- (2) Adjustments to appropriation authorizations necessary to implement the requirements of subsection (1) shall be made only after the approval of transfers by the legislature pursuant to section 393(2) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1393.

- 3 stock, and laboratory analyses as specified in the following:
- 4 (a) Management services publications.
- 5 (b) Management services audit and licensing functions.
- 6 (c) Pesticide and plant pest management propagation and7 certification of virus-free foundation stock.
- 8 (d) Pesticide and plant pest management grading services.
- 9 (e) Laboratory support testing for testing horses in draft
- 10 horse pulling contests at county fairs when local jurisdictions
- 11 request state assistance.
- 12 (f) Laboratory support analyses to determine foreign
- 13 substances in horses engaged in racing or pulling contests at
- 14 tracks.
- 15 (g) Laboratory support analyses of food, livestock, and
- 16 agricultural products for disease, foreign products for disease,
- 17 toxic materials, foreign substances, and quality standards.
- 18 (h) Laboratory support test samples for other agencies and
- 19 organizations.
- 20 (i) Fruit and vegetable inspection at shipping and termination
- 21 points and processing plants.
- 22 (2) The department shall notify the senate and house
- 23 appropriations subcommittees on agriculture and the senate and
- 24 house fiscal agencies 30 days prior to proposing changes in fees
- 25 authorized under this section or under section 5 of 1915 PA 91, MCL
- **26** 285.35.
- 27 (3) Annually, before February 1, the department shall provide

- 1 a report to the senate and house appropriations subcommittees on
- 2 agriculture and the senate and house fiscal agencies detailing all
- 3 the fees charged by the department under the authorization provided
- 4 in this section, including, but not limited to, rates, number of
- 5 individuals paying each fee, and the revenue generated by each fee
- 6 in the previous fiscal year.
- 7 Sec. 304. (1) To ensure motor fuel quality and quantity, the
- 8 department shall maintain the motor fuel quality program and shall
- 9 not reduce program level of effort below that of the 2006-2007
- 10 fiscal year. Notwithstanding the provisions of section 205, the
- 11 department shall maintain field and laboratory staff for the motor
- 12 fuel quality program.
- 13 (2) On or before January 1 and every 6 months thereafter, the
- 14 department shall report to the senate and house appropriations

- 23 Sec. 401. The department shall monitor restaurant inspection
- 24 and licensing functions carried out by local health departments to
- 25 ensure uniform application and enforcement of minimum program
- 26 requirements.

- 1 Sec. 402. Not later than April 1, 2011, the department shall
- 2 provide a report to the senate and house appropriations
- 3 subcommittees on agriculture and the senate and house fiscal
- 4 agencies describing significant food-borne outbreaks and
- 5 emergencies, including any enforcement actions taken related to
- 6 food safety during the 2009-2010 fiscal year.
- 7 Sec. 404. From the funds appropriated in section 104 for food
- 8 safety and quality assurance, not less than \$150,000.00 from the
- 9 consumer and industry food safety education fund shall be expended
- 10 for purposes required under section 4117 of the food law of 2000,
- 11 2000 PA 92, MCL 289.4117, including the statewide training and
- 12 education to consumers on food safety and the training and
- 13 education on food safety to food service establishment employees
- 14 and department employees and agents who enforce section 4117 of the
- 15 food law of 2000, 2000 PA 92, MCL 289.4117.
- 16 Sec. 406. Notwithstanding the provisions of section 205, the
- 17 department is authorized to fill open positions in the food and
- 18 dairy inspection program.

ANIMAL INDUSTRY

- 20 Sec. 450. From the funds appropriated in section 105 for the
- 21 bovine tuberculosis program, the department shall reimburse the
- 22 department of natural resources and environment for those costs
- 23 associated with monitoring and testing wildlife for bovine
- 24 tuberculosis that are necessary to support the department goals and
- 25 are jointly agreed to by the department and the department of
- 26 natural resources and environment to be in excess of efforts

- 1 necessary to effectively plan and execute the eradication of bovine
- 2 tuberculosis from Michigan's wild free-ranging deer herd.
- 3 Sec. 451. From the funds appropriated in section 105 for
- 4 bovine tuberculosis, the department shall pay for all whole herd
- 5 testing costs and individual animal testing costs in the modified
- 6 accredited zone to maintain split-state status requirements. These
- 7 costs include indemnity and compensation for injury causing death
- 8 or downer to animals.
- 9 Sec. 452. The department shall apply for all federal and
- 10 private funds for which it is eligible that can be used to support
- 11 the bovine tuberculosis program.
- Sec. 454. The department shall use its resources to
- 13 collaborate with the United States department of agriculture to
- 14 obtain TB-free status for the area of the Lower Peninsula that is
- 15 zoned as modified accredited advanced. The department shall also
- 16 aggressively work toward eradicating bovine TB in the modified
- 17 accredited zone.

