental quality.

- 1 (m) "MDNR" means the Michigan department of natural resources.
- 2 Sec. 204. The department of civil service shall bill departments
- 3 and agencies at the end of the first fiscal quarter for the 1% charge
- 4 authorized by section 5 of article XI of the state constitution of
- 5 1963. Payments shall be made for the total amount of the billing by
- 6 the end of the second fiscal quarter.
- 7 Sec. 205. (1) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1,
- 8 there is appropriated an amount not to exceed \$5,000,000.00 for
- 9 federal contingency funds. These funds are not available for
- 10 expenditure until they have been transferred to another line item in
- 11 this bill under section 393(2) of the management and budget act, 1984
- **12** PA 431, MCL 18.1393.
- 13 (2) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1, there is
- 14 appropriated an amount not to exceed \$6,000,000.00 for state
- 15 restricted contingency funds. These funds are not available for
- 16 expenditure until they have been transferred to another line item in
- 17 this bill under section 393(2) of the management and budget act, 1984
- **18** PA 431, MCL 18.1393.
- 19 (3) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1, there is
- appropriated an amount not to exceed \$100,000.00 for local contingency
- 21 funds. These funds are not available for expenditure until they have
- 22 been transferred to another line item in this bill under section
- 23 393(2) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1393.
- 24 (4) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1, there is
- appropriated an amount not to exceed \$100,000.00 for private
- 26 contingency funds. These funds are not available for expenditure
- 27 until they have been transferred to another line item in this bill
- 28 under section 393(2) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431,
- **29** MCL 18.1393.
- 30 Sec. 206. Unless otherwise specified the department shall use the

- 1 Internet to fulfill the reporting requirements of this bill. This may
- 2 include transmission of reports via electronic mail to the recipients
- 3 identified for each reporting requirement, or it may include placement
- 4 of reports on an Internet or Intranet site. Quarterly, the department
- 5 shall provide to the appropriations subcommittee members, state budget
- 6 office, and the fiscal agencies an electronic and paper copy listing
- 7 of the reports submitted during the most recent 3-month period along
- 8 with the Internet or Intranet site of each report, if any.
- 9 Sec. 207. (1) A hiring freeze is imposed on the state classified
- 10 civil service. State departments and agencies are prohibited from
- 11 hiring any new full-time state classified civil service employees and
- 12 prohibited from filling any vacant state classified civil service
- 13 positions. This hiring freeze does not apply to internal transfers of
- 14 classified employees from one position to another within a department.
- 15 (2) The state budget director shall grant exceptions to this
- 16 hiring freeze when the state budget director believes that the hiring
- 17 freeze will result in rendering a state department or agency unable to
- 18 deliver basic services, cause loss of revenue to the state, result in
- 19 the inability of the state to receive federal funds, or would
- 20 necessitate additional expenditures that exceed any savings from
- 21 maintaining a vacancy. The state budget director shall report by the
- 22 thirtieth of each month to the chairpersons of the senate and house
- 23 standing committees on appropriations the number of exceptions to the
- 24 hiring freeze approved during the previous month and the reasons to
- 25 justify the exception.
- Sec. 208. (1) The negative appropriation for budgetary savings in
- 27 part 1 shall be satisfied by savings from the hiring freeze imposed in
- 28 Section 207 and, if necessary, by other savings identified by the
- 29 department director and approved by the state budget director.
- 30 (2) Appropriation authorizations shall be adjusted after the

- 1 approval of transfers by the legislature pursuant to section 393(2) of
- 2 the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1393.
- 3 Sec. 209. Of the funds appropriated in part 1, the department may
- 4 provide for indemnity as provided for pursuant to the animal industry
- 5 act of 1987, 1988 PA 466, MCL 287.701 to 287.747, not to exceed
- 6 \$10,000.00 per order from any line item for the fiscal year ending
- 7 September 30, 2002. Before the department provides for an
- 8 indemnification under this section, the department shall report the
- 9 reason for the indemnification, the amount of the indemnification, and
- 10 to whom the indemnification is to be paid. The report shall be given
- 11 to each member of the house and senate appropriations subcommittees on
- 12 agriculture and to the senate and house fiscal agencies and state
- 13 budget director.
- 14 Sec. 210. The unexpended and unencumbered balance of revenue
- 15 deposited pursuant to section 20 of the horse racing law of 1995, 1995
- 16 PA 279, MCL 431.320, for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2002
- 17 shall be appropriated to the Michigan agriculture equine industry
- 18 development fund for distribution as set forth in section 20 of the
- 19 horse racing law of 1995, 1995 PA 279, MCL 431.320.

