SENATE BILL No. 621

June 27, 2007, Introduced by Senators SCOTT, BASHAM, JACOBS, ANDERSON, BRATER, HUNTER, THOMAS, SWITALSKI, CLARKE and SCHAUER and referred to the Committee on Agriculture.

A bill to amend 1981 PA 93, entitled "Michigan right to farm act,"

by amending sections 2 and 4 (MCL 286.472 and 286.474), section 2 as amended by 1995 PA 94 and section 4 as amended by 1999 PA 261.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF MICHIGAN ENACT:

- 1 Sec. 2. As used in this act:
- 2 (A) "ADVERSE EFFECTS ON THE ENVIRONMENT OR PUBLIC HEALTH"
- 3 MEANS ANY UNREASONABLE RISK TO HUMAN BEINGS OR THE ENVIRONMENT,
- 4 BASED ON SCIENTIFIC EVIDENCE AND TAKING INTO ACCOUNT THE ECONOMIC,
- 5 SOCIAL, AND ENVIRONMENTAL COSTS AND BENEFITS AND SPECIFIC
- 5 POPULATIONS WHOSE HEALTH MAY BE ADVERSELY AFFECTED.
 - (B) "COMMISSION" MEANS THE COMMISSION OF AGRICULTURE.
- (C) "CONCENTRATED ANIMAL FEEDING OPERATION" OR "CAFO" MEANS

- 1 THAT TERM AS DEFINED IN R 323.2102(I) OF THE MICHIGAN
- 2 ADMINISTRATIVE CODE.
- 3 (D) "DEPARTMENT" MEANS THE DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE.
- 4 (E) "DIRECTOR" MEANS THE DIRECTOR OF THE DEPARTMENT OR HIS OR
- 5 HER DESIGNEE.
- 6 (F) (a) "Farm" means the land, plants, animals, buildings,
- 7 structures, including ponds used for agricultural or aquacultural
- 8 activities, machinery, equipment, and other appurtenances used in
- 9 the commercial production of farm products.
- 10 (G) (b)—"Farm operation" means the operation and management of
- 11 a farm or a condition or activity that occurs at any time as
- 12 necessary on a farm in connection with the commercial production,
- 13 harvesting, and storage of farm products, and includes, but is not
- 14 limited to, ALL OF THE FOLLOWING:
- 15 (i) Marketing produce at roadside stands or farm markets.
- 16 (ii) The generation of noise, odors, dust, fumes, and other
- 17 associated conditions.
- 18 (iii) The operation of machinery and equipment necessary for a
- 19 farm including, but not limited to, irrigation and drainage systems
- 20 and pumps and on-farm grain dryers, and the movement of vehicles,
- 21 machinery, equipment, and farm products and associated inputs
- 22 necessary for farm operations on the roadway as authorized by the
- 23 Michigan vehicle code, Act No. 300 of the Public Acts of 1949,
- 24 being sections 257.1 to 257.923 of the Michigan Compiled Laws 1949
- 25 PA 300, MCL 257.1 TO 257.923.
- 26 (iv) Field preparation and ground and aerial seeding and
- 27 spraying.

- $\mathbf{1}$ (v) The application of chemical fertilizers or organic
- 2 materials, conditioners, liming materials, or pesticides.
- 3 (vi) Use of alternative pest management techniques.
- 4 (vii) The fencing, feeding, watering, sheltering,
- 5 transportation, treatment, use, handling and care of farm animals.
- 6 (viii) The management, storage, transport, utilization, and
- 7 application of farm by-products, including manure or agricultural
- 8 wastes.
- 9 (ix) The conversion from a farm operation activity to other
- 10 farm operation activities.
- 11 (x) The employment and use of labor.
- 12 (H) (c) "Farm product" means those plants and animals useful
- 13 to human beings produced by agriculture and includes, but is not
- 14 limited to, forages and sod crops, grains and feed crops, field
- 15 crops, dairy and dairy products, poultry and poultry products,
- 16 cervidae, livestock, including breeding and grazing, equine, fish,
- 17 and other aquacultural products, bees and bee products, berries,
- 18 herbs, fruits, vegetables, flowers, seeds, grasses, nursery stock,
- 19 trees and tree products, mushrooms, and other similar products, or
- 20 any other product which incorporates the use of food, feed, fiber,
- 21 or fur, as determined by the Michigan commission of agriculture.
- 22 (I) (d)—"Generally accepted agricultural and management
- 23 practices" means those practices as defined by the Michigan
- 24 commission of agriculture. The commission shall give due
- 25 consideration to available Michigan department of agriculture
- 26 information and written recommendations from the Michigan state
- 27 university college of agriculture and natural resources extension

