HOUSE BILL No. 5881

EXECUTIVE BUDGET BILL

February 23, 2010, Introduced by Rep. Bauer and referred to the Committee on Appropriations.

A bill to make appropriations for the state institutions of higher education and certain state purposes related to education for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2011; to provide for the expenditures of those appropriations; and to prescribe the powers and duties of certain state departments, institutions, agencies, employees, and officers.

Pursuant to section 30 of article IX of the state 5 constitution of 1963, total state spending from state resources 6 under part 1 for fiscal year 2010-2011 is \$1,573,778,500.00 and 7 8 state spending from state resources to be paid to local units of 9 government for fiscal year 2010-2011 is \$0. 10 Sec. 202. The appropriations authorized under this bill are 11 subject to the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1101 12 to 18.1594. Sec. 203. As used in this bill, "research university" means a 13 public university classified as a "research university (very high 14 15 research activity) " under the 2005 classification of institutions 16 of higher education conducted by the Carnegie foundation for the 17 advancement of teaching. 18 Sec. 208. Unless otherwise specified, public universities 19 receiving appropriations in part 1 shall use the Internet to 20 fulfill the reporting requirements of this bill. This requirement 21 may include transmission of reports via electronic mail to the 22 recipients identified for each reporting requirement, or it may 23 include placement of reports on an Internet or Intranet site.

Sec. 209. Funds appropriated in part 1 shall not be used for

- 21 place an obligation upon the legislature to continue the purposes
- 22 for which the funds are made available.
- 23 Sec. 215. A public university that receives funds under this
- 24 bill shall furnish all program and financial information that is
- 25 required by and in a manner prescribed by the state budget director
- 26 or the house or senate appropriations committee.
- 27 Sec. 216. A public university receiving funds in part 1 shall

- 1 cooperate with all measures taken by the state to comply with the
- 2 state fiscal stabilization fund provisions of the American recovery
- 3 and reinvestment act of 2009, Public Law 111-5, requiring the
- 4 establishment of a statewide P-20 education longitudinal data
- 5 system.

6 GRANTS AND FINANCIAL AID

- 7 Sec. 301. (1) Payments of the amounts included in part 1 for
- 8 the state competitive scholarship program shall be distributed
- **9** pursuant to 1964 PA 208, MCL 390.971 to 390.981.
- 10 (2) The Michigan higher education assistance authority shall
- 11 implement a proportional competitive scholarship maximum award
- 12 level for recipients enrolled less than full-time in a given
- 13 semester or term.
- 14 (3) If a student who receives an award under this section has
- 15 his or her tuition and fees paid under the Michigan educational
- 16 trust program, pursuant to the Michigan education trust act, 1986
- 17 PA 316, MCL 390.1421 to 390.1442, and still has financial need, the
- 18 funds awarded under this section may be used for educational
- 19 expenses other than tuition and fees.
- 20 (4) If the Michigan higher education assistance authority
- 21 increases the maximum award per eligible student from that provided
- 22 in the previous fiscal year, it shall not have the effect of
- 23 reducing the number of eligible students receiving awards in
- 24 relation to the total number of eligible applicants. Any increase
- 25 in the maximum grant shall be proportional for all eligible
- 26 students receiving awards.
- 27 (5) Veterans administration benefits shall not be considered

- 1 in determining eligibility under 1964 PA 208, MCL 390.971 to
- **2** 390.981.
- 3 Sec. 307. The auditor general may audit selected enrollments,
- 4 degrees, and awards at selected independent colleges and
- 5 universities receiving awards administered by the department of
- 6 treasury. The audits shall be based upon definitions and
- 7 requirements established by the Michigan higher education
- 8 assistance authority, the state budget director, and the senate and
- 9 house fiscal agencies. The auditor general shall accept the Free
- 10 Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) form as the standard of
- 11 residency documentation. The auditor general shall submit a report
- 12 of findings to the senate and house appropriations committees and
- 13 state budget director by May 1, 2011.
- Sec. 308. The sums appropriated in part 1 for the student
- 15 financial aid programs shall be paid out of the state treasury and
- 16 shall be distributed to the respective institutions under a
- 17 quarterly payment system as follows:
- 18 (a) For the state competitive scholarship and tuition
- 19 incentive programs, 40% shall be paid at the beginning of the
- 20 state's first fiscal quarter, 40% at the beginning of the state's
- 21 second fiscal quarter, 10% at the beginning of the state's third
- 22 fiscal quarter, and 10% at the beginning of the state's fourth
- 23 fiscal quarter.
- 24 (b) For the Robert C. Byrd honors scholarship program, 50%
- 25 shall be paid at the beginning of the state's first fiscal quarter
- 26 and 50% at the beginning of the state's second fiscal quarter.
- 27 Sec. 309. The Michigan higher education assistance authority

