- 13 recreational boating facilities within this state. Subject to the
- 14 approval of the state administrative board, this money shall be
- 15 allocated by the department to the federal government, or to the
- 16 political entities or local units of government involved in the
- 17 particular projects. An allocation shall not exceed the state

- 19 shall take the steps necessary to match federal money available for
