A SUMMARY OF SENATE BILL 1453 AS PASSED BY THE SENATE

The bill would amend the Michigan Renaissance Zone Act to authorize the board of the Michigan Strategic Fund to designate a "redevelopment renaissance zone." (This would be in addition to currently authorized zones). A redevelopment renaissance zone would have to promote the development of existing industrial facilities.

Under the act, businesses and residents within a renaissance zone are eligible for tax exemptions and credits, including exemptions from the single business tax, the state income tax, a city income tax, and property taxes. Under the bill, residents and businesses in a redevelopment renaissance zone would <u>not be eligible</u> for the city income tax exemption or the property tax exemption.

"Redevelopment renaissance zone" would mean a renaissance zone that contains an industrial site of 200 or more acres located in a city with a population of more than 7,500 and less than 8,500 and in a county with a population of more than 60,000 and less than 70,000 (i.e., the City of Greenville in Montcalm County).

FISCAL IMPACT:

The bill could reduce state revenue by an indeterminate amount. Without knowing the amount of economic activity that would result from the additional renaissance zone, the bill's fiscal impact cannot be accurately determined.