- 1 and the MICHIGAN STATE UNIVERSITY agricultural experiment station
- 2 in cooperation with the United States department of agriculture
- 3 natural resources conservation service and the consolidated farm
- 4 service agency, the Michigan department of natural resources, and
- 5 Other THE DEPARTMENT OF ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY, AGRICULTURAL
- 6 professional and industry organizations, AND ANY STATEWIDE
- 7 ENVIRONMENTAL ORGANIZATIONS.
- 8 (J) (e) "Person" means an individual, corporation,
- 9 partnership, association, or other legal entity.
- 10 Sec. 4. (1) Subject to subsection (2), the director shall
- 11 investigate all complaints involving a farm or farm operation,
- 12 including, but not limited to, complaints involving the use of
- 13 manure and other nutrients, agricultural waste products, dust,
- 14 noise, odor, fumes, air pollution, surface water or groundwater
- 15 pollution, food and agricultural processing by-products, care of
- 16 farm animals and pest infestations. Within 7 business days of AFTER
- 17 receipt of the complaint, the director shall conduct an on-site
- 18 inspection of the farm or farm operation. The director shall
- 19 notify, in writing, the city, village, or township and the county
- 20 in which the farm or farm operation is located of the complaint.
- 21 (2) The commission and the director shall enter into a
- 22 memorandum of understanding with the director of the department of
- 23 environmental quality. The investigation and resolution of
- 24 environmental complaints concerning farms or farm operations shall
- 25 be conducted in accordance with the memorandum of understanding.
- 26 However, the director shall notify the department of environmental
- 27 quality of any potential violation of the natural resources and

- 1 environmental protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.101 to
- 2 324.90106, or a rule promulgated under that act. Activities at a
- 3 farm or farm operation are subject to applicable provisions of the
- 4 natural resources and environmental protection act, 1994 PA 451,
- 5 MCL 324.101 to 324.90106, and the rules promulgated under that act.
- 6 The commission and the director shall develop procedures for the
- 7 investigation and resolution for other farm-related complaints.
- 8 (3) If the director finds upon investigation under subsection
- 9 (1) that the person responsible for a farm or farm operation is
- 10 using generally accepted agricultural and management practices, the
- 11 director shall notify, in writing, that person, the complainant,
- 12 and the city, village, or township and the county in which the farm
- 13 or farm operation is located of this finding. If the director
- 14 identifies that the source or potential sources of the problem were
- 15 caused by the use of other than generally accepted agricultural and
- 16 management practices, the director shall advise the person
- 17 responsible for the farm or farm operation that necessary changes
- 18 should be made to resolve or abate the problem and to conform with
- 19 generally accepted agricultural and management practices and that
- 20 if those changes cannot be implemented within 30 days, the person
- 21 responsible for the farm or farm operation shall submit to the
- 22 director an implementation plan including a schedule for completion
- 23 of the necessary changes. When the director conducts a follow-up
- 24 on-site inspection to verify whether those changes have been
- 25 implemented, the director shall notify, in writing, the city,
- 26 village, or township and the county in which the farm or farm
- 27 operation is located of the time and date of the follow-up on-site

- 1 inspection and shall allow a representative of the city, village,
- 2 or township and the county to be present during the follow-up on-
- 3 site inspection. If the changes have been implemented, the director
- 4 shall notify, in writing, the person responsible for the farm or
- 5 farm operation, the complainant, and the city, village, or township
- 6 and the county in which the farm or farm operation is located of
- 7 this determination. If the changes have not been implemented, the
- 8 director shall notify, in writing, the complainant and the city,
- 9 village, or township and the county in which the farm or farm
- 10 operation is located that the changes have not been implemented and
- 11 whether a plan for implementation has been submitted. Upon request,
- 12 the director shall provide a copy of the implementation plan to the
- 13 city, village, or township and the county in which the farm or farm
- 14 operation is located. IF A SECOND OR SUBSEQUENT ON-SITE FOLLOW-UP
- 15 INSPECTION IS NECESSARY, THE FARM OR FARM OPERATION SHALL BE
- 16 ASSESSED \$500.00 FOR EACH INSPECTION. MONEY COLLECTED BY THE
- 17 DEPARTMENT UNDER THIS SUBSECTION SHALL BE FORWARDED TO THE STATE
- 18 TREASURER AND CREDITED TO THE GENERAL FUND.
- 19 (4) A complainant who brings more than 3 unverified complaints
- 20 against the same farm or farm operation within 3 years may be
- 21 ordered, by the director, to pay to the department the full costs
- 22 of investigation of any fourth or subsequent unverified complaint
- 23 against the same farm or farm operation. As used in this
- 24 subsection, "unverified complaint" means a complaint in response to
- 25 which the director determines that the farm or farm operation is
- 26 using generally accepted agricultural and management practices.
- 27 (5) Except as provided in subsection (6), this act does not

