

SENATE BILL No. 301

EXECUTIVE BUDGET BILL

March 3, 2009, Introduced by Senator SWITALSKI and referred to the Committee on Appropriations.

A bill to make appropriations for the department of education and certain other purposes relating to education for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2010; to provide for the expenditure of the appropriations; to prescribe the powers and duties of certain state departments, school districts, and other governmental bodies; and to provide for the disposition of fees and other income received by certain legal entities and state agencies.

PART 1

20 PROVISIONS CONCERNING APPROPRIATIONS

21 **GENERAL SECTIONS**

22 Sec. 201. Pursuant to section 30 of article IX of the state

23 constitution of 1963, total state spending from state resources

24 under part 1 for fiscal year 2009-2010 is \$33,428,600.00 and state

25 spending from state resources to be paid to local units of

government for fiscal year 2009-2010 is \$10,505,000.00. The itemized statement below identifies appropriations from which spending to local units of government will occur:

Sec. 202. The appropriations authorized under this bill are subject to the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1101 to 18.1594.

Sec. 203. As used in this bill:

(a) "Department" means the Michigan department of education.

(b) "District" means a local school district as defined in section 6 of the revised school code, 1976 PA 451, MCL 380.6, or a public school academy as defined in section 5 of the revised school code, 1976 PA 451, MCL 380.5.

(c) "FTE" means full-time equated.

(d) "IMLS" means institute of museum and library services.

Sec. 204. The civil service commission shall bill departments and agencies at the end of the first fiscal quarter for the charges authorized by section 5 of article XI of the state constitution of 1963. Payments shall be made for the total amount of the billing by the end of the second fiscal quarter.

Sec. 205. The department shall use the Internet to fulfill the reporting requirements of this bill. This requirement may include transmission of reports via electronic mail to the recipients identified for each reporting requirement, or it may include

1 placement of reports on an Internet or Intranet site.

2 Sec. 206. The department shall provide through the Internet
3 the state board of education agenda and all supporting documents,
4 and shall notify the state budget director and the senate and house
5 fiscal agencies that the agenda and supporting documents are
6 available on the Internet, at the time the agenda and supporting
7 documents are provided to state board of education members.

8 Sec. 207. (1) Upon receipt of the federal drug-free grant, the
9 department shall allocate \$225,000.00 of the grant to the safe
10 school program within the department. The safe school program shall
11 work with local school boards, parents of enrolled students, law
12 enforcement agencies, community leaders, and the office of drug
13 control policy for the prevention of school violence. The safe
14 school program shall develop and implement, and serve as
15 coordinator of, a statewide clearinghouse for information, program
16 development, model programs and policies, and technical assistance
17 on school violence prevention.

18 (2) To accomplish its functions under this section, the safe
19 school program shall do all of the following:

20 (a) Coordinate with the office of drug control policy in the
21 department of community health to ensure that there is a meaningful
22 linkage between the efforts under this bill to provide safe schools
23 and the initiatives undertaken through that office, including, but
24 not limited to, school districts' safe and drug-free school plans,
25 and to facilitate timely applications for and distribution of
26 available grant money.

27 (b) Provide through the Internet the availability to access,

1 and provide through the Internet information regarding, the state
2 model policy on locker searches, the state model policy on firearm
3 safety and awareness, and any other state or local safety policies
4 that the office considers exemplary.

5 (c) Advance, promote, and encourage the awareness and use of
6 the state police anti-violence hotline.

7 Sec. 208. The department shall require all public school
8 districts to maintain complete records within the personnel file of
9 a teacher or school employee of any disciplinary actions taken by
10 the local school board against the teacher or employee for sexual
11 misconduct. The records shall not be destroyed or removed from the
12 teacher's or employee's personnel file except as required by a
13 court order.

14 Sec. 209. From the funds appropriated in part 1 for
15 information technology, departments and agencies shall pay user
16 fees to the department of information technology for technology-
17 related services and projects. Such user fees shall be subject to
18 provisions of an interagency agreement between the departments and
19 agencies and the department of information technology.