18 PESTICIDE AND PLANT PEST MANAGEMENT

23 ENVIRONMENTAL STEWARDSHIP

- 25 which it is eligible that can be used to support the migrant labor

- 2 Sec. 604. The department shall work with the conservation
- 3 districts on the most effective and efficient use of the funding
- 4 provided in section 107. Funds should be used to help draw down
- 5 federal funding and support land conservation projects.
- 6 Sec. 606. The department shall actively search for all
- 7 possible funding sources to be used to match federal funds in the
- 8 USDA environmental quality incentives program.
- 9 Sec. 607. It is the intent of the legislature that the
- 10 department continue its activities in support of intercounty
- 11 drainage districts as provided in chapter 5 of the drain code of
- 12 1956, 1956 PA 40, MCL 280.101 to 280.106.

13 AGRICULTURE DEVELOPMENT

- Sec. 706. Not later than April 1, 2011, the department shall
- 15 provide a report to the senate and house appropriations
- 16 subcommittees on agriculture and the senate and house fiscal
- 17 agencies describing the department's agriculture development and
- 18 export market development activities. The report shall identify
- 19 grants awarded during the prior fiscal year, including a
- 20 description of federal or private funds made available as a result
- 21 of department activities.
- Sec. 709. (1) Not later than April 1, 2011, the department
- 23 shall provide a report to the senate and house appropriations
- 24 subcommittees on agriculture and the senate and house fiscal
- 25 agencies describing the activities of the grape and wine industry
- 26 council established under section 303 of the Michigan liquor

- 1 control act of 1998, 1998 PA 58, MCL 436.1303.
- 2 (2) The report shall include all of the following:
- 3 (a) Council activities and accomplishments for the previous
- 4 fiscal year.
- 5 (b) Council expenditures for the previous fiscal year by
- 6 category of administration, industry support, research and
- 7 education grants, and promotion and consumer education.
- 8 (c) Grants awarded during the prior fiscal year and the
- 9 results of research grant projects completed during the prior
- 10 fiscal year.
- 11 Sec. 710. The department may match external funding for
- 12 domestic and international marketing programs for the purpose of
- 13 developing new and enhancing existing export markets for Michigan
- 14 agricultural products.
- 15 Sec. 711. In accordance with chapter 8B of the Michigan
- 16 strategic fund act, 1984 PA 270, MCL 125.2089 to 125.2089d, it is
- 17 the intent of the legislature that the Michigan strategic fund, its
- 18 employees, contract employees, and individuals working on its
- 19 behalf collaborate with the Michigan department of agriculture to
- 20 promote business development of Michigan agricultural products to
- 21 achieve outcomes that include, but are not limited to, increases in
- 22 export sales, increases in the number of retailers carrying
- 23 Michigan commodities both within and outside of this state, and
- 24 increased sales of Michigan products at chain grocers.

25 CAPITAL OUTLAY

26 Sec. 1001. Of the amounts appropriated in part 1 for farmland

- 1 and open space development acquisition, the funds shall be used for
- 2 the purchase of development rights and the awarding of grants by
- 3 the agriculture preservation fund board under the natural resources
- 4 and environmental protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.101 to
- **5** 324.90106.
- 6 Sec. 1002. (1) The director shall allocate lump-sum
- 7 appropriations made in this act consistent with statutory
- 8 provisions and the purposes for which funds were appropriated.
- 9 Lump-sum allocations shall address priority program or facility
- 10 needs and may include, but are not limited to, design,
- 11 construction, remodeling and addition, special maintenance, major
- 12 special maintenance, energy conservation, and demolition.
- 13 (2) The state budget director may authorize that funds
- 14 appropriated for lump-sum appropriations shall be available for no
- 15 more than 3 fiscal years following the fiscal year in which the
