SENATE BILL No. 47

by amending section 32d (MCL 388.1632d), as amended by 2012 PA 201.

## THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF MICHIGAN ENACT:

- Sec. 32d. (1) From the funds appropriated in section 11, there is allocated to eligible intermediate districts and consortia of intermediate districts for great start readiness programs an amount not to exceed \$109,275,000.00 for 2012-2013. Funds allocated under this section shall be used to provide part-day, school-day, or GSRP/head start blended comprehensive free compensatory classroom programs designed to do 1 or both of the following:
  - (a) Improve the readiness and subsequent achievement of educationally disadvantaged children, as defined by the department, who will be at least 4, but less than 5 years of age, as of

- 1 December 1 of the school year in which the programs are offered,
- 2 and who meet the participant eligibility and prioritization
- 3 guidelines as defined by the state board. SUBJECT TO SUBSECTION
- 4 (13), BEGINNING WITH THE 2012-2013 SCHOOL YEAR, FOR A CHILD TO BE
- 5 ELIGIBLE TO PARTICIPATE IN A PROGRAM UNDER THIS SECTION, THE CHILD
- 6 SHALL BE AT LEAST 4, BUT LESS THAN 5, YEARS OF AGE, AS OF THE DATE
- 7 SPECIFIED FOR DETERMINING A CHILD'S ELIGIBILITY TO ATTEND SCHOOL
- 8 UNDER SECTION 1147 OF THE REVISED SCHOOL CODE, MCL 380.1147.
- 9 HOWEVER, A CHILD IS ALSO ELIGIBLE TO PARTICIPATE IN A PROGRAM UNDER
- 10 THIS SECTION AS FOLLOWS:
- 11 (i) FOR THE 2013-2014 PROGRAM YEAR, THE CHILD IS 5 YEARS OF AGE
- 12 AND HIS OR HER BIRTHDATE IS AFTER NOVEMBER 1 BUT ON OR BEFORE
- 13 DECEMBER 1.
- 14 (ii) FOR THE 2014-2015 PROGRAM YEAR, THE CHILD IS 5 YEARS OF
- 15 AGE AND HIS OR HER BIRTHDATE IS AFTER OCTOBER 1 BUT ON OR BEFORE
- 16 NOVEMBER 1.
- 17 (iii) FOR THE 2015-2016 PROGRAM YEAR, THE CHILD IS 5 YEARS OF
- 18 AGE AND HIS OR HER BIRTHDATE IS AFTER SEPTEMBER 1 BUT ON OR BEFORE
- 19 OCTOBER 1.
- 20 (b) Provide preschool and parenting education programs similar
- 21 to those under former section 32b as in effect for 2001-2002.
- 22 Beginning in 2007-2008, funds spent for programs described in this
- 23 subdivision shall not exceed the amount spent under this
- 24 subdivision for the immediately preceding fiscal year. Funds spent
- 25 for programs described in this subdivision shall be used for
- 26 services to families with income below 300% of the federal poverty
- 27 level.

- 1 (2) Funds allocated under this section shall be allocated to
- 2 intermediate districts or consortia of intermediate districts. An
- 3 intermediate district or consortium of intermediate districts
- 4 receiving funding under this section shall act as the fiduciary for
- 5 the great start readiness programs. For 2012-2013, the fiduciary
- 6 intermediate districts and consortia of intermediate districts
- 7 shall allocate the funding under this section as follows:
- 8 (a) An amount not to exceed \$100,400,000.00 allocated to
- 9 intermediate districts and consortia of intermediate districts as
- 10 directed by the department based on the formula in section 39. In
- 11 order to be eligible to receive funds allocated under this
- 12 subdivision from an intermediate district or consortium of
- 13 intermediate districts, a district or consortium of districts shall
- 14 comply with this section and section 39.
- 15 (b) An amount not to exceed \$8,875,000.00 allocated in grants
- 16 to competitive great start readiness programs as directed by the
- 17 department based on the grant award process in section 32l. In order
- 18 to be eliqible to receive funds allocated under this section from
- 19 an intermediate district or consortium of intermediate districts, a
- 20 competitive great start readiness program shall comply with this
- **21** section and section 32l.
- 22 (3) In addition to the allocation under subsection (1), from
- 23 the general fund money appropriated under section 11, there is
- 24 allocated an amount not to exceed \$300,000.00 for 2012-2013 for a
- 25 competitive grant to continue a longitudinal evaluation of children
- 26 who have participated in great start readiness programs.
- 27 (4) To be eligible for funding under this section, a program