20 EXECUTIVE

- 21 Sec. 301. The appropriations in part 1 may be used for per diem
- 22 payments to members of boards, committees, and commissions for a full
- 23 day's board, committee, or commission work at which a quorum is
- 24 present; for attending a hearing as authorized by the respective
- 25 board, committee, or commission; or for performing official business
- 26 as authorized by the respective board, committee, or commission. The
- 27 per diem payments shall be at a rate as follows:
- (a) Commission of agriculture \$ 75.00 per day
- **29** (b) Upper Peninsula state fair board \$ 50.00 per day
- (c) Agricultural marketing and bargaining board \$ 35.00 per day

- 1 (d) Michigan state fair council \$ 50.00 per day
- 2 (e) Grape and wine industry council \$ 50.00 per day
- 3 Sec. 302. The department may receive and expend revenue and use
- 4 that revenue to cover necessary expenses related to publications,
- 5 audit and licensing functions, livestock sales, certification of
- 6 nursery stock, bean inspection services, and laboratory analyses as
- 7 specified in the following:
- 8 (a) Management services publications.
- 9 (b) Management services audit and licensing functions.
- 10 (c) Upper Peninsula state fair livestock sales.
- (d) Pesticide and plant pest management propagation and
- 12 certification of virus free foundation stock.
- 13 (e) Pesticide and plant pest management bean inspection and
- 14 grading services.
- 15 (f) Laboratory support testing for testing horses in draft horse
- 16 pulling contests at county fairs when local jurisdictions request
- 17 state assistance.
- 18 (g) Laboratory support analyses to determine foreign substances in
- 19 horses engaged in racing or pulling contests at tracks.
- 20 (h) Laboratory support analysis of food, livestock, and
- 21 agricultural products for disease, foreign products for disease,
- 22 toxic materials, foreign substances, and quality standards.
- 23 (i) Laboratory support test samples for other agencies and
- 24 organizations.
- 25 (j) Fruit and vegetable inspection at shipping and termination
- 26 points and processing plants.

27 FOOD AND DAIRY

- 28 Sec. 401. The department shall monitor restaurant inspection and
- 29 licensing functions carried out by local health departments to ensure
- 30 uniform application and enforcement of minimum program requirements.

- 1 On or before April 1, 2002, the department shall report to the senate
- 2 and house appropriations subcommittees on agriculture, the senate and
- 3 house fiscal agencies, and the state budget director on local health
- 4 department conformance with minimum program requirements.

5 ANIMAL INDUSTRY

- 6 Sec. 501. From the funds appropriated in part 1 for the bovine
- 7 tuberculosis program, the department of agriculture shall reimburse
- 8 the department of natural resources for those costs associated with
- 9 monitoring and testing wildlife for bovine tuberculosis that are
- 10 necessary to support the department of agriculture goals and are
- 11 jointly agreed to by the department of agriculture and the department
- 12 of natural resources to be in excess of efforts necessary to
- 13 effectively plan and execute the eradication of bovine tuberculosis
- 14 from Michigan's wild free-ranging deer herd.

15 PESTICIDE AND PLANT PEST MANAGEMENT

- 16 Sec. 601. The department is authorized to enter into a
- 17 cooperative agreement with a nonprofit foundation or agency associated
- 18 with the gypsy moth slow-the-spread program in order to receive funds
- 19 for managing plant pests.

20 <u>ENVIRONMENTAL STEWARDSHIP</u>

- 21 Sec. 701. The funds appropriated in part 1 for the energy
- 22 conservation program shall be distributed on a competitive basis that
- 23 will be based on statewide energy conservation criteria.
- Sec. 702. (1) The department may expend the amount appropriated
- 25 in part 1 for migrant labor housing grants for construction of new
- 26 migrant labor housing. Project grants shall not exceed \$4,000.00 per
- 27 unit. An applicant is not eligible for more than a \$16,000.00 grant
- 28 in any fiscal year. Units shall be equivalent in construction to
- 29 units approved by the DAG-rural development agency for low interest
- 30 construction loans and shall be not less than 484 square feet in

