- (a) "DAG" means the United States department of agriculture.
- 21 (b) "DAG-NRCS" means the United States department of
- 22 agriculture natural resources conservation service.
- (c) "Department" means the department of agriculture.
- (d) "Director" means the director of the department.
- 25 (e) "EPA" means the United States environmental protection
- 26 agency.
- (f) "FTE" means full-time equated.
- 28 (g) "HHS-FDA" means the United States department of health and

- 1 human services food and drug administration.
- 2 (h) "IDG" means interdepartmental grant.
- 3 (i) "MDCH" means the Michigan department of community health.
- 4 (j) "MDCIS (LCC)" means the Michigan department of consumer
- 5 and industry services liquor control commission.
- 6 (k) "MDEQ" means the Michigan department of environmental7 quality.
- 8 (1) "MDNR" means the Michigan department of natural resources.
- 9 Sec. 204. The department of civil service shall bill
- 10 departments and agencies at the end of the first fiscal quarter
- 11 for the 1% charge authorized by section 5 of article XI of the
- 12 state constitution of 1963. Payments shall be made for the total
- 13 amount of the billing by the end of the second fiscal quarter.
- 14 Sec. 205. (1) A hiring freeze is imposed on the state
- 15 classified civil service. State departments and agencies are
- 16 prohibited from hiring any new full-time state classified civil
- 17 service employees and prohibited from filling any vacant state
- 18 classified civil service positions. This hiring freeze does not
- 19 apply to internal transfers of classified employees from one
- 20 position to another within a department.
- 21 (2) The state budget director shall grant exceptions to this
- 22 hiring freeze when the state budget director believes that the
- 23 hiring freeze will result in rendering a state department or
- 24 agency unable to deliver basic services, cause loss of revenue to
- 25 the state, result in the inability of the state to receive federal

- 4 Sec. 206. (1) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1,
- 5 there is appropriated an amount not to exceed \$5,000,000.00 for
- 6 federal contingency funds. These funds are not available for
- 7 expenditure until they have been transferred to another line item
- 8 in this bill under section 393(2) of the management and budget
- 9 act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1393.
- 10 (2) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1, there is
- 11 appropriated an amount not to exceed \$6,000,000.00 for state
- 12 restricted contingency funds. These funds are not available for
- 13 expenditure until they have been transferred to another line item
- 14 in this bill under section 393(2) of the management and budget
- 15 act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1393.
- 16 (3) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1, there is
- 17 appropriated an amount not to exceed \$100,000.00 for local
- 18 contingency funds. These funds are not available for expenditure
- 19 until they have been transferred to another line item in this bill
- 20 under section 393(2) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA
- 21 431, MCL 18.1393.
- 22 (4) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1, there is
- 23 appropriated an amount not to exceed \$100,000.00 for private
- 24 contingency funds. These funds are not available for expenditure
- 25 until they have been transferred to another line item in this bill
- 26 under section 393(2) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA
- **27** 431, MCL 18.1393.
- Sec. 208. Unless otherwise specified, the department shall use

- 1 the Internet to fulfill the reporting requirements of this bill.
- 2 This may include transmission of reports via electronic mail to
- 3 the recipients identified for each reporting requirement or it may
- 4 include placement of reports on an Internet or Intranet site.
- 5 Sec. 212. Of the funds appropriated in part 1, the department
- 6 may provide for indemnity as provided for pursuant to the animal
- 7 industry act of 1987, 1988 PA 466, MCL 287.701 to 287.747, not to
- 8 exceed \$10,000.00 per order from any line item for the fiscal year
- 9 ending September 30, 2003. Before the department provides for an
- 10 indemnification under this section, the department shall report
- 11 the reason for the indemnification, the amount of the
- 12 indemnification, and to whom the indemnification is to be paid.
- 13 The report shall be given to each member of the house and senate
- 14 appropriations subcommittees on agriculture, the senate and house
- 15 fiscal agencies, and the state budget director.
- 16 (2) All indemnification payments for individual livestock or
- 17 domestic animals within the heard, flock, or school shall be made
- 18 pursuant to section 14 of the animal industry act, 1988 PA 466,
- 19 MCL 287.714, based on 100% of the fair market value of that type
- 20 of livestock or domestic animal, not to exceed \$4,000.00.
- 21 Sec. 259. From the funds appropriated in part 1 for
- 22 information technology, the department shall pay user fees to the
- 23 department of information technology for technology related
- 24 services and projects. Such user fees shall be subject to
- 25 provisions of an interagency agreement between the department and
- 26 the department of information technology.
- 27 Sec. 260. Amounts appropriated in part 1 for information
- 28 technology may be designated as work projects and carried forward

