February 13, 2002, Introduced by Senators Bennett, Gast and North and referred to the Committee on Appropriations.

EXECUTIVE BUDGET BILL

A bill to make appropriations for the department of environmental quality for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2003; to provide for the expenditure of those appropriations; to create funds and accounts; to require reports; to prescribe certain powers and duties of certain state agencies and officials; to authorize certain transfers by certain state agencies; and to provide for the disposition of fees and other income received by the various state agencies.

3 PROVISIONS CONCERNING APPROPRIATIONS

4 GENERAL SECTIONS

5 Sec. 201. Pursuant to section 30 of article IX of the state
6 constitution of 1963, total state spending from state resources
7 under part 1 for fiscal year 2002-2003 is \$258,815,400.00 and
8 state spending from state resources to be paid to local units of
9 government for fiscal year 2002-2003 is \$15,557,500.00. The
10 itemized statement below identifies appropriations from which
11 spending to units of local government will occur:

25 Sec. 203. As used in this bill:

26 (a) "CESARS" means chemical evaluation search and retrieval
27 system.

28 (b) "Department" means the department of environmental

1 quality.

2 (c) "DOC" means the United States department of commerce.

3 (d) "DOC-NOAA" means the DOC national oceanic and atmospheric
4 administration.

5 (e) "DOD" means the United States department of defense.

6 (f) "DOI" means the United States department of interior.

7 (g) "EPA" means the United States environmental protection
8 agency.

9 (h) "EPA-GWDW" means the EPA groundwater drinking water.

10 (i) "EPA-LUST trust" means the EPA leaking underground storage
11 tank trust fund.

12 (j) "EPA, radon" means the EPA radon grants.

13 (k) "EPA, superfund" means the EPA superfund grants.

14 (l) "EPA-UST" means the EPA underground storage tank.

15 (m) "FEMA" means the federal emergency management agency.

16 (n) "FTE" means full-time equated.

17 (o) "IDG" means interdepartmental grant.

18 (p) "IDT" means intradepartmental transfer.

19 (q) "MDCH" means the Michigan department of community health.

20 (r) "MDSP" means the Michigan department of state police.

21 (s) "MDOT" means the Michigan department of transportation.

22 (t) "MUSTFA" means the Michigan underground storage tank
23 financial assurance fund.

24 (u) "NPL" means the federal national priority list.

25 Sec. 204. The department of civil service shall bill
26 departments and agencies at the end of the first fiscal quarter
27 for the 1% charge authorized by section 5 of article XI of the
28 state constitution of 1963. Payments shall be made for the total

1 amount of the billing by the end of the second fiscal quarter.

2 Sec. 205. (1) A hiring freeze is imposed on the state
3 classified civil service. State departments and agencies are
4 prohibited from hiring any new full-time state classified civil
5 service employees and prohibited from filling any vacant state
6 classified civil service positions. This hiring freeze does not
7 apply to internal transfers of classified employees from one
8 position to another within a department.

9 (2) The state budget director shall grant exceptions to this
10 hiring freeze when the state budget director believes that the
11 hiring freeze will result in rendering a state department or
12 agency unable to deliver basic services, cause loss of revenue to
13 the state, result in the inability of the state to receive federal
14 funds, or would necessitate additional expenditures that exceed
15 any savings from maintaining a vacancy. The state budget director
16 shall report quarterly to the chairpersons of the senate and house
17 standing committees on appropriations the number of exceptions to
18 the hiring freeze approved during the previous quarter and the
19 reasons to justify the exception.

20 Sec. 206. (1) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1,
21 there is appropriated an amount not to exceed \$30,000,000.00 for
22 federal contingency funds. These funds are not available for
23 expenditure until they have been transferred to another line item
24 in this bill under section 393(2) of the management and budget
25 act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1393.

26 (2) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1, there is
27 appropriated an amount not to exceed \$5,000,000.00 for state
28 restricted contingency funds. These funds are not available for

1 expenditure until they have been transferred to another line item
2 in this bill under section 393(2) of the management and budget
3 act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1393.

4 (3) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1, there is
5 appropriated an amount not to exceed \$100,000.00 for local
6 contingency funds. These funds are not available for expenditure
7 until they have been transferred to another line item in this bill
8 under section 393(2) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA
9 431, MCL 18.1393.

10 (4) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1, there is
11 appropriated an amount not to exceed \$100,000.00 for private
12 contingency funds. These funds are not available for expenditure
13 until they have been transferred to another line item in this bill
14 under section 393(2) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA
15 431, MCL 18.1393.

16 Sec. 208. Unless otherwise specified, the department shall use
17 the Internet to fulfill the reporting requirements of this bill.
18 This may include transmission of reports via electronic mail to
19 the recipients identified for each reporting requirement or it may
20 include placement of reports on an Internet or Intranet site.

21 Sec. 211. (1) From funds appropriated under part 1, the
22 department shall prepare a report that lists all of the following
23 regarding grant, loan, or grant and loan programs administered by
24 the department for the fiscal year ending on September 30, 2003:

25 (a) The name of each program.

