## **OVERVIEW**

In a letter dated May 21, 2012, the State Budget Office (SBO) submitted FY 2011-12 supplemental requests totaling \$97.2 million Gross. Included in this supplemental request were one-time funding requests from funds awarded to the state of Michigan under the joint state-federal foreclosure settlement entered into by state Attorneys General and five national mortgage servicers. The \$25 billion settlement provides a total of \$2.5 billion to state attorneys general to provide foreclosure relief and housing programs.

The following programs were recommended for funding by the Attorney General and Governor: foreclosure counseling for homeowners, restitution for victims of foreclosure rescue scams, creation of a home protection unit within the Attorney General's office, support for the Michigan Housing and Community Development Fund, assistance for school children displaced by foreclosure, assistance for military service members, support of the Education Achievement Authority, and blight elimination programs. House Bill 5015 (S-3) contains some of those items but allocates a portion of the funding for other proposed foreclosure-related programs. Gross funding for these items totals only \$87.2 million because \$10.0 million in the Department of Education budget was previously appropriated from GF/GP funds.

Additionally, House Bill 5015 (S-3) includes various supplemental appropriation adjustments not related to the Joint State-Federal Foreclosure Settlement for the Department of Community Health, Department of Human Services, Department of State Police, and the Department of Transportation. These items total \$1.6 million in Gross appropriations (\$869,500 GF/GP).