- 1 size and be self-contained with a minimum of 1 bedroom, a kitchen, a
- 2 flush toilet, a lavatory, and bathing facilities.
- 3 (2) Any unexpended migrant labor housing funds from the prior year
- 4 shall be available for grants in the subsequent fiscal year.
- 5 Sec. 703. The appropriation in part 1 for local conservation
- 6 districts shall be allocated in the following manner:
- 7 (a) Of the total appropriation, \$690,000.00 shall be allocated for
- 8 district forestry and wildlife programs to assist private land
- 9 management. Grants to districts will be made in accordance with a
- 10 plan developed by the department of agriculture in cooperation with
- 11 the forest management division of the department of natural resources.
- 12 (b) Of the total appropriation, \$130,000.00 shall be allocated for
- 13 local conservation district training.
- 14 (c) Of the total appropriation, each local conservation district
- 15 meeting the minimum grant requirements shall receive a grant of
- 16 \$20,000.00 to support basic operations, unless the district resides in
- 17 a county consisting of multiple districts, in which case a \$20,000.00
- 18 grant shall be divided equally among the districts in that county.
- 19 The amount of money allocated under this subdivision shall not be used
- 20 by local conservation districts to replace any money received from
- 21 local sources.
- 22 (d) Of the remaining appropriation after distributions under
- 23 subdivisions (a) through (c), additional grants, not to exceed
- 24 \$20,000.00 per local conservation district, may be provided based on a
- 25 formula approved by the commission of agriculture. Grants under this
- 26 subdivision shall require at least a 100% cash or in-kind local match.
- 27 Criteria used to distribute grants under this subdivision shall
- 28 include, but are not limited to, the natural resources need, the size,
- 29 and the population of the area served by each local conservation
- 30 district.

1 MARKET DEVELOPMENT

- 2 Sec. 801. Within the appropriations in part 1 for market
- 3 development, \$448,400.00 is for the grape and wine industry council,

- 4 from which the department may provide grants for the purposes as
- 5 described in section 303 of the Michigan liquor control code of 1998,
- 6 1998 PA 58, MCL 436.1303.
- 7 Sec. 802. In any given year when insufficient amounts of Michigan
- 8 surplus products are offered to the food bank council and accepted for
- 9 distribution, unused funds may be applied by the food bank council for
- 10 the direct purchase of foods from Michigan growers, manufacturers, or
- 11 wholesalers.
- 12 Sec. 803. (1) The \$100,000.00 appropriated in part 1 for the
- 13 grown in Michigan program is to provide competitive grants to Michigan
- 14 nonprofit organizations to raise in-state consumer awareness of
- 15 Michigan grown commodities.
- 16 (2) The grants are to be made by the director on a competitive
- 17 basis considering the following order of priority:
- (a) Cooperative efforts by recognized, statewide, grower funded
- 19 organizations.
- 20 (b) The number of consumers made aware of the benefits of Michigan
- 21 grown commodities.
- 22 (c) The number of Michigan grown products encompassed in the
- 23 proposal.
- 24 (d) The amount of the match.
- 25 (3) A grant made under this section shall not be less than
- 26 \$2,500.00 or more than \$25,000.00.
- 27 (4) Each grant shall be matched equally with grantees' funds. In-
- 28 kind contributions shall not be considered as matching funds.
- 29 Sec. 804. Indirect costs may not be charged against the future
- 30 farmers of America grant in part 1 by any administering agency.

- 1 Sec. 805. The department is authorized to receive and expend up
- 2 to \$5,000,000 of utility company uncollectible allowance recovery fund
- 3 resources which may be deposited into the agricultural development
- 4 fund for the support of grants for value-added agricultural processing
- 5 and agricultural production ventures in accordance with the
- 6 Jullian-Stille Value-Added Act, P.A.322 of 2000. The agriculture
- 7 development fund resources when certified as available by the
- 8 department of treasury, shall remain unallotted until such time as the
- 9 state budget director has reviewed and approved a department submitted
- 10 allotment schedule. Expenditures for support of agricultural
- 11 processing and production ventures shall not exceed revenues received.
- 12 Unexpended resources remaining in the fund at the end of the fiscal
- 13 year shall remain in the fund and not lapse to the general fund.