- 1 shall determine the needs analysis criteria for students to qualify
- 2 for the state competitive scholarship program. To be consistent
- 3 with federal requirements, student wages may be taken into
- 4 consideration when determining the amount of the award.
- 5 Sec. 310. (1) The funds appropriated in part 1 for the tuition
- 6 incentive program shall be distributed as provided in this section
- 7 and pursuant to the administrative procedures for the tuition
- 8 incentive program of the department of treasury.
- 9 (2) As used in this section "department" means the department
- 10 of treasury.
- 11 (3) Payments under the tuition incentive program shall be made
- 12 on behalf of students for an academic period of 80 semester or 120
- 13 term credits, or less, leading to an associate degree or
- 14 certificate.
- 15 (4) A person shall meet the following basic criteria and
- 16 financial thresholds to be eligible for tuition incentive benefits:
- 17 (a) Apply for certification to the department before
- 18 graduating from high school or completing the general education
- 19 development (GED) certificate.
- 20 (b) Be less than 20 years of age at the time of high school
- 21 graduation or GED completion.
- (c) Be a United States citizen and a resident of Michigan
- 23 according to institutional criteria.
- 24 (d) Be at least a half-time student, earning less than 80
- 25 semester or 120 term credits at a participating educational
- 26 institution within 4 years of high school graduation or GED
- 27 certificate completion.

- 1 (e) Request information on filing a FAFSA.
- 2 (f) Be financially eligible as determined by the department. A
- 3 person is financially eligible for the tuition incentive program if
- 4 that person was Medicaid eligible for 24 months within the 36
- 5 months before application. Certification of eligibility may begin
- 6 in the sixth grade.
- 7 (g) Not be incarcerated.
- 8 (5) The department shall provide payment on behalf of a person
- 9 eligible under subsection (4) as follows:
- (a) Payments for associate degree or certificate programs
- 11 shall not be made for more than 80 semester or 120 term credits for
- 12 any individual student at any participating institution.
- 13 (b) For persons enrolled at a Michigan community college, the
- 14 department shall pay the current in-district tuition and mandatory
- 15 fees. For persons residing in an area that is not included in any
- 16 community college district, the out-of-district tuition rate may be
- 17 authorized.
- 18 (c) For persons enrolled at a Michigan public university, a
- 19 Michigan independent, nonprofit degree-granting college or
- 20 university, a Michigan federal tribally controlled community
- 21 college, or Focus: HOPE, the department shall pay mandatory fees
- 22 for the current year and a per-credit payment that does not exceed
- 23 the average community college in-district per-credit tuition rate
- 24 as reported on August 1, for the immediately preceding academic
- **25** year.
- 26 (d) The department shall reject billings that are excessive or
- 27 outside the guidelines for the type of educational institution.

- 1 (6) The department shall work closely with participating
- 2 institutions to develop an application and eligibility
- 3 determination process that will provide the highest level of
- 4 participation and ensure that all requirements of the program are
- 5 met.
- 6 (7) Applications for the tuition incentive program may be
- 7 approved at any time after the student begins the sixth grade. If a
- 8 determination of financial eligibility is made, that determination
- 9 is valid as long as the student meets all other program
- 10 requirements and conditions.
- 11 (8) Each institution shall ensure that all known available
- 12 restricted grants for tuition and fees are used prior to billing
- 13 the tuition incentive program for any portion of a student's
- 14 tuition and fees.
- 15 (9) The department shall ensure that the tuition incentive
- 16 program is well publicized and that potentially eligible Medicaid
- 17 clients are provided information on the program. The department
- 18 shall provide the necessary funding and staff to fully operate the
- 19 program.
- 20 Sec. 311. To enable the legislature and the state budget
- 21 director to evaluate the appropriation needs of higher education,
- 22 each independent college and university shall make available to the
- 23 legislature or state budget director, upon request, data regarding
- 24 grants for the preceding, current, and ensuing fiscal years.
- Sec. 315. By March 31 of each year, the department of treasury
- 26 shall submit a report to the state budget director, the house and
- 27 senate appropriations subcommittees on higher education, and the