- 1 to support technology projects under the direction of the
- 2 department of information technology. Funds designated in this
- 3 manner are not available for expenditure until approved as work
- 4 projects under section 451a of the management and budget act, 1984
- **5** PA 431, MCL 18.1451a.

6 EXECUTIVE

- 7 Sec. 301. The appropriations in part 1 may be used for per
- 8 diem payments to members of boards, committees, and commissions
- 9 for a full day's board, committee, or commission work at which a
- 10 quorum is present; for attending a hearing as authorized by the
- 11 respective board, committee, or commission; or for performing
- 12 official business as authorized by the respective board,
- 13 committee, or commission. The per diem payments shall be at a
- 14 rate as follows:
- 16 (b) Upper Peninsula state fair board \$ 50.00 per day
- 17 (c) Agricultural marketing and bargaining
- 19 (d) Michigan state fair council \$ 50.00 per day
- 20 (e) Grape and wine industry council \$ 50.00 per day
- 21 Sec. 302. The department may receive and expend revenue and
- 22 use that revenue to cover necessary expenses related to
- 23 publications, audit and licensing functions, livestock sales,
- 24 certification of nursery stock, bean inspection services, and
- 25 laboratory analyses as specified in the following:
- 26 (a) Management services publications.
- 27 (b) Management services audit and licensing functions.
- (c) Upper Peninsula state fair livestock sales.

- 1 (d) Pesticide and plant pest management propagation and
- 2 certification of virus free foundation stock.
- 3 (e) Pesticide and plant pest management bean inspection and
- 4 grading services.
- 5 (f) Laboratory support testing for testing horses in draft
- 6 horse pulling contests at county fairs when local jurisdictions
- 7 request state assistance.
- 8 (g) Laboratory support analyses to determine foreign
- 9 substances in horses engaged in racing or pulling contests at
- 10 tracks.
- 11 (h) Laboratory support analysis of food, livestock, and
- 12 agricultural products for disease, foreign products for disease,
- 13 toxic materials, foreign substances, and quality standards.
- 14 (i) Laboratory support test samples for other agencies and
- 15 organizations.
- 16 (j) Fruit and vegetable inspection at shipping and termination
- 17 points and processing plants.

18 FOOD AND DAIRY

- 19 Sec. 401. The department shall monitor restaurant inspection
- 20 and licensing functions carried out by local health departments to
- 21 ensure uniform application and enforcement of minimum program
- 22 requirements. On or before April 1, 2003, the department shall
- 23 report to the senate and house appropriations subcommittees on
- 24 agriculture, the senate and house fiscal agencies, and the state
- 25 budget director on local health department conformance with
- 26 minimum program requirements.
- 27 Sec. 450. From the funds appropriated in part 1 for the
- 28 bovine tuberculosis program, the department of agriculture shall

- 1 reimburse the department of natural resources for those costs
- 2 associated with monitoring and testing wildlife for bovine
- 3 tuberculosis that are necessary to support the department of
- 4 agriculture goals and are jointly agreed to by the department of
- 5 agriculture and the department of natural resources to be in
- 6 excess of efforts necessary to effectively plan and execute the
- 7 eradication of bovine tuberculosis from Michigan's wild free-
- 8 ranging deer herd.

9 PESTICIDE AND PLANT PEST MANAGEMENT

- 10 Sec. 503. The department is authorized to enter into a
- 11 cooperative agreement with a nonprofit foundation or agency
- 12 associated with the gypsy moth slow-the-spread program in order to
- 13 receive funds for managing plant pests.