26 (b) The goals, criteria, filing fees, nominating procedures,
27 eligibility requirements, processes, and deadlines for each
28 program.

1 (c) The maximum and minimum grant and loan available and
2 whether there is a match requirement for each program.

3 (d) The amount of any required match, and whether in-kind
4 contributions may be used as part or all of a required match.

5 (e) Information pertaining to the application process,
6 timeline for each program, and the contact people within the
7 department.

8 (f) The source of funds for each program, including the
9 citation of pertinent authorizing acts.

10 (g) Information regarding plans for the next fiscal year for
11 the phaseout, expansion, or changes for each program.

12 (h) A listing of all recipients of grants or loans awarded by
13 the department by type and amount of grant or loan.

14 (2) The reports required under this section shall be submitted
15 to the senate and house appropriations committees, the senate and
16 house fiscal agencies, and the state budget office by January 1,
17 2003.

18 Sec. 215. (1) The department shall report all of the following
19 information relative to allocations made in part 1 for the
20 environmental cleanup and redevelopment program, state cleanup,
21 emergency actions, superfund cleanup, the revitalization revolving
22 loan program, the brownfield grants and loans program, the leaking
23 underground storage tank cleanup program, the contaminated lake
24 and river sediments cleanup program, and the environmental
25 protection bond projects under section 19508(7) of the natural
26 resources and environmental protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL
27 324.19508, to the state budget director, the senate and house
28 appropriations subcommittees on environmental quality, and the

1 senate and house fiscal agencies:

2 (a) The name and location of the site for which an allocation
3 is made.

4 (b) The nature of the problem encountered at the site.

5 (c) A brief description of how the problem will be resolved if
6 the allocation is made for a response activity.

7 (d) The estimated date that site closure activities will be
8 completed.

9 (e) The amount of the allocation, or the anticipated financing
10 for the site.

11 (f) A summary of the sites and the total amount of funds
12 expended at the sites at the conclusion of the fiscal year.

13 (g) The number of sites that would qualify as brownfields that
14 were redeveloped.

15 (2) The report prepared under subsection (1) shall also
16 include all of the following:

17 (a) The status of all state-owned facilities that are on the
18 list compiled under part 201 of the natural resources and
19 environmental protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.20101 to
20 324.20142.

21 (b) The report shall include the total amount of funds
22 expended during the fiscal year and the total amount of funds
23 awaiting expenditure.

24 (c) The total amount of bonds issued for the environmental
25 protection bond program pursuant to part 193 of the natural
26 resources and environmental protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL
27 324.19301 to 324.19306, and bonds issued pursuant to the clean
28 Michigan initiative act, 1998 PA 284, MCL 324.95101 to 324.95108.

1 (3) The report shall be made available by March 31 of each
2 year.

3 Sec. 225. (1) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1
4 for the environmental cleanup and redevelopment program and the
5 leaking underground storage tank cleanup program, the department
6 of environmental quality is authorized to expend amounts remaining
7 from prior fiscal year appropriations to meet funding needs of
8 legislatively approved sites.

9 (2) Unexpended and unencumbered amounts remaining from
10 appropriations from the environmental protection bond fund
11 contained in 1989 PA 180, 1990 PA 55, 1990 PA 194, 1991 PA 31,
12 1991 PA 160, 1993 PA 74, 1993 PA 353, 1994 PA 442, 1996 PA 353,
13 and 1997 PA 114 are appropriated for expenditure for any site
14 listed in this bill and any site listed in the public acts
15 referenced in this section.

16 (3) Unexpended and unencumbered amounts remaining from
17 appropriations from the cleanup and redevelopment fund and
18 unclaimed bottle deposits fund contained in 1996 PA 319, 1997 PA
19 113, 1997 PA 114, 1998 PA 292, 1999 PA 125, 2000 PA 275 and 2001
20 PA 43 are appropriated for expenditure for any site listed in this
21 bill and any site listed in the public acts referenced in this
22 section.

23 (4) Unexpended and unencumbered amounts remaining from
24 appropriations from the clean Michigan initiative fund - response
25 activities contained in 1999 PA 111, 2000 PA 52, and 2000 PA 506
26 are appropriated for expenditure for any site listed in this bill
27 and any site listed in the public acts referenced in this section.

28 Sec. 259. From the funds appropriated in part 1 for

1 information technology, the department shall pay user fees to the
2 department of information technology for technology related
3 services and projects. Such user fees shall be subject to
4 provisions of an interagency agreement between the department and
5 the department of information technology.

6 Sec. 260. Amounts appropriated in part 1 for information
7 technology may be designated as work projects and carried forward
8 to support technology projects under the direction of the
9 department of information technology. Funds designated in this
10 manner are not available for expenditure until approved as work
11 projects under section 451a of the management and budget act, 1984
12 PA 431, MCL 18.1451a.