- 1 shall prepare children for success in school through comprehensive
- 2 part-day, school-day, or GSRP/head start blended programs that
- 3 contain all of the following program components, as determined by
- 4 the department:
- 5 (a) Participation in a collaborative recruitment and
- 6 enrollment process. At a minimum, the process shall include all
- 7 other funded preschool programs that may serve children in the same
- 8 geographic area, to assure that each child is enrolled in the
- 9 program most appropriate to his or her needs and to maximize the
- 10 use of federal, state, and local funds.
- 11 (b) An age-appropriate educational curriculum that is in
- 12 compliance with the early childhood standards of quality for
- 13 prekindergarten children adopted by the state board.
- 14 (c) Nutritional services for all program participants.
- 15 (d) Health and developmental screening services for all
- 16 program participants.
- 17 (e) Referral services for families of program participants to
- 18 community social service agencies, as appropriate.
- 19 (f) Active and continuous involvement of the parents or
- 20 guardians of the program participants.
- 21 (g) A plan to conduct and report annual great start readiness
- 22 program evaluations and continuous improvement plans using criteria
- 23 approved by the department.
- 24 (h) Participation in a multidistrict, multiagency, school
- 25 readiness advisory committee that provides for the involvement of
- 26 classroom teachers, parents or guardians of program participants,
- 27 and community, volunteer, and social service agencies and

- 1 organizations, as appropriate. The advisory committee annually
- 2 shall review the program components listed in this subsection and
- 3 make recommendations for changes to the great start readiness
- 4 program for which it is an advisory committee.
- 5 (i) The ongoing articulation of the kindergarten and first
- 6 grade programs offered by the program provider.
- 7 (5) An application for funding under this section shall
- 8 provide for the following, in a form and manner determined by the
- 9 department:
- 10 (a) Ensure compliance with all program components described in
- 11 subsection (4).
- 12 (b) Ensure that more than 75% of the children participating in
- 13 an eligible great start readiness program are children who live
- 14 with families with a household income that is equal to or less than
- 15 300% of the federal poverty level.
- 16 (c) Ensure that the applicant only uses qualified personnel
- 17 for this program, as follows:
- 18 (i) Teachers possessing proper training. For programs managed
- 19 directly by a district or intermediate district, a valid teaching
- 20 certificate and an early childhood (ZA or ZS) endorsement are
- 21 required. This provision does not apply to a district, intermediate
- 22 district, or competitive program that subcontracts with an eligible
- 23 child development program. In that situation, a teacher must have a
- 24 valid Michigan teaching certificate with an early childhood (ZA or
- 25 ZS) endorsement, a valid Michigan elementary teaching certificate
- 26 with a child development associate credential, or a bachelor's
- 27 degree in child development with specialization in preschool

- 1 teaching. However, if an applicant demonstrates to the department
- 2 that it is unable to fully comply with this subparagraph after
- 3 making reasonable efforts to comply, teachers who have significant
- 4 but incomplete training in early childhood education or child
- 5 development may be used if the applicant provides to the
- 6 department, and the department approves, a plan for each teacher to
- 7 come into compliance with the standards in this subparagraph. A
- 8 teacher's compliance plan must be completed within 2 years of the
- 9 date of employment. Progress toward completion of the compliance
- 10 plan shall consist of at least 2 courses per calendar year.
- 11 (ii) Paraprofessionals possessing proper training in early
- 12 childhood development, including an associate's degree in early
- 13 childhood education or child development or the equivalent, or a
- 14 child development associate (CDA) credential. However, if an
- 15 applicant demonstrates to the department that it is unable to fully
- 16 comply with this subparagraph after making reasonable efforts to
- 17 comply, the applicant may use paraprofessionals who have completed
- 18 at least 1 course that earns college credit in early childhood
- 19 education or child development if the applicant provides to the
- 20 department, and the department approves, a plan for each
- 21 paraprofessional to come into compliance with the standards in this
- 22 subparagraph. A paraprofessional's compliance plan must be
- 23 completed within 2 years of the date of employment. Progress toward
- 24 completion of the compliance plan shall consist of at least 2
- 25 courses or 60 clock hours of training per calendar year.
- 26 (d) Include a program budget that contains only those costs
- 27 that are not reimbursed or reimbursable by federal funding, that

- 1 are clearly and directly attributable to the great start readiness
- 2 program, and that would not be incurred if the program were not
- 3 being offered. The program budget shall indicate the extent to
- 4 which these funds will supplement other federal, state, local, or
- 5 private funds. Funds received under this section shall not be used
- 6 to supplant any federal funds by the applicant to serve children
- 7 eligible for a federally funded existing preschool program that has
- 8 the capacity to serve those children.
- 9 (6) For a grant recipient that enrolls pupils in a school-day
- 10 program funded under this section, each child enrolled in the
- 11 school-day program shall be counted as 2 children served by the
- 12 program for purposes of determining the number of children to be
- 13 served and for determining the amount of the grant award. A grant
- 14 award shall not be increased solely on the basis of providing a
- 15 school-day program.
- 16 (7) An intermediate district or consortium of intermediate
- 17 districts receiving a grant under this section may contract with
- 18 for-profit or nonprofit preschool center providers that meet all
- 19 requirements of subsection (4) and retain for administrative
- 20 services an amount equal to not more than 5% of the grant amount.
- 21 An intermediate district, consortium of intermediate districts, or
- 22 competitive grant program may expend not more than 10% of the total
- 23 grant amount for administration of the program.
- 24 (8) Any public or private for-profit or nonprofit legal entity
- 25 or agency may apply for a competitive grant under this section.
- 26 However, a district or intermediate district may not apply for a
- 27 competitive grant under this section unless the district,