- 1 house and senate fiscal agencies for the preceding fiscal year on
- 2 all student financial aid programs for which funds are appropriated
- 3 in part 1. For each student financial aid program, the report shall
- 4 include, but is not limited to, the total number of awards paid in
- 5 the preceding fiscal year, the total dollar amount of those awards,
- 6 and the number of students receiving awards and the total amount of
- 7 those awards at each eligible postsecondary institution. To the

- 14 Sec. 433. (1) Included in part 1 is \$2,982,900.00 for the
- agricultural experiment station and \$2,645,200.00 for the
- 16 cooperative extension service for project GREEEN. Project GREEEN is
- 17 intended to address critical regulatory, food safety, economic, and
- 18 environmental problems faced by this state's plant-based
- 19 agriculture, forestry, and processing industries. "GREEEN" is an
- 20 acronym for generating research and extension to meet environmental
- 21 and economic needs.
- 22 (2) The department of agriculture and Michigan State
- 23 University, in consultation with agricultural commodity groups and
- 24 other interested parties, shall develop project GREEEN and its
- 25 program priorities.
- 26 (3) Not later than September 30, 2011, a report shall be
- 27 submitted by Michigan State University to the state budget

- 1 director, the house and senate appropriations subcommittees on
- 2 agriculture and on higher education, and the house and senate
- 3 fiscal agencies for the preceding school fiscal year regarding
- 4 expenditures and programmatic outcomes of the agricultural
- 5 experiment station and cooperative extension service. The report
- 6 shall include, but is not limited to:
- 7 (a) Total funds expended by the agricultural experiment
- 8 station and cooperative extension service identified by state,
- 9 local, private, federal, and university fund sources.
- 10 (b) The dollar amount of each project GREEEN project and a
- 11 review of each project's performance and accomplishments.
- 12 (c) The dollar amount of each bioeconomy research and
- 13 development project and a review of each project's performance and
- 14 accomplishments.
- 15 (d) The dollar amount and description of all other individual
- 16 programs and services provided by the agricultural experiment
- 17 station and cooperative extension service and a review of each
- 18 project's performance and accomplishments.
- 19 (e) The number of businesses created or that had increased
- 20 employment and the number of patents generated as a result of work
- 21 conducted by the agricultural experiment station and cooperative
- 22 extension service.
- 23 Sec. 440. All public universities shall submit the amount of
- 24 tuition and fees actually charged to a full-time resident
- 25 undergraduate student for academic year 2010-2011 as part of their
- 26 higher education institutional data inventory (HEIDI) data by
- 27 August 31, 2010. A public university shall report any revisions for

- 1 any semester of the reported academic year 2010-2011 tuition and
- 2 fee charges to HEIDI within 15 days of being adopted.
- 3 Sec. 460. From the amount appropriated in part 1 to Central
- 4 Michigan University for operations, \$29,700.00 shall be paid to
- 5 Saginaw Chippewa Tribal College for the costs of waiving tuition
- 6 for North American Indians under 1976 PA 174, MCL 390.1251 to
- **7** 390.1253.
- 8 Sec. 461. From the amount appropriated in part 1 to Lake
- 9 Superior State University for operations, \$100,000.00 shall be paid
- 10 to Bay Mills Community College for the costs of waiving tuition for
- 11 North American Indians under 1976 PA 174, MCL 390.1251 to 390.1253.
- 12 Sec. 464. Each public university receiving an appropriation in
- 13 part 1 shall submit a plan by January 15, 2010 to the state budget
- 14 director, the house and senate appropriations subcommittees on
- 15 higher education, and the house and senate fiscal agencies on its
- 16 process to inform both the private and public sectors regarding
- 17 research and technology that could be developed commercially.
- 18 Sec. 466. Public universities shall coordinate their purchases
- 19 of goods and services whenever possible. This may include, but is
- 20 not limited to, group purchases for vehicles, utilities, supplies,
- 21 electronic equipment, maintenance equipment, books, and contractual
- 22 services. To the extent possible, the public universities shall use
- 23 both the "Michigan delivering extended agreements locally" (MiDEAL)
- 24 purchasing services of the state department of technology,
- 25 management and budget that makes state contracts available to local
- 26 units of government, colleges, and universities and the purchasing
- 27 services available through the state's membership in the Midwestern

