- 18 provide detail about enforcement actions taken to eradicate bovine
- 19 tuberculosis, the number of infected deer found, new science it is

- 23 Sec. 502. It is the intent of the legislature that, from the

The department shall complete and deliver these reports no later than 45 days after the end of the fiscal quarter. 21 22 Sec. 803. In addition to the money appropriated in this act, 23 the department may receive and expend money from federal sources 24 for the purpose of providing response to wildfires as required by a 25 compact with the federal government. If additional expenditure 26 authorization is required, the department shall notify the state 27 budget office that expenditure under this section is required. The
