- 19 Sec. 501. It is the intent of the legislature that funding for
- 20 the groundwater dispute resolution program should be provided
- 21 through a supplemental appropriation act for the fiscal year ending
- 22 September 30, 2010 if the legislature fails to enact amendatory
- 23 legislation by October 1, 2009 eliminating part 317 of the natural
- 24 resources and environmental protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL

1 GRANTS

- 2 Sec. 601. If a certified health department does not exist in a
- 3 city, county, or district or does not fulfill its responsibilities

- 6 department of environmental quality may spend funds appropriated in

21 PARKS AND RECREATION