14 ENVIRONMENTAL STEWARDSHIP

- 15 Sec. 601. The funds appropriated in part 1 for the energy
- 16 conservation program shall be distributed on a competitive basis
- 17 that will be based on statewide energy conservation criteria.
- 18 Sec. 602. (1) The department may expend the amount
- 19 appropriated in part 1 for migrant labor housing grants for
- 20 construction of new migrant labor housing grants for construction
- 21 of new migrant labor housing. Beginning October 1, 2002, project
- 22 grants shall not exceed \$5,000.00 per unit. Beginning October 1,
- 23 2002, an applicant is not eliqible for more than a \$20,000.00
- 24 grant in any fiscal year.
- 25 Sec. 604. The appropriation in part 1 for local conservation
- 26 districts shall be allocated in the following manner:
- 27 (a) Of the total appropriation, \$130,000.00 shall be allocated
- 28 for local conservation district training.

- 1 (b) Of the total appropriation, each local conservation
- 2 district meeting the minimum grant requirements shall receive a
- 3 grant of \$20,000.00 to support basic operations, unless the
- 4 district resides in a county consisting of multiple districts, in
- 5 which case a \$20,000.00 grant shall be divided equally among the
- 6 districts in that county. The amount of money allocated under
- 7 this subdivision shall not be used by local conservation districts
- 8 to replace any money received from local sources.
- 9 (c) Of the remaining appropriation after distributions under
- 10 subdivisions (a) and (b), additional grants, not to exceed
- 11 \$20,000.00 per local conservation district, may be provided based
- 12 on a formula approved by the commission of agriculture. Grants
- 13 under this subdivision shall require at least a 100% cash or in-
- 14 kind local match. Criteria used to distribute grants under this
- 15 subdivision shall include, but are not limited to, the natural
- 16 resources need, the size, and the population of the area served by
- 17 each local conservation district.

18 MARKET DEVELOPMENT

- 19 Sec. 701. Within the appropriations in part 1 for market
- 20 development, \$603,000.00 is for the grape and wine industry
- 21 council, from which the department may provide grants for the
- 22 purposes as described in section 303 of the Michigan liquor
- 23 control code of 1998, 1998 PA 58, MCL 436.1303.
- 24 Sec. 702. In any given year when insufficient amounts of
- 25 Michigan surplus products are offered to the food bank council and
- 26 accepted for distribution, unused funds may be applied by the food
- 27 bank council for the direct purchase of foods from Michigan
- 28 growers, manufacturers, or wholesalers.

- 1 Sec. 704. Indirect costs may not be charged against the future
- 2 farmers of America grant in part 1 by any administering agency.
- 3 Sec. 707. The department is authorized to receive and expend
- 4 up to \$5,000,000 of utility company uncollectible allowance
- 5 recovery fund resources which may be deposited into the
- 6 agricultural development fund for the support of grants for value-
- 7 added agricultural processing and agricultural production ventures
- 8 in accordance with the Julian-Stille Value-Added Act, P.A. 322 of
- 9 2000. The agriculture development fund resources when certified
- 10 as available by the department of treasury, shall remain
- 11 unallotted until such time as the state budget director has
- 12 reviewed and approved a department submitted allotment schedule.
- 13 Expenditures for support of agricultural processing and production
- 14 ventures shall not exceed revenues received. Unexpended resources
- 15 remaining in the fund at the end of the fiscal year shall remain
- 16 in the fund and not lapse to the general fund.

17 FAIRS AND EXPOSITIONS

- 18 Sec. 802. (1) The appropriation of \$297,100.00 in part 1 for
- 19 standardbred purses and supplements licensed tracks is intended
- 20 to provide state purse supplements for 4 races at state licensed
- 21 pari-mutuel horse racing tracks. The purse supplements are to be
- 22 used for races comprised only of Michigan-bred horses segregated
- 23 into a 4-year-old colt trot division, a 4-year-old filly trot
- 24 division, a 4-year-old colt pace division, and a 4-year-old filly
- 25 pace division.
- 26 (2) The appropriation in part 1 for licensed tracks light
- 27 horse racing shall be allocated as follows:
- 28 Arabian and Appaloosa horse racing \$ 20,600

