#### 2 PROVISIONS CONCERNING APPROPRIATIONS

#### 3 GENERAL SECTIONS

- 4 Sec. 201. In accordance with the provisions of section 30 of
- 5 article IX of the state constitution of 1963, total state spending
- 6 from state resources in this appropriation act for the fiscal year
- 7 ending September 30, 2010 is \$(1,385,850.00) and state
- 8 appropriations paid to local units of government are \$0.
- 9 Sec. 202. The appropriations made and expenditures authorized
- 10 under this act and the departments, commissions, boards, offices,
- 11 and programs for which appropriations are made under this act are
- 12 subject to the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1101
- **13** to 18.1594.
- 14 Sec. 203. The departments described in this act shall fulfill
- 15 reporting requirements of this act by use of the Internet. Reports
- 16 identified for each reporting requirement shall be placed on the
- 17 Internet.

# 18 DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE

- 19 Sec. 210. If the agriculture equine industry development fund
- 20 revenue exceeds appropriations for the year ending September 30,
- 21 2010, up to \$308,688.00 shall be allocated to standardbred purses
- 22 and supplements, up to \$202,302.00 shall be allocated to
- 23 standardbred breeders' awards, up to \$40,896.00 shall be allocated
- 24 to licensed tracks light horse racing, and up to \$190,844.00
- 25 shall be allocated to thoroughbred programs for the year ending
- 26 September 30, 2011 because standardbred purses and supplements,

- 1 standardbred breeders' awards, licensed tracks light horse
- 2 racing, and thoroughbred programs are receiving larger cuts in the
- 3 current fiscal year than other appropriations to ensure the
- 4 continuation of races. Contingency fund transfers shall be used as
- 5 necessary to allow for spending of any additional revenue.

- 7 Sec. 250. The appropriations in part 1 to the racing
- 8 commissioner are intended to ensure that 217 total racing dates
- 9 occur at Michigan's 5 licensed horse racetracks for the fiscal year
- 10 ending September 30, 2010. The appropriations in part 1, in
- 11 combination with 2009 PA 119, 2009 PA 140, Executive Order No.
- 12 2009-45, and Executive Order No. 2009-54, are necessary to allow 62
- 13 race dates at Hazel Park, 11 race dates at Mount Pleasant Meadows,
- 14 32 race dates at Northville Downs, 35 race dates at Northville
- 15 Racing Corp, 43 race dates at Pinnacle Race Course, and 34 race
- 16 dates at Sports Creek Raceway for the fiscal year ending September
- 17 30, 2010. In order to allow 31 of the 43 race dates at Pinnacle
- 18 Race Course, the Michigan thoroughbred owners and breeders
- 19 association and the horsemen's benevolent and protection
- 20 association shall enter into an agreement to fund the Michigan bred
- 21 programs and the Michigan gaming control board's regulatory
- 22 expenses. From the amount appropriated in part 1 to the racing
- 23 commissioner, the Michigan gaming control board shall provide all
- 24 regulatory functions necessary for the conduct of horse racing
- 25 under the horse racing law of 1995, 1995 PA 279, MCL 431.301 to
- **26** 431.336.

1 Sec. 251. The Michigan gaming control board, with the

- 2 assistance of the Michigan department of agriculture and each
- 3 certified horsemen's organization, shall report to the legislature
- 4 on the status and ongoing efforts to transfer the function of the
- 5 office of racing commissioner to the Michigan gaming control board
- 6 pursuant to Executive Order Nos. 2009-45 and 2009-54. The report
- 7 shall be submitted on or before September 1, 2010 to the house and
- 8 senate appropriations subcommittees on agriculture and general
- 9 government and the house and senate fiscal agencies. The report
- 10 shall include, at a minimum, the following:
- 11 (a) Efforts to utilize the most efficient and effective
- 12 methods of regulating and promoting the horse racing industry.
- 13 (b) Efforts to promote and support the horse racing industry
- 14 with the goal of increasing employment and expanded economic
- 15 activity associated with the horse racing industry.
- 16 (c) A comparison of Michigan with other states regarding both
- 17 regulation and promotion of the horse racing industry.
- 18 Sec. 252. The Michigan gaming control board shall use actual
- 19 expenditure data in determining the actual regulatory costs of
- 20 conducting racing dates and shall provide that data to the house
- 21 and senate appropriations subcommittees on agriculture and general
- 22 government and the house and senate fiscal agencies. The Michigan
- 23 gaming control board shall not be reimbursed for more than the
- 24 actual regulatory cost of conducting race dates. If a certified
- 25 horsemen's organization funds more than the actual regulatory cost,
- 26 the balance shall remain in the agriculture equine industry
- 27 development fund to be used to fund subsequent race dates conducted

- 1 by race meeting licensees with which the certified horsemen's
- 2 organization has contracts. If a certified horsemen's organization
- 3 funds less than the actual regulatory costs of the additional horse
- 4 racing dates, the Michigan gaming control board shall reduce the
- 5 number of future race dates conducted by race meeting licensees
- 6 with which the certified horsemen's organization has contracts.
- 7 Prior to the reduction in the number of authorized race dates due
- 8 to budget deficits, the executive director of the Michigan gaming
- 9 control board shall provide notice to the certified horsemen's
- 10 organizations with an opportunity to respond with alternatives. In
- 11 determining actual costs, the Michigan gaming control board shall
- 12 take into account that each specific breed may require different
- 13 regulatory mechanisms.
