- 4 (a) "Commission" means the commission of natural resources.
- 5 (b) "DAG" means the United States department of agriculture.
- 6 (c) "Department" means the department of natural resources.
- 7 (d) "DHS" means the United States department of homeland
- 8 security.
- 9 (e) "DOC" means the United States department of commerce.
- 10 (f) "DOE" means the United States department of energy.
- 11 (g) "DOI" means the United States department of interior.
- 12 (h) "DOT" means the United States department of
- 13 transportation.
- 14 (i) "EPA" means the United States environmental protection
- 15 agency.
- 16 (j) "FTE" means full-time equated.

- 19 Sec. 204. The department of civil service shall bill

- 20 Sec. 209. Within 14 days after the release of the executive
- 21 budget recommendation, the department shall provide the state
- 22 budget director, the senate and house appropriations subcommittees
- 23 on natural resources, and the senate and house fiscal agencies with
- 24 an annual report on estimated restricted fund balances, projected
- 25 revenues, and expenditures for the fiscal years ending September

- 1 appropriations under this act shall receive and retain copies of

- 9 department shall prepare a report that lists all of the following

- 13 (b) The goals, criteria, filing fees, nominating procedures,