- 1 Higher Education Compact (MHEC). Not later than January 1 of each
- 2 year, the presidents council, state universities of Michigan shall
- 3 submit to the members of the house and senate appropriations
- 4 subcommittees on higher education, the house and senate fiscal
- 5 agencies, and the state budget director a report on group or pooled
- 6 purchases and the savings achieved by the public universities in
- 7 the previous fiscal year.
- 8 Sec. 469. By November 14, 2009, each public university
- 9 receiving an appropriation in part 1 shall report the number of
- 10 undergraduate students who graduated in academic year 2009-2010 and
- 11 received a Pell grant at any time during their enrollment at that
- 12 university to the members of the house and senate appropriations
- 13 subcommittees on higher education, the house and senate fiscal
- 14 agencies, and the state budget director.
- Sec. 480. (1) Each public university receiving an
- 16 appropriation in part 1 is encouraged do all of the following:
- 17 (a) Meet the provisions of section 5003 of the post-911

- 26 (2) As used in this section, "veteran" means an honorably
- 27 discharged veteran entitled to educational assistance under the

- 2 assistance act of 2008, title V of Public Law 110-252, 38 USC 3301

4 STATE AND REGIONAL PROGRAMS

- 5 Sec. 490. The funds appropriated in part 1 for higher
- 6 education database modernization and conversion shall be expended
- 7 to maintain, coordinate, and improve the higher education
- 8 institutional data inventory (HEIDI) established under section 1299
- 9 of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1299. The
- 10 advisory committee established under that section shall meet
- 11 regularly to review data definitions and requirements in order to
- 12 advise the state budget director regarding changes to those
- 13 definitions and requirements that would result in more useful and
- 14 reliable data being provided to state policymakers and university
- 15 officials.

16 MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR. - CESAR CHAVEZ - ROSA PARKS PROGRAMS

- Sec. 501. (1) Included in the appropriation for each public
- 18 university in part 1 is funding for the Martin Luther King, Jr. -
- 19 Cesar Chavez Rosa Parks future faculty program that is intended
- 20 to increase the pool of academically or economically disadvantaged
- 21 candidates pursuing faculty teaching careers in postsecondary
- 22 education. Preference may not be given to applicants on the basis
- 23 of race, color, ethnicity, gender, or national origin. Institutions
- 24 should encourage applications from applicants who would otherwise
- 25 not adequately be represented in the graduate student and faculty
- 26 populations. Each public university shall apply the percentage
- 27 change applicable to every public university in the calculation of

- 1 appropriations in part 1 to the amount of funds allocated to the
- 2 future faculty program.
- 3 (2) The program shall be administered by each public
- 4 university in a manner prescribed by the Michigan department of
- 5 energy, labor, and economic growth. The Michigan department of
- 6 energy, labor, and economic growth shall use a good faith effort
- 7 standard to evaluate whether a fellowship is in default.
- 8 Sec. 502. (1) Included in the appropriation for each public
- 9 university in part 1 is funding for the Martin Luther King, Jr. -
- 10 Cesar Chavez Rosa Parks college day program that is intended to
- 11 introduce academically or economically disadvantaged schoolchildren
- 12 to the potential of a college education. Preference may not be
- 13 given to participants on the basis of race, color, ethnicity,
- 14 gender, or national origin. Public universities should encourage
- 15 participation from those who would otherwise not adequately be
- 16 represented in the student population.
- 17 (2) Individual program plans of each public university shall
- 18 include a budget of equal contributions from this program, the
- 19 participating public university, the participating school district,
- 20 and the participating independent degree-granting college. College
- 21 day funds shall not be expended to cover indirect costs. Not more
- 22 than 20% of the university match shall be attributable to indirect
- 23 costs. Each public university shall apply the percentage change
- 24 applicable to every public university in the calculation of
- 25 appropriations in part 1 to the amount of funds allocated to the
- 26 college day program.
- 27 (3) The program described in this section shall be

