EXECUTIVE BUDGET BILL

February 21, 2006, Introduced by Rep. Brown and referred to the Committee on Appropriations.

A bill to make appropriations for the department of environmental quality for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2007; to provide for the expenditure of those appropriations; to create certain funds and accounts; to require certain reports; to prescribe the powers and duties of certain state agencies and officials; to authorize certain transfers by certain state agencies; and to provide for the disposition of fees and other income received by the various state agencies.

- 5 (a) "Department" means the department of environmental

- 7 (b) "DHS" means the United States department of homeland
- 8 security.
- 9 (c) "DHHS" means the United States department of health and

- (d) "DOC" means the United States department of commerce.
- 12 (e) "DOC-NOAA" means the DOC national oceanic and atmospheric

- 25 Sec. 204. The department of civil service shall bill
- 26 departments and agencies at the end of the first fiscal quarter for
- 27 the 1% charge authorized by section 5 of article XI of the state

- 1 constitution of 1963. Payments shall be made for the total amount
- 2 of the billing by the end of the second fiscal quarter.
- 3 Sec. 205. (1) A hiring freeze is imposed on the state
- 4 classified civil service. State departments and agencies are
- 5 prohibited from hiring any new full-time state classified civil
- 6 service employees and prohibited from filling any vacant state
- 7 classified civil service positions. This hiring freeze does not
- 8 apply to internal transfers of classified employees from 1 position

- 27 Sec. 207. Funds appropriated in part 1 shall not be used for

- 1 the purchase of foreign goods or services, or both, if
- 2 competitively priced and of comparable quality American goods or
- 3 services, or both, are available. Preference should be given to
- 4 goods or services, or both, manufactured or provided by Michigan
- 5 businesses if they are competitively priced and of comparable

- 8 ensure businesses in deprived and depressed communities compete for