- 1 intermediate district, or consortium of districts or intermediate
- 2 districts is acting as a local grantee for the federal head start
- 3 program operating under the head start act, 42 USC 9831 to 9852.
- 4 (9) A recipient of funds under this section shall report to
- 5 the department in a form and manner prescribed by the department
- 6 the number of children participating in the program who meet the
- 7 income or other eligibility criteria prescribed by the department
- 8 and the total number of children participating in the program. For
- 9 children participating in the program who meet the income or other
- 10 eligibility criteria specified under subsection (5)(b), a recipient
- 11 shall also report whether or not a parent is available to provide
- 12 care based on employment status. For the purposes of this
- 13 subsection, "employment status" shall be defined by the department
- 14 of human services in a manner consistent with maximizing the amount
- 15 of spending that may be claimed for temporary assistance for needy
- 16 families maintenance of effort purposes.
- 17 (10) As used in this section:
- (a) "GSRP/head start blended program" means a part-day program
- 19 funded under this section and a head start program, which are
- 20 combined for a school-day program.
- (b) "Part-day program" means a program that operates at least
- 22 4 days per week, 30 weeks per year, for at least 3 hours of
- 23 teacher-child contact time per day but for fewer hours of teacher-
- 24 child contact time per day than a school-day program.
- (c) "School-day program" means a program that operates for at
- 26 least the same length of day as a district's first grade program
- 27 for a minimum of 4 days per week, 30 weeks per year. A classroom

- 1 that offers a school-day program must enroll all children for the
- 2 school day to be considered a school-day program.
- 3 (11) A grant recipient receiving funds under this section is
- 4 encouraged to establish a sliding scale of tuition rates based upon
- 5 a child's family income for the purpose of expanding eligible
- 6 programs under this section. A grant recipient may charge tuition
- 7 for programs provided under this section according to that sliding
- 8 scale of tuition rates on a uniform basis for any child who does
- 9 not meet the program eligibility requirements under this section.
- 10 (12) The department shall develop a plan for a multiyear
- 11 phased-in approach to transfer funding for great start readiness
- 12 programs under this section into an early childhood block grant
- 13 program, along with funding for great start collaboratives under
- 14 FORMER section 32b and funding for great parents, great start
- 15 programs under FORMER section 32j. The early childhood block grant
- 16 program will allocate funds to intermediate districts and consortia
- 17 of intermediate districts to act as fiduciaries and provide
- 18 administration of regional early childhood programs in conjunction
- 19 with their regional great start collaborative to improve program
- 20 quality, evaluation, and efficiency for early childhood programs.
- 21 The department shall work with intermediate districts, districts,
- 22 great start collaboratives, and the early childhood investment
- 23 corporation to establish a revised funding formula, application
- 24 process, program criteria, and data reporting requirements.
- 25 (13) IF A CHILD WHO IS OTHERWISE ELIGIBLE TO PARTICIPATE IN A
- 26 PROGRAM UNDER THIS SECTION IS NOT 4 YEARS OF AGE ON THE PROGRAM
- 27 ELIGIBILITY DATE SPECIFIED IN SUBSECTION (1)(A), BUT WILL BE 4

- 1 YEARS OF AGE NOT LATER THAN DECEMBER 1 OF A PROGRAM YEAR, THE CHILD
- 2 SHALL BE ELIGIBLE TO PARTICIPATE IN THE PROGRAM IF THE PARENT OR
- 3 LEGAL GUARDIAN OF THAT CHILD NOTIFIES THE PROGRAM IN WRITING NOT
- 4 LATER THAN JUNE 1 BEFORE THE BEGINNING OF THE PROGRAM YEAR THAT HE
- 5 OR SHE INTENDS TO ENROLL THE CHILD IN THE PROGRAM. A PROGRAM THAT
- 6 RECEIVES THIS WRITTEN NOTIFICATION MAY MAKE A RECOMMENDATION TO THE
- 7 PARENT OR LEGAL GUARDIAN OF A CHILD DESCRIBED IN THIS SUBSECTION
- 8 THAT THE CHILD IS NOT READY TO ENROLL IN THE PROGRAM DUE TO THE
- 9 CHILD'S AGE OR OTHER FACTORS. HOWEVER, REGARDLESS OF THIS
- 10 RECOMMENDATION, THE PARENT OR LEGAL GUARDIAN RETAINS THE SOLE
- 11 DISCRETION TO DETERMINE WHETHER OR NOT TO ENROLL THE CHILD IN A
- 12 PROGRAM UNDER THIS SUBSECTION.