- 1 administered by each public university in a manner prescribed by
- 2 the Michigan department of energy, labor, and economic growth.
- 3 Sec. 503. (1) Included in part 1 is funding for the Martin
- 4 Luther King, Jr. Cesar Chavez Rosa Parks select student support
- 5 services program for developing academically or economically
- 6 disadvantaged student retention programs for 4-year public and
- 7 independent educational institutions in this state. Preference may
- 8 not be given to participants on the basis of race, color,
- 9 ethnicity, gender, or national origin. Institutions should
- 10 encourage participation from those who would otherwise not
- 11 adequately be represented in the student population.
- 12 (2) An award made under this program to any 1 institution
- 13 shall not be greater than \$150,000.00, and the amount awarded shall
- 14 be matched on a 70% state, 30% college or university basis.
- 15 (3) The program described in this section shall be
- 16 administered by the Michigan department of energy, labor, and
- 17 economic growth.
- Sec. 504. (1) Included in part 1 is funding for the Martin
- 19 Luther King, Jr. Cesar Chavez Rosa Parks college/university
- 20 partnership program between 4-year public and independent colleges
- 21 and universities and public community colleges, which is intended
- 22 to increase the number of academically or economically
- 23 disadvantaged students who transfer from community colleges into
- 24 baccalaureate programs. Preference may not be given to participants
- 25 on the basis of race, color, ethnicity, gender, or national origin.
- 26 Institutions should encourage participation from those who would
- 27 otherwise not adequately be represented in the transfer student

- 2 (2) The grants shall be made under the program described in
- 3 this section to Michigan public and independent colleges and
- 4 universities. An award to any 1 institution shall not be greater
- 5 than \$150,000.00, and the amount awarded shall be matched on a 70%
- 6 state, 30% college or university basis.
- 7 (3) The program described in this section shall be
- 8 administered by the Michigan department of energy, labor, and
- 9 economic growth.
- Sec. 505. (1) Included in the appropriation for each public
- 11 university in part 1 is funding for the Martin Luther King, Jr. -
- 12 Cesar Chavez Rosa Parks visiting professors program which is
- 13 intended to increase the number of instructors in the classroom to
- 14 provide role models for academically or economically disadvantaged
- 15 students. Preference may not be given to participants on the basis
- 16 of race, color, ethnicity, gender, or national origin. Public
- 17 universities should encourage participation from those who would
- 18 otherwise not adequately be represented in the student population.
- 19 (2) The program described in this section shall be
- 20 administered by the Michigan department of energy, labor, and
- 21 economic growth.
- 22 Sec. 506. (1) Included in the appropriation in part 1 is
- 23 funding under the Martin Luther King, Jr. Cesar Chavez Rosa
- 24 Parks initiative for the Morris Hood, Jr. educator development
- 25 program which is intended to increase the number of academically or
- 26 economically disadvantaged students who enroll in and complete K-12
- 27 teacher education programs at the baccalaureate level. Preference

- 1 may not be given to participants on the basis of race, color,
- 2 ethnicity, gender, or national origin. Institutions should
- 3 encourage participation from those who would otherwise not
- 4 adequately be represented in the teacher education student
- 5 population.
- 6 (2) The program described in this section shall be
- 7 administered by each state-approved teacher education institution
- 8 in a manner prescribed by the Michigan department of energy, labor,
- 9 and economic growth.
- 10 (3) Approved teacher education institutions may and are
- 11 encouraged to use student support services funding in coordination
- 12 with the Morris Hood, Jr. funding to achieve the goals of the
- 13 program described in this section.
- 14 Sec. 507. Each institution receiving funds under section 503,
- 15 504, or 506 shall notify the Michigan department of energy, labor,
- 16 and economic growth by April 15, 2011 as to whether it will expend

- 23 Sec. 601. (1) From the amount appropriated in part 1, the
- 24 public universities shall systematically inform Michigan high
- 25 schools regarding the academic status of students from each high
- 26 school in a manner prescribed by the presidents council, state
- 27 universities of Michigan in cooperation with the Michigan

- 1 association of secondary school principals.
- 2 (2) The Michigan high schools shall systematically inform the
- 3 public universities about the use of information received under
- 4 this section in a manner prescribed by the Michigan association of
- 5 secondary school principals in cooperation with the presidents
- 6 council, state universities of Michigan.
- 7 Sec. 602. From the amount appropriated in part 1, the public
- 8 universities shall inform Michigan community colleges regarding the
- 9 academic status of community college transfer students in a manner
- 10 prescribed by the presidents council, state universities of
- 11 Michigan in cooperation with the Michigan community college
- 12 association.
- 13 Sec. 603. Public universities shall work with the state
- 14 community colleges to encourage the transfer of students from the
- 15 community colleges to the state universities and to facilitate the
- 16 transfer of credits from the community colleges to the public
- 17 universities.