14 FAIRS AND EXPOSITIONS

- 15 Sec. 901. (1) The appropriation of \$276,500.00 in part 1 for
- 16 standardbred purses and supplements licensed tracks is intended to
- 17 provide state purse supplements for 4 races at state licensed pari-
- 18 mutuel horse racing tracks. The purse supplements are to be used for
- 19 races comprised only of Michigan-bred horses segregated into a 4-year-
- 20 old colt trot division, a 4-year-old filly trot division, a 4-year-old
- 21 colt pace division, and a 4-year-old filly pace division.
- 22 (2) The appropriation in part 1 for licensed tracks light horse
- 23 racing shall be allocated as follows:
- 24 Arabian and Appaloosa horse racing \$ 19,200
- Sec. 902. Included in the appropriation made in part 1 for the
- 27 thoroughbred program is \$30,500.00 for the Michigan united
- 28 thoroughbred breeders and owners association to conduct a thoroughbred
- 29 yearling show. The Michigan united thoroughbred breeders and owners

- 2 Sec. 903. From the funds appropriated in part 1 for thoroughbred
- 3 owners' awards, the department shall develop a program to provide for
- 4 thoroughbred owners' awards that will be given to owners of Michigan-
- 5 bred horses finishing first in nonrestricted races at licensed pari-
- 6 mutuel tracks in Michigan.
- 7 Sec. 904. The \$78,200.00 appropriated in part 1 for draft horse
- 8 shows shall be allocated in equal amounts to the Can-Am draft horse
- 9 show held at the Michigan state fairgrounds and the Great Lakes draft
- 10 horse show held at Michigan State University.
- 11 Sec. 905. A county fair, district fair, 4-H fair, or state fair
- 12 receiving funds in part 1 to be used for prizes or awards, in whole or
- 13 in part, as a condition precedent to the receiving of the funds for
- 14 those purposes, shall publish the rules relative to the prizes,
- 15 awards, and deadlines for entries eligible for the funds in their
- 16 official premium books or lists relative to the prizes or awards. An
- 17 aggrieved exhibitor may make a written complaint to the fair within 10
- 18 days after the fair ends. If the fair has not satisfactorily settled
- 19 the grievance within 45 days after it is submitted to the fair, the

- 28 Sec. 907. Of the amount appropriated in part 1 for premiums,
- 29 \$11,400.00 shall be expended as a grant for the Michigan horse show
- 30 association fall youth show at the Michigan exposition and

- 1 fairgrounds.
- 2 Sec. 908. From the appropriations for premiums county and state
- 3 fairs in part 1, \$120,000.00 shall be awarded through a competitive
- 4 grant program to local, regional, or state fairs or expositions to
- 5 promote youth involvement and adult exhibitions in the animal
- 6 agriculture industry. Appropriate exhibition classes for youth shall
- 7 be developed that encourage a production exhibit for which premium
- 8 awards may be paid. The age for youth exhibitors shall be
- 9 determined by the standards of the association requesting the grant
- 10 or, if standards do not exist, the age for youth exhibitors shall be
- 11 ages 9 through 21. Implementation of the latest technologies into the
- 12 evaluation of the animals shall be encouraged in the production
- 13 exhibit. Adult exhibitions should focus on the performance or end

- 16 Sec. 909. The funds appropriated in part 1 for distribution of
- 17 outstanding wining tickets are not available for expenditure until
- 18 they are deposited in the agriculture equine industry development fund
- 19 pursuant to section 2 of 1951 PA 90, MCL 431.252. These funds shall
- 20 be expended in accordance with section 2 of 1951 PA 90, MCL 431.252,
- 21 and only after they have been transferred to another line item in this
- 22 bill under section 393(2) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA
- **23** 431, MCL 18.1393.

- 24 Sec. 910. An individual or other entity that leases land, a
- 25 building, or other property under the Michigan exposition and
- 26 fairgrounds act, 1978 PA 361, MCL 285.161 to 285.176, is not eligible
- 27 for a state grant, loan, appropriation, or other state subsidy related
- 28 to the leased land, building, or other property.

29 OFFICE OF RACING COMMISSIONER

30 Sec. 1001. The racing commissioner may pay rewards of not more

- 1 than \$5,800.00 to a person who provides information that results in
- 2 the arrest and conviction on a felony or misdemeanor charge for a
- 3 crime that involves the horse racing industry. A reward paid pursuant
- 4 to this section shall be paid out of the office of racing commissioner
- 5 line item.