20 Sec. 212. Funds appropriated in part 1 shall not be used for
21 the purchase of foreign goods or services, or both, if
22 competitively priced and of comparable quality American goods or
23 services, or both, are available. Preference shall be given to
24 goods or services, or both, manufactured or provided by Michigan
25 businesses, if they are competitively priced and of comparable
26 quality. In addition, preference should be given to goods or
27 services, or both, that are manufactured or provided by Michigan

1 businesses owned and operated by veterans, if they are
2 competitively priced and of comparable quality.

3 Sec. 214. (1) Due to the current budgetary problems in this
4 state, out-of-state travel for the fiscal year ending September 30,
5 2010 shall be limited to situations in which 1 or more of the
6 following conditions apply:

7 (a) The travel is required by legal mandate or court order or
8 for law enforcement purposes.

9 (b) The travel is necessary to protect the health or safety of
10 Michigan citizens or visitors or to assist other states in similar
11 circumstances.

12 (c) The travel is necessary to produce budgetary savings or to
13 increase state revenues, including protecting existing federal
14 funds or securing additional federal funds.

15 (d) The travel is necessary to comply with federal
16 requirements.

17 (e) The travel is necessary to secure specialized training for
18 staff that is not available within this state.

19 (f) The travel is financed entirely by federal or nonstate
20 funds.

21 (2) Not later than January 1 of each year, each department
22 shall prepare a travel report listing all travel by classified and
23 unclassified employees outside this state in the immediately
24 preceding fiscal year that was funded in whole or in part with
25 funds appropriated in the department's budget. The report shall be
26 submitted to the senate and house of representatives standing
27 committees on appropriations, the senate and house fiscal agencies,

1 and the state budget director. The report shall include the
2 following information:

3 (a) The name of each person receiving reimbursement for travel
4 outside this state or whose travel costs were paid by this state.

5 (b) The destination of each travel occurrence.

6 (c) The dates of each travel occurrence.

7 (d) A brief statement of the reason for each travel
8 occurrence.

9 (e) The transportation and related costs of each travel
10 occurrence, including the proportion funded with state general
11 fund/general purpose revenues, the proportion funded with state
12 restricted revenues, the proportion funded with federal revenues,
13 and the proportion funded with other revenues.

14 (f) A total of all out-of-state travel funded for the
15 immediately preceding fiscal year.

16 Sec. 217. The director shall take all reasonable steps to
17 ensure businesses in deprived and depressed communities compete for
18 and perform contracts to provide services or supplies, or both. The
19 director shall strongly encourage firms with which the department
20 contracts to subcontract with certified businesses in depressed and
21 deprived communities for services, supplies, or both.

22 Sec. 219. (1) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1,
23 there is appropriated an amount not to exceed \$5,000,000.00 for
24 federal contingency funds. These funds are not available for
25 expenditure until they have been transferred to another line item
26 in this bill under section 393(2) of the management and budget act,
27 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1393.

1 (2) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1, there is
2 appropriated an amount not to exceed \$700,000.00 for state
3 restricted contingency funds. These funds are not available for
4 expenditure until they have been transferred to another line item
5 in this bill under section 393(2) of the management and budget act,
6 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1393.

7 (3) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1, there is
8 appropriated an amount not to exceed \$250,000.00 for local
9 contingency funds. These funds are not available for expenditure
10 until they have been transferred to another line item in this bill
11 under section 393(2) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431,
12 MCL 18.1393.

13 (4) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1, there is
14 appropriated an amount not to exceed \$3,000,000.00 for private
15 contingency funds. These funds are not available for expenditure
16 until they have been transferred to another line item in this bill
17 under section 393(2) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431,
18 MCL 18.1393.

19 Sec. 221. Funds appropriated in part 1 shall not be used by a
20 principal executive department, state agency, or authority to hire
21 a person to provide legal services that are the responsibility of
22 the attorney general. This prohibition does not apply to legal
23 services for bonding activities and for those activities that the
24 attorney general authorizes.

