ANALYSIS

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Senate Bill 940 (Substitute S-1 as reported)

Sponsor: Senator John Proos

Committee: Michigan Competitiveness

CONTENT

The bill would amend the Corrections Code to require the Department of Corrections (DOC) to allow representatives from all nonprofit faith-based, business and professional, civic, and community organizations that applied, to register with the Department to enter correctional facilities in order to provide inmate reentry services, subject to DOC policies and procedures for screening and approving applicants.

Reentry services would include, but not be limited to, counseling, providing information on housing and job placement, and money management assistance.

The Department would have to develop and adopt policies and procedures for screening, approving, and registering organizations and representatives from the organizations listed above that applied to provide inmate reentry services. The DOC could deny approval and registration to an organization or representative if the Department determined that the organization or representative did not meet its screening guidelines.

The DOC would retain discretion to deny entry into a correctional facility at any time to a representative of a listed organization regardless of whether he or she previously applied and was registered with the Department to provide inmate reentry services within a correctional facility.

The DOC would have to post a Department telephone number and provide a registration application on its public internet website for use by representatives from an organization who wished to provide inmate reentry services, to obtain information and begin the application process for registration.

The DOC would be prohibited from endorsing or sponsoring any faith-based reentry program or endorsing any specific religious message. The Department also could not require an inmate to participate in a faith-based program.

The bill would take effect 90 days after enactment.