- 1 affect the application of state statutes and federal statutes.
- 2 (6) Beginning June 1, 2000, except EXCEPT as otherwise
- 3 provided in this section, it is the express legislative intent that
- 4 this act preempt any local ordinance, regulation, or resolution
- 5 that purports to extend or revise in any manner the provisions of
- 6 this act or generally accepted agricultural and management
- 7 practices developed under this act. Except as otherwise provided in
- 8 this section, a local unit of government shall not enact, maintain,
- 9 or enforce an ordinance, regulation, or resolution that conflicts
- 10 in any manner with this act or generally accepted agricultural and
- 11 management practices developed under this act. THE PREEMPTION AND
- 12 PROHIBITION ON LOCAL ORDINANCES UNDER THIS SECTION DOES NOT APPLY
- 13 TO SETBACK REQUIREMENTS RELATING TO A NEW OR EXPANDED CONCENTRATED
- 14 ANIMAL FEEDING OPERATION. IN ADDITION, A GENERALLY ACCEPTED
- 15 AGRICULTURE AND MANAGEMENT PRACTICE FOR A NEW OR EXPANDED
- 16 CONCENTRATED ANIMAL FEEDING OPERATION SHALL NOT PROVIDE FOR A
- 17 SETBACK DISTANCE THAT IS SHORTER THAN THE DISTANCE THAT IS PROVIDED
- 18 IN AN APPLICABLE LOCAL ORDINANCE.
- 19 (7) A local unit of government may submit to the director a
- 20 proposed ordinance prescribing standards different from those
- 21 contained in generally accepted agricultural and management
- 22 practices if adverse effects on the environment or public health
- 23 will exist within the local unit of government. A proposed
- 24 ordinance under this subsection shall not conflict with existing
- 25 state laws or federal laws. At least 45 days prior to enactment of
- 26 the proposed ordinance, the local unit of government shall submit a
- 27 copy of the proposed ordinance to the director. Upon receipt of the

- 1 proposed ordinance, the director shall hold a public meeting in
- 2 that local unit of government to review the proposed ordinance. In
- 3 conducting its review, the director shall consult with the
- 4 departments of environmental quality and community health and shall
- 5 consider any recommendations of the county health department of the
- 6 county where the adverse effects on the environment or public
- 7 health will allegedly exist. Within 30 days after the public
- 8 meeting, the director shall make a recommendation to the commission
- 9 on whether the ordinance should be approved. An ordinance enacted
- 10 under this subsection shall not be enforced by a local unit of
- 11 government until approved by the commission of agriculture.
- 12 (8) By May 1, 2000, the commission shall issue proposed
- 13 generally accepted agricultural and management practices for site
- 14 selection and odor controls at new and expanding animal livestock
- 15 facilities. The commission shall adopt such generally accepted
- 16 agricultural and management practices by June 1, 2000. In
- 17 developing these generally accepted agricultural and management
- 18 practices, the commission shall do both of the following:
- 19 (a) Establish an advisory committee to provide recommendations
- 20 to the commission. The advisory committee shall include the
- 21 entities listed in section 2(d), 2 individuals representing
- 22 townships, 1 individual representing counties, and 2 individuals
- 23 representing agricultural industry organizations.
- 24 (b) For the generally accepted agricultural and management
- 25 practices for site selection, consider groundwater protection, soil
- 26 permeability, and other factors determined necessary or appropriate
- 27 by the commission.

- 1 (8) (9)—If generally accepted agricultural and management
- 2 practices require the person responsible for the operation of a
- 3 farm or farm operation to prepare a manure management plan, the
- 4 person responsible for the operation of the farm or farm operation
- 5 shall provide a copy of that manure management plan to the city,
- 6 village, or township or the county in which the farm or farm
- 7 operation is located, upon request. A manure management plan
- 8 provided under this subsection is exempt from disclosure under the
- 9 freedom of information act, 1976 PA 442, MCL 15.231 to 15.246.
- 10 (9) (10)—The department shall do all of the following:
- 11 (a) Annually submit to the standing committees of the senate
- 12 and house of representatives with jurisdiction over issues
- 13 pertaining to agriculture and local government a report on the
- 14 implementation of this act.
- 15 (b) Make available on the department's website current
- 16 generally accepted agricultural and management practices.
- 17 (c) Establish a toll-free telephone number for receipt of
- 18 information on noncompliance with generally accepted agricultural
- 19 and management practices.
- 20 (11) As used in this section:
- 21 (a) "Adverse effects on the environment or public health"
- 22 means any unreasonable risk to human beings or the environment,
- 23 based on scientific evidence and taking into account the economic,
- 24 social, and environmental costs and benefits and specific
- 25 populations whose health may be adversely affected.
- 26 (b) "Commission" means the commission of agriculture.
- 27 (c) "Department" means the department of agriculture.

- 1 (d) "Director" means the director of the department or his or
- 2 her designee.