25 **STATE BOARD/OFFICE OF THE SUPERINTENDENT**

26 Sec. 301. (1) The appropriations in part 1 may be used for per

1 diem payments to the state board for meetings at which a quorum is
2 present or for performing official business authorized by the state
3 board. The per diem payments shall be at a rate as follows:

4 (a) State board of education - president - \$110.00 per day.

5 (b) State board of education - member other than president -
6 \$100.00 per day.

7 (2) A state board of education member shall not be paid a per
8 diem for more than 30 days per year.

9 (3) The state board executive shall report to the public, the
10 senate and house fiscal agencies, and the state budget director the
11 previous quarter's expenses by fund source for members of the state
12 board of education.

13 Sec. 302. From the amount appropriated in part 1 to the state
14 board of education, not more than \$35,000.00 shall be expended for
15 in-state travel and out-of-state travel directly related to the
16 duties of the state board of education.

17 **MICHIGAN SCHOOLS FOR THE DEAF AND BLIND**

18 Sec. 401. The employees at the Michigan schools for the deaf
19 and blind who work on a school year basis shall be considered
20 annual employees for purposes of service credits, retirement, and
21 insurance benefits.

22 Sec. 402. For each student enrolled at the Michigan schools
23 for the deaf and blind, the department shall assess the
24 intermediate school district of residence 100% of the cost of
25 operating the student's instructional program. The amount shall
26 exclude room and board related costs and the cost of weekend

1 transportation between the school and the student's home.

2 Sec. 404. (1) The department may assess rent or lease excess
3 property located on the campus of the Michigan schools for the deaf
4 and blind in Flint to private or publicly funded organizations.

5 (2) In addition to those funds appropriated in part 1, the
6 department may receive and expend additional funds from lease
7 agreements at the Michigan schools for the deaf and blind Flint
8 campus that have been negotiated with the approval of the
9 department of management and budget. These funds are appropriated
10 to the department for the operation, maintenance, and renovation
11 expenses associated with the leased space.

12 (3) From the unexpended balances of appropriations for the
13 schools for the deaf and blind operations, up to \$250,000.00 of any
14 unexpended and unencumbered funds remaining on September 30, 2010
15 may be carried forward as a work project and expended for special
16 maintenance and repairs of facilities at the campus of the Michigan
17 schools for the deaf and blind in Flint. The work shall be carried
18 out by state employees, or by contract as necessary, at an
19 estimated cost of \$250,000.00. The estimated completion date of the
20 work is September 30, 2011.

21 (4) From the tenant rent appropriation for Fay hall, up to
22 \$100,000.00 of any unexpended and unencumbered funds remaining on
23 September 30, 2010 may be carried forward as a work project or as
24 restricted revenue and expended for special maintenance and repairs
25 of facilities at Fay hall. The work project may be performed by
26 state employees, or by contract when necessary, at an estimated
27 cost of \$100,000.00. The estimated completion date of the work

1 project is September 30, 2011.

2 Sec. 405. The department may assist the department of
3 community health, other departments, and local school districts to
4 secure reimbursement for eligible services provided in Michigan
5 schools from the federal Medicaid program. The department may
6 submit reports of direct expenses related to this effort to the
7 department of community health for reimbursement.

8 Sec. 406. (1) The Michigan schools for the deaf and blind may
9 promote its residential program as a possible appropriate option
10 for children who are deaf or hard of hearing or who are blind or
11 visually impaired. The Michigan schools for the deaf and blind
12 shall distribute information detailing its services to all
13 intermediate school districts in the state.

14 (2) Upon knowledge of or recognition by an intermediate school
15 district that a child in the district is deaf or hard of hearing or
16 blind or visually impaired, the intermediate school district shall
17 provide to the parents of the child the literature distributed by
18 the Michigan schools for the deaf and blind to intermediate school
19 districts under subsection (1).

