- 4 Sec. 502. (1) From the appropriation in part 1 for aquatic

- 11 advisory workgroup shall do all of the following:

1 report shall include a summary of how the appropriations in part 1

- 20 the state budget director, the senate and house appropriations
- 21 subcommittees on conservation, the senate and house standing
- 22 committees on natural resources and environmental issues, and the
- 23 senate and house fiscal agencies.
- 24 (2) The funding appropriated in part 1 for real-time water
- 25 quality monitoring is contingent upon both of the following:
- 26 (a) Submission by October 1, 2009 of a report by the grant

- 1 recipient on the status of the project and use of prior funding
- 2 provided by the state and other fund sources for this project.
- 3 (b) Submission by December 31, 2010 of a plan by the grant
- 4 recipient for long-term funding of operation and maintenance of the
- 5 real-time monitoring system for the Huron-Erie corridor. The
- 6 funding plan shall not require state funds for more than 50% of
- 7 total funding for the project and not more than \$250,000.00
- 8 annually.
