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SENATE BILL No. 1283

May 25, 2006, Introduced by Senator PATTERSON and referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

A bill to amend 1970 PA 91, entitled "Child custody act of 1970,"

by amending section 7b (MCL 722.27b), as amended by 2004 PA 542.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF MICHIGAN ENACT:

- Sec. 7b. (1) A child's grandparent may seek a grandparentingtime order under 1 or more of the following circumstances:
- (a) An action for divorce, separate maintenance, or annulmentinvolving the child's parents is pending before the court.
 - (b) The child's parents are divorced, separated under a judgment of separate maintenance, or have had their marriage annulled.
 - (c) The child's parent who is a child of the grandparents is deceased.

- 1 (d) The child's parents have never been married, they are not
- 2 residing in the same household, and paternity has been established
- 3 by the completion of an acknowledgment of parentage under the
- 4 acknowledgment of parentage act, 1996 PA 305, MCL 722.1001 to
- 5 722.1013, by an order of filiation entered under the paternity act,
- 6 1956 PA 205, MCL 722.711 to 722.730, or by a determination by a
- 7 court of competent jurisdiction that the individual is the father
- 8 of the child.
- 9 (e) Except as otherwise provided in subsection (13), legal
- 10 custody of the child has been given to a person other than the
- 11 child's parent, or the child is placed outside of and does not
- 12 reside in the home of a parent.
- 13 (f) In the year preceding the commencement of an action under
- 14 subsection (3) for grandparenting time, the grandparent provided an
- 15 established custodial environment for the child as described in
- 16 section 7, whether or not the grandparent had custody under a court
- 17 order.
- 18 (2) A court shall not permit a parent of a father who has
- 19 never been married to the child's mother to seek an order for
- 20 grandparenting time under this section unless the father has
- 21 completed an acknowledgment of parentage under the acknowledgment
- 22 of parentage act, 1996 PA 305, MCL 722.1001 to 722.1013, an order
- 23 of filiation has been entered under the paternity act, 1956 PA 205,
- 24 MCL 722.711 to 722.730, or the father has been determined to be the
- 25 father by a court of competent jurisdiction. The court shall not
- 26 permit the parent of a putative father to seek an order for
- 27 grandparenting time unless the putative father has provided

- 1 substantial and regular support or care in accordance with the
- 2 putative father's ability to provide the support or care.
- 3 (3) A grandparent seeking a grandparenting time order shall
- 4 commence an action for grandparenting time, as follows:
- 5 (a) If the circuit court has continuing jurisdiction over the
- 6 child, the child's grandparent shall seek a grandparenting time
- 7 order by filing a motion with the circuit court in the county where
- 8 the court has continuing jurisdiction.
- 9 (b) If the circuit court does not have continuing jurisdiction
- 10 over the child, the child's grandparent shall seek a grandparenting
- 11 time order by filing a complaint in the circuit court for the
- 12 county where the child resides.
- 13 (4) All of the following apply to an action for
- 14 grandparenting time under subsection (3):
- 16 under subsection (3) shall be accompanied by an affidavit setting
- 17 forth facts supporting the requested order. The grandparent shall
- 18 give notice of the filing to each person who has legal custody of,
- 19 or an order for parenting time with, the child. A party having
- 20 legal custody may file an opposing affidavit. A hearing shall be
- 21 held by the court on its own motion or if a party requests a
- 22 hearing. At the hearing, parties submitting affidavits shall be
- 23 allowed an opportunity to be heard.
- 24 (b) In order to give deference to the decisions of fit
- 25 parents, it is presumed in a proceeding under this subsection that
- 26 a fit parent's decision to deny grandparenting time does not create
- 27 a substantial risk of harm to the child's mental, physical, or

- 1 emotional health. To rebut the presumption created in this
- 2 subdivision, a grandparent filing a complaint or motion under this
- 3 section must prove by a preponderance of the evidence that the
- 4 parent's decision to deny grandparenting time creates a substantial
- 5 risk of harm to the child's mental, physical, or emotional health.
- 6 If the grandparent does not overcome the presumption, the court
- 7 shall dismiss the complaint or deny the motion.
- 8 (c) If a court of appellate jurisdiction determines in a final
- 9 and nonappealable judgment that the burden of proof described in
- 10 subdivision (b) is unconstitutional, a grandparent filing a
- 11 complaint or motion under this section must prove by clear and
- 12 convincing evidence that the parent's decision to deny
- 13 grandparenting time creates a substantial risk of harm to the
- 14 child's mental, physical, or emotional health to rebut the
- 15 presumption created in subdivision (b).
- 16 (5) If 2 fit parents sign an affidavit stating that they both
- 17 oppose an order for grandparenting time, the court shall dismiss a
- 18 complaint or motion seeking an order for grandparenting time filed
- 19 under subsection (3). This subsection does not apply if 1 of the
- 20 fit parents is a stepparent who adopted a child under the Michigan
- 21 adoption code, chapter X of the probate code of 1939, 1939 PA 288,
- 22 MCL 710.21 to 710.70, and the grandparent seeking the order is the
- 23 natural or adoptive parent of a parent of the child who is deceased
- 24 or whose parental rights have been terminated.
- 25 (6) If the court finds that a grandparent has met the
- 26 standard for rebutting the presumption described in subsection (4)
- 27 AN ACTION FOR GRANDPARENTING TIME IS FILED UNDER THIS SECTION, the