18 GENERAL REPORTS AND AUDITS

- 19 Sec. 701. (1) The auditor general shall review higher
- 20 education institutional data inventory (HEIDI) enrollment data
- 21 submitted by all public universities and may perform audits of
- 22 selected public universities if determined necessary. The review
- 23 and audits shall be based upon the definitions, requirements, and
- 24 uniform reporting categories established by the state budget
- 25 director in consultation with the HEIDI advisory committee. The
- 26 auditor general shall submit a report of findings to the house and
- 27 senate appropriations committees and the state budget director no

- 1 later than July 1, 2011.
- 2 (2) Student credit hours reports shall not include the
- 3 following:
- 4 (a) Student credit hours generated through instructional
- 5 activity by faculty or staff in classrooms located outside
- 6 Michigan, with the exception of instructional activity related to
- 7 study-abroad programs or field programs.
- 8 (b) Student credit hours generated through distance learning
- 9 instruction for students not eligible for the public university's
- 10 in-state main campus resident tuition rate. However, in instances
- 11 where a student is enrolled in distance education and non-distance
- 12 education credit hours in a given term and the student's non-
- 13 distance education enrollment is at a campus or site located within
- 14 Michigan, student credit hours per the student's eligibility for
- in-state or out-of-state tuition rates may be reported.
- 16 (c) Student credit hours generated through credit by
- 17 examination.
- 18 (d) Student credit hours generated through inmate prison
- 19 programs regardless of teaching location.
- 20 (e) Student credit hours generated in new degree programs
- 21 after January 1, 1975, that have not been specifically authorized
- 22 for funding by the legislature, except spin-off programs converted
- 23 from existing core programs that do all of the following:
- 24 (i) Represent new options, fields, or concentrations within
- 25 existing programs.
- 26 (ii) Are consistent with the current institutional role and
- 27 mission.

- 1 (iii) Are accommodated within the continuing funding base of the
- public university.
- (iv) Do not require a new degree level beyond that which the
- 4 public university is currently authorized to grant within that
- 5 discipline or field.
- 6 (v) Do not require funding from the state other than that
- 7 provided by the student credit hours generated within the program,
- 8 either before program initiation or within the first 3 years of
- 9 program operation.
- 10 (3) The auditor general shall periodically audit higher
- 11 education institutional data inventory (HEIDI) data as submitted by
- 12 the public universities for compliance with the definitions
- 13 established by the state budget director in consultation with the
- 14 HEIDI advisory committee for the HEIDI database.
- 15 (4) "Distance learning instruction" as used in subsection (2)
- 16 means instruction that occurs solely in other than a traditional
- 17 classroom setting where the student and instructor are in the same
- 18 physical location and for which a student receives course credits
- 19 and is charged tuition and fees. Examples of distance learning
- 20 instruction are instruction delivered solely through the Internet,
- 21 cable television, teleconference, or mail.
- 22 Sec. 702. The principal executive officer of each public
- 23 university receiving an appropriation under part 1 shall expend a
- 24 portion of the funds appropriated to that public university to make
- 25 a report to the auditor general, the house and senate fiscal
- 26 agencies, and the state budget director within 60 days after the
- 27 auditor general issues his or her report on the operation of the

- 1 institution. The public university's report shall specify all of
- 2 the following:
- 3 (a) The recommendations of the auditor general implemented by
- 4 the public university, including projected dates and resources
- 5 required, if any, to achieve compliance.
- 6 (b) The recommendations of the auditor general not implemented

- 9 (c) The rationale for not implementing a recommendation of the
- 10 auditor general or of implementing a recommendation as modified.
- 11 Sec. 708. The auditor general may conduct performance audits
- 12 of public universities receiving funds in part 1 during the fiscal
- 13 year ending September 30, 2011 as the auditor general considers
- 14 necessary.
- 15 Sec. 709. A public university receiving funds under part 1 and
- 16 also subject to the student right-to-know and campus security act,
- 17 Public Law 101-542, 104 Stat. 2381, shall make a copy of all
- 18 material prepared pursuant to the public information reporting
- 19 requirements under the crime awareness and campus security act of
- 20 1990, title II of the student right-to-know and campus security
- 21 act, Public Law 101-542, 104 Stat. 2381, available in electronic
- 22 Internet format on their websites.
- Sec. 714. A public university receiving funds under this bill
- 24 and also subject to the family educational rights and privacy act
- 25 (FERPA), 20 USC 1232g, 34 CFR part 99, shall, when requested,
- 26 provide information from the records of a student to any person or
- 27 persons to whom the student has authorized disclosure on a written

1 consent form pursuant to 34 CFR 99.30.