- 2 Sec. 803. Included in the appropriation made in part 1 for the
- 3 thoroughbred program is \$30,500.00 for the Michigan united
- 4 thoroughbred breeders and owners association to conduct a
- 5 thoroughbred yearling show. The Michigan united thoroughbred
- 6 breeders and owners association shall submit to the department an
- 7 itemized list of expenses showing that the expenses of the
- 8 yearling show were paid.
- 9 Sec. 804. From the funds appropriated in part 1 for
- 10 thoroughbred owners' awards, the department shall develop a
- 11 program to provide for thoroughbred owners' awards that will be
- 12 given to owners of Michigan-bred horses finishing first in
- 13 nonrestricted races at licensed pari-mutuel tracks in Michigan.
- 14 Sec. 806. A county fair, district fair, 4-H fair, or state
- 15 fair receiving funds in part 1 to be used for prizes or awards, in
- 16 whole or in part, as a condition precedent to the receiving of the
- 17 funds for those purposes, shall publish the rules relative to the
- 18 prizes, awards, and deadlines for entries eligible for the funds
- 19 in their official premium books or lists relative to the prizes or
- 20 awards. An aggrieved exhibitor may make a written complaint to
- 21 the fair within 10 days after the fair ends. If the fair has not
- 22 satisfactorily settled the grievance within 45 days after it is
- 23 submitted to the fair, the aggrieved person may file the complaint
- 24 with the department and the department shall investigate the
- 25 complaint and make a finding of fact regarding the complaint and
- 26 take appropriate action regarding the complaint.
- Sec. 807. Of the amount appropriated in part 1 for purses and
- 28 supplements fairs/licensed tracks, a sufficient amount is

- 1 appropriated to provide for overnight purse supplements pursuant
- 2 to the horse racing law of 1995, 1995 PA 279, MCL 431.301 to
- **3** 431.336.
- 4 Sec. 809. From the appropriations for premiums county and
- 5 state fairs in part 1, \$120,000.00 shall be awarded through a
- 6 competitive grant program to local, regional, or state fairs or
- 7 expositions to promote youth involvement and adult exhibitions in
- 8 the animal agriculture industry. Appropriate exhibition classes
- 9 for youth shall be developed that encourage a production exhibit
- 10 for which premium awards may be paid. The age for youth
- 11 exhibitors shall be determined by the standards of the association
- 12 requesting the grant or, if standards do not exist, the age for
- 13 youth exhibitors shall be ages 9 through 21. Implementation of
- 14 the latest technologies into the evaluation of the animals shall
- 15 be encouraged in the production exhibit. Adult exhibitions should
- 16 focus on the performance or end product, or both, with the
- 17 appropriate technologies used to enhance placings and the awarding
- 18 of premiums.
- 19 Sec. 811. The funds appropriated in part 1 for distribution of
- 20 outstanding wining tickets are not available for expenditure until
- 21 they are deposited in the agriculture equine industry development
- 22 fund pursuant to section 2 of 1951 PA 90, MCL 431.252. These
- 23 funds shall be expended in accordance with section 2 of 1951 PA
- 24 90, MCL 431.252, and only after they have been transferred to
- 25 another line item in this bill under section 393(2) of the
- 26 management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1393.
- 27 Sec. 812. An individual or other entity that leases land, a
- 28 building, or other property under the Michigan exposition and

- 1 fairgrounds act, 1978 PA 361, MCL 285.161 to 285.176, is not
- 2 eligible for a state grant, loan, appropriation, or other state
- 3 subsidy related to the leased land, building, or other property.

4 OFFICE OF RACING COMMISSIONER

- 5 Sec. 901. The racing commissioner may pay rewards of not more
- 6 than \$5,800.00 to a person who provides information that results
- 7 in the arrest and conviction on a felony or misdemeanor charge for
- 8 a crime that involves the horse racing industry. A reward paid
- 9 pursuant to this section shall be paid out of the office of racing
- 10 commissioner line item.