- 1 court shall consider whether it is in the best interests of the
- 2 child to enter an order for grandparenting time. If the court finds
- 3 by a preponderance of the evidence that it is in the best interests
- 4 of the child to enter a grandparenting time order, the court shall
- 5 enter an order providing for reasonable grandparenting time of the
- 6 child by the grandparent by general or specific terms and
- 7 conditions. In determining the best interests of the child under
- 8 this subsection, the court shall consider all of the following:
- 9 (a) The love, affection, and other emotional ties existing
- 10 between the grandparent and the child.
- 11 (b) The length and quality of the prior relationship between
- 12 the child and the grandparent, the role performed by the
- 13 grandparent, and the existing emotional ties of the child to the
- 14 grandparent.
- 15 (c) The **GEOGRAPHICAL LOCATION OF THE** grandparent's -moral
- 16 fitness RESIDENCE AND THE DISTANCE BETWEEN THAT RESIDENCE AND THE
- 17 CHILD'S RESIDENCE.
- 18 (d) The -grandparent's- mental and physical health OF ALL OF
- 19 THE PARTIES INVOLVED.
- (e) The child's reasonable preference, if the court considers
- 21 the child to be of sufficient age to express a preference.
- 22 (f) The <u>effect on the child of hostility between the</u>
- 23 grandparent and the parent of the child CHILD'S ADJUSTMENT TO
- 24 HOME, SCHOOL, AND COMMUNITY.
- 25 (g) The willingness of the grandparent, except in the case of
- 26 abuse or neglect, to encourage a close relationship between the
- 27 child and the parent or parents of the child AMOUNT OF TIME THAT

- 1 WILL BE AVAILABLE FOR THE CHILD TO SPEND WITH SIBLINGS.
- 2 (h) Any history of physical, emotional, or sexual abuse or
- 3 neglect of any child by the grandparent.
- 4 (i) Whether the parent's decision to deny, or lack of an
- 5 offer of, grandparenting time is related to the child's well-being
- 6 or is for some other unrelated reason THE WISHES AND CONCERNS OF
- 7 THE CHILD'S PARENTS, AS EXPRESSED BY THEM TO THE COURT.
- 8 (J) THE AGE OF THE CHILD.
- 9 (K) THE HEALTH AND SAFETY OF THE CHILD.
- 10 (l) -(j)— Any other factor relevant to the -physical and
- 11 psychological well-being BEST INTERESTS of the child.
- 12 (7) If the court has determined that a grandparent has met
- 13 the standard for rebutting the presumption described in subsection
- 14 (4), the THE court may refer that A grandparent's complaint or
- 15 motion for grandparenting time filed under subsection (3) to
- 16 domestic relations mediation as provided by supreme court rule. If
- 17 the complaint or motion is referred to the friend of the court
- 18 mediation service and no settlement is reached through friend of
- 19 the court mediation within a reasonable time after the date of
- 20 referral, the complaint or motion shall be heard by the court as
- 21 provided in this section.
- 22 (8) A grandparent may not file more than once every 2 years,
- 23 absent a showing of good cause, a complaint or motion under
- 24 subsection (3) seeking a grandparenting time order. If the court
- 25 finds there is good cause to allow a grandparent to file more than
- 26 1 complaint or motion under this section in a 2-year period, the
- 27 court shall allow the filing and shall consider the complaint or

- 1 motion. Upon motion of a person, the court may order reasonable
- 2 attorney fees to the prevailing party.
- 3 (9) The court shall not enter an order prohibiting an
- 4 individual who has legal custody of a child from changing the
- 5 domicile of the child if the prohibition is primarily for the
- 6 purpose of allowing a grandparent to exercise the rights conferred
- 7 in a grandparenting time order entered under this section.
- 8 (10) A grandparenting time order entered under this section
- 9 does not create parental rights in the individual or individuals to
- 10 whom grandparenting time rights are granted. The entry of a
- 11 grandparenting time order does not prevent a court of competent
- 12 jurisdiction from acting upon the custody of the child, the
- 13 parental rights of the child, or the adoption of the child.
- 14 (11) A court shall not modify or terminate a grandparenting
- 15 time order entered under this section unless it finds by a
- 16 preponderance of the evidence, on the basis of facts that have
- 17 arisen since entry of the grandparenting time order or were unknown
- 18 to the court at the time it entered that order, that a change has
- 19 occurred in the circumstances of the child or his or her custodian
- 20 and that a modification or termination of the existing order is
- 21 necessary to avoid creating a substantial risk of harm to the
- 22 mental, physical, or emotional health IN THE BEST INTERESTS of the
- 23 child. A court modifying or terminating a grandparenting time order
- 24 under this subsection shall include specific findings of fact in
- 25 its order in support of its decision.
- 26 (12) The court shall make a record of its analysis and
- 27 findings under subsections -(4), (6), (8), and (11), including the

- 1 reasons for granting or denying a requested grandparenting time
- 2 order.
- 3 (13) Except as otherwise provided in this subsection, adoption
- 4 of a child or placement of a child for adoption under the Michigan
- 5 adoption code, chapter X of the probate code of 1939, 1939 PA 288,
- 6 MCL 710.21 to 710.70, terminates the right of a grandparent to
- 7 commence an action for grandparenting time with that child.
- 8 Adoption of a child by a stepparent under the Michigan adoption
- 9 code, chapter X of the probate code of 1939, 1939 PA 288, MCL
- 10 710.21 to 710.70, does not terminate the right of a grandparent to
- 11 commence an action for grandparenting time with that child.