20 (3) Parents will continue to have a choice regarding the
21 educational placement of their deaf or hard of hearing children.

22 Sec. 407. Revenue received from gifts, bequests, and donations
23 that is unexpended at the end of the state fiscal year may be
24 carried over to the succeeding fiscal year and may not revert to
25 the general fund.

26 **PROFESSIONAL PREPARATION SERVICES**

1 Sec. 501. From the funds appropriated in part 1 for
2 professional preparation services, the department shall maintain
3 the professional personnel register and certificate
4 revocation/felony conviction files.

5 Sec. 502. The department shall authorize teacher preparation
6 institutions to provide an alternative program by which up to 1/2
7 of the required student internship or student teaching credits may
8 be earned through substitute teaching. The department shall require
9 that teacher preparation institutions collaborate with school
10 districts to ensure that the quality of instruction provided to
11 student teachers is comparable to that required in a traditional
12 student teaching program.

13 Sec. 506. Revenue received from teacher testing fees that is
14 unexpended at the end of the state fiscal year may be carried over
15 to the succeeding fiscal year and may not revert to the general
16 fund.

17 OFFICE OF SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT

18 Sec. 601. From the amount appropriated in part 1 for the
19 office of school improvement, there is allocated \$350,000.00 and
20 3.5 FTE positions to operate a charter school office to administer
21 charter school legislation and associated regulations, and to
22 coordinate the activities of the department relating to charter
23 schools.

24 Sec. 603. The funds appropriated in part 1 for subject area
25 content expectations and guidelines shall be used for the
26 development, approval, and implementation of subject area content

1 expectations and guidelines that apply to the credit requirements
2 of the Michigan merit standard, as required under section 1278b of
3 the revised school code, 1976 PA 451, MCL 380.1278b.

4 **INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY**

5 Sec. 701. The department shall work in collaboration with the
6 center for educational performance and information to support the
7 comprehensive educational information system and all data
8 collection and reporting efforts of the department.

9 **LIBRARY OF MICHIGAN**

10 Sec. 801. In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1, the
11 funds collected by the department for document reproduction and
12 services; conferences, workshops, and training classes; and the use
13 of specialized equipment, facilities, and software are appropriated
14 for all expenses necessary to provide the required services. These
15 funds are available for expenditure when they are received and may
16 be carried forward into the next succeeding fiscal year.

17 Sec. 802. In order to receive subregional state aid as
18 appropriated in part 1, a regional or subregional library's fiscal
19 agency must agree to maintain local funding support at the same
20 level in the current fiscal year as in the fiscal agency's
21 preceding fiscal year. If a reduction in expenditures equally
22 affects all agencies in a local unit of government that is the
23 regional or subregional library's fiscal agency, that reduction
24 shall not be interpreted as a reduction in local support and shall
25 not disqualify a regional or subregional library from receiving

1 state aid under part 1. If a reduction in income affects a library
2 cooperative or district library that is a regional or subregional
3 library's fiscal agency or a reduction in expenditures for the
4 regional or subregional library's fiscal agency, a reduction in
5 expenditures for the regional or subregional library shall not be
6 interpreted as a reduction in local support and shall not
7 disqualify a regional or subregional library from receiving state
8 aid under part 1.

9 Sec. 803. The funds appropriated in part 1 for a regional or
10 subregional library shall not be released until a budget for that
11 regional or subregional library has been approved by the department
12 for expenditures for library services directly serving the blind
13 and persons with disabilities.

14 **GRANTS ADMINISTRATION AND SCHOOL SUPPORT SERVICES**

15 Sec. 901. Within 10 days of the receipt of a grant
16 appropriated in the federal and private grants line item in part 1,
17 the department shall notify the house and senate chairpersons of
18 the appropriations subcommittees responsible for the department
19 budget, the house and senate fiscal agencies, and the state budget
20 director of the receipt of the grant, including the funding source,
21 purpose, and amount of the grant.
