OVERVIEW

House Bill 4288 contains FY 2009-10 supplemental appropriations for the Department of Agriculture.

The House substitute would restore, in part, funding for certain line items vetoed by the Governor from the original FY 2009-10 Agriculture appropriation bill, Enrolled Senate Bill 237. In passing Senate Bill 237, the Legislature did not follow the Executive recommendation with regard to appropriations for horse racing programs, including appropriations for the Office of Racing Commissioner. The Executive budget had recommended funding the Office of Racing Commissioner using \$2.5 million from the Agriculture Equine Industry Development Fund (AEIDF), a revenue source generated from a tax on simulcast race wagering at race tracks. Instead, the enrolled bill had funded the Office of Racing Commissioner from the State Services Fee Fund (SSFF), a revenue source derived from a kind of licensing fee paid annually by the three Detroit casinos under the Michigan Gaming Control Act. By using SSFF revenue for the Office of Racing Commissioner, the enrolled bill was able to include additional AEIDF revenue for direct horse racing purses and purse supplements, grants which are ultimately paid to horse owners and breeders under provisions of the Horse Racing Act of 1995.

The Governor rejected the Legislature's proposed funding and vetoed the entire appropriation for the Office of Racing Commissioner, and all 13 line items in the Fairs and Expositions appropriation unit (including 10 horse racing purse and purse supplement lines).

The bill would restore, in part, those vetoed lines. Specifically, the bill would fund the Office of Racing Commissioner at \$2.5 million – same as the enrolled bill – but using AEIDF as a fund source rather than SSFF revenue. In addition, the bill would restore 10 purse and purse supplement lines that directly support horse racing, at levels more closely aligned to estimated AEIDF revenue. The bill would also restore funding for the *Fairs*, *racing*, *and producer security* line item. Fairs, Racing, and Producer Security, a line item which supports the department's grain elevator regulatory program under the Grain Dealers Act (PA 141 of 1939) is the only line in the bill which includes General Fund support.

The department indicates that if funding is not restored to the Office of Racing Commission and to the Fairs, Racing, and Producer Security lines by November 5, 2009, 25 department employees would be laid off. The layoff of Office of Racing Commission employees would prevent the running of live horse racing in November – there appear to be 24 races currently scheduled. The department has already issued layoff notices.

Note that if the Office of Racing Commissioner is transferred to the Michigan Gaming Control board under Executive Order 2009-45, appropriation spending authority would also simply transfer to the Michigan Gaming Control Board to support transferred Office of Racing Commissioner regulatory activities.

Finally, the bill contains a single boilerplate section for the Department of State Police related to school bus inspections.

More detailed information on appropriation line items and boilerplate sections in the bill is provided below.