13 **SURFACE WATER QUALITY**

14 Sec. 501. Of the funds appropriated in part 1 for surface
15 water surveillance, a minimum of \$250,000.00 shall be designated
16 for grants to local organizations for water quality monitoring
17 activities.

18 **ENVIRONMENTAL RESPONSE**

19 Sec. 702. The unexpended portion of funds appropriated in part
20 1 for the state cleanup program, environmental cleanup and
21 redevelopment program, emergency cleanup action, contaminated site
22 investigations, cleanup and revitalization, revitalization
23 revolving loan program, and superfund cleanup projects is
24 considered work project appropriations and any unencumbered or
25 unallotted funds are carried forward into the succeeding fiscal
26 year. The following is in compliance with section 451a(1) of the
27 management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1451a:

28 (a) The purpose of the projects to be carried forward is to

1 provide contaminated site cleanup.

2 (b) The projects will be accomplished by contract.

3 (c) The total estimated cost of all projects is identified in
4 each line-item appropriation.

5 (d) The tentative completion date is September 30, 2007.

6 Sec. 703. Of the funds appropriated in part 1 as state match
7 for the superfund cleanup program, an amount not to exceed
8 \$250,000.00 shall be expended as state match for the hazardous
9 substance research center.

10 Sec. 705. Of the funds appropriated in part 1 for the
11 environmental cleanup and redevelopment program, an amount not to
12 exceed \$2,000,000 shall be expended for the NPL municipal landfill
13 match grants.

14 **STORAGE TANKS**

15 Sec. 801. (1) The funds appropriated in part 1 from the
16 Michigan underground storage tank financial assurance fund for the
17 purpose of carrying out the duties and responsibilities as
18 specified in part 215 of the natural resources and environmental
19 protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.21501 to 324.21551, are
20 considered work project appropriations and any unencumbered funds
21 are carried forward into the succeeding fiscal year. The
22 following is in compliance with section 451a(1) of the management
23 and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1451a:

24 (a) The purpose of the projects to be carried forward is to
25 carry out the responsibilities of part 215 of the natural
26 resources and environmental protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL
27 324.21501 to 324.21551.

28 (b) The projects will be accomplished by contract and state

1 employees.

2 (c) The total estimated cost is identified in a line-item
3 appropriation.

4 (d) The tentative completion date is September 30, 2007.

5 (2) The Michigan underground storage tank financial assurance
6 policy board shall allocate the amount of the underground storage
7 tank financial assurance fund to be distributed to the department.
8 If the amount recommended by the board is less than that
9 appropriated in part 1, expenditures shall be adjusted
10 accordingly.

11 (3) Included in the funds appropriated in part 1 from the
12 Michigan underground storage tank financial assurance fund are
13 funds sufficient to pay debt service costs on the bonds or notes
14 issued pursuant to part 215 of the natural resources and
15 environmental protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.21501 to
16 324.21551.

17 Sec. 802. The department shall report to the state budget
18 director, the senate and house appropriations subcommittees on
19 environmental quality, and the senate and house fiscal agencies
20 not later than October 31, 2003 on the Michigan underground
21 storage tank financial assurance fund. The report shall include
22 the fund balance, estimate of available revenues, number and
23 dollar value of claims processed through September 30, 2002, and
24 total estimated claims liability through December 22, 2004.

25 Sec. 803. The unexpended portion of the funds appropriated in
26 part 1 for the leaking underground storage tank cleanup program is
27 considered work project appropriations and any unencumbered or
28 unallotted funds are carried over into the succeeding fiscal year.

1 The following is in compliance with section 451a(1) of the
2 management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1451a:

3 (a) The purpose of the projects to be carried over is to
4 provide for redevelopment and contaminated site cleanup.

5 (b) These projects will be accomplished by contract.

6 (c) The total estimated costs of all projects is identified in
7 each line-item appropriation.

8 (d) The tentative completion date for these projects is
9 September 30, 2007.

10 **GRANTS**

11 Sec. 1201. If a certified health department does not exist in
12 a city, county, or district or does not fulfill its
13 responsibilities under part 117 of the natural resources and
14 environmental protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.11701 to
15 324.11719, then the department may spend funds appropriated in
16 part 1 under the septage waste compliance program in accordance
17 with section 11716 of the natural resources and environmental
18 protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.11716.

19 Sec. 1203. Of the funds appropriated in part 1 for scrap tire
20 grants, \$100,000.00 shall be available for grants to communities
21 to cover scrap tire fire suppression costs, provided owner
22 liability bonds and other available funding sources have been
23 exhausted.

24 **DEPARTMENT SUPPORT SERVICES**

25 Sec. 1301. Due to the consolidation of the department of
26 environmental quality operations for the purpose of increasing
27 agency efficiencies, effective October 1, 2002, the department of
28 environmental quality is prohibited from expending any of the

1 funds appropriated in part 1 of this bill for rental payments or
2 operational expenses for the leased premises located at 300 South
3 Washington, Lansing, Michigan.
